Safety Rest Area Pioneer Honored By Texas Highway Department Award

R.E. Wingate, a pioneer in the formation of the present system of Texas roadside parks and rest areas, recently was presented with a plaque from the Texas Highway Department in recognition for his services. The text of the award is as follows:

WHEREAS, the Texas Highway Department long has enjoyed the reputation of paying special attention to roadside esthetics, amenities and the comfort and convenience of the traveling public, and

WHEREAS, Mr. R.E. Wingate of Woodville in 1930, while working as county foreman for the Texas Highway Department in Newton County, developed facilities adjacent to State Highway 87 for the use of travelers and local residents alike; and

WHEREAS, he pioneered the concept which became the inspiration for today's hundreds of safety rest areas for the enjoyment, convenience and safety of the traveling public; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Wingate helped establish traditions that evolved into traveler amenities along the state highway system of Texas; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Texas Highway Commission to salute him for his pioneering efforts and outstanding service to his community and the Texas Highway Department,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE TEXAS HIGHWAY COMMISSION that a copy of this order be prepared for presentation to him in appreciation of his service to the Texas Highway Department and to the people of Texas.

To the assembled group and to Austin Fuller who will replace him as county treasurer he said, "the duties have increased in this office as they have in other county offices as there are a lot more people living in Tyler County now than when I took office in 1959."

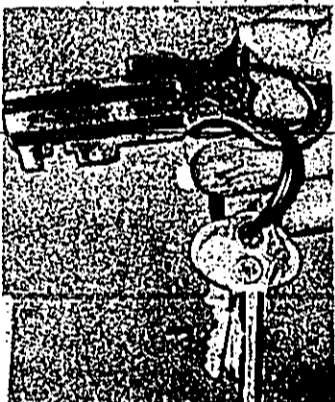

Present Conditions May Cause A New Jail To Be Built During Coming Year



These keys unlock many problems that exist today with the present Tyler County jail facilities.

To build or not to build? Perhaps that is no longer the question with the people of this county. State inspectors have already said this jail is beyond repair. Sheriff Lewis Craven is awaiting the report these men filed upon their return to Austin.

The location of the jail atop other rooms in the courthouse has already proven an expensive one. Prisoners, with idle time, have stuffed objects down the plumbing until these

stop up, overflow and damage the ceilings, furniture, and carpeting below.

Because prisoners have ready access to lighting fixtures these have been ripped from the wall and today many walls have exposed wiring. A walk-around, built on the exterior of three sides of the jail is an exercise area where the prisoners can walk about at will, the door is never locked. Along this area are a few metal benches where prisoners can sit and look outside, along this area are also windows that prisoners have kicked and broken out. The benches are sagged and bent out of shape. Windows in the walk around have pieces of cardboard over them because glass replacement comes too often. Because of an attempted jail break some of the cell windows have sheets of metal welded over them, blocking out most of the light.

Conditions of the jail are deplorable, filth and trash abound. Janitors clean the area each week but the tenants put it back in the previous state. The four flights of stairs to the top of the jail are poorly lighted, naked light bulbs hang from the ceiling. The steps are uneven and one flight is especially steep and narrow, the steps here being only 9" in width. Yet there have been few accidents.

Women prisoners have the option of having the door opening on the hall either open or shut. Shut, they have less ven-

tilation but they are protected from the view of passerbys walking down the hallway. The male prisoners have more privacy upstairs.

Although visiting hours are officially limited to 2-4 p.m., on Thursdays, actually visitations occur at all times during the week. Meals are served to the jail tenants twice each day but family members usually supplement these with food stuffs. Prisoners have access to a communal room where they are allowed to play cards, dominoes or eat their snacks and meals. The littered table in this room is an indication of the lack of appreciation they have for this privilege. The shower in this room is filled with burnt trash and totally unusable. The ceiling is blackened with smoke.

Bottles and opened boxes of food spill over the metal table and floor. The walls are filled with graffiti. Some prisoners fashioned a calendar on the wall and have marked the days of their sentence on this. There have been prisoners serving sentences of as long as a year in the county jail.

There is a cell for solitary confinement but it is locked and has not been in use for a long time. Existing facilities are rank with filth in the remaining cells. The area is largely unfit to the cell area. It is unpleasant to those locked within this area, it is offending to those who must tend the prisoners.

Regardless of personal feelings toward the present jail facility or the building of a new one, it seems the question may no longer be in the

hands of the people when the state intervenes. A new jail building may be one of the constructions projected in Woodville for the coming year.

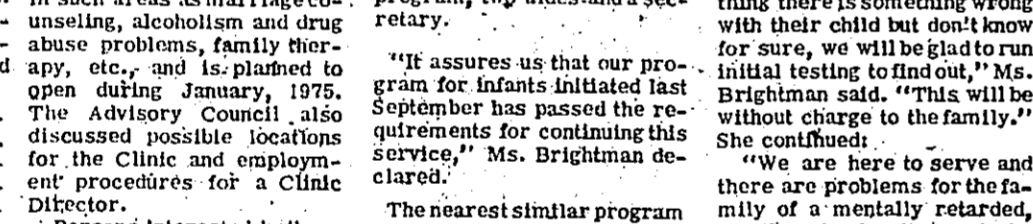

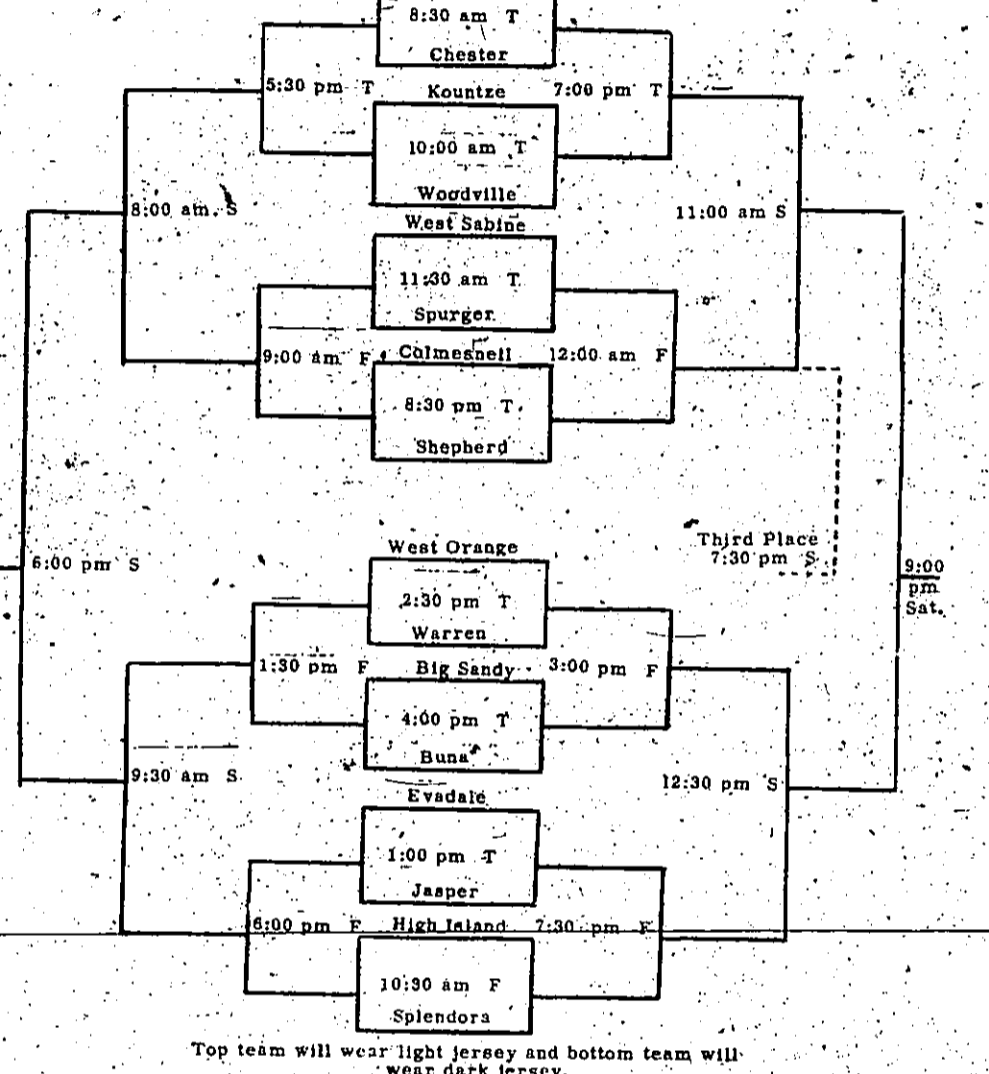
The board will have open bids on a weight machine. The closing of the bid end of the patio area between the high school and the gym to provide visiting teams a dressing room and weightroom has been authorized.

Returning Unwanted Christmas Gifts

AUSTIN—The Christmas gift-buying season inevitably followed by the post-Christmas gift-returning season. There are many reasons for returning gifts—many. One in Agatha had put on so many pounds since you just saw her that the gift she bought her looked more like a necktie.

Or Uncle Wellington's home wreathmaking kit, he loved it, but had received one just like it for his birthday in October.

Or maybe it's you with a gift that's unusable or impractical—like that white terry cloth bow tie for formal tennis games that your brother-in-law gave you.

Most consumers expect to be able to return or exchange gifts in such cases with little or no trouble beyond perhaps having to stand in a waiting line.

The fact is, though, that stores are not legally required to refund money, exchange merchandise, or accept returned goods for store credit unless the item is defective or is not as represented.

Most merchants, however, are very agreeable about adjustments since this is a form of customer service which encourages repeat business.

But you may be unable to cooperate fully with the post-Christmas gift-returning season. In such cases, you may operate under more restrictive adjustment policies than other stores in the community. The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division strongly recommends that shoppers check on store policy before buying gifts that may need to be returned or exchanged.

There are certain instances in which a store is legally required to make adjustments. For example, if a store advertised car coats with sheepskin linings, but you discovered the lining is actually acrylic pile, you have the right to return the coat for an adjustment.

Or perhaps you ordered a 12" dress but the store sent a size 14. Or you specified a green table lamp but got a blue floor lamp. The store must correct its error or make some satisfactory adjustment in such cases.

It's important to remember that if a store has advertised goods for a special sale, there may be a "no return" policy on that particular merchandise. Other items such as swim suits, undergarments and other intimate apparel may always be sold on an "all sales as final" basis for the customer's protection.

Just as most stores try to cooperate in making adjustments when possible, most consumers are careful to ask for an adjustment only if it is warranted. In such cases, merchants may rightfully refuse to make an adjustment.

If you find you must return merchandise for any reason, contact your Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division for the following:

- Take all manufacturers' hang tags, price labels, and sales or charge receipts with you, plus the original receipt and proof of purchase and proof that the goods actually came from their store.
- Return goods in their original boxes, or sacks, if possible.
- Return the goods to the department where they were purchased, or to the nearest desk if there is one.
- Explain the reason for the return.
- If you have a problem with an adjustment you think is due, write to the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, or call (512) Better Business Bureau.
