Residents of Dunham, New Hampshire apparently are not concerned with the energy shortage or else they have had sufficient supplies of fuel oil and gasoline. In a town meeting recently, a proposal to build a \$600-million oil refinery was brought before the assembly. They voted 1884 to 14 to turn down the proposal. Residents of New Hampshire and other New England states are adamant in their opposition to any oil and gas exploration in their off-shore waters because they are afraid it might have a bad effect on their environment. There are "broken gas" and oil deposits off the coast of these states and, if they were brought into production and refineries built, the energy shortage would be alleviated some.

Bill to prevent cuts in pensions

(WASHINGTON, D.C.)—Congressman Charles Wilson today introduced a bill which provides that the recent 10% increase in Social Security benefits be exempted from consideration when determining pensions for veterans and widows.

In 1975, more than a million veterans and widows will have their pensions cut by an average of 10% per year—and 15,000 veterans and widows will be removed entirely from the pension rolls because of the recent automatic increases in the Social Security bill. The cuts will affect those who are not entitled to an increased benefit because they come at the expense of a person's only other source of income.

She will be representing the more than 800,000 Indians from coast to coast.

Miss Manning will arrive with her chaperones in Houston on Wednesday March 13 and take a tour of East Texas before the special event on Thursday. Fulton Bellino, Chief of the Alabama-Coushatta Tribe will crown the new Miss Indian America. The public is invited to this rare event.


