Politics are warming up as the end of the year comes near. Leading contender for Republican nomination for governor of Texas are George Bush, Republican party Chairman, and Jim Granberry of Lubbock. Granberry is a former mayor of Lubbock. Hank Grover, who made an excellent showing in the governor race against Governor Dolph Briscoe, has not indicated his intentions.

Amendment No. 8 to be voted on November 6 is one that you should study thoroughly. This amendment authorizes levying of additional ad valorem taxes by cities, towns, and villages, without the limitations established in state statute should not pass. If it does pass, the governing bodies of regional governments would be free to do as they please in raising taxes. Food Stamps Begin Here

The new statewide Food Stamp Program administered by the Texas Department of Public Welfare, is in Tyler County. Applications are being accepted at the State Welfare Office in Woodville, located in the Tyler County Courthouse.

When applying for food stamps, persons should take with them proof of income, shelter, expenses, medical bills, and records of bank accounts, if any. Among those who are eligible for food stamps are persons who are unemployed, working part-time, working for low wages, and those who get small social security payments for some kind of pension check. The amount of food stamps a household receives and how much they must pay for them is determined by the size of the household and the total net income.

When a person is certified for Food Stamps, he will receive an Authorization to Purchase Card (pink) and an Identification Card (yellow) which are to be taken to the Post Office in Woodville, along with the required money (cash only) to purchase the food stamps.

The issuing hours for purchasing food stamps will be between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. only Monday through Friday. These issuing hours have been selected to avoid the possibility of long lines when purchasing the stamps. The Authorization to Purchase Card is good for the month shown on the card and the purchase of stamps does not have to be made on the day the Authorization to Purchase Card is received in the mail. This provision is made for the convenience of the purchaser to avoid standing in line or having to secure special transportation. The Authorization to Purchase Card is not to be signed prior to purchasing the food stamps.

After purchasing food stamps, the household member should sign his name on the Food Stamp Booklets prior to leaving the Post Office and are not to remove the food stamps until actually purchasing groceries at an authorized store. Food stores have been instructed not to accept food stamps removed from the booklets prior to purchasing other than the 50¢ coupons. In purchasing, it will be helpful if the person will tell the cashier that food stamps are being used.

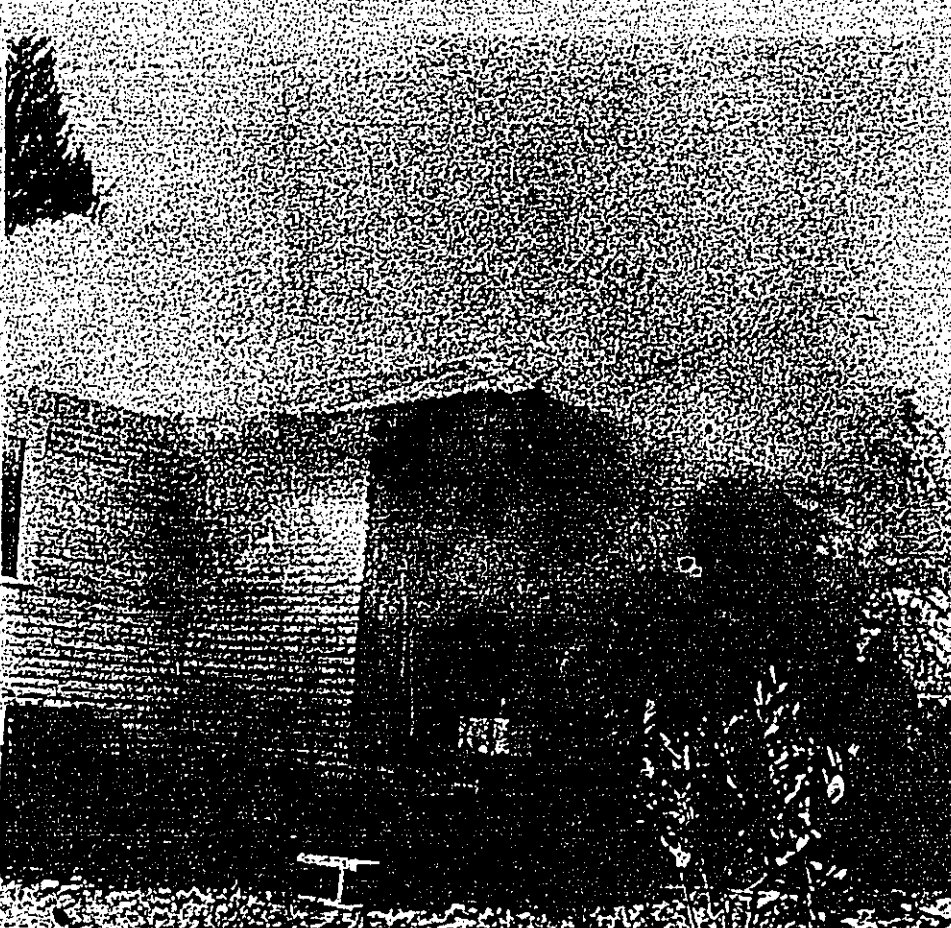
Veteran Forms Sent

Income questionnaires will be mailed Thursday, November 1st, to Tyler County Veterans. All questionnaires must be returned to the V.A. office by January 15. All income must be reported on the forms. Veterans who receive Social Security checks which include wives should indicate the wife's share of Social Security Benefits.

Unusual medical expenses not paid by insurance must be totaled and may be deducted from income. Deductions may increase checks a small percentage each month. Records of medical expenses must be kept in order. Veterans over 72 years of age whose income has not changed

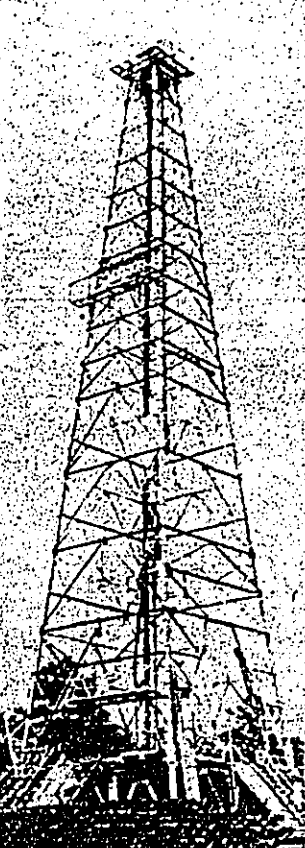
Gas Field In County Drilling Possible

The possible discovery of a natural gas field in the northern portion of Tyler County has brightened economic hopes in the area. Two gas-producing wells have been drilled approximately 6 miles northeast of Colmesneil. One well is producing about 3 million cubic feet daily while the other is producing about half that amount. Two wells were also brought in the Camden area. Woodman said is prevalent in both well-producing areas. The two wells at Colmesneil were brought in at 11,500 ft. while the Camden wells were struck at 12,500 ft.

Geological conditions point to a possible field stretching in a line from Camden to Colmesneil passing through the Chester area. Drilling is under way about 2 miles west of Chester presently. A site had been previously drilled at Chester which produced oil and gas, but salt water complicating caused it to be plugged for economic reasons.

Oil companies including Sunoco and Cities Service has been leasing extensively in the north Tyler County area. Mark Development Corporation which originally did some of the work in the area has let its lease out to other companies including H.B. Sutton and Delta Drilling Company. The Lafayette division of Delta is currently drilling about 1.6 miles off U.S. Highway 287 four miles north of Woodville. The operation has been preceding as scheduled according to Vaughn Edwards, General Superintendent. Sources indicate that the permit issued Delta has a limit of approximately 17,000 ft.

Most drilling is occurring in North Tyler County in woodman sand which is the same formation successful in Polk County gas wells. Observers in the county are hopeful that current signs of gas discovery continue to be successful. Discovery of a new natural gas field in Tyler County could provide much needed economic growth.

In addition to controlling insects outside the home, Currie also suggests checking for cracks at the top of the walls, whether on stucco walls or around windows. Insects often crawl up a wall to the ceiling and gain entrance to the attic for sub-floor in a two-story house.

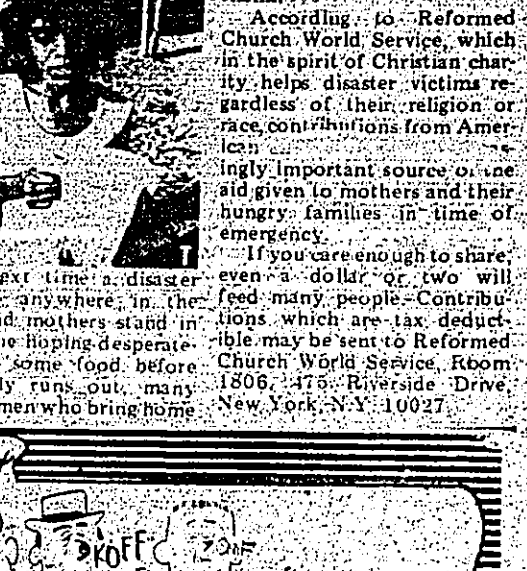
