Woodville band is shown in a portion of this film. 50 copies of this film are made and shown in all states of the United States and 30 countries. The film is produced in eight different languages.

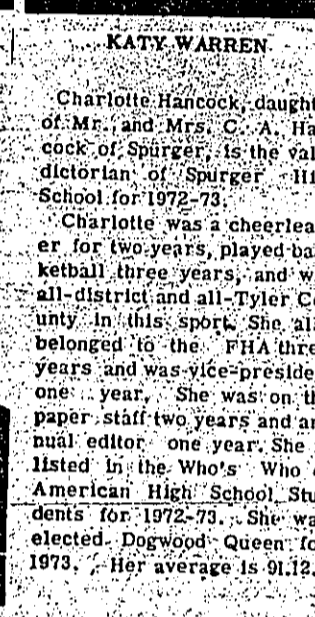

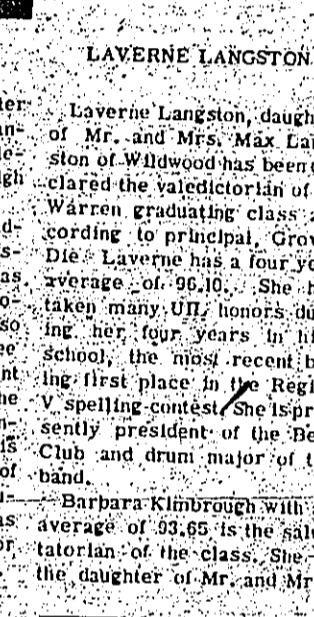

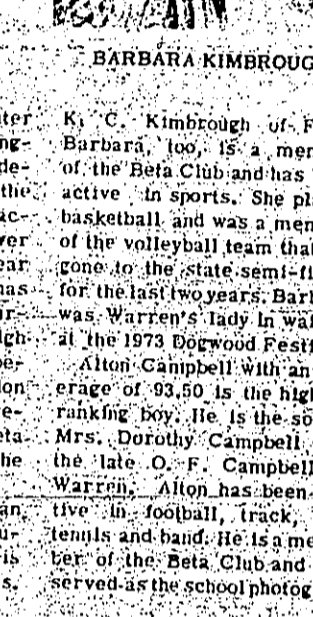
of Media Relations, Texas Tourist Development Agency, and C. W. Shupper, Travel Editor, The Houston Post.

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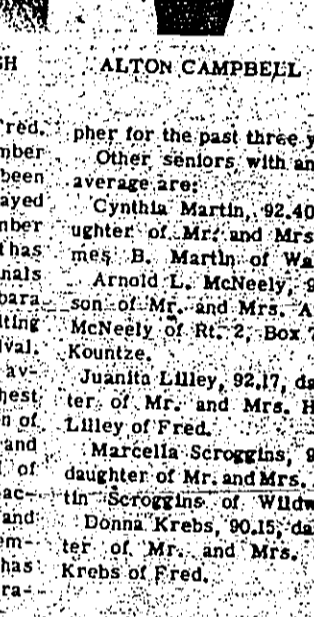

COUNTY AGENT'S REPORT

Keep snakes from your home—Make your home and yard an unattractive habitat for snakes—get rid of cover and possible food sources and block access to your residence or area.

According to Charles Ramsey, Wildlife Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the best way to get rid of snakes is to go away with their food and cover. Lumber and trash piles, tall grass or weeds and overgrown areas are among the favorite hiding places for the rattlesnakes.

Most of our poisonous snakes feed mainly on rats, mice and other small rodents. Eliminating these rodents by poisoning and trapping plus removing their food and cover keeps snakes away from the home. Moles in lawns, gardens and buildings should be blocked.

The best preventative measure for snakes is to keep them away from people," says the Texas A&M University specialist. "A snake always moves in a straight line when it comes in contact with human activities in a pest situation. All snakes are extremely sensitive to the sound of a rattlesnake. There are four major poisonous species and snakes. These are rattlesnakes, copperheads, cottonmouth, water moccasins and coral snakes. All are easily identified.

One way is to set a trap using a couple of moist burp bags. The snake will crawl into the damp area between the bags and can be easily removed. Fungus also can be used, but only a professional exterminator should do the dusting.

Houses and yards are not only place snakes can hide, but also have distinct holes, low, movable fangs.

Non-poisonous snakes on the other hand, have tapered heads and in fangs.

According to Ramsey, the "used" in these cases, in other places, tunnel traps or funnels of kerosene or kerosene-soaked rags can be used.

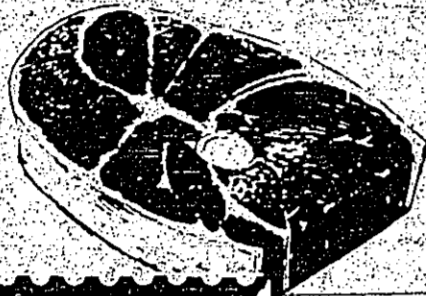
