**Tyler County Elderly Given Tax Exemption**  
The Commissioner's Court voted to give persons of 65 years of age or older, as of January 1, a \$3,000 minimum exemption.  
Those getting this exemption may come by and sign forms at the tax office. They must bring proof of their age at the time the exemption forms are signed.

## Chamber Of Commerce

### Outstanding Citizen Award For 1975 Will Be Given Judge Mann

County Judge Tom Dick Mann was recently selected as the recipient of the first annual Chamber of Commerce Outstanding Citizen Award. Members from Tyler County civic clubs attended a meeting for the purpose of selecting a recipient.  
Tyler County Chamber of Commerce directors felt many county wide improvements have been accomplished this year and the presentation of this award enable individuals to be recognized each year. This is the first time such an award has been given.

Representatives from all clubs presented their candidates and these were voted upon by the assemblage. The award will be presented annually at the Chamber of Commerce banquet.  
The 1974 banquet will be held Friday, January 31 at the Inn of the Indian Village. The guest speaker for the occasion will be former resident, Frank Robinson.

Judge Mann will be given his award at the banquet. He was selected for this honor because of the many improvements he has worked toward for the elderly and youth of this county.  
Judge Mann said this award was a "very pleasant surprise. I had never dreamed it would be given to me, it was completely unexpected." He also said, "I may not be worthy of it but I have done the best I could. If I am not presently worthy of this honor, I hope I will be in the future."

This year he has seen the inauguration of the mind bus program in this county. With money available from a state grant they have purchased the bus and set up pick-up stations throughout the county. The bus serves all of Tyler County during the week and is available for emergencies at all times. For those unable to go to the pick-up station they may call and ask for the bus to come to their home. An assistant rides with the bus to help those that might need help getting on or off the bus.  
"For the four years I have been in this office, I have tried to use available grant money for the employment of youths. We have had as many as 30 working for us at one time." These have worked after school, during their summer vacations, the county has hired as many as possible with the money they had. These youths have worked with the maintenance of the Little League ball park, with sanitation, the commissioners on road work; they have also done custodial work at the courthouse, and worked at the Alan Shivers Library.  
"Through the Commissioners' Court they were able to give

over \$20,000 toward the building of the Little League ball park which serves as a place of recreation for more than 600 children each year.

The Commissioner's Court also made it possible to give \$5,000 annually to the 4-H Club in Tyler County. This club, which is enjoyed by many Tyler County youths, has recently built a new show barn and 4-H arena.  
Judge Mann said he served for three years as juvenile court judge. He said he tried to be understanding of youths and their problems. "Most of the problems they have are actually problems we have created and are therefore directly responsible for them."

Before being elected to his present office this native of Tyler County taught school for 16 years. Ten of these years he was an elementary school principal at Vidor, Beulah and Colmesneil. Mann said that he loved working with children. "In Vidor, I had 2,500 and I enjoyed every one of them." Prior to becoming principal he taught vocational agriculture at Zavalla and then was a coach for several years.  
During his term in office the Tyler County Child Development Center has been implemented. Mann is on the Board of Directors of DETMHRM which parents the clinic here and he also on the local board of directors for this clinic.

The new outreach clinic which opens here this week has also been one of the goals toward which Judge Mann has worked. The clinic which serves outpatients will take some of the case load off the Rusk State Hospital. Those that can't be kept and treated at home may come to the clinic and be given medication. There are psychologists and a psychiatrist who will come to the clinic each month to give tests and aid persons needing help. The clinic will be open five days each week and the director will be there at all times.

For adults, Judge Mann worked on a similar program to that of the one for youth employment. Through federal and state grants adults on the Mainstream program are employed for jobs similar to those of the youth workers. This is sponsored by the Deep East Texas Council of Governors. Mainstream programs have given jobs to as many as 40 persons. Judge Mann also serves as second vice president of the DET Council of Governors.  
Judge Mann has done much toward making the lives of the retired of this county more pleasant. For those who enjoy playing dominoes, there is a domino hall on the courthouse lawn where they can come and enjoy a game while being protected from the weather and have a place for seeing their friends. Whenever possible Judge Mann said they hired the elderly so they could supplement their pensions.  
There is also the solid waste disposal system which has made Tyler County a model for trash disposal.  
Today there is a growing problem with fire ants. Presently there are 10,000 pounds of bait ready for distribution. They have a standing order with the state and whenever they have any poison to be released, the county is given their portion. Fire ant bait for lawns can be picked up at Judge Mann's office now and they will also direct persons where they can go for larger amounts.  
Judge Mann also serves on the Tyler County hospital board. He is active in all types of programs aimed at helping the county and making it a better place to live. Helping people unable to help themselves, giving employment to those who need it, working with youths and the elderly and those falling in neither of these brackets, Tom Dick Mann is to be seen everywhere.
