Top of the Morning

Better is a poor man who walks in his integrity than a man who is perverse in speech, and is a fool.

One of the main attractions at the Highway Commission meeting held at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation Friday was the Kirby High School Band from Woodville. We heard many fine comments about the band from those attending the meeting.

Amendment No. 7 is one that won't cost you any money if it passes. The bill was originally passed in 1946 and has been approved by the voters each time it has been presented.

(Amending Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution, to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund.)

The proposed amendment authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations, the proceeds from which would be deposited in the Veterans' Land Fund. Other changes which the proposed amendment makes are the following:

(1) The interest payable on the bonds and obligations issued and sold by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set by the board as high as 8 percent. The current maximum rate payable on these bonds and obligations is 4-1/2 percent per annum.

(2) The present provision states that in order to qualify for purchase lands of the Veterans' Land Fund, veterans, in addition to other qualifications, must have served in the armed forces for a certain prescribed length of time between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam.

The proposed amendment would change this qualification to those who have served in the armed forces for an identical length of time after September 16, 1940.

(3) Surviving spouses of eligible veterans who had filed an application and contract of sale to purchase land through the board may complete the transaction.

Section 49-b was originally adopted in 1946. The purpose of Section 49-b was to set up the Veterans' Land Board through which Texas veterans of World War II were allowed to purchase land. Since the original section was adopted, it has been amended to provide additional amounts of bonds and obligations to be sold, to allow Texas veterans of the Korean conflict, veterans of the Viet Nam conflict, and veterans who had served in the armed forces during peace time to participate in the program.

The bonds and obligations of the State of Texas which have been issued and the land sold to veterans pursuant to the provisions of Article III, Section 49-b, have never been an expense for which tax money has been used. Interest rates allowable on these bonds and obligations were originally set at a maximum rate of three percent per annum. However, in order to keep the bonds and obligations saleable on subsequent bond markets, the maximum interest rate allowable was increased to the present 4-1/2 percent per annum.

The total \$400 million of bonds and obligations which the Texas Constitution now authorizes has already been issued. Therefore, if the Veterans' Land Program as it currently exists is to continue, an additional amount must be authorized. The proposed amendment makes such an authorization in the amount of an additional \$100 million of bonds and obligations.

WOODVILLE - If your community has all the modern roads and streets it needs, it is a rare one indeed, Reagan Houston, chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, said today.

Houston spoke after a caption dinner on the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation.

The event was sponsored by the Deep East Texas Development Association in observance of Highway Week. The day's events also included a helicopter tour of the big lakes of East Texas and highway dedications at Lufkin and Nacogoches.

Houston heads the policy making body for the Texas Highway Department, which maintains, constructs and operates more than 70,000 miles of highways in both rural and urban areas.

Good roads are essential to Texas, he said. "Everything we produce, manufacture, buy or sell depends on good highways," he said. "Good streets and highways have widened the range of opportunities you don't have to live close to work anymore. Distance is measured in minutes rather than miles."

He said the recent enactment of a new federal aid highway bill brought both good news and bad news.

The good news was that many needed highway projects now can get money. The bad news is that for the first time, some money from the fund, which is supposed to be used for mass transit, will be used for highway projects.

What the lack of the highway program, devoted to a use of taxes, derived from the operation of the motor vehicle for the operation of mass transit system.

That objection is based on the fact that there is not enough money to meet highway needs present and future. To illustrate that, he asked yourself the simple question: Does Texas economy have all the money it needs and streets it needs? If you think it does, you live in a very rare area.

The recently enacted Federal Aid Highway Act released highway trust funds accumulating in the Federal Highway Trust Fund to the states following a long period during which many states ran out of money for highway development.

We have had a successful scouting program in Woodville and Tyler County for many years because of the financial support of our citizens and we feel sure this will continue.

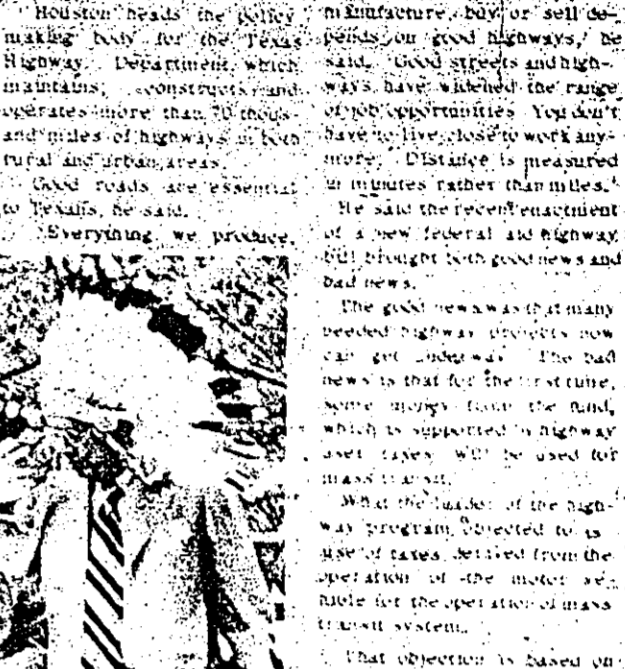
Colmesneil Homecoming Slated Friday Night

The 1973 Colmesneil High School homecoming will be Friday night, October 5, 1973.

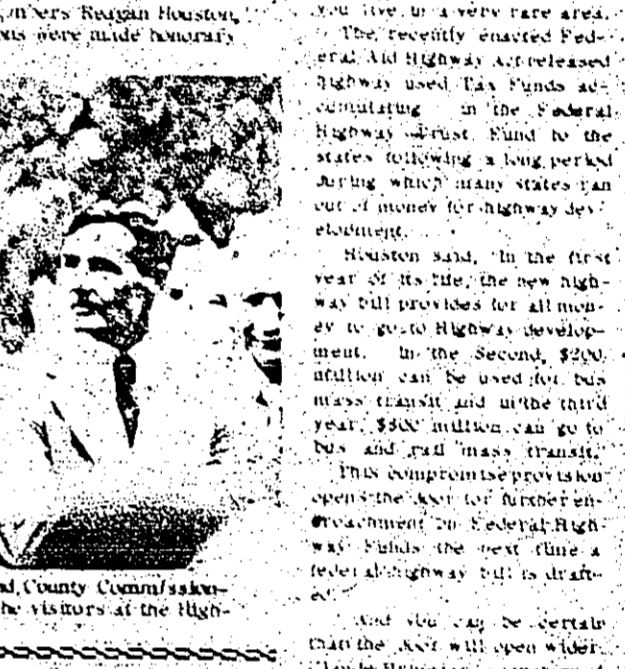

The school building will be open from 8:00 until 7:00 for registration and visitation for all uses.

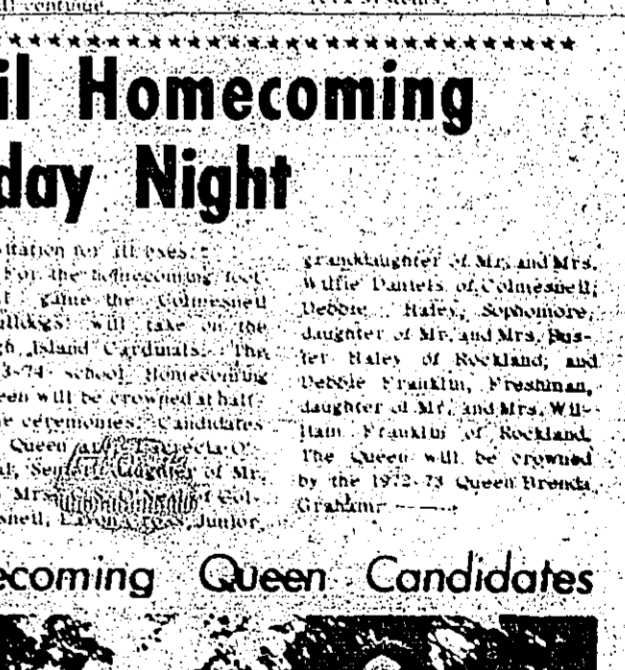

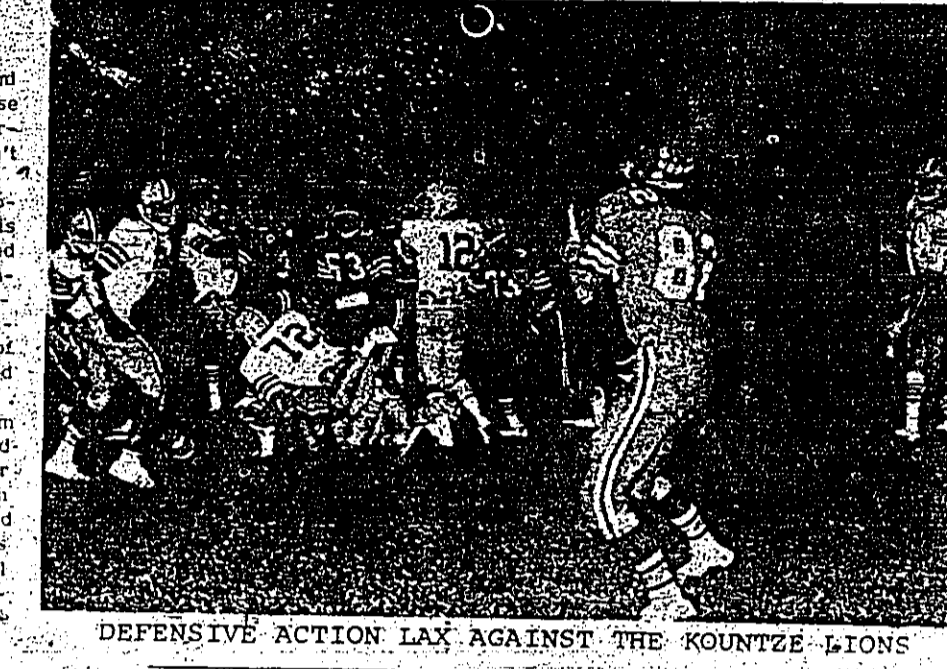

County Agent's Report

By CLINTON CURRIE TYLER COUNTY AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION AGENT

Chinch bugs are taking their toll on Texas lawns. San Antonio is the worst area. The chinch bug is a pest of lawns and pastures. It feeds on the roots of grasses and causes them to die.

Granular materials, often preferred by home owners, can be applied with a broadcast type fertilizer spreader. Following application of granular material, water the lawn thoroughly to work the granules into the soil.

Information sheets should accompany each sample to show past history and plans for the next crop. These plus making cartons for the soil samples are available at the county office.

Since a tractor or combine engine takes in about 9,000 gallons of air for every gallon of fuel it burns, it's important that the air cleaner be serviced regularly.

Proper care of the air cleaner results in better economy and insures longer engine life. An efficient air cleaner removes dust particles that grind away engine parts such as cylinders, rings and bearings.

A reliable soil test is the best place to start, and fall is the best time to collect soil samples. Each year, give time to make plans and place fertilizer orders early.

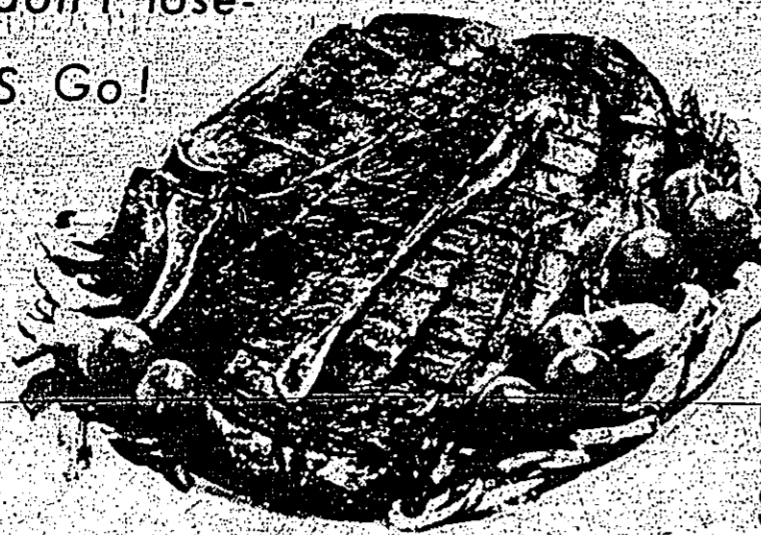
