Senator Lloyd Bentsen is expected to announce his candidacy for president of the United States in the near future, possibly in mid-February. If he decides to run he will be the fifth official candidate for the Democratic nomination. Others who have announced are former Gov. Jimmie Carter of Georgia, former Senator Fred Harris of Oklahoma and Representative Morris Udall of Arizona. Senator Henry Jackson of Washington is expected to announce in the first week in February.

Senator Bentsen was present for 74 percent of all roll calls during 1974. The Congressional quarterly gave Texas Congressmen an average roll call participation in 88 per cent. The Texas delegation ranked No. 22. Senator John Tower, R-Texas had a favorable record of 90 per cent participation of Senate roll calls in 1974. Congressman Charles Wilson, representing our district (2nd) also had a favorable roll call participation of 86. The lowest Texas participation rate was earned by Democratic Rep. Olin Teague of Bryan. George Mahon of Lubbock had the best participation rate, 99 percent.

Outreach Clinic Is Open To Provide Care For Those In County Area

The Deep East Texas Regional Mental Health Mental Retardation Services announces the opening of a Mental Health Clinic in Woodville. The Tyler County Outpatient Clinic opened Monday, January 20 and is located at 1008 W. Bluff. The Clinic will be open from 8 a.m. to noon and 1-5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The Clinic will provide a full-range of psychiatric and counseling services, including marriage, personal problem, family, alcohol and drug abuse counseling, as well as follow-up care for persons discharged from Bush State Hospital. Psychological testing and chemotherapy will also be available. The staff hopes to work closely with local agencies and school systems in helping prevent serious emotional and/or behavior problems.

Mrs. Barbara Arnold is the full-time clinic director. Part-time staff who will be at the clinic on a regular basis include Dr. Felix Peebles, psychiatrist; Bob West, psychologist; Miss Judy Gibson, caseworker; and Jolyon Bowman, alcohol/drug abuse counselor.

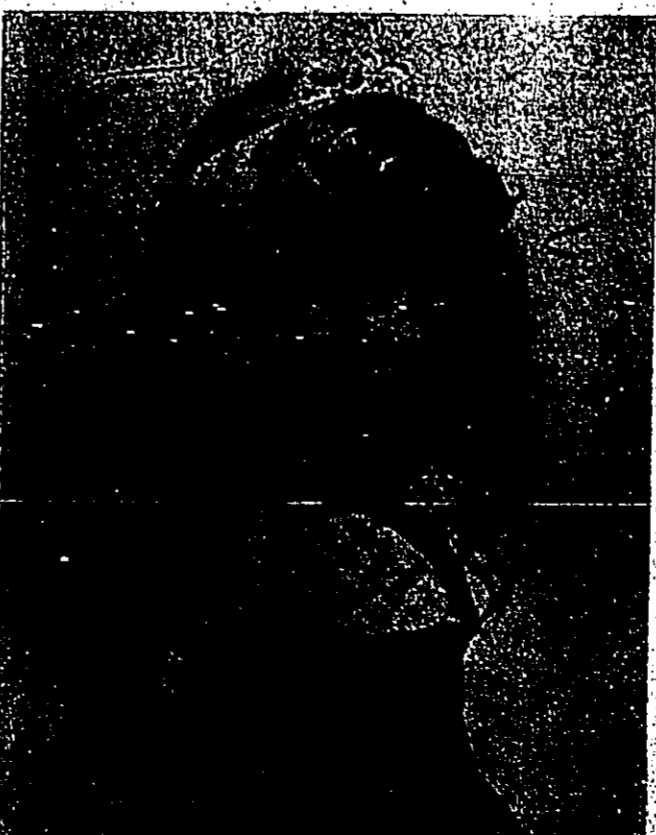

YOUR GARDEN

For A More Fruitful Life Many of the people who want to grow their own fruit orchard, berry patch or nut grove are not aware of what they are getting themselves against! Those nasty insects, fruits and nuts are also very appealing to swarms of pests that can really reduce your yield.



Your fruit garden may be attacked by such creatures as codling moth, mites, aphids, leaf rollers, scale crawlers and many others. For the healthiest fruit and nut plants, agricultural experiments stations suggest treating them with bug spray at least five to ten times a year. In addition, apples, peaches, oranges, plums, grapes, cherries and strawberries should be sprayed with a light insecticide every seven to ten days after that. For persistent pest, use a more powerful insecticide. One such insecticide is Spectracide, a chemical that kills over 120 pests. It allows you to pick your fruits within 5 to 21 days after spraying. With a little effort on your part to protect your fruit trees, nut groves and berry bushes, your garden could become the apple of your eye!

The legislation, if enacted, would affect a wide range of current Social Security provisions, most importantly, the \$2500 limit on outside income. Wilson favors elimination of the earnings ceiling. "The \$2500 maximum is far too low," he said, "especially when you consider the present law permits unlimited income from investments, fiduciary earnings who receive substantial stock dividends, for example, can now also receive Social Security while those who are working are required by law to live below the poverty level in order to receive the same benefits." 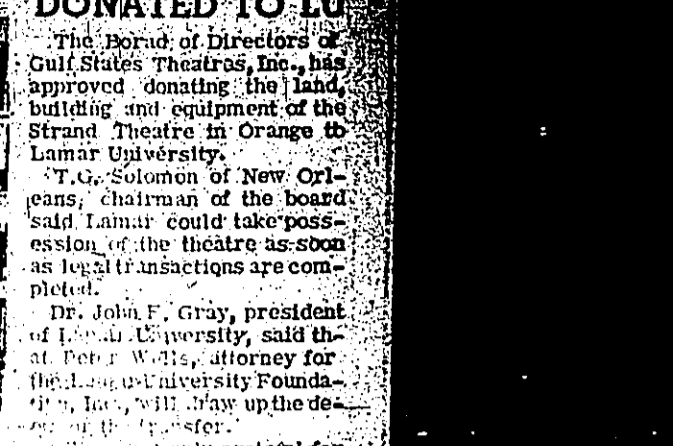
Texas Senate Resolution Eulogizes George Enloe



SMITH STATES THAT INSURANCE MAY NOT BE KEEPING UP WITH INFLATION

The "inflation guard" you signed up for insurance duty may not be doing his job—this is, keeping pace with inflation. That's the unfortunate appraisal of J.O. (Gim) Smith, Jr., chairman of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association (TIAA).

An "inflation guard" can be added to some homeowners insurance policies. It automatically increases the amount of the policy by one per cent every three months. (Insurance industry representatives are seeking a similar provision for those who own commercial establishments.)

"Costs are soaring so fast," Smith says, "it is an exceptional family or business that keeps on top of today's changing conditions."

Smith says that while the tradition of an inflation guard to a policy automatically boosts coverage four per cent a year, "costs for rebuilding are increasing far ahead of this pace."

Smith's double-digit inflation points out, is "simply cringing faster than the cushion provided by the tariff."

The TIAA official suggests policyholders, both present and prospective, take into account the impact of inflation. "Insurance is supposed to protect individuals against loss, but it has to be adequate enough to keep up with the cost of items it protects, and that takes frequent review. Insurance doesn't hurt the companies when there's a claim—it hurts the individual who hopes to restore his home or business to what it was before the loss."

The TIAA is an advisory organization with membership consisting of insurance companies writing approximately 90% of the property insurance in Texas.

Smith is resident vice president of Reliance Insurance Company, Dallas, in addition to serving as TIAA executive committee chairman.
