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IRS Answers Taxpayers Are Asking

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q-- I just bought a house. Are all the points I paid to get a low interest rate deductible?

A-- Deductibility depends on the type of points you pay. The term points is sometimes used to describe charges you may pay as a mortgage. On Form 1040, in the form of loan origination fees, maximum loan charges or premium charges, you must pay any of these charges as a compensation solely for the use of money, such points are regarded as interest. The amounts are deductible in full in the year you pay them unless the deduction causes a material distortion of your income. If all or part of the points are for the purpose of securing a loan for the purchase of a new home, the points are deductible over the term of the loan. Examples of this type of charge are an appraisal fee, the cost of preparing the mortgage note or deed, title insurance, and notary fees. A typical non-deductible point situation is the charge for a service in connection with obtaining a Veterans' Administration (VA) guaranteed loan.

Q-- Where do I show depreciation on self-employment on my tax return?

A-- On Form 1040, depreciation on self-employment business property is deductible on Schedule C. Show depreciation on rental property on Schedule E. If you claim employee business expenses as an outside salesman, all depreciation expenses are included on line 41 of Form 1040. Other employees incurring allowable business expenses including automobile depreciation on line 41, and any other allowable depreciation on line 27, should include the cost of the automobile used when I had a deductible medical expense.

A-- Yes. Amulance here is a deductible medical expense. It is included with your other medical expenses on Schedule A of Form 1040.

Q-- How long do I have to keep records?

A-- Records that support an item of income or a deduction appearing on your return should be kept until the statute of limitations expires for that return. Generally, this is three years from the date the return was due or filed, or two years from the date the tax was paid, whichever occurs later. Some records must be kept indefinitely. For example, if you buy a house, you will have to keep all the records concerning the property so that if you sell it, you can prove how much you paid for it, what you spent for repairs, etc. Records of property should be kept as long as they are material in determining the basis of the original or replacement property. Detailed information determining the basis in property is found in IRS Publication 527, "Tax Information on Selling Your Home." It is free. You can get a copy by writing IRS, P. O. Box 2929, Austin, Texas 78767.

Q-- Is the interest I received with my tax refund in 1974 subject to income tax?

A-- Yes. If you receive a tax refund that includes interest on the amount refunded, the interest must be included in your gross income. If you received the interest on a refund of your business purposes using your own car, the standard mileage rate has been changed. If you used your car for business, you may deduct 15 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business use and ten cents for each mile over 15,000.

Challenges are being made that the companies are regulated enough. At present, the Texas Railroad Commission fixes the prices that can be from the well to the city border. Then the prices of gas are delivered to the customer by the city government. The service offered to the customer is regulated by the same agencies. The rate paid and service offered is different from one city to another. In Texas, it is one of the only states in the nation which does not regulate privately owned electrical companies, is the only one that does not control telephone rates and is the only one that does not get all charges for natural gas.

An AP story quotes a former top official of Southwestern Bell as saying, "Of all the AT&T companies, Southwestern Bell through the years has been the most profitable. Under corporation ownership, the principal purpose of their function is maximum profit. Yet these companies serve the public and the public's main interest is good service at a low price. In five of the nation's most profitable gas companies are based in Texas. It must be noted that utilities corporations will probably spend millions of dollars, money paid by rate-paying citizens, to prevent the creation of a state regulatory authority. At the last count, Texas Electrical Services have registered twenty-one lobbyists and twenty-two utility companies have registered a total of one lobbyist each. It is impossible to measure the emotional impact that poor utility management creates. Texas has a long history of wide level have united to promote inadequate services, excessive rates, and unsafe utility equipment maintenance.

The establishment of a utilities authority in the State of Texas has a long history beginning in the 1920s. In 1924, there was a better chance for it to happen. This year than any time in the past. Senators and Representatives from all over the state are feeling a strong desire to constitute for such an authority. The utilities companies are in a very difficult position without great resistance. The fight shapes up as a bitter rivalry.

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Discover Hardin County Ghost Road

Find six who will swear on a stack of Bibles they've seen the ghost light along the "Ghost Road" between Saratoga and Bragg, and you'll find as many more who'll say "Baloney!"

The "Ghost Road" shoots straight through the Big Thicket of Hardin County, like a rifle shot aimed from Saratoga to Bragg, eight miles away, or vice versa.

It used to be the Saratoga switch, a railroad line over which Saratoga's oil was carted to the Santa Fe mainline. When that use ended the right-of-way became the sandy, all-weather county road that it is today.

"Spook hunters named it the "Ghost Road" as they searched for a mystic ghost light which believers say flickers in and out among the trees and brush, hovering over the swampy morass on a hazy night or, as some say, pursuing them down the "Ghost Road".

Margaret Ayres, who is close to being a non-agenarian, has been the innkeeper at Bragg since 1908. If anyone should have seen the ghost it would have been her, yet she pooch-pooches the whole business. She has never seen the ghost light and lives there where it is supposed to float, eerily frightening young lovers parking along the secluded road.

Mrs. Ayres says folks keep looking for the light. Some nights she has observed the eight mile road almost filled with cars of the curious. She remembers one night when 500 cars were counted and that it was impossible to pull off the road.

Then there are reputable folks who insist the light exists: They have guided scores of the curious along the "Ghost Road." They'll argue about it.

To others it is sacrilege to even think there ain't no "ghost light" in the Bragg thicket.

Then comes along a fellow like Bill Brett of Daisetta, he's postmaster there and recognized as an authority of the Big Thicket's lore and its people, who recalls how a Saratoga barber started the whole yarn about the light. What the barber saw, Brett tells, were car headlights fuzzy in the foggy mist that overhangs the road. The barber concocted, according to Brett's version, the "ghost light" yarn and it has spread clear across the continent.

If there is such a light, a popular and credible explanation comes from the scientifically minded visitors who say it's "foxfire" or a luminous marsh gas. Now, if you don't know, "foxfire" is a fluorescent fungus growth which lives on decaying trees; there are plenty of them in the Big Thicket. But, the "spook hunters' best story is that the railroad agent at Bragg was hunting a stray cow down the mainline one lonely night. Along came a screaming train and cut off his head. The ghost story resulted. The head is wandering through the Bragg thicket searching for its body.

Now, Mrs. Ayres won't have any of that. There's just no way for the yarn to be true. You see, her husband was the Santa Fe agent at Bragg and he never lost his head to no engine and he ain't never been hunting no stray cows along the mainline tracks.

More than likely, if there is a "ghost light," the light would be the flaming body of a Santa Fe fireman seeking escape from perdition. Along about 1910 or 1912 it did happen at Bragg that a fireman died a flaming death.

Mrs. Ayres would remember that night. The mainliner was taking on fuel at Bragg. Fumes swam through the night to the pumpmaster's lantern, which had been left on the engine. Explosion awakened Mrs. Ayres, flames swept into the engine and the fireman was blasted out, a fiery ball of flame. He was dead in minutes.

Asked if she had ever seen the "ghost light," Mrs. Ayres came through with a sly, impish grin and answered simply, "I've seen a lot of car lights."

Evasive, probably, but then she wants no arguments with one side or the other.

If you think you've seen the lights, okay. But, don't try to argue the point with non-believers.

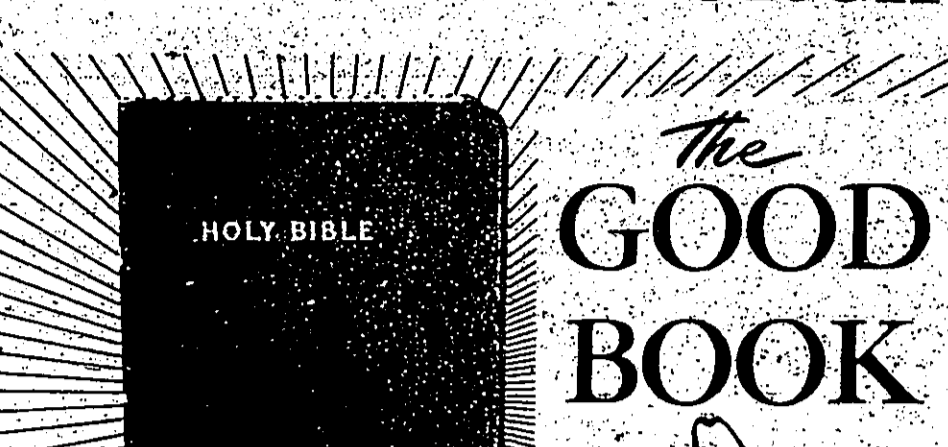
