The Dallas City Health Department has discovered a new source of air pollution. A newsletter issued by the Dallas Health Department claims that burping cows are the biggest polluters of the air. The newsletter writers got their information from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency report. TYLER COUNTY DECLARED DISASTER AREA BY GOVERNOR

Tyler County has been declared a state disaster area by Gov. Dolph Briscoe due to damage that has been sustained by flooding to homes and roads in low-lying areas, according to Tyler County Judge Tom Mann. The declaring of the county a disaster area may open up the opportunity for many who have experienced property damage to receive funds from the state. Heavy rains were reported in many parts of the county last week causing flooding in several low-lying areas, especially in the eastern and northern sections of the county near Wolf Creek and the Neches river. It was reported that a flood stage reading of 27.56 feet was taken on the Neches river at Rockland on Sunday June 17. Between 8 and 10 inches have been flooded in the Fox Bend area. Flooding of homes has also been reported in the Wiggins area. Many homes, though not flooded, have been isolated by the waters and the damage to county roads has been very extensive.

The current flooding is not an extension of the extreme weather that the county has experienced since spring. The Texas Forest Service reports that since January that an average 32.24 inches of rain has fallen. The heaviest rain would have been the amount for that period. Such makes this year's fall 1973 inches of rain. Ten flooding this year. Water has damaged many of the county's timber lands. The timber lands have been damaged by the heavy rains. Many homes that have been tried to plant have been frustrated. In other areas, due to excessive rains that have washed out gardens, but county agent Clinton Durr stated that those who grow hay and other crops have experienced difficulty. The steady rain would not lay quiet for at least 1973.

Some county residents, especially those along the flooded Neches river, must use boats to go to or from their homes. One of these, Jess W. Ward of the Holly Fork community 16 miles east of Woodville, reports that he had to travel one half mile by boat to reach the county road. The flooding in his area started Friday and was still flooded on Monday, June 18.

The current excessive rain adds to the difficulties that the timber industry has experienced during the recent months. The timber industry, which makes up about 25% of the county's industry, has been greatly hampered by the difficulty of getting logs out of the woods. The resulting shortage of timber has caused many mills to close. Some mills have been operating several times during the winter and spring. Others have continued to operate at only one-half or two-thirds capacity. This shortage of timber may be one factor in increasing lumber prices which in turn have affected the building industry.

The current flooding is just an extension of the trend of freakish weather that the county and much of the country have experienced in the past few months. Many now find that they have sustained real damage to their property and for that reason it is to their advantage that the county has been declared a disaster area. Judge Mann noted that those who have sustained real damage to their homes should report it to him if they wish to apply for funds which the state will provide to those who have suffered damage. Judge Mann's telephone number is 283-2341. He encourages all who may qualify to call and report their damage to him. He also suggests that photographs be made of the damage to be presented to the state. As soon as the extent of the losses is determined the county will apply to the governor for funds.

Hotel and motel industry \$591 million, food and drink industry \$625 million, gas, oil and automotive \$436 million, entertainment and recreation \$210 million, other (retail stores, clothing, gifts, services, drugs, misc.) \$416 million. The Tyler County Chamber of Commerce promotes tourism in this area by supplying maps and brochures of local attractions to all inquiries and visitors. Also, by taking a 1/2 page ad in the East Texas Chamber of Commerce Vacation Guide published each year. 125,000 copies of the guide are separate East Texas Fun Maps are distributed each year through major attractions, agencies, other Chambers of Commerce, and during late winter at Sports, Travel and Boat Shows in the Midwest.

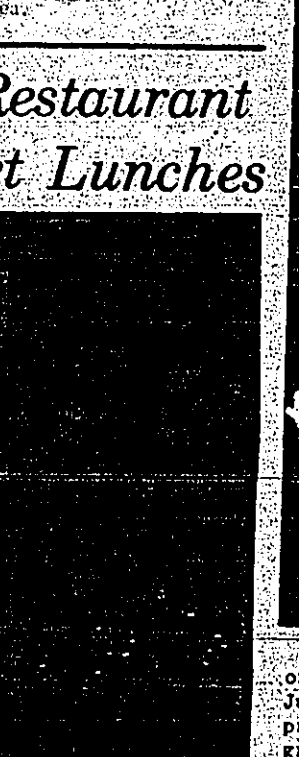

A new five-year, \$25-million research program to develop science and technology for the economic utilization of coal is being announced by the U.S. Dept. of Energy. The program is designed to meet appropriate environmental standards and to provide a ready source of energy to compensate for diminishing availability of oil and gas. The program is being announced by Dr. Sherwood Fawcett, president of Battelle Memorial Institute of Columbus, Ohio.

"The solution to this critical situation lies in the prompt development of domestic energy sources which meet appropriate environmental standards and are readily available for public consumption," he explained.

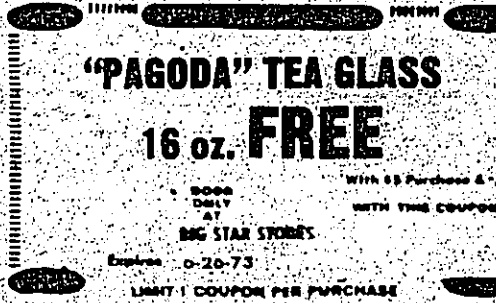
