This column is the last in a series of prize winning recipes from the 4th annual Homemaking Contest. Today's column features the two Senior Division winners - Cynthia Mitchell's Savarin Cream Cheesecake and Denise Stanzler's Taco Salad which also won a blue ribbon.

SAVARIN CREAM CHEESECAKE
1 cup water
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup heavy cream
1/4 cup warm water
Eggs, beaten
1/2 tsp. ground lemon peel
2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
3/4 c. toasted chopped filberts
1 c. or. or red currant cherries
Rum-Flavored Syrup
1 cup water
3/4 cup sugar
1 long strip orange peel
1 long strip lemon peel
2 tsp. rum extract
Mix the water, sugar, orange peel and lemon peel in saucepan and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and stir in rum extract. Remove peels and discard.
Apple-Glaze
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 c. apricot preserves
2 T. sugar
Combine the apricot preserves and sugar in a saucepan. Cook and stir over high heat for 5 minutes or until mixture coats a spoon with high film.
Sauce
1/2 c. butter
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 c. apricot preserves
1/2 c. milk
1/4 tsp. vanilla
1/4 tsp. rum extract
1/2 c. unflavored gelatin
1/4 c. water
1 cup heavy cream
Blend the egg yolks and 1/2 cup sugar in a bowl and mix in flour. Pour milk into a saucepan and bring to a boil. Stir in vanilla and rum extract, then add to sugar mixture. Gradually stirring constantly, return milk to saucepan and bring to a boil, stirring

Since Leon Fowler of Colmesatee began his job as wolf-trapper for Tyler County February 10 he has caught 19 wolves. Most of these have been captured in the northern portion of the county where most of the complaints have been received. On the night of Thursday, February 20 Fowler caught the wolves pictured in this photo. Late capture owned by International Paper Company. He has reported the capture to the Baytown Community, Springer and been working on the W. C. Cruise ranch. Fowler only has 50 traps but he is trying to respond to complaints as soon as possible giving preference to those involving the killing of small calves.

Fowler was trained by Kirby Lilly, representative of the state and federal government for a week prior to his taking the job. His hiring was approved in the February Commissioners' meeting. This is in accordance with the Texas Wolf and Predatory Animal Control Service. His salary is being paid out of the Revenue Sharing Funds.

Fowler said that he catches the female and uses her milk in the traps. In this way, dogs are not trapped, only wolves. After catching the wolves, Fowler shoots them and before he can dispose of the bodies he has to put off the eggs. There is no bounty on wolves in this county.

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The Alert Consumer

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Unfortunally, according to the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, some of these methods may be deceptive. One such effort to improve the credibility of advertising claims involves the use of the "notarized testimonial."

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Our Consumer Protection attorneys are not real estate attorneys; exploit the ideal here by many people that a notarized text is a guarantee of the truthfulness and validity of that statement, and that it is not a device to deceive.

The National Notary Association, an official organization for notaries public, warns consumers that a notarized text does not guarantee the truthfulness of any document, not even a legal document.

Officials of the association say many notaries themselves may be misled by these practices. Notaries are responsible for the accuracy of a document's contents. In reality, a notary seal on a document generally means only that a person or persons appeared before a notary public, provided proof of identity, and signed a document or took an oath.

Darryl Harshbarger, president of the Texas Insurance Information Service here, says that the cost of rebuilding a home has risen about 70 percent since 1965. He says that the average home in 1975 is worth \$24,000. However, he says that the average home owner has only \$10,000 in insurance. This means that the owner is underinsured by \$14,000.

IRS Answers Taxpayers Are Asking

Tanner's Texas Topics

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I just bought a house. Are all the points I paid to get a low rate deductible?

A—Deductibility depends on the type of points you pay. The term points is sometimes used to describe charges you may pay as a mortgagee on the loan, origination fees, maximum loan charges or premium charges. If you must pay any of these charges as a compensation solely for the use of money, such points are regarded as interest. The amounts are deductible in full in the year you pay them unless the deduction causes a material distortion in the income tax for that year. However, if the payment of charges for points is in connection with the purchase of a new home, the points are deductible over the term of the mortgage. Examples of this type of charge are an appraisal fee, the cost of preparing the mortgage note or deed, title insurance, and notary fees. A typical nondeductible point situation is the charge for services in connection with obtaining a Veterans' Administration (VA) guaranteed loan.

Q—Where do I show depreciation on self-employment on my tax return?

A—On Form 1040, depreciation on self-employment business property is deductible on Schedule C. Show depreciation on rental property on Schedule E. If you claim employee business expenses as an outside salesman, all depreciation expenses are included on line 41 of Form 1040. Other employees incurring allowable business expenses including automobile depreciation on line 41, and any other allowable depreciation on Schedule A, itemized deductions.

Q—Does the deduction for interest on a medical expense include the cost of the ambulance I used when I had an accident?

A—Yes. Ambulance hire is a deductible medical expense. It is included with other medical expenses on Schedule A of Form 1040.

Q—How long do I have to keep my records?

A—Records that support an item of income or a deduction appearing on your return should be kept until the statute of limitations expires for that return. Generally, this is three years from the date the return was due or filed, or two years from the date the tax was paid, whichever occurs later. Some records must be kept indefinitely. For example, if you buy a house, you will have to keep all the records concerning the property so that if you sell it, you can prove how much you paid for it, what you spent for repairs, etc. Records of prepayment should be kept as long as they are material in determining the basis of the original or replacement property. Detailed information on determining the basis in property is found in IRS Publication 527, "Tax Information on Selling Your Home." It is free. You can get a copy by writing IRS, P. O. Box 2920, Austin, Texas 78767.

Q—Is the interest I received with my tax refund in 1974 subject to income tax?

A—Yes. If you receive a tax refund that includes interest on the amount refunded, the interest must be included in your gross income.

Q—How much can I deduct for the mileage I drove for business purposes using my own car?

A—For 1974, the standard mileage rate has been changed. If you used your car for business you may deduct 15 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business use and ten cents for each mile over 15,000.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

NOTICE OF ELECTION STATE OF TEXAS COUNTIES OF TYLER, JASPER AND WASHINGTON COLMESNEIL INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

To the resident, qualified voters of the Colmesneil Independent School District who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and to other resident, qualified voters of said district:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the district at the line and subject of the proposition as provided in the Order for Election duly passed by the Board of Trustees of the Colmesneil Independent School District on this day of April, 1975, at the Colmesneil Community Center, Colmesneil, Texas.

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than four qualified election clerks to serve and assist in the election. The election shall be held at the place designated by the Presiding Judge named above, actually, serves as expected, the Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

The polls for regular voting shall be open from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Nellene Rawls is hereby appointed as the clerk for absentee voting for this election, and the Superintendent of Schools, Colmesneil High School, Colmesneil, Texas, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. The period of absentee voting is designated for the hours, designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays, and official State Holidays; and the aforesaid clerk shall be absent during such hours for absentee voting.

That at said election the following proposition shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION: SHALL the Board of Trustees of the Colmesneil Independent School District be authorized to issue negotiable coupon bonds in the amount of \$475,000, bearing interest at such rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of such Board of Trustees, and maturing serially or otherwise within the limits prescribed by law, for the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor and to levy and pledge, and cause to be collected, annual ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient without limitation to raise or amount to pay the principal of and the interest on said bonds as same come due?

That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the voters to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition. Such ballots shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

FOR The issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax thereon to pay the interest thereon.

AGAINST

Each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way the voter wishes to vote.

That said election shall be held and conducted in effect as two separate but simultaneous elections, to-wit: one election at which only the resident, qualified voters who are the taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote, and another election at which the other resident, qualified voters of the District shall be entitled to vote. The votes cast at each of said separate but simultaneous elections shall be recorded separately, and canvassed separately, where the term "election" is used in this order, it shall mean the separate but simultaneous elections, in the further explanation, if need be, the "voting" shall be in one box and the non-voting voters vote in the other box. Both elections may be considered as one for determining the outcome of same as to the qualified voters.

That a substantial copy of this Order for Election shall serve as proper notice of said election, and said notice shall be published one time not less than 10 days before the date set for the election, in a newspaper of general circulation in the District.

Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall cause the official election laws of this state, except as modified by applicable school laws, and this Board of Trustees shall cause to be collected and posted as required by law, the necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

PASSED AND APPROVED at a meeting open to the public this 10th day of February, 1975, after public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given and posted as required by law:

Veteran Benefits Usually Exempt From Taxation

Here are tips from the Veterans Administration on federal income taxes for veterans filing returns.

In general, Texas VA officials noted, veterans benefits are exempt from federal income tax, and need not be reported as income.

This income tax exemption applies to dividends and proceeds from government life insurance policies, but federal estate tax does apply to insurance proceeds. Also, interest earned on government life insurance dividends left on deposit or credit with VA is considered income and must be reported on federal income tax returns, it was explained.

Among major tax exempt veterans benefits are: compensation, pension, GI Bill and other educational assistance, including subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees.

Also exempt are grants to service disabled veterans eligible for specially adapted homes and clothing allowances for veterans whose prosthetic devices tend to wear out of their fitting.

Comptroller Bullock Looks At Tax On Parking Tickets

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that his office is looking into local handling of the state criminal justice tax, including reports that some courts mistakenly pay the \$250 tax on parking tickets.

The tax levied by the Legislature in 1971 to support the Criminal Justice Council, covers only moving traffic violation convictions, but courts are moving state convictions and criminal law convictions.

Bullock said that taxes wrongly put on parking tickets are subject to refund to people who paid the tickets but that the burden for all refunds rests on the city and county which levied the tax by mistake.

The state, in turn, will reimburse the local courts upon proof that a refund was actually paid the ticket holder. Bullock said. Refunds to cities and counties will be in the form of credits to their quarterly tax reports.

Jasper High School won first place in the annual dogwood relays held last Saturday in Woodville. Jasper finished the events with 85 total points.

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Ghost Road

Find six who will swear on a stack of Bibles they've seen the ghost light along the "Ghost Road" between Saratoga and Bragg, and you'll find as many more who'll say "Baloney!"

The "Ghost Road" shoots straight through the Big Thicket of Hardin County, like a rifle shot aimed from Saratoga to Bragg, eight miles away, or vice versa.

It used to be the Saratoga switch, a railroad line over which Saratoga's oil was carted to the Santa Fe mainline. When that use ended the right-of-way became the sandy, all-weather county road that it is today.

"Spook hunters named it the "Ghost Road" as they searched for a mystic ghost light which believers say flickers in and out among the trees and brush, hovering over the swampy morass on a hazy night or, as some say, pursuing them down the "Ghost Road".

Margaret Ayres, who is close to being a non-agenarian, has been the innkeeper at Bragg since 1908. If anyone should have seen the ghost it would have been her, yet she pooch-pooches the whole business. She has never seen the ghost light and lives there where it is supposed to float, eerily frightening young lovers parking along the secluded road.

Mrs. Ayres says folks keep looking for the light. Some nights she has observed the eight mile road almost filled with cars of the curious. She remembers one night when 500 cars were counted and that it was impossible to pull off the road.

Then there are reputable folks who insist the light exists: They have guided scores of the curious along the "Ghost Road." They'll argue about it.

To others it is sacrilege to even think there ain't no "ghost light" in the Bragg thicket. Then comes along a fellow like Bill Brett of Daisetta, he's postmaster there and recognized as an authority of the Big Thicket's lore and its people, who recalls how a Saratoga barber started the whole yarn about the light. What the barber saw, Brett tells, were car headlights fuzzy in the foggy mist that overhangs the road. The barber concocted, according to Brett's version, the "ghost light" yarn and it has spread clear across the continent.



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FARM NOTES

Planning Your Vegetable Garden
Space is another consideration. A small garden can provide a variety of many vegetables that are relatively easy to grow. A garden 20 feet by 20 feet can provide abundant fresh produce for a family of four.

The first important consideration is to choose vegetables that are easy to grow. Beans, peas, tomatoes, radishes, and lettuce are easy to grow and require little care after planting.

Finally, a frequently overlooked consideration is the family's diet. If all possible, plan to mature crops before or after the vacation. Or perhaps a neighbor or friend will be willing to take care of the garden during your absence for a small part of the crop.

So, take time now to begin planning the home garden. Sketch out the garden plot, list the crops to be grown, and indicate the number of rows, distance between rows, and anticipate planting dates of each vegetable.

Plan the garden plan, check these points in mind: (1) group crops according to height to prevent shading; (2) plant taller growing plants on the north side of the garden so they will not shade smaller ones; (3) if the garden is on a slope, run the rows across the slope, not up and down, to help hold moisture and reduce erosion; (4) group together small growing, quick maturing crops as soon as they are harvested and plant a second crop rotation if possible; (5) successive plantings may be made to increase productivity.

Remove early maturing crops as soon as they are harvested and plant a second crop rotation if possible. Planning prior to planting a garden will go a long way in avoiding the many and possible problems later in the year.

Shelton's (Oysters, clams and mussels) if consumed may present a high potential health hazard to the consumer because of shellfish toxins and other pathogenic microorganisms and substances present in the environment. Shellfish are packed while alive and are often consumed before they are cooked. Shellfish which have not been handled and packaged in accordance with regulations may be contaminated with shellfish toxins. If this occurs, shellfish may be poisonous.

All water-borne diseases, including typhoid fever, salmonella, and infectious hepatitis, can be transmitted by contaminated oysters. But the risk can be virtually eliminated if consumers refuse to buy uncooked shellfish.

Processors and consumers are reminded that the Texas Shellfish Sanitation Law of 1965 makes it unlawful for any person to take, sell, offer, or hold for sale, any shellfish (oysters, clams or mussels) from an area declared by the Commissioner of Health to be polluted. The law also specifies that it is unlawful to sell, offer, or hold for sale, any shellfish or oysters of shellfish which have not been handled and packaged in accordance with regulations.

The State Health Department's shellfish certification program includes the classification of oyster growing waters in Texas according to their ability to produce safe, edible shellfish, and a continuing procedure for monitoring the program designed to assure sanitary processing and packaging.

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Accent On Health Oysters From Certified Sources Safe To Eat

Harvesting of oysters in the coastal waters of Texas is in full swing and purchasers of the delicacy should have no qualms about eating them, provided the oysters come from certified sources, says the Texas State Department of Health.

State health authorities are asking the public to help eliminate the troublesomeness and traffic in "booby" oysters by buying only those shellfish produced under the Texas State Department of Health certification.

The reason for concern is that booby oysters may have come from waters of questionable purity and may contain undesirable bacteria and other organisms. Shellfish from these waters may be contaminated with bacteria, viruses, and other organisms.
