Toy Safety Campaign Underway

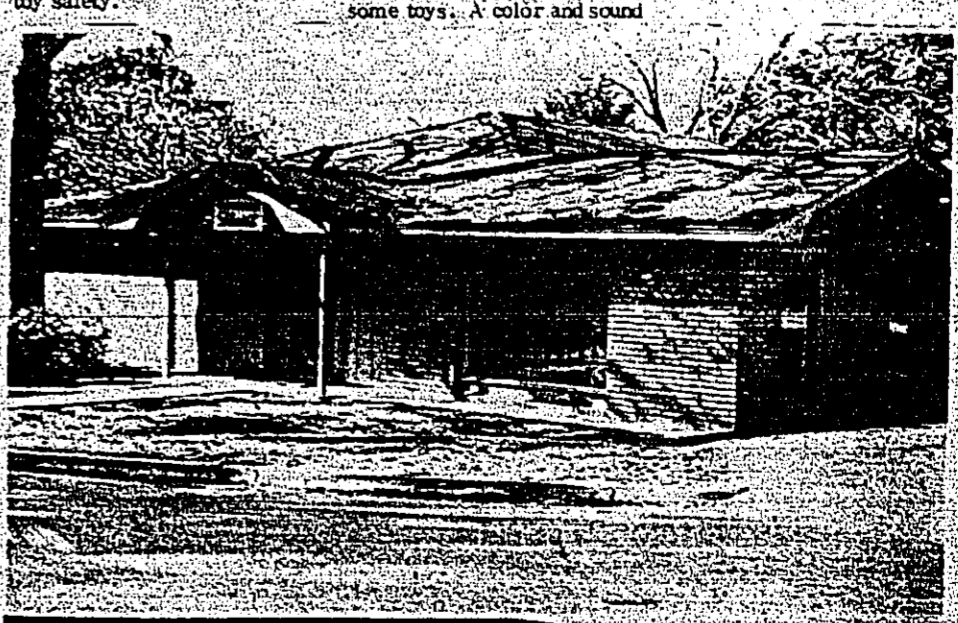

CONSTRUCTION TIPS ON SWEATERS
Sweater knits are making the news and will become even more popular this fall. Techniques suitable for double knit can be used successfully with single sweater knits, but stretchy knits need slight differences in construction. Selection of pattern and fabric is important. Consider the weight of the fabric in relation to the weight of the sweater. Weights for most styles, heavy weights for cardigans and jackets, medium weights for sweaters. In a sandwich-like construction, electric blankets are a good idea. Use a sweater knit for the regular size. Use a lighter sweater knit for the lining. Allow for relaxation shrinkage. 
