Commissioner's Court Calls Special Meeting

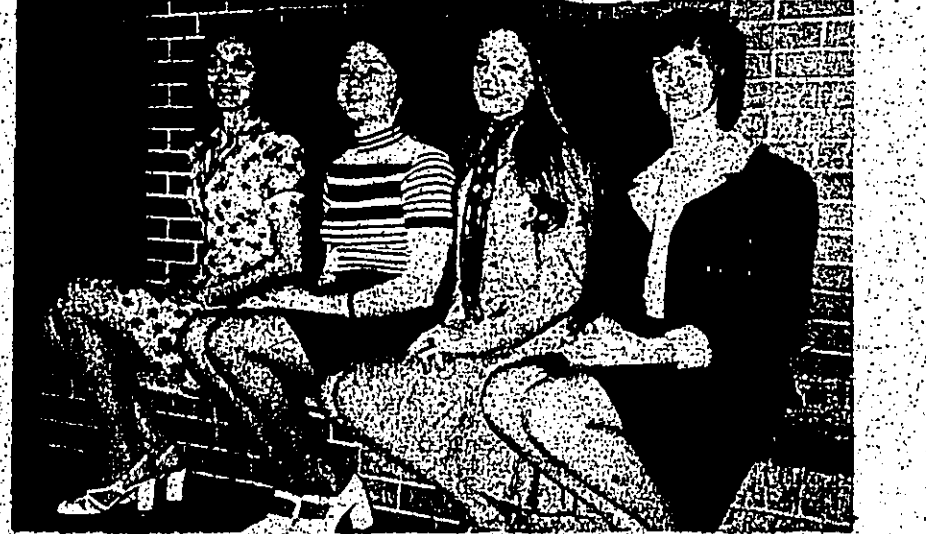
A special meeting of the Tyler County Commissioners Court was called Friday, February 28 at 10 a.m. All members were present at this meeting.

Brookshire Bros. Store Enhances Tyler County

Looking at the items stocked on the shelves of the gourmet section of the new Brookshire Bros. store one can imagine being whisked away to lands as exotic as the food from these places. Imported caviar, canned lobster and snails are some of the good stocked there. There are soups from Switzerland and products from other countries about the world.
The huge building which covers 25,000 square feet of floor space opened Monday morning, March 3 with many festivities.
Crowds filled the store for the opening to see the new building and variety of products offered. They also took advantage of the opening specials and registered for items to be given away.
Some of the new lines added to the store are greeting cards, an art center, party favors, materials, yarn and clothing patterns. They are also completely stocked with games, toys, office supplies, clocks, and picture frames.
They have greatly expanded their line of tennis shoes, jeans, blouses and stationary supplies.
In order to speed customers through the check-out aisles there are seven counters through which items will be checked.
For the opening the checkers wore navy and white slacks suits trimmed with red.
The expanse of frozen foods, dairy goods and produce items are a shoppers delight. Products which have not been handled by the store prior to this time will be found on almost every shelf. The roominess of the new building makes it possible to carry three times as much merchandise as in the original building.
The new Brookshire Bros. store will be keeping new hours for the convenience of shoppers. They will be open six days a week from 7:30 a.m. until 7 p.m.
Store manager Jeff Ratcliff has been with Brookshire Bros. since they opened their first store in Woodville seven years ago. He is adding 18 new employees for the new store. Eight of these will be high school students working part time.
Supervisor Steve Phillips said that the selection of meats and produce they will have will not be matched by any store in this area.
The ribbon cutting ceremony took place on Monday, March 3 at 8:30 a.m.

Concerned Parents, Teachers Try Plan For Better Education

Approximately 95 concerned parents, teachers and interested persons attended the first meeting of the new school booster club on Monday, March 3. The 7 p.m. meeting was held in the Kirby school cafeteria.
"We are not interested in the buildings so much as the education of the students in school," said Jim Allison, county attorney who conducted the meeting. He told of the origin of this group who were sincerely interested in the education their children were receiving in the Woodville public schools.
The purpose of the meeting was to form a permanent organization to assist with education. A nominating committee was named from the floor. Mrs. Ann Gardner was unanimously approved as chairman of this committee. Others of this group are Mary Nell Rainey, George Jarrott, Ethyl Jackson, Judy Pool, Herb Branch, Marth Kimbrough, Dr. Raymond Parker and Lionel Reese. They will present a slate of officers at the March 17 meeting.
Mrs. Becky Jinnette said it was vital to help the children in obtaining a better education. She read a list of several areas of work where this group could possibly provide help. One of the groups would have the opportunity to work with publicity telling what the children are doing and what the club is doing also. An area of prime importance would be work with health aid. Presently there is little provision for

taking sick children to the doctor or home from school; parents could volunteer for this service. Volunteers are needed to provide assistance with the flouride treatments each spring, the tubercular testing and other areas of health work. Volunteers are also needed to find clothes, to wash, iron and mend these for children needing clothing.
Another area for the club members to function would be in teaching areas, preparing transparencies, felt boards, bulletin boards and even to assist in the presentation of various materials. They could help in the library on a regular basis. Also there is need for person to work with raising funds which will be used to buy needed supplies.

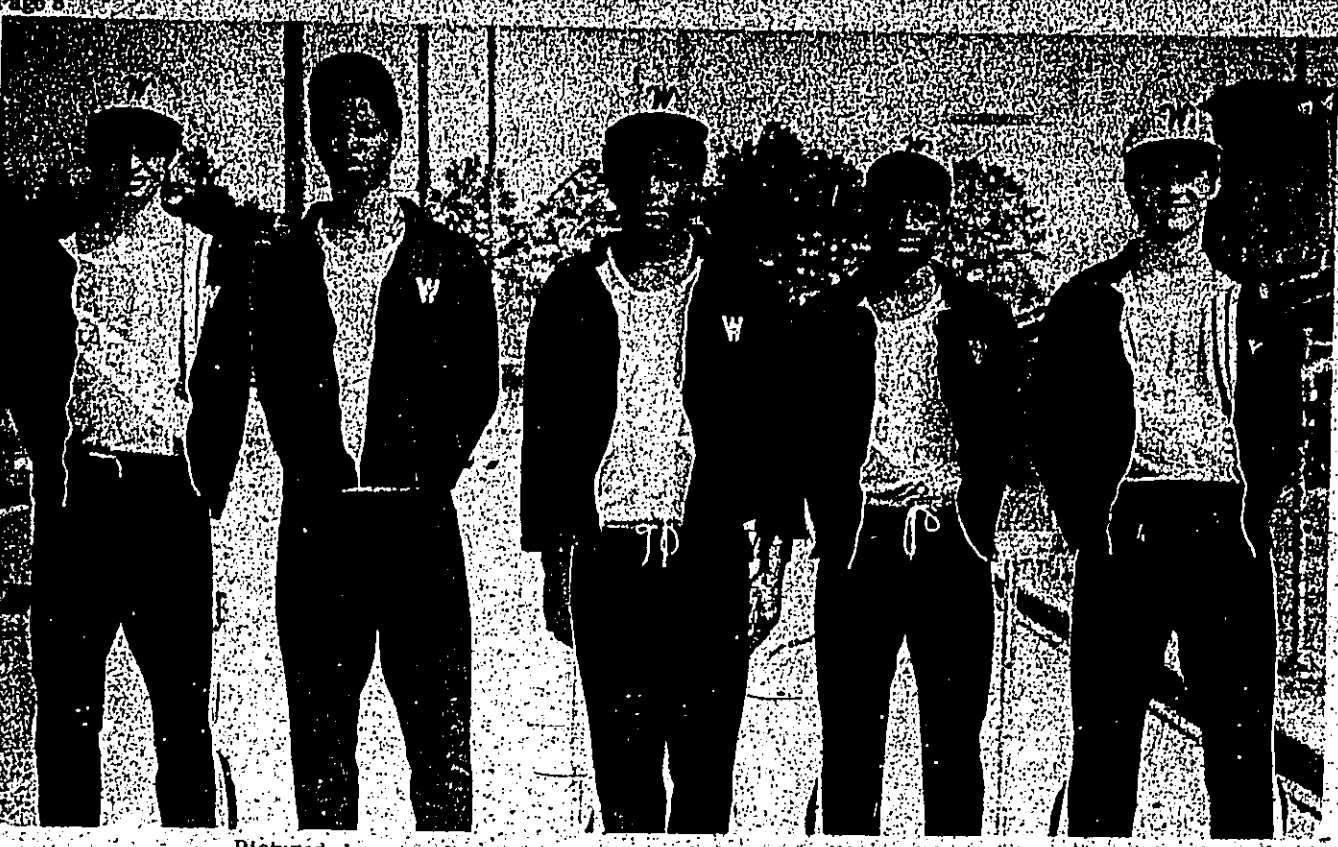

PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE - ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)
Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 61, and 61c of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution. Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to read as follows:
"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO - ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)
Amending Article III, Section 21 of the Texas Constitution to read as follows:
"Provide an increase in the salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$800 per month. Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature."
Provide an increase in the trustee rate for members of the State of Texas from \$10 per diem to the rate provided by law for employees of the State of Texas.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of retirement for state employees and other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities and employees of counties which may voluntarily participate. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the Legislature at \$800 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

Booklet Tells How To Choose Foods For Your Health

How can you choose economically and select healthful foods are listed in a new booklet from the American Heart Association entitled "Save Food \$5 and Help Your Heart."
The booklet is designed for use by the general public and patients who have made changes in their eating habits for medical reasons. It is divided into various food categories: meat, poultry and fish, fruits and vegetables, bread, cereal, and miscellaneous for easy reference.

Taxpayers Ask IRS

Q. Are utility taxes deductible under state or local law? A. Utility taxes imposed under state or local law are not deductible if the rate differs from that of the general sales tax in your area.
Q. I bought a new car recently for personal use which developed so many mechanical problems that I had to get rid of it. I traded it in for less than what I paid. Is this loss deductible?
A. No. A loss from the sale of a personal automobile is not a deductible loss, unless it results from casualty or theft. However, don't forget that your state or local sales tax on the purchase of your new car or the part of the tax you paid that is equal to the amount of your federal income tax on your federal income tax.
Q. Don't I have to show exact amounts to the penny of deductions, income, etc., on my tax return?
A. Taxpayers may round off such amounts to the whole dollar. This means that you may eliminate any amount less than 50 cents and increase an amount from .50 to .99 cent to the next dollar.
Q. How can I determine whether to use Form 1040 or 1040A to figure my tax?
A. Generally, the Short Form 1040A is used by a person who does not have his deductions and losses grossed up. It consists only of wages, salary, tips, and dividend income or interest income of \$400 or less. But taxpayers who have other types of income—gains or losses from sales or exchanges of capital assets, investment tax credit, sick pay exclusion, etc.—should use Form 1040 and the appropriate schedules to determine their tax. The instructions for each form explain in greater detail when to use each form.
Q. Don't I have to show exact amounts to the penny of deductions, income, etc., on my tax return?
A. Taxpayers may round off such amounts to the whole dollar. This means that you may eliminate any amount less than 50 cents and increase an amount from .50 to .99 cent to the next dollar.

Homemaking Hints

Home Canning

With coming warm days at hand it is now time for homemakers to take a good look at their home canning equipment. Every year, new equipment needs to be checked to make sure it is in good working condition.
Here are some tips to help you keep your pressure canner in safe working order:
-Take off removable pet-cock and dry thoroughly after each use. Occasionally soak these parts in vinegar to remove any corrosion. Follow manufacturer's direction for pet-cock cleaning.
-Use footlock, pipe cleaner or string to clean opening at top of canner.
-Wash pressure canner thoroughly after each use. Do not immerse lid in water. Do not use harsh scouring powder.
-To remove odors and stains, use one of the following mixtures and process at 5 pounds pressure for 5 minutes:
1. Juice of 1 lemon and 2 quarts of water.
2. Two tablespoons of vinegar and 2 quarts of water.
3. Handful of Irish potato peelings and 2 quarts of water.
