

# DRUG ABUSE PROBLEM A GROWING REALITY IN TYLER COUNTY

Drug Abuse Prevention Week - October 21 - 27

According to the Tyler County Sheriff's Department, drug abuse is becoming a very real and dangerous problem. Citizens of rural communities seem to dismiss the drug problem as being a big city phenomenon. However, facts concerning numbers of arrests in Tyler County for drug abuse show an alarmingly increasing participation by residents in use and sale of dangerous substances.

Forty-two arrests have been made by the Tyler County Sheriff's Department for drug abuse. However, 9 of these arrests were made in the month of September and 16 were made in the first half of October. Increasing juvenile arrests for possession in the last two months have been an alarming factor. Also important were the five arrests made during the year for sale of Marijuana and other dangerous drugs.

During the last week, the Sheriff's Department also reported the seizure and destruction of a large quantity of Marijuana. The Marijuana was being grown in Tyler

County possibly for sale and had a street value of approximately \$1,500. This is not the first case of seized Marijuana in Tyler County in 1973 according to the files of Sheriff Louis Craven.

Arrests for possession of dangerous substances were minimal during the first four months of 1973 with only 3 arrests recorded. Summer arrests totaled 14, not including some of the juvenile arrests. The growing problem of Marijuana and other dangerous substances by the Tyler County Youth. The Sheriff also cautioned that parents should give every consideration as to the whereabouts of their children and the companions their children associate with.

The Sheriff reminds parents that children and young adults are particularly susceptible to peer influence and may be encouraged to try Marijuana or some other dangerous substance first as an experiment or to maintain or gain a position with his or her group. All citizens and parents in particular are asked to be alert for signs of Marijuana use, or possession by anyone. Everyone should be particularly aware of the symptoms of Marijuana use.

**DRUG ABUSE WEEK**  
October 21-27 has been declared Drug Abuse Prevention Week. Concentrated efforts are being aimed at renewing public concern about drugs and drug abuse, and more importantly, aimed at generating public action.

The main aim of Drug Abuse Prevention Week is to show the family can be a powerful, effective means of heading off drug abuse. The family has been generally neglected in many previous drug abuse prevention campaigns, and during the week of October 21-27, the family will be brought back into perspective as an important resource.

A family is not just limited to the traditional "nuclear" family unit, but can also include the families of peers and associates of any other grouping of people who band together or are drawn together by common interests and needs.

National Drug Prevention Week should provide Tyler County an opportunity to re-

new public interest in overcoming a problem which is rapidly becoming an eyesore in American society. The Tyler County Booster is cooperating with other newspapers across the nation to inform the general public concerning the drug problem.

Public concern and awareness along with the family concept mentioned are important weapons in fighting drug traffic in the rural community. Citizens of Tyler County should participate in educational programs concerning drug abuse.

The Warren Independent School Board of Trustees met in regular session on October 16, 1974.

Besides approving the minutes of the last meeting and the bills and financial statements, the following items of business were taken care of: A new Board Policy on Senior Trips was made because most of the seniors now reached the adult age of 18 and the Board felt this advisable for making the final payment. They also accepted the low bid from Best Sporting Goods Company for Track Equipment.

The Board also gave their consent to the Superintendent to file an intent to adopt plan A in Special Education for the year 1974-75, so as to be more helpful to those students needing additional help. The Board also agreed to pursue, updating and organizing all school Board Policies.

### Wilson Seeks Tax Credit For Disaster Victims

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Last Texas Congressman Charles Wilson today called upon Congress to vote tax credit for the victims of natural disasters.

"For the fourth time this year," Wilson reported, "there are floods in the lower end of my district. These people need our help, particularly since the President vetoed the federal disaster relief bill."

Wilson said he has been in touch with several government agencies in an effort to find a permanent solution to the flooding problems, but he emphasized that future

solutions don't help the people whose living rooms are full of water right at this moment.

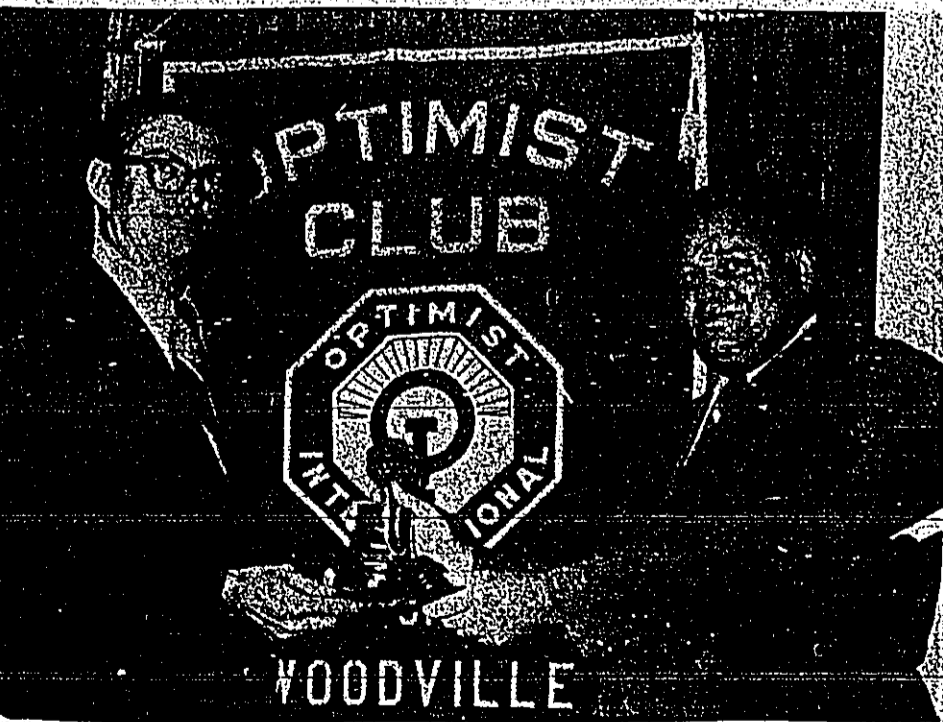
Wilson is cosponsoring an amendment to the Internal Revenue Code which will, if enacted, provide individual tax credits for disaster expenses. "I consider this an emergency measure," Wilson said. "I realize it's not the ultimate answer to flood control problems, but when you've got the Trinity or Neches River coming through your window you can't afford to wait for the ultimate answer. We've got a responsibility to assist these folks right now."

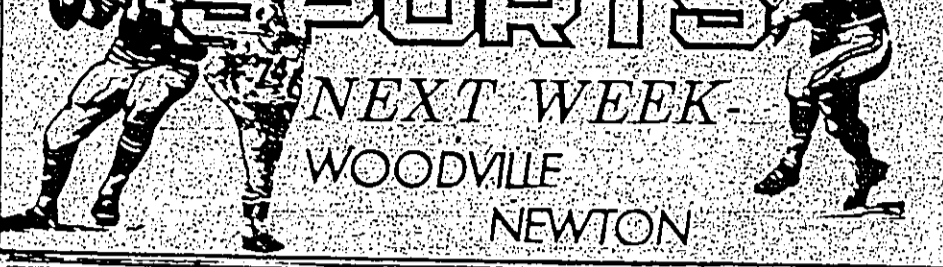

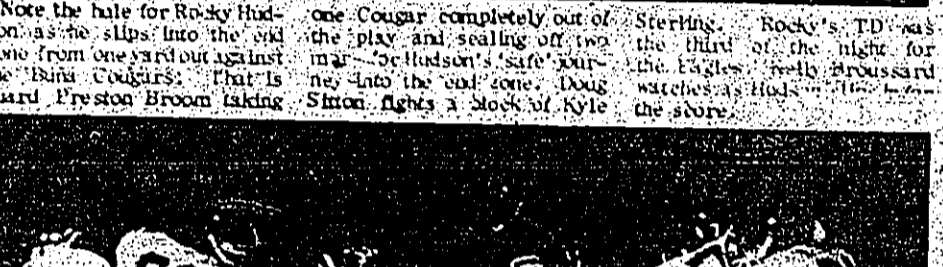

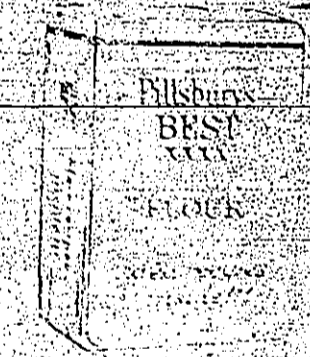
