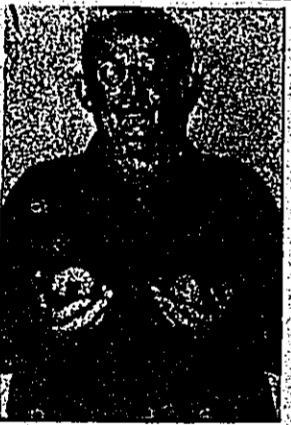
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Top of the Morning

The experience of growing up in the early 1900's has been recaptured in a delightful little book, handwritten and illustrated by Martha Hybert Blackley. Country life was rough in those days, but a cheerful acceptance of it permeates the book. Says the 72 year old author, "We came up the hard way but I expect it was good for us. Can you imagine the present generation living without running hot and cold water, electricity, radio, television, automobile washing machines, vacuums, nylon and many more modern conveniences? She continues, "We had to carry all our water from a spring, about a quarter of a mile, mostly uphill. We caught rain water for washing clothes. . . . We are left with observation, "I wonder if we ever stop to think what we have now, and thank God for it all, and stop complaining about what we don't have. . . . Because we had so little we were always so grateful for what we had. If our families now could feel that way they would be happier. They have so much and don't realize it. . . . It's something to think about."

Decision on Warren Superintendents' contract delayed

An out-of-court settlement concerning the employment of a new school superintendent was reached Thursday in Woodville when a meeting was held in Judge Clyde Smith's office in the Tyler County court house. Patrons of the Warren School District had sought to enjoin the Board

from hiring another superintendent until the contract of Supt. Jack Daniels is settled. Daniels was fired August 7. His contract has two more years before expiration. A public hearing on the superintendent's contract will be held August 25 in the Warren School auditorium.

Sen. Don Adams Lions Club Speaker

Senator Don Adams of Jasper spoke to the Woodville Lions Club on August 16 about the accomplishments of the 63rd Legislature.

Adams told the group that one of the main issues facing the legislature this past session was ethics in State Government. The legislature, he said, responded to this key issue by passing several strong ethics bills to insure reform in state government and greater ethical conduct on the part of all elected officials. Bills requiring public financial disclosures, conduct codes, lobby control, campaign reporting and disclosure, and open meetings of governmental bodies were passed during this past session.

Senator Adams said he was also pleased to report that the legislature had been able to pass an appropriations bill that would fund the state for the next biennium with no new taxes. This was a major accomplishment in light of the continued increase in service that the state is providing for its citizens.

Adams also told the group that among the many important pieces of legislation passed into law by this past legislature, three stand out as being of particular significance:

(1) The Penal Code revision - For the first time since 1856 a full-scale overhaul of the state's criminal laws was made. The new code, as Adams explained, it would classify all crimes into three categories: each of felonies and misdemeanors with crimes and punishment graded according to severity. He said this new code will facilitate the workings of our judicial system and provide the state with a fairer and more easily understood body of law.

(2) The Death Penalty - The House and Senate adopted a bill which would reinstate the death penalty under certain

defined situations. The recent Supreme Court decision regarding the death penalty left room for Constitutional legislation on this matter.

(3) The Family Code revision - Title II containing laws affecting parents and child (most notably custody and adoption) and Title III dealing with juvenile delinquency were revised by the 63rd Session of the Legislature. Adams, a Jasper lawyer, explained to the group that the intent of the new Title II code is to protect the child and to keep legal proceedings involving the child at the court equipped to determine what is best for him or her. The new Title III distinguishes between children considered delinquents and those just in need of supervision. Besides these three major items, Adams explained there were several other bills that he touched on.

The Consumer Protection Bill which would give the consumer a fair claim against fraud and misrepresentation of goods and services being sold and allow him to file for triple damages and lawyers fees incurred in the suit.

Public school financing - although this is one of the major problems facing the state, the Legislature did not address itself to its solution.

Jail transfer - Adams introduced and passed a bill that would allow a trial court to order the transfer of certain convicted felons to the Department of Corrections while his case is being appealed to the higher courts. The time spent in the Department of Corrections awaiting appeal would be credited toward his final sentence.

Senator Adams then entertained questions from the group concerning the above items and many others that were dealt with by this past legislative session.

One dead in Colmesneil shooting

Tyler County Sheriff Lewis Craven said Tuesday he had no new developments in the shooting death of Billy Mumphy last Wednesday at Colmesneil.

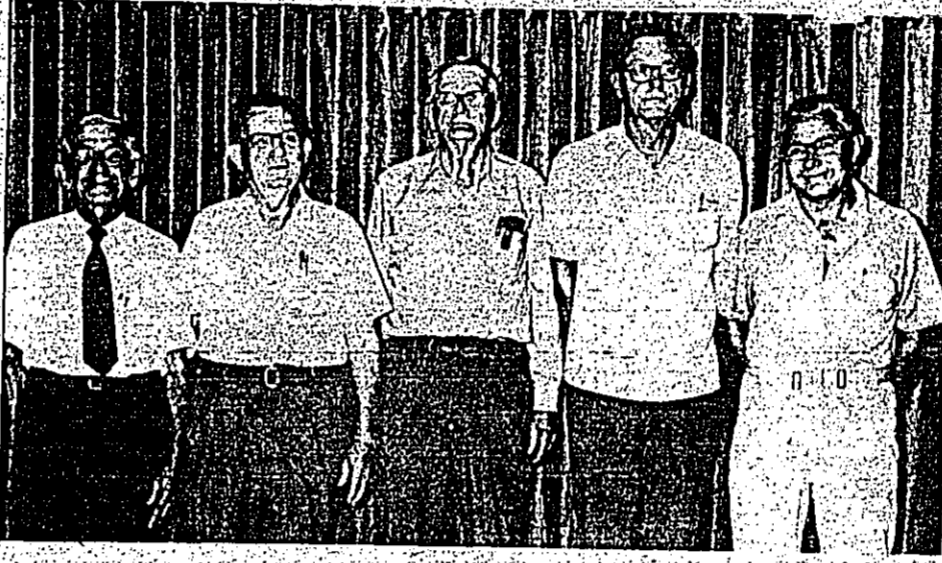
Mumphy was allegedly shot three times at the home of a relative in Colmesneil by Albert W. Boykin of Zavalla. Boykin, 30, was taken before

Justice of Peace E. A. Sturrock and ordered held in the Tyler County Jail at Woodville under \$25,000 bond.

Sheriff Craven said the shooting occurred during a dispute between the two men late Wednesday. A gun believed to have been used by Boykin was found at the scene of the shooting. Boykin was arrested in Zavalla by Jasper County officers.

SEARCH FOR GRAVES EXTENDS TO TYLER COUNTY

A fish fry was held Tuesday night, August 14 to honor former fire chiefs and newly elected chief O. L. Marsh. Approximately 45 firemen, their wives and friends attended.

On April 18, 1939, the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department organized upon a called meeting by Mayor Watt Barclay. The Mayor appointed Roy Pate as Fire Chief, Leroy Davis, Fire Marshall and S. P. Sims as secretary-treasurer. There were 10 persons who signed up for membership.

In September, 1940 the first fire truck was purchased. The Woodville Fire Department, as of now has 30 members and O. L. Marsh is the fire chief. A. W. Cook, Jr. is fire marshall.

Through the years Roy Pate, J. P. Miller, J. E. Gardner, A. L. Ferrell and R. T. Williams has served as fire chiefs.

At the present time, the fire department has three trucks: one 750 gallon pumper truck, one 500 gallon pumper truck and one tank truck which carries 800 gallons of water and pumps 250 gallons per minute. The Department answers about 80 to 90 calls a year. They drill twice a month for two hours, each drill.

From January 1970 to the present, the Department has answered 40 calls and has pumped 10,000 gallons of water and laid about 2500 feet of hose.

In 1940 there were five fire plugs in town. At the present there are 99.

Officers search for Father Of Henley in Tyler County Sunday

Acting on a alert bulletin from state retraining school headquarters in Lufkin, Sunday, law enforcement officers from Tyler and Polk counties made a joint search for Elmer W. Henley, father of . . . Wayne Henley, one of the suspects in the Houston mass murder . . . The alert bulletin said the elder Henley was wanted by the Houston Police Department for aggravated assault. The Houston Police said Henley was almost 60 and considered dangerous, that he had served a 10 year term for a murder conviction.

Officers, including Sheriff Herman Nolan, yielded a home which was later determined to be that of an animal. Sheriff Craven said he would like to express his appreciation to the citizens of Tyler County who reported these sites. Sheriff Craven also said that should further sites be found each will be thoroughly checked by the Sheriff's Department personnel.

Labor Day death toll expected to reach 42

Colonel Watson L. Spurr, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today warned that 42 persons may lose their lives in Texas traffic during the long Labor Day weekend.

The holiday officially begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 31 and runs through midnight Monday, September 3.

Spurr said the DPS is making preparations to cope with increased holiday travel.

The DPS director noted that special attention will be paid to hazardous traffic violations normally associated with high holiday death toll. Patrolmen will be especially watchful for such offenses as speeding, driving while drinking, improper passing and driving on the wrong side of the road.

In addition to stepped-up enforcement activities, the DPS will also work with local law enforcement agencies and the news media of Texas to conduct an accident prevention program called "Operation Motorcade."

During "Operation Motorcade," tabulations and pertinent facts about all fatal holiday traffic crashes will be compiled three times daily and released to the news media. A notation will be made as to where and why accidents are happening.

Spurr called the holiday program "a life and death struggle for the lives of our citizens," and he urged every motorist to cooperate in the effort.

Parker Speaker

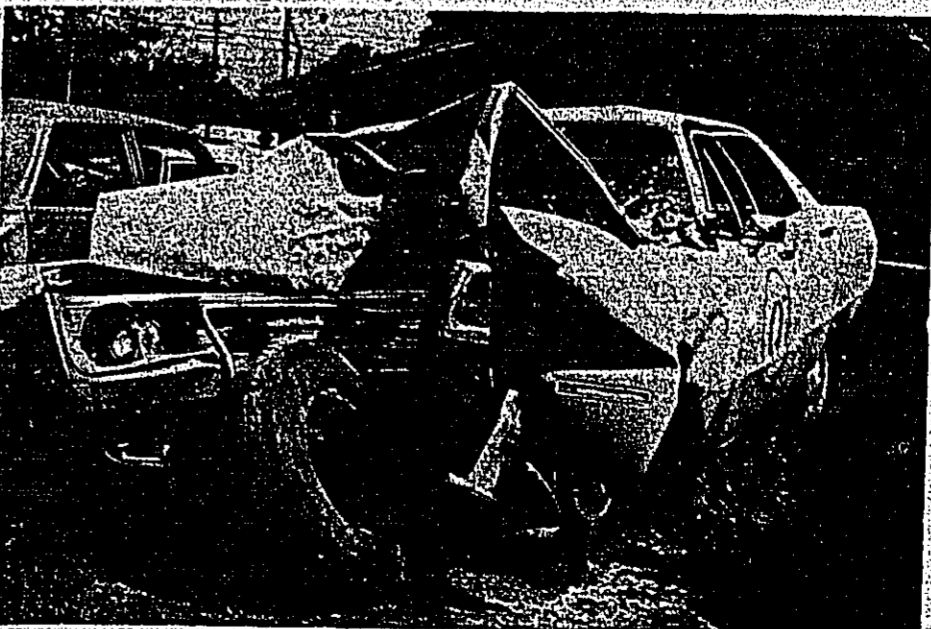

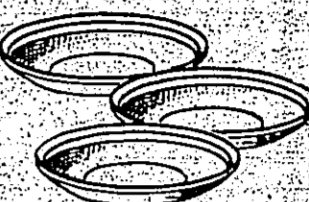
