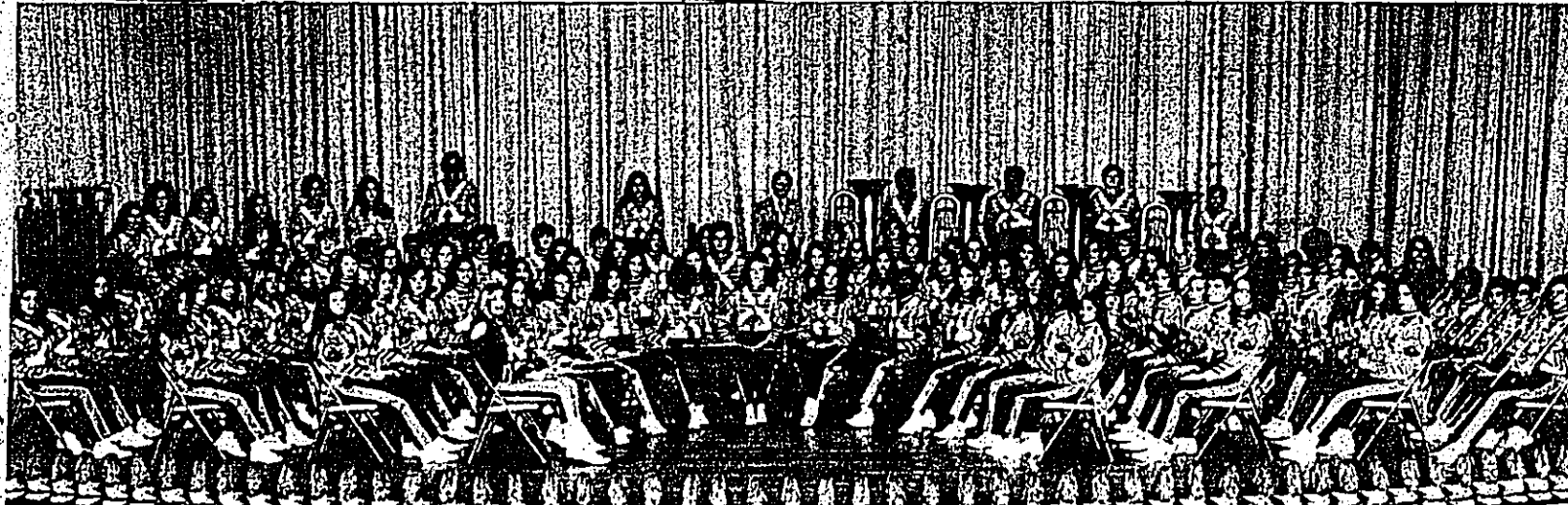

KHS BAND TO PERFORM AT HIGHWAY COMMISSION MEETING



The Kirby High School Band of Woodville under the direction of Jerry Brown will perform at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation on Friday, when the Deep East Texas Council of Government hosts the Texas Highway Commission.

Among the notables to be present include Commission Chairman Reagan Houston, THC members Dewitt C. Greer and Charles E. Simons; assistant state engineers G. Goode and Marcus Yancey, and

director of travel and information, Tom H. Taylor. The Woodville band has been named the Sweepstakes Award winner of Texas University Interscholastic League competition for the years 1966-67, 1967-68, 1968-69, 1970-71, and 1971-72. This award signifies a first division rating in marching, concert, and sight-reading contests. The group has achieved a first division at Regional Marching Contest for fifteen consecutive years. They have also been

named Region Honor Band from 1967-71. In 1970 they placed seventh in Texas in Class AA Competition. The parade performances by the Kirby High School Band at Sam Houston University Homecoming Parade in 1966, 1967, 1968, and 1970. In the same parade the band's twirlers were cited as the Outstanding Twirler Line in 1967 and 1970. The Outstanding Drum Major Award was also won in 1971. The Stephen F. Austin University Home-

coming Parade award for the most outstanding band was received by the group in 1969, 1970, 1971, and 1972. The band has received many invitations to perform outside their own community. In 1970, the group served as the Texas representative at the Sugar Bowl Parade in New Orleans, Louisiana. They have also received invitations to participate in the National Flag Day Festival in Monterey, Mexico and the Dakota Days

Band Festival in Rapid City, South Dakota. A motion picture film of the band has been shown at the Texas Band Directors Association Convention for the past five years and at convention throughout the South. The Texas House of Representatives proclaimed the Kirby High School Band as the official representatives of the State of Texas at the 1972-73 Orange Bowl Parade.

Voting Requirements For Disabled Persons Changed

A new election law, S. B. No. 193 enacted by the 63rd Legislature will change the absentee voting requirements for permanently disabled persons by permitting any permanently disabled voter to file a certificate of permanent disability with the registrar of voters in lieu of having to submit a certificate of disability with each application for an absentee ballot.

Subdivision 2d paragraph defines the new requirements as follows: (a) A voter having an ailment or physical disability which renders him permanently unable to appear at the polling place is not required to accompany his application for an absentee ballot with the certificate of sickness or

physical disability referred to in Subdivision 2 of this section if he files a certificate of permanent disability with the registrar of voters as provided in this subdivision. A certificate of permanent disability must be signed by a duly licensed physician or chiropractor or accredited Christian Science and must certify that the person signing it has personal knowledge of the voter's physical condition; that the voter has an ailment or physical disability of a continuing nature which renders him unable to appear at the polling place for voting; or that the voter is, in continuous residence at a duly licensed nursing or custodial home because of sickness or physical disability; and that it is the signer's opinion that the voter will be permanently unable to appear at the polling place for any election held in the future. The criminal penalties stated in Subdivision 2 of this section in regard to certificates of sickness or physical disability executed under that subdivision also apply to certificates of permanent disability executed under this subdivision.

Treasures gained by wickedness do not profit, but righteousness delivers from death. Proverbs 10:2-3.

If you have recently moved to Tyler County and wish to vote in the election November 6, you will need to register to vote thirty days before the election. Don't wait, time is running out.

Amendment No. 5 is one that does not directly affect people who do not live on the Gulf Coast. However, we should study the new proposed amendment and consider the arguments for the amendment and arguments against the amendment.

(Amending Article XI, Section 7, of the Texas Constitution, to provide that Counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico, may levy a tax for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon the vote of a majority of the resident taxpayers voting at an election called for that purpose.)

The proposed amendment to Article XI, Section 7, would lower the majority needed to authorize cities or counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to levy a tax for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters or for sanitary purposes from two-thirds to a simple majority of the resident taxpayers voting at an election called for that purpose.

Section 7 of Article XI has been part of the constitution since 1876. In its original form it required a majority of two-thirds of the taxpayers residing in the city or county to pass such a tax. Since it was difficult to get such a large number of voters to vote, the section was amended in 1932 to require only a two-thirds majority of the persons actually voting at an election called for such a purpose to authorize the tax. The proposed amendment would lower the requirement to a simple majority of those voting.

The Texas coast is frequently battered by hurricanes and other severe storms. People living on the coast need protection for both their lives and their homes from these ravages of nature. It is difficult for these people to insure their property unless there are adequate sea walls or breakwaters protecting them. Many communities on the Texas coastline are with-

FIVE ARRESTED

20 burglary and theft cases solved by Tyler County Sheriff's Department

Tyler County Sheriff Lewis Craven reports this week that as a result of intensive investigation by the Sheriff's Department Deputies 5 arrests have been made clearing over 20 burglaries and cases of theft in Tyler County. Five individuals arrested by Sheriff Craven, Chief Deputy Herman Nolen and Deputy Sheriff George McKee, were arraigned before Justice of the Peace E.A. Sturrock on various charges ranging from parole violation, auto theft to burglary and theft.

Two individuals were tried in the 88th District Court and upon conviction one received a two year probation sentence, the other was turned over to a Harris County Juvenile authorities. Two adults and one juvenile are still in custody, pending additional charges, for the burglary of the Sportmans Lodge and auto theft. Three juveniles were apprehended by Constable Arthur G. Gilchrist, of Precinct 4 late Friday night clearing several burglaries in the Warren area.

Tyler County man found dead Wednesday

Tyler County Sheriff's Department has ruled out the possibility of foul play in the death of 73 year old Russell Kinney whose skeletal remains were found on the front porch of his home last Wednesday. He was found by an electric company employee. The officers believe Mr. Kinney had been dead about two months when his remains were discovered.

Justice of the Peace E.A. Sturrock has ruled the death was from natural causes. Mr. Kinney's 410 shotgun was lying on the porch about 4 feet from him. Inside the

man's house, a television set was playing, and had apparently been on since Mr. Kinney died. A preliminary investigation indicated nothing had been taken from the house.

Suspected Murder Probed

Sheriff Lewis Craven announced Tuesday his department is investigating the death of Robert V. Bailey, to determine if it was a murder.

SBA accepts 820 disaster loans for June flooding

On July 11, 1973, the counties of Brazoria, Galveston, Hardin, Harris, Jasper, Liberty, Montgomery, Polk, San Jacinto, and Tyler were declared disaster areas by President Nixon. Two weeks later the counties of Newton and Matagorda were also declared disaster areas by the President.

Newton and Matagorda counties still have until September 22 to file applications for disaster loans. Monday, September 10, was the last day for all other counties to file. The SBA has accepted 755 home loan applications requesting \$5,400,000, and 65 business loan applications for \$2,700,000. During the last week, SBA received 32% of the home loan applications, and 54% of the business loan applications from citizens suffering losses in the June floods.

All applications are being handled individually, and being given consideration and expert attention by a loss verifier, loan officer, and legal counsel. The disaster office requests citizens to be patient and not to call for frequent progress reports.

(c) When the registrar receives a certificate of permanent disability which complies with the requirements of this subdivision, he shall take the necessary steps to have the notation of permanent disability added on the list of registered voters, as provided in paragraph (c) of this subdivision, and shall then attach the certificate to the voter's application for registration.

(d) If, after filing a certificate of permanent disability, a voter later becomes able to appear at the polling place, it is his duty to notify the registrar to that effect, whereupon the registrar shall cancel the certificate. The registrar shall investigate any report or any information furnished to him which indicates that a voter who has filed a certificate of permanent disability is presently able to appear at the polling place, and if he has reason to believe that this is true, he shall notify the voter by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, that the voter's status as a permanently disabled absentee voter will be cancelled unless he furnished the registrar with a new certificate of permanent disability within 60 days after the date of the notice. The registrar shall cancel the certificate if the voter does not comply.

out such protection and need to be able to raise taxes for this purpose.

Section 7 of Article XI is one of two sections in the constitution which require a two-thirds majority to authorize a local tax. There is treatment of taxation for schools and breakwaters. Certainly public schools and other districts are very important to local communities, but only a simple majority is required to authorize local taxation for these purposes.

Arguments against: The Texas coastline is 3,600 miles long. The state's most beautiful natural resources, "sea walls and breakwaters" are also very destructive by themselves. They greatly speed up the erosion of beaches, thus destroying much of the recreational value of the shoreline.

Much of the protection which sea walls and breakwaters help only the people living fairly close to the water. There should be a selective majority in favor of such a tax before a city or county should be allowed to tax all or what may be a very small proportion of the population.

4-Hers Create, Eat Meals "Right" for Them

When going out in public, whether in the local store, the doctor's office, or wherever, visiting relatives or whatever, people always want to be looking and feeling their best. When out in public people choose with care what they wear and how they act. Well, proper nutrition is just as important in how one looks and feels as clothing and behavior.

Over 600,000 young people have found out that you are what you eat and that proper nutrition is very important to the total you by participating in the national 4-H food-nutrition program. All aspects of nutrition are emphasized in this program, which is sponsored nationally by General Foods Corporation.

The program teaches about the food groups, planning nutritious meals and snacks, and the food needs of people of different ages or their job.

With the help of the formula 4-4-3-2, younger 4-Hers in the food-nutrition program learn the proper amount of meat, fruits, and vegetables they should eat each day. Young people are also encouraged through the program to plan and create meals that are not only nutritious but pleasing and tasty as well.

"General Foods" program design, along with the Creative Extension Service and the National 4-H Service Committee, have helped young people create nutritious meals by producing a series of five booklets on food-nutrition for 4-H members and leaders. "Teen Entertainment" in the series helps 4-H teens plan meals that are nutritious, economical, easy to prepare and satisfying.

Helping others learn about good nutrition is also a goal of the program. Agnes Arnold, a 1972 national winner in the 4-H food-nutrition program, taught principles of good nutrition to young people from low income families in her home town of Lebanon, Pa.

Another 1972 national winner in the program is heading toward a career as a professional chef as a result of his food-nutrition program. Mike Colluzzi, of Louisville, Ky., participated in 1970.

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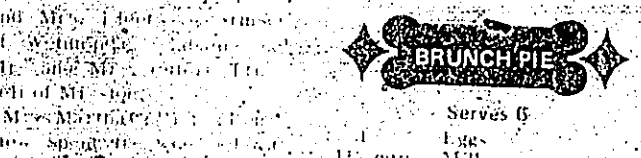

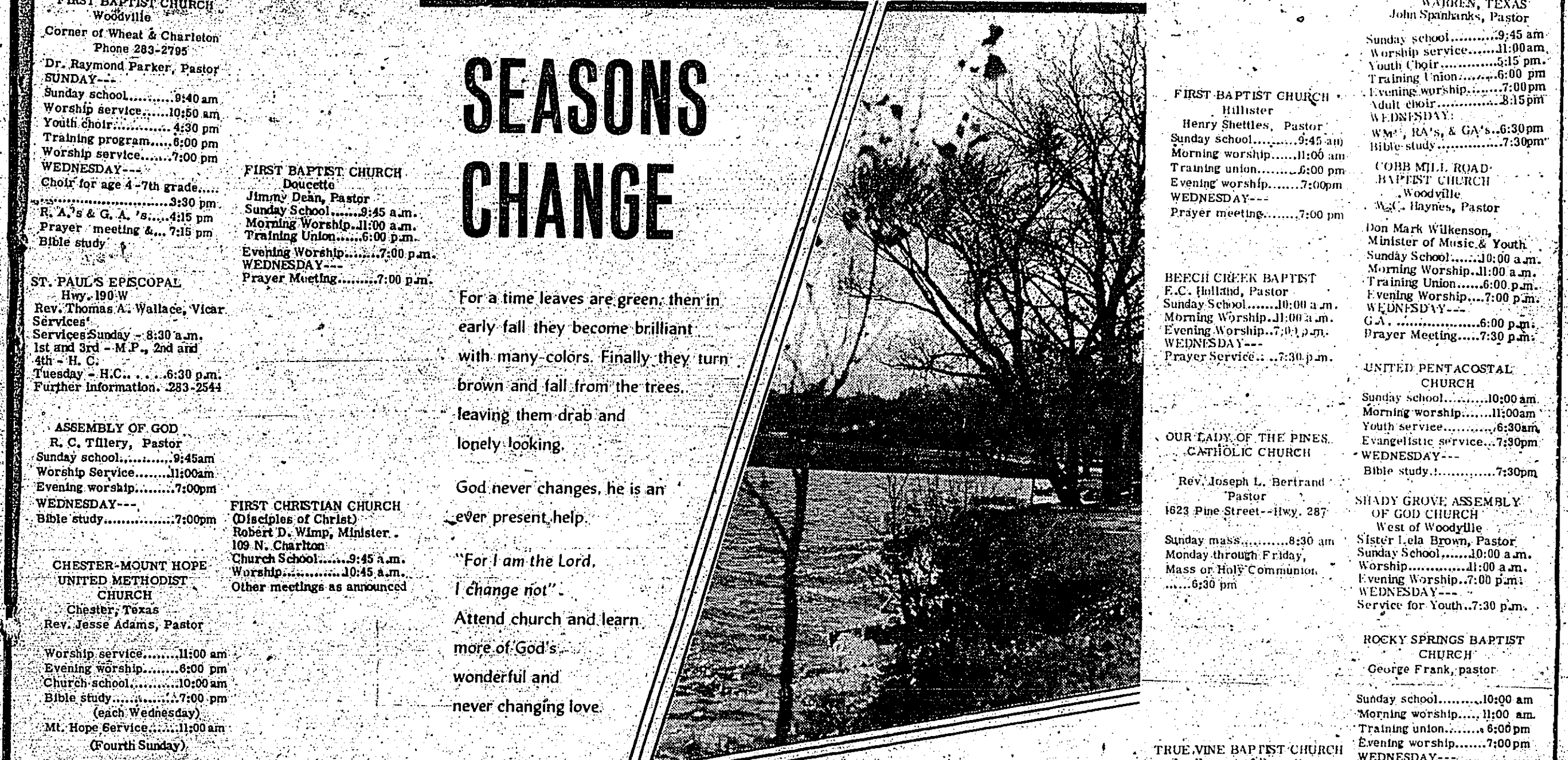

Early plantings can take full advantage of fall rainfall and other favorable growing conditions.

Early plantings also offer a target for some insect pests, but the advantages of getting the crop established early far outweigh any insect problems that may develop.

Soil test should be made well ahead of planting to determine the proper rate of fertilization.

One of more side dressings of nitrogen will generally be needed during the growing season for continued forage production.

Planting high-quality seed in a well-prepared seedbed further boosts production and high-quality forage.

According to Currie, soil testing or over seeding of soil with grasses or grain into permanent warm season grasslands with little or no tillage has limitations compared to seeding in a prepared seedbed.

When reworking an old established bed or iris, select only the strongest healthy rhizomes for replanting.

After planting, water only enough to settle the soil around the roots, then give the plants a good soaking every 10 to 14 days until established.
