## Top of the Morning

By wisdom a house is built and by understanding it is established. Proverbs 24:3

Due to a mechanical breakdown some articles had to be left out of the Booster this week. The articles will appear in next week's Booster.

### AMENDMENT NO. 3-S.J.R. NO. 13

(amending Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.)

The proposed amendment to Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b, provides that the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption shall also apply to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults, male or female, including those living alone, and thus negates the necessity of finding the existence of a family relationship. Prior to 1972, the exemption applied to state and county ad valorem taxation but principally to county taxation with the reduction in state ad valorem taxes to be completed December 31, 1978. The proposed amendment also provides that the amendment of Article VIII, Section 1-b, approved in November, 1972, authorizing any political subdivision to exempt not less than \$3,000 of the value of residence homesteads of person 65 years of age or older from the ad valorem taxes of the subdivision, applies to the homesteads of married or unmarried adults and includes those living alone. Here, too, the existence of a family relationship would no longer be necessary.

Background: Dissatisfaction with the property tax system led to the adoption of Article VIII, Section 1-a, of the Texas Constitution, in 1932. The present form of Section 1-a was the result of an amendment in 1948, at which time Section 1-b, was also adopted.

Article VIII, Section 1-a, provides that no state ad valorem tax shall be levied for general revenue purposes, but authorizes the counties to levy ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, except that the first \$3,000 of value of residential homesteads cannot be subject to these taxes. Article VIII, Section 1-b, applies the \$3,000 residential homestead exemption to all taxation for state purposes. Section 1-b was amended in 1972 to allow political subdivisions of the state to exempt not less than \$3,000 of the assessed value of residential homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older from ad valorem taxes of that political subdivision. The importance of state ad valorem taxation has been further diminished by the adoption in 1968 of Article VIII, Section 1-e which abolishes state ad valorem taxes for most purposes.

## Wingate gives clock to church



R. E. Wingate and Dr. Raymond Parker standing by the Grandfather clock Mr. Wingate has donated to the Woodville First Baptist Church in memory of his wife Ophelia, who died last year.

Mr. Wingate, 87 years old, a retired Highway Department employee, built the clock in three months working a few hours each day. He drew the pattern for the clock housing and cut the wood in his workshop. The clock mechanism was purchased from a German firm. The inscription on the brass plate reads:

"This clock was built by R.E. Wingate and dedicated to First Baptist Church of Woodville in memory of his wife Ophelia Hatten Wingate. It represents the love she had for mankind; especially her church, her Sunday School class, and her pastor, Dr. Raymond A. Parker.

"My God, Bless each of you would be her prayer, that is my prayer also." Signed R.E. Wingate 1973

The clock will be temporarily in the vestibule of the church until her birthday, October 11 and will be permanently installed in the church office.

## American Lung Association meets in Woodville Saturday

The Quarterly meeting of the American Lung Association of Texas/Piney Woods Area Board of Directors was held Saturday, September 8 at the Woodville Inn in Woodville, Texas. The Executive Board met at 10:30 a.m. and the General Board luncheon was held at noon. Mr. T. J. Romero, president from Fort Arthur presided.

Judge Martin Dies, Jr., Piney Woods, Christmas Seal Chairman was to be speaker and guest of the meeting, but was unable to attend due to the death of one of his close friends.

Dr. Homer Prince, a board member from Crockett, spoke on "Allergies with references to Respiratory Diseases."

In his talk, Dr. Prince used slides to show graphically how air pollutants damage the human lung. He pointed out that each year "200 million tons of unwanted gases and particles are dumped into the air of this country unwanted by-products of all the things people do and make."

Some of these pollutants, damage materials, like stone or metal or fabrics. Some hurt living things, like birds, cattle, or trees and some harm you," he added.

Dr. Prince said some of the pollutants in the air are sulfur dioxide, from coal and

fuel oil, hydrocarbons from incompletely burned fuel; nitrogen oxides formed by the intense heat and pressure of modern furnaces and engines; carbon monoxide from complete combustion of carbon-

containing material; fluoride produced in industrial processes; lead and other additives from burning vehicle fuel; poisonous chemicals sprayed into the air to kill insects and plants; photochemical smog, including ozone formed by the action of the sun on a car's exhaust fumes; particles, also called particulates, from everything man does and many come from combustion.

There are many, many others, Dr. Prince said. Some come from evaporation. Some from attrition (grinding or wearing down). But most of them come from combustion.

Mr. Jack Farley, Fund Raising Committee Chairman, Dr. Jack Pruitt, Medical Advisory Committee Chairman and Mr. D. L. Winzer, Nominating Committee Chairman gave committee reports. Quarterly reports were also made by Edwin S. Hayes, Ph. D., and Mrs. William Mitchell, R.N. and also Mrs. Jane Priest, Area Executive, state directors of the association.

## New addition to telephone building

Gary Picher, local manager for Southwestern Bell, announced that the addition to the Woodville "283" telephone equipment building located at 213 South Village Street is nearing completion.

The new addition, which measures 60 x 50 feet and will

add 3,000 square feet of floor space to the building, is being added to the rear or east end of the present building.

The addition is being constructed of brick and will generally match the existing structure.

The purpose of the "283" building addition is to house additional switching equipment and a test center to handle future growth needs in the Woodville area for both long distance and local telephone service.

The new addition will be air-conditioned and centrally heated in order to keep the switching equipment at an even temperature year around.

When completed, the new addition, plus the new equipment installed in it, will cost in excess of \$100,000.

Construction is scheduled to complete on the building addition by early fall.

## Wilson sponsored "Police Bill of Rights" before Congress

WASHINGTON--One of the key bills awaiting the reconvened Congress is the Law Enforcement Officers' Bill of Rights.

Wilson, who spent the Congressional recess touring his East Texas district, went to work on the bill immediately upon his return to Washington.

There's a legitimate concern for protecting the Bill of Rights, these days," said Wilson, "and I think we should spell out how the police officers' rights are protected."

The bill, he explained, is an amendment to the 1968 Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act. It requires States to institute grievance procedures for State and local law enforcement officers before they can qualify for federal grants.

"It's a policy that has been followed with many other federal programs," Wilson said, "and I think police officers are certainly entitled to the same safeguards."

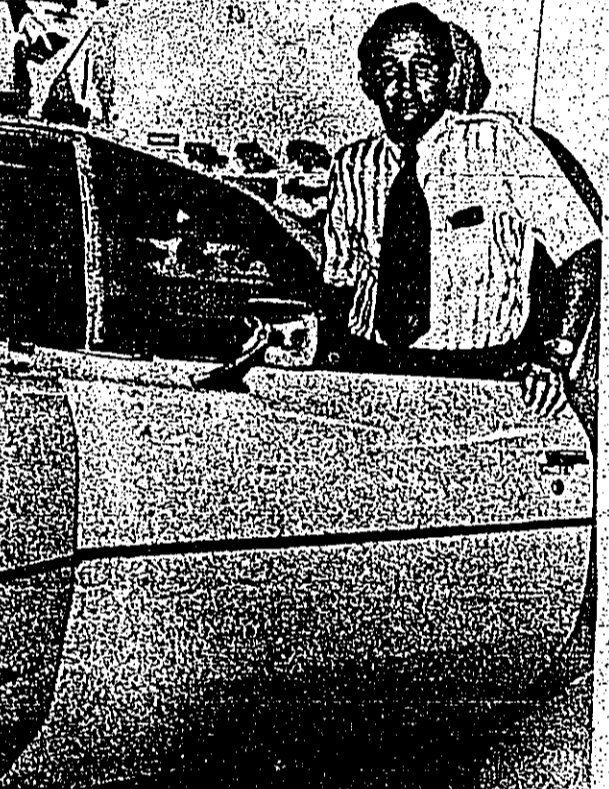
### Homes in Dam B Area burglarized

One juvenile and one adult are in the Tyler County Jail in Woodville charged with "Breaking and entering with intent to commit theft." A second juvenile is being sought in the case. He is on parole from Harris County.

Officers believe the three burglarized 14 houses in the Dam B area Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Sheriff Lewis Craven was notified Friday morning of the burglaries and began an investigation. He had the two suspects in custody by Friday night.

Bonds for the adult were set at \$1,500 for each count. The juvenile was taken before Judge Clyde Smith. A petition will be filed and the court, Sheriff Craven said. The three took various household articles and a considerable amount of vandalism in some of the houses. Many of the houses are owned by people who occupy them only on weekends. One of the houses burglarized belonged to a man who was away recuperating from a heart attack.

A ribbon-cutting on FM 2609 is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. in Nacogdoches and a dedication of highway overpass Loop 287 East is scheduled in Lubbock at 3:00 p.m.

Polk County Judge Peyton Walters, who was instrumental in taking the first steps toward inviting the Commission into East Texas, urged all interested officials and citizens of the region to attend the ceremonies.

"We hope that many people from the region will be able to attend, to meet the commission and make them aware how concerned we are about our present highway systems," Judge Walters said.

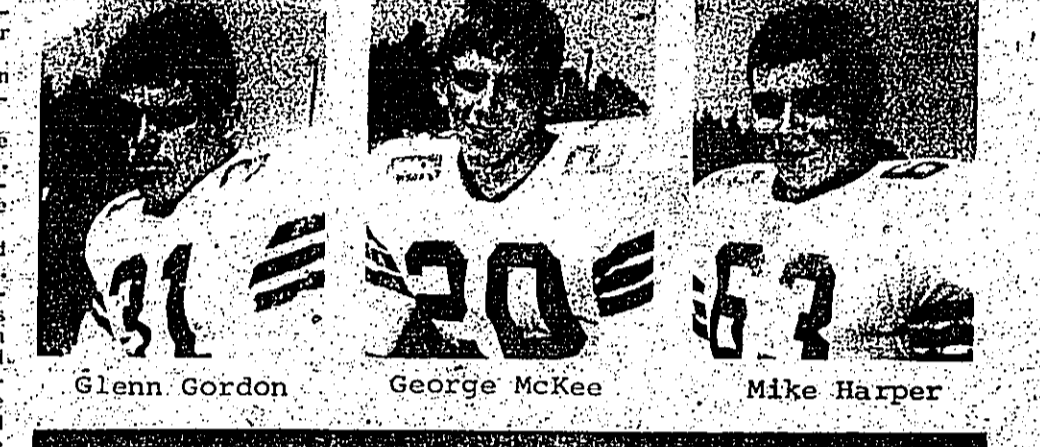
# WARRIORS WARM WIGWAM FOR 1973 SEASON

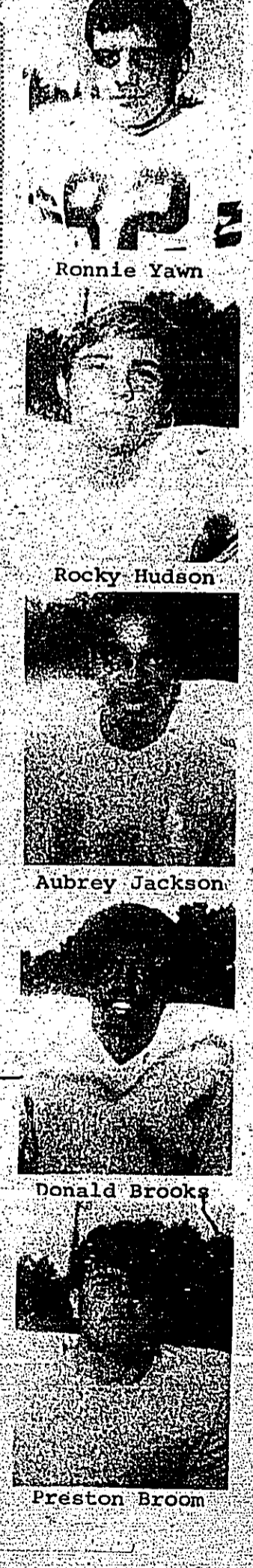

## You'll probably have to do laundry for the rest of your life. Here's how you can do it more efficiently.

It seems like you keep washing and drying and the laundry never stops. As long as you're excited, you may as well make the best of it. By using your electric washer and dryer efficiently to make your laundry days go by faster.

The very first thing you should do is sort your clothes before washing. Not all clothes should be washed at the same temperature. By sorting, you can avoid color fading and save on hot water by washing similar items together. Try to wait until you have a full load before washing.

Before drying, make sure the lint filter is clean. It should be cleaned after every load; your clothes will dry quicker. Otherwise, you make the dryer work harder for the same results. Don't overdry your clothes. They will get harsh and stiff in addition to being wasteful.

Sort your electricity. If you have a timer of automatic dryer, experiment with different settings to get exactly what you want. To fluff pillows, small throw rugs, sweaters, etc. Make tumble items without heat for not more than their limits.

Be sure to sort your clothes according to texture, weight and type of fabric. That way, you won't dry wash a wear with towels which need a higher temperature and more time to dry.

### HOMEMAKING HINTS

Proper nutrition before birth and during childhood means the difference between a stunted child and a child with a normal size and number of brain cells to develop.

Dr. Myron Willick spoke recently at the University of Texas Health Science Center on Nutrition and Mental Development.

Dr. Willick is professor of pediatrics and director of the Institute of Nutrition at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons in New York City.

In explaining the critical Dr. Willick stated in a recent professional journal, "Inadequate nutrition during the first 18 months of life is the most common two-fold which affects the growing fetus and can be related to growth retardation, are blood supply and the nutrition of the mother.

If growth is retarded because of insufficient blood vessels, the prospect for normal brain development is good according to investigations by the doctor. If, however, growth is retarded by the mother's lack of protein in the number of brain cells in the fetus is lower.

These infants with fewer brain cells, explains Dr. Willick, are more often found to be in poverty areas where malnutrition is most common.

The newborns are proportionately growth retarded in every part of their body, but it is usually reduced in size. Later, the children appear to show retarded development when they reach school age.

The constitution amendment which was adopted in 1972 to allow political subdivisions to partially exempt from ad valorem taxes the residential homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older has been interpreted to mean that a family relationship is necessary for the residence homestead to qualify for the tax exemption authorized by that amendment.

ARGUMENTS FOR The present tax discrimination against single persons who do not have the necessary family relationship to qualify for the tax exemption which married persons and persons with the necessary family relationship have received.

The tax assessors and collectors frequently are in a quandary to know if the facts of individual cases qualify a person for the tax exemption.

The exemption afforded persons with a family relationship was of less economic significance when it applied only to the limited state and county taxes, but now is of great importance to persons 65 years of age and older in political subdivisions which elect to partially exempt taxes on such residence homesteads.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST The tax exemption is to eliminate tax but merely shift the tax burden to other taxpayers or other sources.

The adoption of such an amendment may result in greatly reduced tax revenues at a time when the elimination of a tax source is unwise.

Modern social security, retirement systems, and welfare programs have reduced the need for protection of a residence homestead, and the exemption is not based on the need of a person's ability to pay.

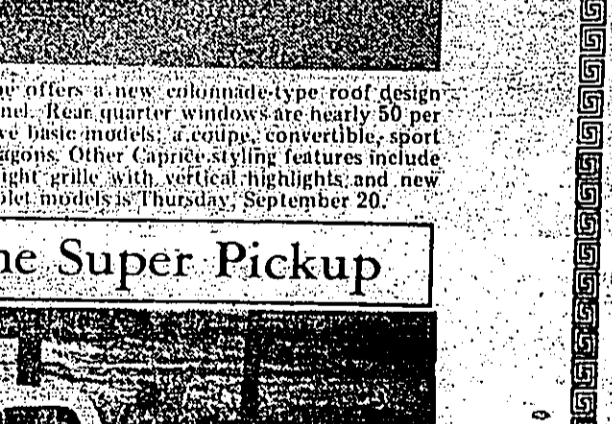

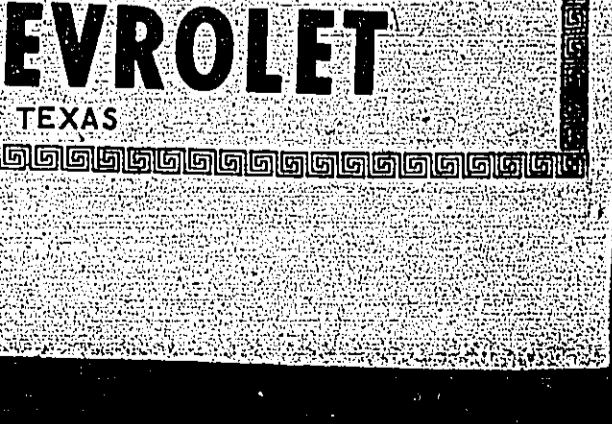

JUST A MINUTE

For the living know that they shall die. But the dead know not anything. Neither have they anymore a reward for the memory of them. It is forgotten. Neither have they anymore a portion forever in anything that is done under the sun. Eccl. 9:5-6

In mid September 1960 my friend and I drove high up in the Sierra Nevada mountains for a week end camp-out. We set up our camp on the east shore of beautiful Lake Donner, formed by an ancient volcano crater having a depth of some twelve hundred feet. Our camp was near the last camp site of the ill-fated Donner Party and the Donner Party was made up of a group of 49ers trying to reach the gold fields of California by following the serpentine route of the Truckee River through the rugged mountain passes, believing it to be a short cut to the land of promise.

After exhausting their food supply and the loss of a number of wagons and members of their party by death and mishap, the remnant reached the lake site and were caught in the heavy snows of a long hard winter. Here they perished from cold and hunger, leaving no witness to tell their story - save the diary of William Bonner the Wagon Master. He told of death and misery brought on by the cold and hunger and how the
