Texas Highway Patrol Arrests Tourists Spent \$16 Million In Texas 2,146 In Tyler County In 1972, 1973

The Texas Highway Patrol is responsible for providing Tyler County with revenue of \$69,800 in 1972, according to a report by the Department of Public Safety.

That's the amount paid in fines to the county that stem-

med from arrests made and tickets issued by the three Highway Patrolmen in the county. Total number of arrests was 2,146.

According to the report the biggest two groups of arrests were based on charges of spe-

eding and driving while intoxicated. There were 946 cases of speeding and 230 for DWI which resulted in fines of \$18,446 and \$21,934 respectively.

Among non-hazardous violations there were 365 cases of drivers license violations and 171 drunk pedestrian violations.

The Department of Public Safety has three highway patrolmen stationed in Woodville. They are Joe Wilmon, Gary Hennigan and Bill Bradberry. These patrolmen are assigned to patrol areas of Tyler County.

No Fatal Accidents In County During April

Sergeant C. L. Taylor of the Texas Highway Patrol announced that during the month of April 1973, in Tyler County, there was one rural fatal accident in which one person was killed. In addition, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 26 rural motor vehicle accidents in which 21 persons were injured.

Through April of this year, there have been 81 rural accidents in Tyler County, killing 9 persons and injuring 44 persons.

During the same four month period in 1972, there were 84 rural traffic accidents killing 3 and injuring 37 persons.

During the month of April in the 16 counties comprising District 2-B, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 464 rural accidents, killing 16 persons and injuring 241 persons.

Immunization Clinic Slated

The Texas State Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans for conducting a series of monthly immunization clinics for preschool children in Tyler County. The clinics will be conducted in the Woodville Elementary School auditorium.

The first clinic will be held May 23, 1973.

Clinic hours will be from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. Subsequent clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is planned for children two months thru five years of age. This clinic is intended only for those children who do not have a family physician.

Immunizations to be offered include measles, rubella, oral polio, and DPT. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.

Application forms may be secured from Postmaster H. M. Durham at the Woodville post office.

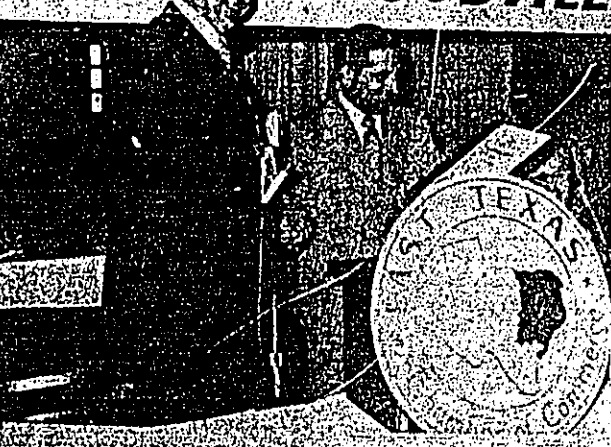
Police Dept. Vacation Tips

The Woodville Police Department would like to remind home owners that vacation time is fast approaching and along with vacation time comes the increase in residential thefts and burglaries. The police department suggest the following five steps be taken before your departure, so that we in Woodville do not feel the increase this year.

- (1) Notify the police department. Call the Tyler County Sheriff's Department and give them your name, address, the date you plan to leave, the date you plan to return, and a telephone number or address that you can be reached at while you are gone. This information will be given to the police department and placed on file. We will keep a closer watch on your property while you are gone.
- (2) Let your neighbors know that you are leaving and have them call the police department if there is any strange activities around your home. The reason for this is that more and more thefts are being committed during the day.
- (3) Have a neighbor or friend collect your mail and any newspapers that may be left in your yard. A yard of newspapers is a sure sign that no one is at home.
- (4) If you plan to be gone for two or more weeks have someone take care of your yard.
- (5) Leave a light burning somewhere in the house so that at night it would appear that someone is at home. It is better to pay a small light bill than to replace a house full of furniture.

We believe that these steps if followed will help you to come home and tell of your wonderful trip rather than come home and tell how while you were gone someone stole all of your worldly goods.

Beef Cattle And Pasture Field Day Slated Saturday

The Deep East Texas Development Association and the Agricultural Committee of the Tyler County Program Building are sponsoring a Beef Cattle and Pasture Field Day at H. M. Durham's farm on Saturday, May 19.

The tour will start at 9:00 a.m. and will end by noon. Mr. Durham's farm is located 5.2 miles from Woodville on highway 287. Take the dirt road at Kirkland Springs State Highway Park. Mr. Durham's farm is located at the end of the dirt road 6/10 mile from the park.

First pasture will show crimson clover and Arizona bermuda grass, which has been receiving for the last 6 years.

Second pasture will show Shorthorn hybrid bermuda and ball clover, and also Shorthorn and Aleta mixed.

Third pasture will show coastal and dallis grass mixture. In pasture three Mr. Durham has 1.2 acres of certified Aleta grass.

Fourth pasture will show Pensacola Bahia, dallis grass, ball clover and 8-1 clover.

Sixth pasture will show common bermuda grass, cut grass and tall clover planted last fall.

Seventh pasture will show Pensacola Bahia grass.

Other business included a resolution recognizing Mrs. Bessie Lock for her service as RSV Coordinator for Shelby County upon her retirement from that position. Members also heard reports from Mayor Jack Walker of Brown-dell of the nominations committee, Hardin County Judge Emmett Lack of the budget committee.

Parents Urged To Register Pre-School Children May 18

All parents are urged to register their kindergarten aged children and all first grade children who were not in kindergarten during the 1972-73 school year, at the Warren Elementary School and the Fred Elementary School, May 18, from 8:30 to 12:00 noon, for the school year 1973-74. The kindergarten students must be 5 years of age or before September 1, 1973. All students must have the required inoculations and a copy of their birth certificate.

Over six million out-of-state tourists visited Texas in 1972 and spent almost 2 billion dollars, it was reported by Tom Taylor, Director of the Tourist and Information Division of the Texas Highway Department, at the final luncheon of the last Texas Chamber of Commerce Tourist Conference held at the Woodville Inn, May 16th.

These figures were compiled by Mr. Taylor's department from reports kept in eleven Tourist Information Bureaus at various entry points into the state.

"It is difficult for the average citizen to fully realize the economic impact the tourist business has on each community unless they are in direct contact with the public," Mr. Taylor added.

"The state alone resulting from this money earned outside the state reduces the citizens of Texas of a sizable tax load. It is known that the municipalities realize a one-percent sales tax and the state a four-percent sales tax."

With the beauty of the East Texas mountains, flowers and water, Mr. Taylor said the conference had that area possesses all of the natural phenomena so desired in the planning of new tourist attractions to complement and enhance those already existing in East Texas.

The local Chamber of Commerce president, Jim Clark, who attended the conference, also noted the address of Frank Hildbrand, head of the Texas Tourist Development Bureau at Thursday night's banquet, as well as the various fund-raising workshops conducted during the conference which were highly educational and beneficial for the Tyler County community, particularly in the area of new attractions, ideas, their planning and promotion.

"The elusive industrial dollar is difficult to obtain for most small communities and the entanglement, development and promotion of the tourist business in our community seems to be the only practical solution to our economic progress and our Chamber of Commerce as well as all our local citizens should give it more than just a passing consideration," Mr. Clark said.



Coastal wetlands needs grazing. There's something about coastal wetlands that the more it's grazed, the better it performs. Yet many producers fail to utilize the grass properly and become disappointed in its performance.

Coastal wetlands thrive on heavy grazing, provided it has been fertilized and watered. Some of the best yields are produced on the 200-acre Mission, Texas, wetlands. The area is grazed by 100 head of cattle and 100 head of hogs. The area is fertilized with 200 lbs. of nitrogen and 100 lbs. of phosphate per acre. The area is watered by a canal that runs through the area.

Producers who graze their wetlands should consider fertilizing and watering. This will increase the yield and make the wetlands more productive. The area should be grazed by a mix of cattle and hogs. This will help to break up the clumps and keep the grass growing.

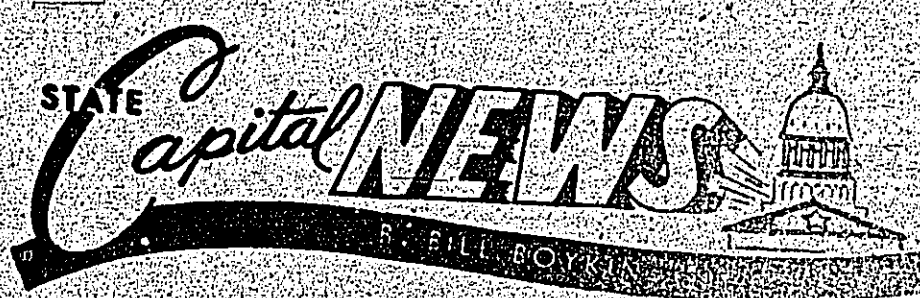

State Capital News

During more federal court challenges, the House Republican Committee has advanced a "redistricting" bill that makes virtually no changes in present representation.

The Committee bill, approved last week, would retain multi-member House districts but the three metropolitan counties of Bexar, Dallas and Harris would be split into single-member districts.

Rep. Joe Wyatt of Houston, the sponsor, said he would accept an amendment that would allow the Texas House to single out certain districts for special action.

Chairman Tom Blanton of the Texas House said that the House would retain the three-member districts in the major cities but would split the rest into single-member districts.

A three-year federal court case in January, 1972, ordered the House to redraw its districts for Texas and other states and save the legislation until July 1, 1973, a 100-day deadline.

Representatives were paid before the vote that if the U.S. Supreme Court strikes the 1972 ruling, the House will order single member districts in all 11 House districts in all 11 House districts.

The bill would amend the Constitution to allow the House to single out certain districts for special action.

However, Wyatt introduced the Supreme Court in 1972 ruling, a case later limited to 16.4 percent deviation.
