Respiratory Association Changes Name

American Lung Association of Texas will be the new name of the Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, it was announced by Dr. Travis Smith, Abilene, president of the Board of Directors.

Dr. Smith said the new name of the Christmas Seal agency will be effective immediately. The action corresponds with the adoption of the name American Lung Association by the National Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association which will inaugurate its new title at its annual meeting in New York on May 20.

G. Gordon Beck, Dallas, Joe K. Wells, Austin, Henry Guerra, San Antonio, and Dr. Daniel E. Jenkins, Houston will represent the Texas association at this meeting.

Dr. Smith explained that his association's board of directors approved the change to American Lung Association of Texas because "the simpler and shorter name will be easier for people to recognize and remember and they can more easily identify the organization when they need help."

"Lung Association more accurately reflects our central purpose—the prevention and control of lung disease," Dr. Smith said. "At the same time, it is broad enough to encompass our expanded activities in combating air pollution and cigarette smoking which are among the most serious dangers to healthy lungs."

Mrs. William Mitchell of Lufkin and Edwin S. Hayes, Ph. D. of Beaumont represented the Piney Woods Area at this meeting. To conform with the new name the Piney Woods Area of the Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association will become the American Lung Association of Texas - Piney Woods Area.

DETCOG Receives \$15,000 Increase In Planning Grant

The Deep East Texas Council of Governments has been awarded a \$45,000 Planning Grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development's Dallas Area office. Representing an increase of \$15,000 above the previous year's 701 Planning Grant, the grant was awarded on April 12, 1973 and will allow DETCOG to continue in its capacity as the thirteen (13) county area-wide planning agency.

Specific programs included in the work program period covered by the recently approved grant include a continuing study of the region's housing, water/sewer planning, parks/open-space planning, mobile home/travel trailer study, historic preservation, inter-governmental coordination, citizen participation/public information program activities, technical assistance to local governments and community development; with implementation programs in each program area.

The Deep East Texas Council of Governments is a voluntary association of local governments in the Deep East Texas region. Member counties include Angelina, Hardin, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, an Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler; grouped together because of common geographic, economic and social patterns and working together as a unit to bring economic and social developmental programs into the region.

Methodist Revival To Start May 13

The Woodville United Methodist Church will begin its revival to be led by Dr. Harry Denman on May 13, at 7:30 p.m., with services continuing through May 18. All services will be held nightly at 7:30 p.m., with morning services held Monday through Friday at 10 a.m.

Dr. Harry Denman was for a quarter of a century the general secretary of the Board of Evangelism of the Methodist Church. Since his retirement he has become a world-wide evangelist, constantly traveling in this country and abroad to share the good news of Jesus Christ. In a recent year, for example, he delivered 407 major addresses and sermons in 19 nations. His office reports show him once speaking in five states - Ohio, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Indiana - in a 48 hour period.

Billy Graham has called Dr. Denman the greatest personal worker in evangelism alive today.

Bishop Gerald Kennedy has said, "No man is more closely associated with Christian evangelism than Harry Denman. He is the kind of person that you do not forget. Because of his special gift and his unique style he has stood before the church and the world as an example of what Christ can do with one man's life. Whoever hears such a man speak will say to himself that this man is authentic and some who hear him will say, 'I wish I knew where to find what this man has found.'"

ETC Travel Development Conference To Be Held Here

Twenty cities will receive awards for participation in the first decade of the national tourist advertising program of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce at its 11th annual travel development conference May 10-11 in Woodville at the Woodville Inn.

More than 150 delegates from the region are anticipated, with top speakers to include Tom H. Taylor, director of Travel Division, Texas Highway Department, and Frank Hildebrand, executive director of Texas Tourist Development Agency.

This two-day tourist conference is the oldest and most dynamic in results in Texas, states Alton Holt, ETCO tourist committee chairman. "We urge you to invite the members of your tourist committees, and all other East Texans, to attend to find out new ways to increase your profit from travel in the coming year."

The preview of the 1974 action of the East Texas Chamber will be outlined for discussion and approval. One session will include planning for sites for next year's travel shows. Another will be on funding of local tourist programs, led by several cities which are currently receiving hotel-motel room tax funds, who will outline their operations. "All cities, lakes, and attractions will find valuable information from the popular panels of lay leaders and professionals.

Receiving 10-year awards for continually in the national program for East Texas will be leaders from the following: Chamber of Commerce-Huntsville-Walker County; Tyler, Longview, Gladewater, Marshall, Nacogdoches County, Marion County, Jefferson, San Augustine County, Angelina County, (Lufkin), Panola County (Carthage) Port Arthur, Trinity, Palestine, Upshur County, Gilmer, Rusk County (Henderson).

Also, Houston County Development Foundation (Crockett), the Surrey Inn, Caldwell, Tejas Village, Lake

Receiving five-year awards for participation will be the Giddings and Goldsprings Chambers of Commerce.

Opening session will begin at 1:30 p.m., May 10, with reception at 6:30 p.m., followed by dinner and entertainment. The conference resumes at 9 a.m., May 11, with closing luncheon at noon, followed by awards. Cost per person for the complete conference is \$16. All interested persons are invited to attend.

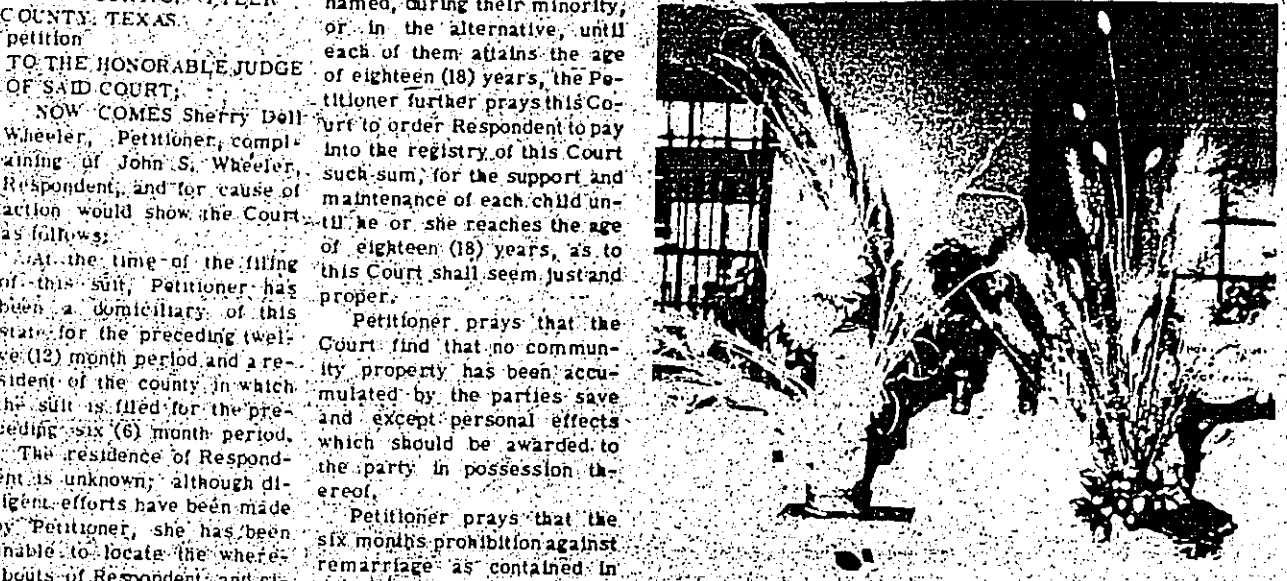

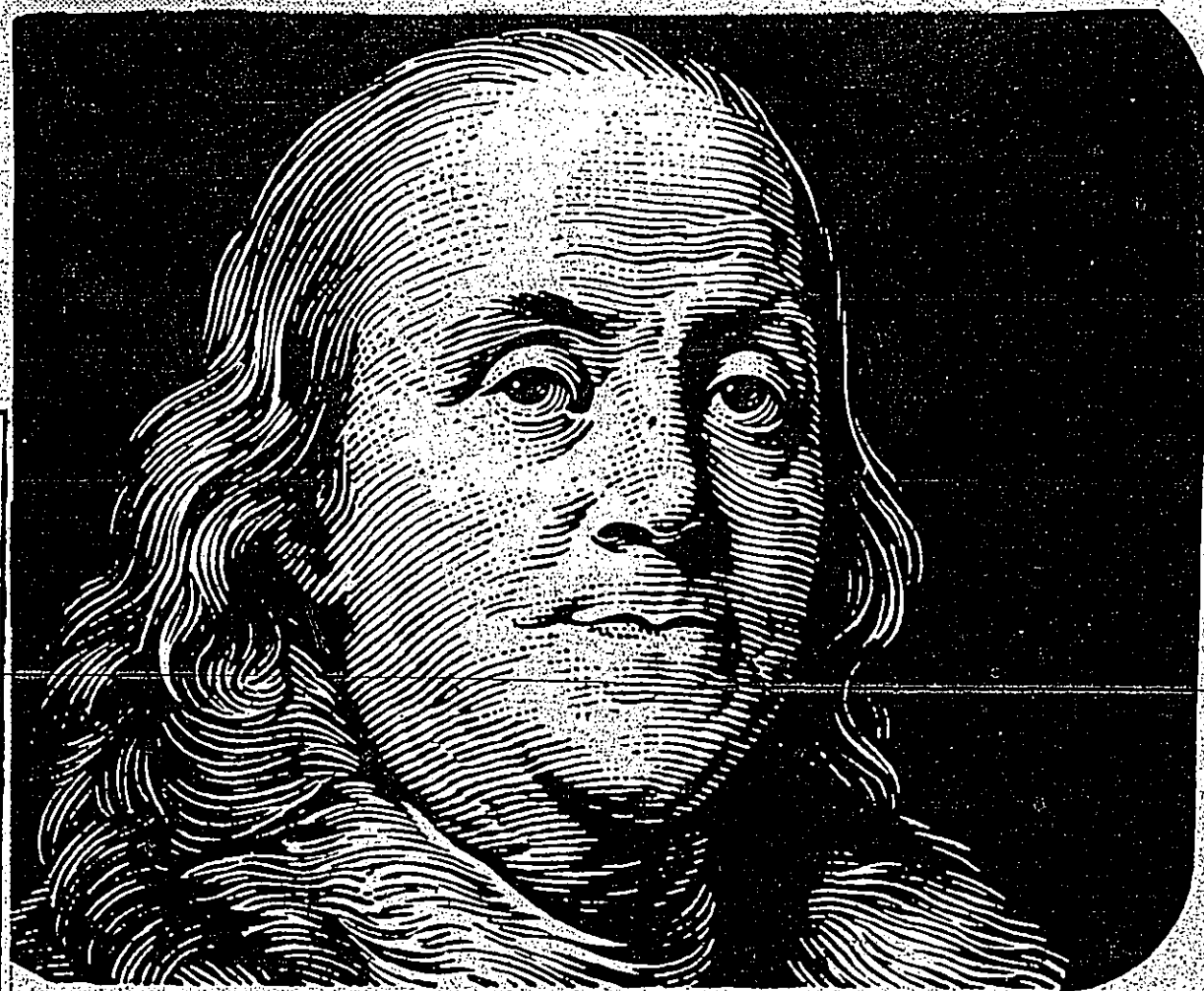
