The Big Thicket Bill is now waiting a committee vote in the House of Representatives where some supporters of the bill want action delayed on the bill until all areas of biological value have been added to the area for permanent preservation. In some places in the Big Thicket area, some people want these areas included in the park. This type of arid land is found in Hardin County along Village Creek. The arid plant area was left out of the Park Service's final recommendation of park acreage after the administration set a 68,000-acre maximum for a bill it would support; they were consequently left out of the recent environmental impact statement which the Park Service limited strictly to the acres recommended by White House sources. Even when the acreage was horse traded up to 84,000 acres in the House National Parks subcommittee in mid-October, the sandylands still were left out.

Veteran Forms Sent

Income questionnaires were mailed Thursday, November 1st, to Tyler County Veterans. All questionnaires must be returned to the V.A. office by January 15. All income must be reported on the forms. Veterans who receive Social Security checks which include wives should note the wife's share of the Social Security benefits.

Unusual medical expenses not paid by insurance must be totaled and may be deducted from income. Deductions may increase checks for small percentages each month. Records of medical expenses must be kept in order. Veterans over 72 years of age whose income has not changed in the past two years will not be sent a questionnaire. If income has changed, it should be reported according to E.M. Pitts Sr., Tyler County Service Officer.

Veterans who were discharged between February 1, 1953, until June 1, 1966, have until May 31, 1974, to take advantage of educational benefits under the G.I. Bill. Also veterans from Minnesota who served between August 5, 1964, and January 27, 1973 will receive a bonus of \$800.00 plus \$15 per month served. Partial allowance will be increased from \$250 to \$400. Veterans seeking additional information should contact E.M. Pitts Sr., Tyler County Service Officer in the Court House.

Chamber Picks Five

RAINFALL TWICE NORMAL AMOUNT

The cumulative total of rainfall for 1973 is almost double the normal amount according to the Texas Forestry Service, Tyler County, which normally experiences 46 to 48 inches of rain annually. It has already received 85.25 inches of rain through the month of October. Moisture saturation has been causing numerous problems in county agriculture according to Vernon Currie, county Extension Agent. The wet summer is responsible largely for the unusual amount of rainfall reported. The normally dry months of June, July and August produced 31.25 inches of rain with June having the highest monthly total of the year at 11.88. Five of the first ten months of 1973 had over 9 inches of rain including the month of October which has just ended. At the current monthly average of 8.5 inches per month, Tyler County could receive 99 inches total rainfall measurement for the year. This is almost 22% of the normal amount for the area.

CRIME DECREASES IN TYLER COUNTY

Crimes have decreased in Tyler County in the past two weeks according to Tyler County Sheriff Louis Craven. Especially significant was the decrease in the number of burglaries committed. In the past two weeks, arrests were as follows: Illegal hunting 5; Driving while intoxicated 4; Drunk in public 1; possession of marijuana 6; and Juvenile offense for possession of marijuana 1.

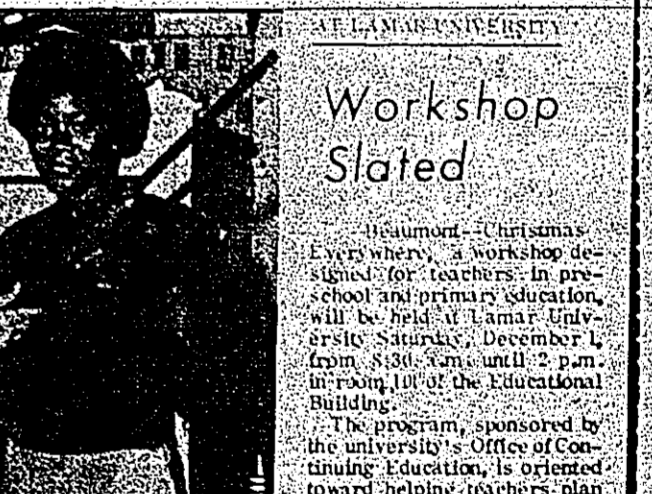

TIPS ON TUBS
Making an old fiber glass bathtub or shower stall look like new can be as easy as polishing furniture.
Start by removing built up dirt and grime with any popular liquid detergent. Full strength from the bottle rubbing with a sponge. Non-abrasive scouring pads made of nylon, saran or polyethylene can be used sparingly for harder to remove stains.
As a last resort, turpentine or paint thinner should be used to remove stubborn spots. Be sure to follow safety directions on the container and use these volatile materials only in well ventilated areas away from open flames.
Never use metal scouring pads or abrasive powders. They will remove the protective coating on fiber glass features.
Once the surface is thoroughly clean, the original luster of fiber glass can be restored with a light application of automobile wax, liquid or paste. It will be applied to the face can be slippery when wet, do not wax areas used for standing.
To maintain the luster of new or restored fiber glass bathtubs, never use anything stronger than a mild liquid detergent for regular cleaning.

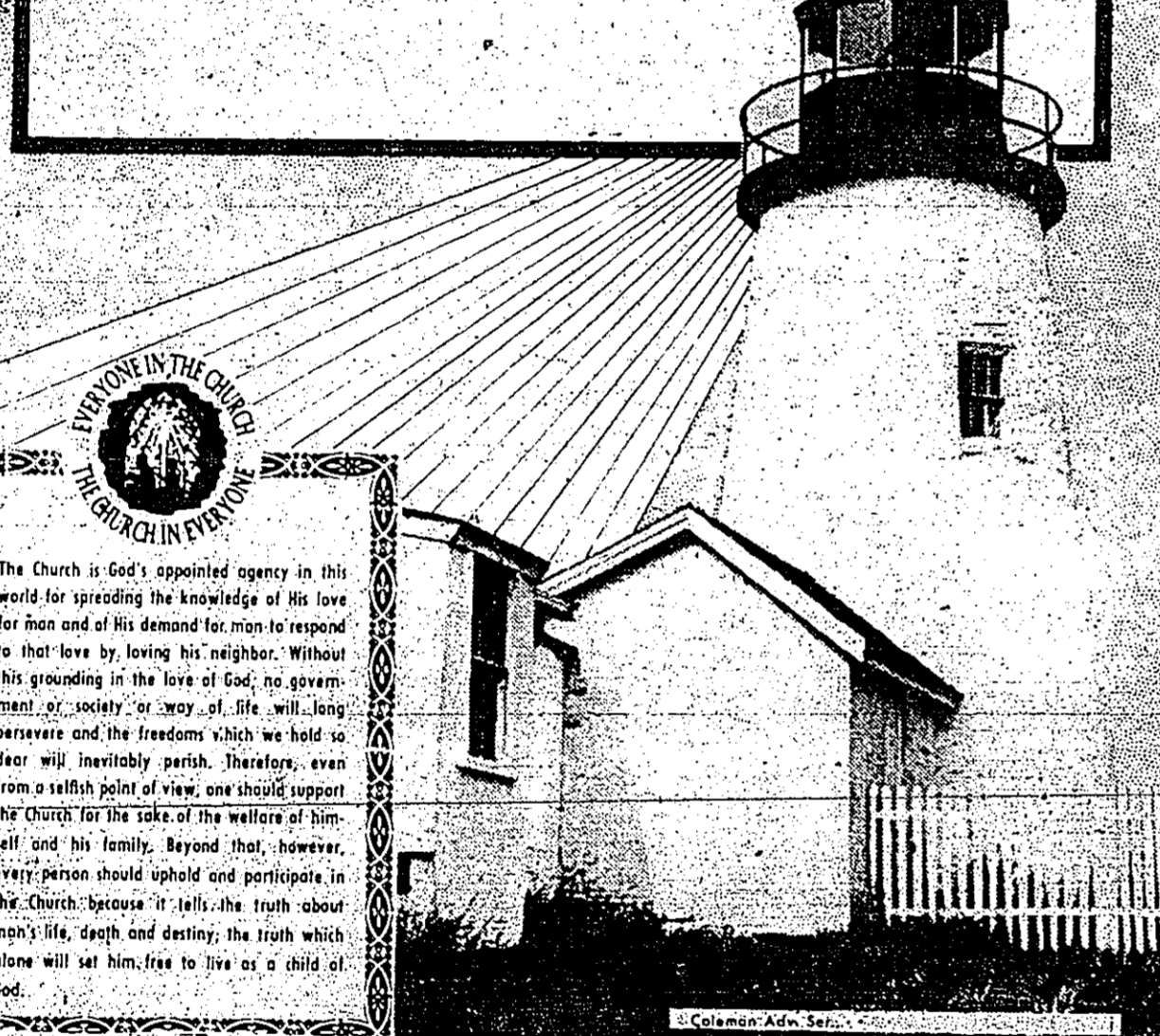
