According to Louisiana Congressman Otto Passman, chairman of the Foreign Assistance, as of July 1, 1971, including interest on what was borrowed to give away, amounted to \$22,880,797,000. And it required 68,000 employees in 127 countries to give the foreign aid away. Interest on the borrowed money amounted to \$4,434,995,000.

Some of the countries receiving U.S. Foreign Aid are: Republic of China, \$5,096,500,000; Cuba, \$43,700,000; Czechoslovakia, \$188,500,000; East Germany, \$800,000; France, \$7,059,700,000; Germany and Berlin, \$3,652,400,000; Korea, \$10,059,500,000; Poland, \$437,300,000; Romania, \$10,000,000; United Kingdom, \$7,209,100,000; USSR, \$186,400,000; Yugoslavia, \$2,515,600,000.

## Grants Made

The Department of Housing and Urban Development has awarded comprehensive planning grants totaling \$474,247 to eight Texas cities and governmental agencies for research in community development and growth, land use planning and housing and transportation development.

The grants were to Deep East Texas Council of Governments in Jasper, \$45,000; Beaumont, \$50,000; Houston, \$100,500; Austin, \$7,697; Port Arthur, \$50,000; Southeast Regional Planning Commission in Beaumont, \$81,000; Central Texas Council of Governments, \$45,000.


## Little League Season To Begin Monday

Two Chester High School students, Ronnie Watts and Ricky Spivey, won first place in the Regional Debate tournament held in Kilgore on April 14. As a result of this victory over other Class B schools in the region, the Chester Forensics Team will represent Region III in the state finals on May 4-5.

In district competition Spivey and Watts defeated teams from Colmesneil and Evadale to advance to Regional. Eight schools competed in regional competition representing 64 schools in this region. The Chester team defeated teams from Wortham, Conroe-Pickton, and Trinidad in this competition to enable them to advance to the state contest. Chester will be one of the four schools representing over 250 schools from Class B in the state.

Ronnie Watts, sophomore, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Dean Watts of Chester. Watts is a member of the Chester Baptist Church, and is active in many extracurricular activities in the high school. He is a member of the yearbook staff, the Yellowjacket band, and the One-Act Play cast for 1973. He is also active in sports; he is a member of the 1972 District

FOOTBALL TEAM, and placed second in high hurdles, and third in intermediate hurdles at the district track meet.

Ricky Spivey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry E. Spivey, is also a sophomore. Spivey is an active member of the First Baptist Church Youth Choir of Woodville. He is also involved in school activities such as band, one-act play crew, and serves as secretary for the local FFA chapter. Spivey was also a member of the 1972 Yellowjacket football team.

Watts and Spivey are coached by Gary Gazzaway. All forensics teams in the state are debating the same topic: "Resolved: that governmental financial support for all public elementary and secondary education in the United States should be provided exclusively by the federal government."

### Daylight Time Starts Sunday

Everyone will be cheated out of an hour early Sunday, but most people will be asleep and will not notice it.

Daylight-Saving Time begins at 2 a.m. Sunday and all timepieces should be run ahead one hour. Most people will set clocks ahead when retiring Saturday night and have the correct time when they awake Sunday morning.

Remember, run the clock ahead one hour. If you retire at 10 p.m., set your clock at 11 p.m. That way you will be on time to church, work, or whatever you plan to do Sunday morning.

Woodville City Council at its meeting last week passed an ordinance regulating parking on highways 69 and 190 within the city limits.

The ordinance prohibits parking on Highway 69 within the city limits.

On Highway 190 parking will be limited to 30 minutes except from Highway 69 west to Village street where two hour parking will be in effect from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. This area is served by parking meters but after 5 p.m. when meter enforcement ends this area also will have 30 minute parking.

At the beginning of the meeting the oath of office was administered so the newly elected councilmen (see picture) are Clay Miller, re-elected, and Dr. James Jinnette and Webb Ashworth. The latter two replace J. G. Anderson and T. L. Gulley, who did not run again. Ashworth was named mayor pro tem.

The council voted to have an outside audit made by the accounting firm of Neuskaider and Browning, Beaumont.

The council moved the regular meeting date to the second Monday night in each month. However, due to a meeting to be attended in early May, the meeting next month will be on May 21.

## Salvation Army Fund Drive Slated

Robert McCombs has been named 1973 campaign chairman of the Woodville Salvation Army Service Unit's county-wide drive. A civic leader and real estate broker, McCombs has been very active over the years in projects to improve the community. A former grocer, McCombs is active in the First Baptist Church of Woodville. He is also an active member and former president of the Woodville Rotary Club, as well as participant in the Chamber of Commerce.

The general drive kickoff will be Tuesday, May 1 with a goal of \$1,200 as announced by service unit committee chairman Rev. Roger Shuemate. The advance gifts division will begin Wednesday, April 25 as announced by advance gift chairman Tom McGuire, local insurance agent.

Funds raised in this campaign will provide local welfare services for the underprivileged and provide aid to stranded travelers. The service unit also participates in such statewide army programs as disaster relief, help for pre-delinquent girls and unwed mothers, free summer camp for boys and assistance to prisoners, alcoholics and their families.

E. C. Hardin, chairman of the 1973 Boy Scout Fund Drive, announced that the kick-off will be Tuesday, May 1.

The kick-off will be held at 6:30 a.m. at the Colmesneil High School cafeteria. The enrollers and scout leaders will have an early breakfast and program during which Scouting in the Three Rivers Council and the local Dogwood District.

After a record breaking year in 1972 scouting has continued to grow and improve in quality throughout the country.

All men and women who worked on the campaign are invited to attend this early breakfast. The program will be over by 7:15 a.m. to allow for travel to work.

## In Six Counties

## Probation Department Begins Second Year

A six-county probation department in the Deep East Texas region begins its second year of operation, thanks to the foresight of several county judges.

The probation department, located in Polk, Hardin, Tyler, San Jacinto, Trinity and Walker counties, has both adult and juvenile probation officers. This year a continuation grant from the Criminal Justice Council for \$9,935 and local funds of \$30,300 from the participating counties and the state, bringing the money available for 1973-74 operating costs to \$20,141.

The program began in March 1971 as a three-county effort, spearheaded by Polk County Judge Peyton Walters. That 1971 grant from CJC amounted to \$22,516 and the three counties - Polk, San Jacinto, with County Judge J. R. Page and Trinity, with County Judge J. V. Price - contributed \$4,506, for a total amount of \$30,021. That first probation department served juveniles only.

In September of 1971, Hardin County Judge Emmett Lack, along with Tyler County Judge Tom D. Mann, felt that their counties needed a probation department.

"We realized, along with the original three counties, that adult probation was also imperative," Judge Lack said.

"A lot of adults now in prison could be rehabilitated and become self-sufficient productive members of the community," he added.

So in September of 1971, Hardin and Tyler counties joined the 3-county probation department, bringing the total number of participating counties up to five.

Adult probation was also added at that time, and the grant revised to compensate for the additions. CJC contributions then totaled \$44,443, with the five counties adding \$14,815 for the com-

plete \$59,258 for operating costs.

In March of 1972, the department was expanded to six counties, taking in Walker County, and Walker County Judge Amos Gates, a neighbor to the west of San Jacinto County.

Judge Lack said, "Judge Walters, Judge Mann, the other judges, and myself, felt that Walker County could contribute to our five-county group, and also benefit greatly from the services offered."

The grant that year (1972-73) totaled \$112,657, with CJC putting in \$84,493 and the counties contributing \$28,164.

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Currently the probation department consists of one Chief Probation Officer, three Adult Probation Officers, three Juvenile Probation Officers and three secretaries.

Lucille G. Plane is the Chief Probation Officer and the director of the probation department. Her main office is in Livingston in Polk County.

Spencer Honey is the adult probation officer for Tyler and Hardin counties, and the Juvenile Probation officer in that area is Roger Harrell. They are based in Kountze with a sub office in Woodville.

"Stand up for Jesus" will be the theme of a special Crusade to be held at the Chester High School auditorium Friday and Saturday, April 27-28 at 7:30 p.m.

Wayne Parker will lead the crusade. He is from Beaumont, where he served as a lay-preacher and also works as a lab technician with Mobil Chemical Co.

Several people will appear on the program as they share their testimonies for Jesus.

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## HOMEMAKING HINTS

Spring weather brings out tools and play equipment. Before using outdoor tools or play equipment that have been neglected during the winter, clean and check them for safety. See the State and Dyer Soil Association.

Insect garden tools or power tools for house parts, such as saws, etc., should be checked over carefully during the winter with a clean dry cloth. A thorough cleaning will remove any foreign material from the tools. Other suggestions for preparing outdoor tools are: paint, oil, and sharpening.

Check for insect damage that occurs during the winter months. Check the boat and trailer for the same damage that occurs during the summer months. If damage is found, repair it as soon as possible. See that children are not allowed to play near the water.

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


