A study by the Veterans Administration covering a period of ten years produced some rather startling facts. Businessmen need to make long-term plans particularly for capital expansion. Limited resources of manpower and materials have to be used steadily, not on a stop-go basis. If shortages and disruptions are to be avoided..."

## Deadline For Temporary Housing Applications

HUD's mission to provide temporary housing assistance to eligible victims in the eleven Texas counties included in the President's July 11 disaster declaration is nearing completion. Alton S. Ray, Jr., HUD Southwest Region Emergency Services Officer announced today.

Ray said that based upon the number of eligible applicants remaining to be housed and State and Federal assessments of the number that may apply, August 9 is the established deadline for making application for temporary housing assistance.

In the eight days (July 18 through 25) Disaster Assistance Centers operated in Houston, Alvin, Conroe, Liberty, Woodville, and Kountze, HUD received a total of 139 applications for housing help. Of these 110 of the applicants have been determined eligible and housing arrangements have been completed for 56 applicants. Arrangements

## WILSON REPORTS

Congressman Charles Wilson from the Second District of Texas today co-sponsored a bill which will make it more difficult for federal agencies and employees of such agencies to gain access to the individual tax returns of American citizens.

In co-sponsoring the bill, Congressman Wilson said, "The assurance provided the American people that information voluntarily given on Federal Tax Returns will be carefully protected from disclosure and improper use is one of the basic concepts underlying this country's system of collecting taxes."

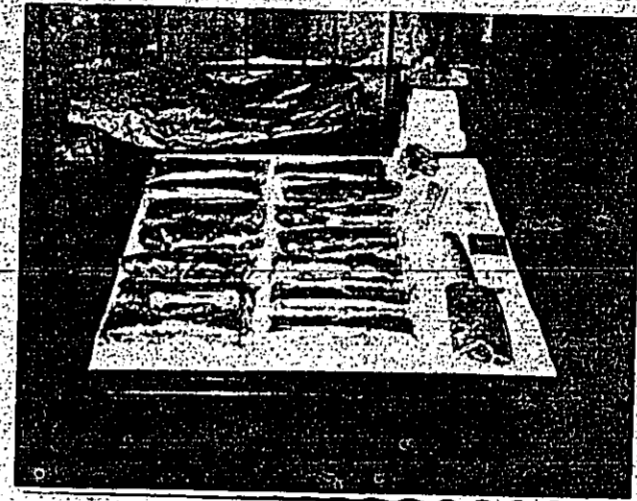
Congressman Wilson said, "Much concern has been voiced over the extent to which citizens' privacy is being invaded. We see this in the accumulation of personal data in computer banks and other such means which constitute a threat to the privacy of every American citizen. There are some who look upon individual tax returns as the great source of such information and already we are seeing some federal agencies eye tax returns as a good source of data. The intent of the bill I today co-sponsored is to further restrict accessibility to taxpayers' tax returns."

This piece of legislation, which has been referred to the Ways and Means Committee, will specifically establish the criteria governing the inspection and protection of the personal data contained in tax returns, according to the Congressman. Congressman Wilson said he was prompted to co-sponsor the bill after reviewing the existing rules and regulations governing the exposure of these returns and after learning of the plans of one federal agency to make a wholesale invasion of the tax returns of American citizens.

## Marijuana Taken In Raid Sunday

Police officers acting on a tip raided a house in Woodville early Sunday morning where they found a large quantity of marijuana.

A 26 year old man and his 24 year old wife were arrested at the house and charged with possession of marijuana. The pair were taken before

Peace Justice Sam Jefferson. Bond was set at \$1,000 for the woman and \$5,000 for the man. They made bond and have been released from custody.

The pair had been under surveillance for several months. Police received a tip Saturday that the pair was selling marijuana, according to City Policeman Kenneth Thyssen. A search warrant was issued by Municipal Judge T. E. Phillips and executed by the Woodville Police Department assisted by D.P.S. officers. Sheriff's deputy and probation officer.

The raid netted the officers 16 plastic bags of marijuana, marijuana stems and leaves, cigarette butts, cigarette paper and a pair of scales the police believe the couple used to weigh the marijuana.

## Bob Belt Attends School Of Banking

Since the creation of Southwestern Graduate School of Banking in 1956, more than 1,900 bankers have graduated from the three-year program. Class I of SWIGSBIE was attended by bank executives from ten states.

## FALL ARMYWORMS ARRIVE EARLY

Fall armyworms have been reported damaging hay meadows in Tyler County. These pests are normally most active in late summer and fall, but favorable moisture and temperatures have allowed populations to build up about a month early, according to Clinton Currie, County Extension Agent.

Armyworms feed on grasses and several other kinds of plants, often seriously damaging pastures, lawns and early planted small grains. The larvae usually feed at night but also actively on cloudy days. Frequent and careful inspection in shaded areas, and along the borders of pastures is necessary for detection before extensive damage occurs.

Newly hatched larvae, less than one-half inch long, are white with black heads. The body darkens as they mature. At maturity, the larvae are approximately one and one-half inches long. The color then varies from pale green to almost black with several

Texas may be better off under its present type of government than the so-called cabinet form being advanced in preparation for constitutional revision, according to Texas House of Representatives.

Legislative members in a new report to the Constitutional Revision Commission point to advantages of the present system and offer these observations:

"While there is room for improvement, Texas' present government is not the administrative machine portrayed by critics. There are 174 legal entities which might make a cabinet government, but fewer than 30 of them control 99 percent of the state's money."
