The aquatic hydrilla plant found in Lake Livingston last summer has now spread to a third area of Texas. The devastating plant has spread rapidly wherever it has started and from available information, the plant is impossible to kill and there is no way to prevent its spreading once it takes root in a lake or waterway. The plant has the potential to take over and ruin any water area and marina owners and operators, fishermen and water district officials are urged to be on the lookout for the plant.

Anyone who finds a plant suspected of being a hydrilla, should collect and send samples of the root system, tubers and leaves to the San Antonio Office of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 134 Braniff, 78216. The agency also needs the exact location where the plant was found.

A recent Harris poll showed sixty percent of Americans would prefer to have gasoline rationing or a 10 cents a gallon tax than President Ford's tax on imported oil. ## Employment Commission Takes Claims

The Texas Employment Commission began taking claims for extended unemployment benefits Monday.

Unemployed persons who have filed initial claims for benefits within one year prior to January 26, 1976, and who have exhausted those benefits, are eligible to file a claim. Payments will be made at the same rate as for regular unemployment insurance, but the total extended benefits will equal only 50 per cent of regular benefits. However, a new federal program may pay extended benefits in the same amount as regular extended state benefits.

Persons claiming unemployment insurance benefits as ex-servicemen or ex-Federal employees are also eligible for these extended benefits. Extended benefits are available only so long as the rate of unemployment remains at levels specified by law.

Claimants who file for extended benefits on or before February 16 may file claims backdated to include January 26, 1976, if they meet the usual requirements for drawing unemployment insurance.

Claims for extended benefits may be filed at the nearest Texas Employment Commission office.

## "You've Come A Long Way" Theme For Tenth Pageant Anniversary

It all began ten years ago. The first Miss Tyler County pageant, sponsored by the Wisteria Chapter, American Business Women's Association was held on the night of June 7, 1966 in the Kirby High School auditorium.

President of the sponsoring organization that year was Mrs. Thomas McClure, and she also served as general chairman of the initial pageant.

Mary Lou Butler, Miss Texas of 1965 was present to place the crown on the first Miss Tyler County, Judy Pavla. Jane Warfield was the first runner-up and Judy Martin was the second runner-up; she was also named Miss Congeniality. Judy was sponsored by Big Star and many other businesses served as sponsors for the other candidates.

June 17 was the date for the opening of the second pageant. The theme for the second year was, "It's More Than Just A Pageant". Betty Lynn Buckley was the mistress of ceremonies and Judy Pavla crowned her successor to the title, Janis Adams. Janis was again sponsored by Big Star. Betty Buckley was invited to appear in the Miss America pageant, one of the first "city pageant" winners to be invited to Atlantic City as a featured talent.

The 1968 pageant was held again at the Kirby High School auditorium on the night of June 15. Former Miss Louisiana, Beverly Laird, was invited to be the mistress of ceremonies for the event. Mann Furniture sponsored the winning candidate, Judith Ann Spurrack. There were only six entries that year the smallest the pageant has had.

June 7, 1969 was the night of the crowning of Linda Pate. The master of ceremonies was John Elliott, a graduate of Warren High school, draft choice of the New York Jets football team and starter for their 1968 season. Linda was sponsored by Howard Motor Company. The theme for the fourth Miss Tyler Pageant was "Mirror, Mirror, On The Wall".

"Starting in 1970", was the theme for the first year of the new decade. On June 6, Lois Smith was crowned the fifth Miss Tyler County. Jim Galney, president of the Chamber of Commerce served as the master of ceremonies and the special guest for the affair was Dana Dowell, Miss Texas of 1969. Dana, from Longview, was then attending Texas Christian University. Sponsoring Lois was Citizens State Bank.

Yvette Durham was the sixth bearer of the title of Miss Tyler County on the night of June 5, 1971. Jim Galney again served as master of ceremonies to the pageant theme of "Today Yesterday and Tomorrow". At this time the pageant had a new addition with the Future Miss Tyler County contestants from ages 4-7 and the Future Miss Tyler County ages 8-10 being a part of the contest. Belinda Yvette was sponsored by Citizens State Bank.

By 1972 the pageant was being staged during the winter months and the night of February 5 saw Ellen Elizabeth Willmon crowned as the new Miss Tyler County. Appropriately the theme for the pageant that year was "Hearts and Flowers". The master of ceremonies was Jim Galney and Citizens State Bank was the sponsor of the winning contestant.

"Happiness Is..." was the theme for the 1973 production of the Miss Tyler County Pageant. Jim Galney was again the master of ceremonies and the

holder of the title was bestowed on Patricia Lynne Parkman. She was the candidate of the Optimist Club.

On February 16 Jim Galney welcomed the audience and then turned the program over to Lois Smith Cartwright former Miss Tyler County, who served as mistress of ceremonies. "Color my World", was the theme of the pageant that saw the crowning of Connie Lynn McCants as Miss Tyler County. Special guest at the pageant was Judy Hallert, Miss Texas 1972, from Beaumont. Connie Lynn was the entrant sponsored by Brookshire Brothers.

Many of the former holders of the title of Miss Tyler County will be returning for the 1976 pageant.

The first Miss Tyler County, Judy Pavla Read is now living in Beaumont and works as an interior decorator. Her husband is a teacher at Lamar University.

Janis Hall nee Adams who at the time of her crowning as Miss Tyler County in 1970, will again be the mistress of ceremonies for the pageant this year. She is a former employee of Lufkin Savings and Loan but presently is in Woodville while her husband is beginning his training at Dental School in Houston.

Yvette McManus nee Durham graduated from Baylor University and is employed by the Texas Highway Department in Austin where her husband is working on his Doctor's degree in organ performance.

Beth Willmon Collins is living in Woodville, the wife of Gary Collins, Woodville city policeman. She will sing for the 1976 pageant.

Patricia Parkman is a resident of Livingston where she works at Waterwood Estates and attends classes at Angellena College.

Last years winner, Connie McCants is attending classes at Lamar University where she is majoring in dance. She will be featured on the program this year.

Judy Shurrock Barnes also lives in Houston where her husband is an attorney.

Linda Page Allen is a resident of Livingston and owner of La Linda Dance Studio in Woodville where she teaches dance. She has been the choreographer of the Miss Tyler County Pageant for many years.

Lois Smith Cartwright, Miss Tyler County in 1970, will again be the mistress of ceremonies for the pageant this year. She is a former employee of Lufkin Savings and Loan but presently is in Woodville while her husband is beginning his training at Dental School in Houston.

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Former holders of the title of Miss Tyler County will be attending of Janis Adams Hall and Yvette McManus nee Durham.

Others accepting an invitation to the Tyler County Pageant are Claire O'Neil, Miss Lamar University of Beaumont, Linda Gullory, Miss Jefferson City from Port Arthur and Liz Cheek, Miss Jasper.

Tickets for the Miss Tyler County Pageant will be available at the door for \$2.50 or they can be purchased in advance for \$2.00. The pageant will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Kirby High School Auditorium.

## Colmesneil Car Accident Kills Two, Injures Others

A two car head-on collision claim of the lives of two persons and injured five Monday afternoon. The wreck occurred 4 miles north of Colmesneil on Hwy. 69 at 3:15 p.m. One person was killed in each vehicle.

Killed in the accident were Ray Bassett, 17, of Colmesneil and Gladys Forrest, 23, of Nederland. Forrest was pronounced dead at the scene by Judge E.A. Shurrock and Bassett was dead on arrival at the hospital.

A 1965 Chevrolet pick-up truck driven by Byron L. Bassett, 41, was headed north when the accident occurred. Garvis Nell Forrest, 27, was driving the southbound 1973 Toyota pick-up truck. Both vehicles were total losses. The accident occurred during a light rain.

Byron Bassett, a carpenter from Colmesneil was transferred to the Lufkin Memorial Hospital. Also taken to Lufkin were Zula Bassett, 29, and Carol Bassett, 4, all of Colmesneil.

Gladys Forrest, 23, a resident of Nederland, is the wife of Mrs. Gladys Forrest, and his son, Gray, 4 months, were taken to the Tyler County Hospital.

Investigating officers at the scene of the accident were Department of Public Safety troopers, Gary Hemigan and Jim Neal.

# Woodville Congressman WILSON REPORT

## Congressman Urge Government Action On Big Thicket Area

In a joint statement, Congressman Charles Wilson (D-Tex) and Congressman Bob Eckhardt (D-Texas) today said the Federal Government should move quickly to preserve the beauty and national woods in the north-eastern Big Thicket National Preserve.

"If the government does not act soon to get title to this land," the two Congressmen said, "the Federal Government is cutting in the Preserve area and other destruction to the property."

The legislative taking bill would provide for the government to acquire the land immediately, then work out a settlement with the owners of the land. The bill also helps them plan for the future.

Congressman Wilson said, "Passage of this bill would be most helpful to the individual landowners. It would establish clearly their rights and help them plan for the future."

The Preserve lies almost entirely within the 240 Congressmen's district.

Congressman Eckhardt, a long-time opponent of the Big Thicket, said, "The people who fought so long for the creation of the Big Thicket National Preserve are heartbroken as they see their land being cut."

## Attorney General John Hill

Imagine getting a letter indicating that you and your family might be heirs to a fortune of \$100,000. The letter would be from the Attorney General of Texas. It would be a letter from the Attorney General of Texas. It would be a letter from the Attorney General of Texas.

The State's Treasurer and our attorneys suggest that any person who believes he has a claim to an abandoned bank account first write the bank to find out if it has been escheated to the state. If it has, contact the State Treasurer, supply the name of the bank.

Along with this initial contact letter comes an agreement form entitling the company to a finder's fee if the money is recovered by the person. In order for the company to research and process the claim, however, the recipient must send from \$10 to \$20 along with the signed agreement.

The letters tell recipients that have arisen in other states indicate that when the recipient returns the agreement and fee he usually receives very little for his money.

What are the odds against the name and last known address of the bank depositor, as shown on the agreement form. Sometimes information is included on how to locate a person who has been listed in which the bank is located. Our Consumer Protection attorneys point out, however, that filing such a claim would be of little value unless the company could establish a right to the money.

Texas and other states have "escheat" laws which only apply to abandoned bank accounts, other personal property, and real estate. The escheat laws are the process by which real and personal property passes to the state if no other valid claim.

According to Texas law, if a person dies without a will, his estate is divided among his heirs, or if absent years and is believed deceased, his property passes to the people of Texas. The State of Texas is very aggressive in recovering the property of its citizens who are entitled to property.

When a bank determines an account has been inactive for seven years, it must report the property to the State Treasurer. Sixty days after such a report is received, the Treasurer mails a notice to the owner.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has been authorized to issue U.S. Army Golden Age Passports to applicants who are 62 years of age or older.

Colonel Sheard said the Lifetime Golden Age Passport will be issued free of charge upon submission of evidence of age, such as a driver's license, birth certificate, insurance policy, or family Bible where the age is given. This is a permanent passport and will not need to be renewed as in past years.

The bearer of a Golden Age Passport and those who accompany him in a single vehicle will be given a 50-percent reduction in the fees charged for camping and the use of electrical outlets at Corps parks where such services are in force. They do not cover charges by private concessionaires operating in the Corps parks.

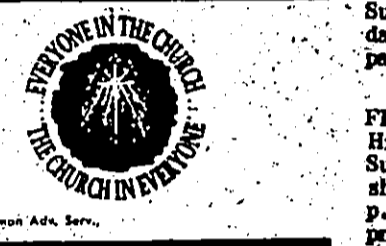

# TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

Outdoor equipment, particularly tools, are constantly being used. Many of these tools are made of metal and are subject to rust. To keep them in good condition, they should be protected from moisture by a thin coat of wax, oil, or other preservative. This coating should be applied after each use and before the tool is put away.

These items are protected from moisture by a surface coat of wax, oil, or other preservative. This coating should be applied after each use and before the tool is put away.

When using tools, be sure to use them in the proper way. Do not use a hammer for prying, and do not use a pry bar for hammering. Use the tool for the job it was designed for.

Keep tools clean. Remove dirt and debris from the tool after each use. Wipe the tool dry with a clean cloth.

Store tools in a dry, well-ventilated area. Do not store them in a damp or humid environment.

Sharpen tools regularly. Dull tools are more likely to be damaged and are more difficult to use.

Check tools regularly for wear and tear. Replace worn or damaged tools promptly.

# Half Of Workers Will Be White Collar By 1985

Half of the nation's workers will be white collar jobs by 1985, according to an article in the Winter 1974 issue of the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Outlook Quarterly.

The article, by labor economist Neal Rosenstat and Hal Dillon of the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics, forecasts employment growth and trends through the mid-1980's.

Included in the article is a prediction that total U.S. employment will reach 107.6 million in 1985—some 24 percent over its 1972 level of 87.1 million.

About half of all jobs in 1985—53.7 million—will be held by white-collar workers, representing a 37-percent increase over the 39.1 million white-collar jobs existing in 1972, the article says.

Blue-collar jobs will rise only 16 percent to 49.6 million in 1985 to 53.7 million in 1985. Blue-collar workers will comprise less than one-third of the total work force by then.

The remaining work force in 1985 will include an estimated 19.4 million service workers, up from 11 million in 1972, and 1.6 million farmers, ranchers, and fishermen, down from 3.1 million in 1972, the article states.

Rosenstat and Dillon explain that these forecasts of future demand for workers are based on certain assumptions about the economy and national policy.

Among the assumptions are: —that high levels of employment and utilization of available manpower will be maintained through the mid-1980's; —that no major event such as widespread energy shortage will alter substantially the rate of economic growth; —that economic, social and educational trends are likely to change according to patterns of the recent past; —that scientific-technological advancement will continue.

# Taxpayers Can Participate In 1976 Presidential Campaign

The Internal Revenue Service reminds taxpayers they can help elect their favorite Presidential candidate by contributing to the 1976 Presidential Campaign Fund simply by checking a box on the front of their 1974 Form 1040 or 1040A tax return.

Under legislation enacted by Congress in 1971, every taxpayer with a tax liability of \$1 or more may designate \$1 of his tax each year to the 1976 Campaign Fund. All money earmarked goes into a general fund to be distributed among all eligible Presidential candidates.

On a joint return, a husband and wife with an income tax liability of \$2 or more may each designate \$1 to the fund, for a total of \$2. If a husband or wife wishes to designate \$1 and the other does not, "Yes" and "No" boxes are provided for each taxpayer filing individually who do not wish to participate in the Campaign Fund.

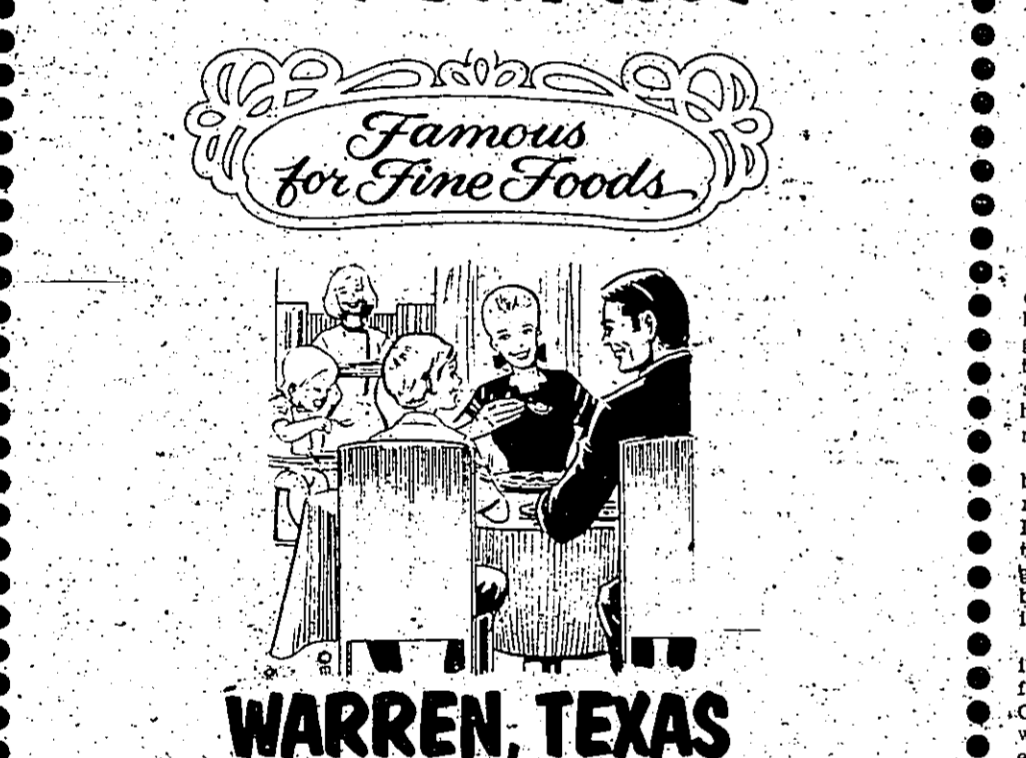

### BUSINESS OWNERS 1974 BONDS UNDER RECONSIDERATION

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday that some sales tax permit holders who had to post bonds because their businesses changed legal status in 1974 may request that their bond requirements be reconsidered. Bullock said reconsiderations would apply to businesses which had been in existence without bond requirements prior to 1974 but during 1974 underwent changes in legal status without actually changing management or ownership. These could include such changes as a small business becoming a corporation, a single ownership becoming a partnership, a merger of two businesses or a former permit holder applying for reinstatement. "If an owner shows the bond is unnecessary, we'll release it," Bullock said. "As I've said before, it's wrong to penalize a business with a bond taxpaying record just because the business changes its name."

Bullock said businesses which think they might qualify for review should contact the Comptroller's district office where their bonds were assessed originally. Several types of securities have been used to fulfill bond requirements. Cash or securities put up as bonds can be redeemed by the Comptroller, but surety bonds can only be released, meaning that any premium refund is a matter between the merchant and the bonding company. The big test in all reviews will be the past tax payment records of the business before it underwent its legal change, Bullock said. There will also be a close check made to determine that there was no substantial change in management and operations. The right to review does not apply to bond requirements on sales tax permit holders who started new businesses for the first time in 1974.

The reconsiderations are a follow-up to Bullock's announcement recently that in the future the Comptroller's Department will take a taxpayer's previous payment record into consideration when businesses make technical legal status changes and have to apply for a new sales tax permit. 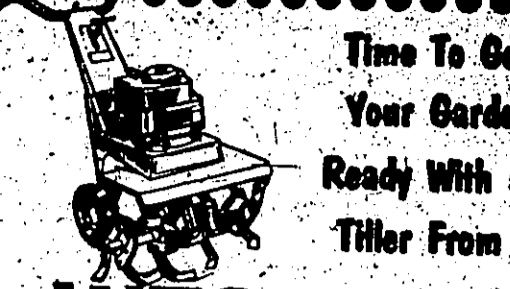
