Steinhagen Lake Lowered

A six-foot drawdown of Steinhagen Lake, on Neches River near Woodville, Texas, is scheduled to begin December 3 and continue for 30 days at a minimum, or a maximum of 45 days, depending upon environmental conditions, Colonel Floyd Henk, District Engineer of the Fort Worth District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, has announced.

The drawdown is to expose more than 3,000 acres of alligator, wood and cypress swamps, which have been restricting recreational use of some areas of the lake. It is expected that the drying of the lake bottom and low winter temperatures will provide an effective control program by killing or at least retarding the plants to the point that they do not interfere with operation or use of the lake.

Said Colonel Henk, "The proposed drawdown would afford the Corps' operation personnel an opportunity to observe and record the results on this weed and others on a 'before and after' basis."

Charles Ferguson, reservoir manager at the Town Bluff Project Office, said the waters will be passed through the dam gradually to accomplish the drawdown from 82 feet mean sea level to 76 feet mean sea level.

Kirby Band Picked To Represent Texas

The Kirby High School Band has been invited to represent the state of Texas at the Four States Bandmaster's Association convention. Only one band will represent Texas in the convention as Honor Band.

The Four States Bandmaster's Association is composed of band directors from the states of Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Oklahoma. One honor band from each state is chosen to perform a concert program at the meeting.

ASCS To Aid In Fuel Distribution

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and the Texas Railroad Commission are joined in an effort to increase efficiency in the handling of the mandatory allocation of middle distillate fuels. An agreement between the state and federal agencies should speed up the program.

Beginning immediately, ASCS County Office Personnel will verify fuel needs for hardship cases on Form OOG-PAP-20 for all applications prior to their submission to the State Allocation Office, Texas Railroad Commission.

Previously, it was planned that needed verification would be obtained after the form was submitted to the State Allocation Office. Form OOG-PAP-20 is to be used by wholesale purchasers to request emergency allocations for immediate use. The form is supplied to ASCS County Offices throughout the State and was made available to County Clerk's offices.

Also available is Form OOG-PAP-17 which is for the use of purchasers of middle distillate fuels in bulk supply to adjust their monthly allocations for the year or for obtaining a new allocation.

Further information may be obtained from the County ASCS Office at 41 North Pine Street, Woodville, Texas.

The following advisory letters were issued on November 15, 1973 and November 16, 1973 by the Department of Interior, Office of Petroleum

Allocation, Washington, D.C. ADVISORY NO. 1 - Fuel Needs of Farmers - Interpretations of Mandatory Allocation Regulations and Distribution of Fossil Fuels which includes petroleum, natural gas and coal.

(2) For the operation of mobile and fixed farm and ranch equipment essential to the planting, growth, or harvesting of crop and/or livestock.

(3) For the operation of public mass transportation systems within metropolitan areas when certified as essential to the public welfare by the Governor of the State to the Administrator.

It is intended that the preference granted herein shall apply only to delivery of diesel fuels in the Middle Distillate range during the 60-day period and does not apply to deliveries placed on a supplier for delivery beyond the next 60 days.

Purchasers requesting assistance under this notice are cautioned to limit their requests to actual current requirements as it is intended that quantities of such fuels delivered during the 60-day period will be assessed against their adjusted total annual allocation.

The local ASCS office urges all distributors of petroleum products to file applications for additional petroleum products when they are unable to deliver to agricultural producers effective immediately.

If you are an agricultural producer and are unable to get delivery of petroleum products, please come by the ASCS office and file a request. Do not file if you have a 60-day supply at this time.

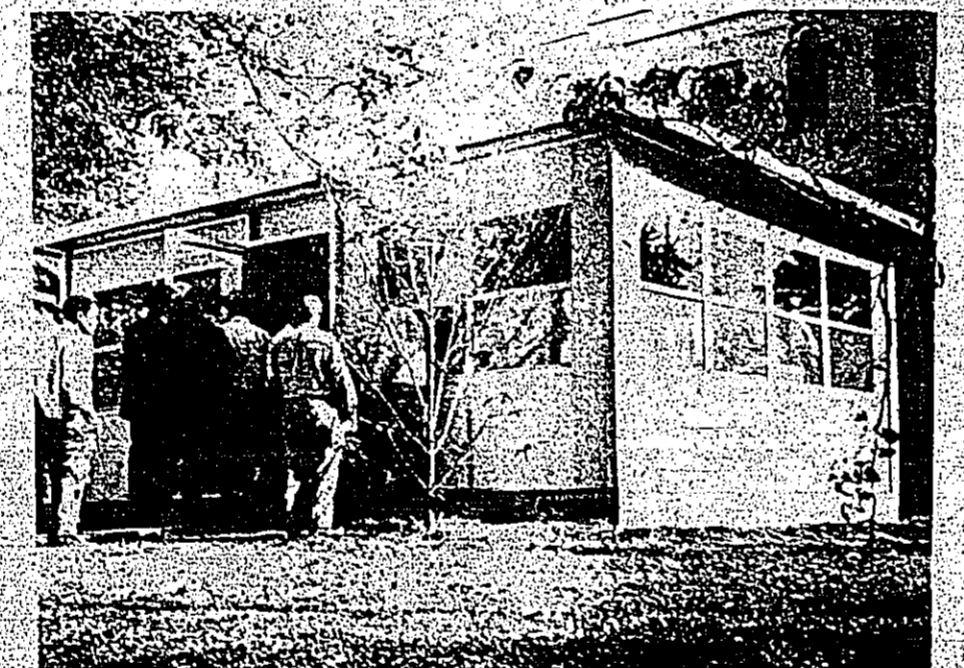

DETCOG Approves Fund

Committee approval of a Regional Workmen's Compensation Insurance Fund program, Health Advisory Council appointments and several resolutions covering Social Services programs and Regional Development projects were some of the highlights of the monthly meeting of the Deep East Texas Council of Governments in Newton November 29.

The meeting was held in the district courtroom of the recently remodeled Newton County Courthouse. Newton County Judge Lee Roy Fillyaw delivered the welcome.

The Executive Committee unanimously adopted a resolution calling for the creation of a Deep East Texas Workmen's Compensation Insurance Fund. The basic purpose of the fund is to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance coverage to participating members. All governmental entities in the Deep East Texas region are eligible to participate in the regional Workmen's Compensation Insurance program.

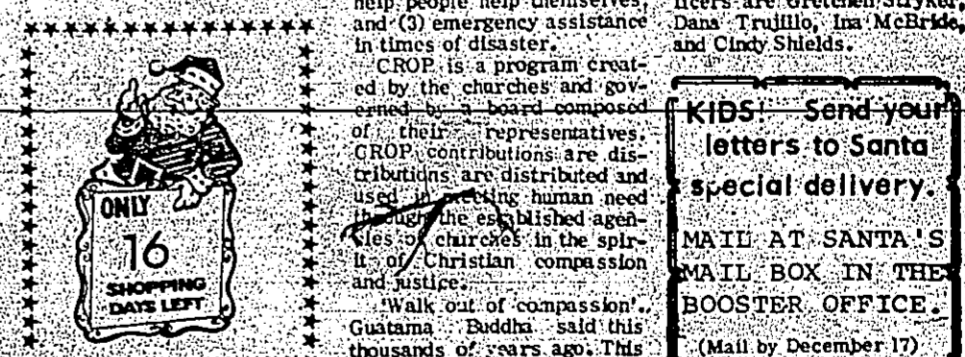
A total of 128 governmental units exist in the region and all must have Workmen's Compensation insurance coverage by July 1, 1977.

Homemaking Hints

KEEPING IT SAFE ON THE WILD

Who gets the prized catch when your great hunter returns from the fields and woods?

Why, you—the cook, of course!

Feeding from the wild offers an added tinge of excitement from the usual hot meal, because meat and fowl enjoyed on the very first Thanksgiving came from the wild.

But be it a 2,000 pound moose or the smallest turkey, Thanksgiving or Christmas, you also get the responsibility of keeping it safe for your family's holiday feast.

And a little extra care can go a long way toward preventing an aftermath of food poisoning, points out the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

Salmonella is the poisoning most likely to develop from improperly handled wild game. It resembles the flu in its systems: headache, vomiting, cramps, nausea, fever and diarrhea. The symptoms usually occur within 12 to 24 hours after eating contaminated food and last from two to seven days. It is seldom fatal, but it can be extremely dangerous for infants or older people.

Bacteria grow between 40 and 140 degrees. So the faster you get your game on one side or the other of these limits, the better your chance of avoiding spoilage, says the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service. This is the USDA agency handling federal meat and poultry inspection. It can speak from experience.

"We'll assume your great hunter has preliminary sanitary steps before presenting his catch to you: He killed his prey quickly and cleanly, washed and chilled it properly, and got it home as soon as possible.

As the cook, you can guard against further danger of bacterial contamination by taking these few precautions in the care and handling of your wild game prey:

To begin with, be sure your kitchen, hands, cutting board, knife and other utensils are as clean as possible, while you're preparing game for storing or cooking. And wash hands and kitchenware again in-between handling raw game cooked meat to avoid cross-contamination. Use plenty of soap and water.

After you have thoroughly cleaned your game, treat it just as you would any meat or poultry you buy from the supermarket—wrap most loosely for later use and store it quickly in the refrigerator. Or, for storage longer than 1 or 2 days, wrap it immediately in all-light freezer bags or foil and store it immediately in the freezer (below 0 degrees F.).

Once meat is thawed, cook it thoroughly. Remember that wild game has a greater chance of bacterial contamination than that bought from your neighborhood supermarket, due to the unsanitary conditions in the field.

The chilling and freezing methods you used to store your meat stopped the growth of harmful bacteria temporarily. But it takes exposure to at least 150 degrees F. all the way through the meat to kill the common strains of salmonella. So you need thorough cooking is doubly important when handling wild game.

Serve your meat as soon as it's cooked. If it is to be eaten hot, keep it hot—above 140 degrees F. If it's cold, keep it cold below 40 degrees F. Don't leave cooked meat out at room temperature for more than two hours. Re-

AUSTIN, Tex. - Gov. Dolph Briscoe called for a 55 mph speed limit, an hour-shorter school day, 68 degree heating thermostat settings, carpooling, driving curbside and elimination of night football.

The proposals were part of the governor's 90-day emergency program to conserve energy.

He said he hoped to improve consumption by 20 per cent through the need reduction, carpooling and cutting down on non-essential trips.

The governor also hopes for a 70 per cent reduction in energy bills and offices through 68 degree winter temperature, 78 degree for cooling, switching off all unnecessary lights and parking daily and advertising signs after midnight.

He termed his program "a minimum response that all of us must take."

We are asking only for the elimination of luxuries and "ifs."

While he "deliberately avoided" specific recommendations for industry, Briscoe made clear he will expert industry to "do its share, no less than the rest of us."

He asked the State Highways Commission to "evaluate the state-wide speed limit questions immediately and make a determination under its existing authority."

The commission scheduled a Tuesday meeting at Texas A&M University in College Station to consider the 55 mph proposal.

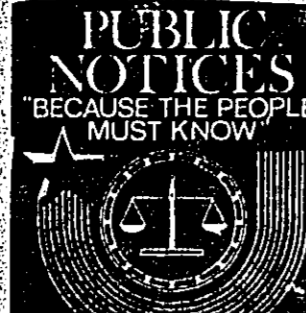
