A study is underway to develop better strains of Mayhaw for home orchards in East Texas. Herbert K. Durand of Texas A & M University is in charge of the project. Mr. Durand furnished us with the following information on the progress being made with the attempt to develop a better variety of Mayhaw.

"The Mayhaw is a popular wild fruit in the south, which makes an excellent jelly. Those who know need no further description. Those who have merely heard about them but have not seen them in bloom, or in fruit, need to see them at that time.

If you are interested in Mayhaws you should be concerned about their future habitats, and their potential use in horticulture. To be concerned, however, is not enough to preserve the Mayhaw as a unique heritage for future generations. The idea is to do something about it if you will join Project Mayhaw, you and others with you will be doing something for the Mayhaw—never done before. Here is what we want to do:

1. Find most of the bogs where the Mayhaw grows. Make a record of its location, accessibility, tree density, owners and so on.

2. Study these bogs each year during bloom and fruit ripening so that trees with superior fruit can be selected, tagged, and observed. Seeds from these trees will be gathered and distributed to our members. Members will keep records on seedlings, germination, growth rate, and other things about the trees and fruits.

3. Observe over the long-term seedling vigor, growth rate, and other characteristics. With this information the superior clones can be made available to propagators for future distribution or for further breeding.

4. Publish a progress report each year to inform members as to future goals, objectives, toward a common purpose.

Wheat To Chair County Law Center Committee

AUSTIN—Leon Jaworski of Houston, chairman of the State Bar of Texas Law Center Committee, announced today the appointment of Josiah Wheat of Woodville as chairman of the Tyler County Law Center Committee.

"Wheat's committee already is well on the road toward securing assistance from lawyers in the Tyler County area to help finance this attractive and necessary addition to our state's Capitol Complex at no cost to the taxpayers," Jaworski said.

Wheat will direct efforts to obtain Tyler county's share of the \$6 million in gifts and contributions needed to finance the six-story structure, which will be the nation's largest headquarters office for a state bar.

Wheat was president of the State Bar during 1969-70 and is chairman-elect of the State Bar Environmental Law Section. He is also chairman of the American Bar Association Advisory Committee to the Environmental Law Center.

Jaworski said the Law Center will be headquarters not only for the State Bar staff, but also will be large enough to provide office space to house other governmental

and law-related organizations whose activities complement those of the state bar.

Through production of a multi-media display on significant events in Texas history concerning lawyers, judges and the law, the center will expand its history-oriented tourist attractions in the Capitol area.

Construction of the structure is underway at the site of the bar's first headquarters building. Completion targeted for July 4, 1976.

Bill Hobby, Lieutenant Governor of Texas, will be the Dogwood Festival Parade Marshal on April 5. This parade, filled with colorful and highly decorated floats, marching bands and other entries is one of the highlights of the Dogwood Festival. Hobby will lead the 2 p.m. parade, riding with him in an open car will be state senator, Dan Adams.

George Jarrott, parade chairman, said that prior to the March 15 parade entry deadline, he expects over 100 entries in the parade. There will be eight bands marching in the parade, including the Kirby High School band. Jarrott anticipates having ten local floats in the parade which will begin at Cartwright's Grocery and follow Bluff Street to the junction with Highway 69 where it will turn left and end at Jack Lane Ford.

It is fitting that Bill Hobby, whose heritage is so intertwined with that of this area, be selected to lead the parade for this festive occasion in Woodville.

As present Lt. Governor and president of the Houston Post, Bill is following in the footsteps of his famous father, Will Hobby although in opposite order. Will Hobby, was born in Moscow, Texas, at an early age his father was elected district judge and the family moved to Livingston. From there the 16-year-old youth decided he had enough formal education, more than most of his contemporaries, and went to Houston to gain practical experience. Throughout his life, "Will Hobby" enjoyed exploring and hunting in the Big Thicket Region and loved the city of Beaumont where he was once editor and then owner of the Beaumont Enterprise.

After his father became lieutenant governor, it wasn't long before the governor, Jim Ferguson, was impeached and Hobby became war time governor. The following term, 1919, he was elected in his own right. After his terms in office he returned to Beaumont and then moved to

Houston where he became President of the then Houston Post and Dispatch.

In 1929 Will Hobby's first wife, Willie Chapman Cooper Hobby, died suddenly. The daughter of former congressman Bronson Cooper, she had given her husband a close tie with the sawmill country of Deep East Texas. Bronson Cooper was born in Kentucky but he was brought to Woodville, Tyler County when less than a year old. Here later he joined the law firm of Nicks, Hobby and Cooper and then became a partner with John Henry Kirby.

Several years later Will Hobby married Oyveta Culp who was the mother of his children, Bill and Jessica. Bill was born in Hermann Hospital, Houston, on the anniversary of Robert E. Lee's birthday, January 19, 1932. Removed in person but not in spirit from the area where his father roamed so happily as a child, Bill graduated from Rice Institute and became secretary-treasurer of the Houston Post before joining the Navy. He served three years in Naval Intelligence.

Bill Hobby is familiar to Texans as a man long active in civic affairs, he has been on presidential committees, the Texas A.M. Council Board of the University of Houston Board of Regents and a director of the Houston Chamber of Commerce. He has also served as chairman of the Senate Interim Committee of Welfare Reform in Texas.

Since his election to the position of Lieutenant Governor in 1972 he has been chairman of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee of the National Conference of Lieutenant Governors. He is also chairman of the Governor's Energy Advisory Council. He was reelected to a four year term as Lt. Governor on November 3, 1974.

Bill Hobby is married to the former Diane Poteat Stallings of North Carolina. They presently make their home in Austin with their four children, Laura, Paul, Andrew, and Katherine.

Councilmen Protest Gas Rate Increase Request

The City Council met in regular meeting Monday, March 10, and voted to protest the Tennessee Gas request for a rate increase. They are protesting to the Federal Power Commission. Tennessee Gas is asking for a 13.82% increase per MCF.

At the Monday night meeting they also decided to order 20,000 plastic garbage bags. Upon arrival these will be for sale in rolls of 40 bags. They voted to install a new streetlight in the Chesswood Addition at the intersection of Carolyn and Pine Street. They tabled a request for street work in the Sutton Addition.

They made an agreement with Charles R. Halle and Associates to study a contract for sewer and other engineering work in the city and to hear this report at the next City Council meeting.

They are going to reopen bids for a new car for city policemen. A contract was awarded to repaint the outside of City Hall. A resolution was passed to accept the Deep East Texas Regional Emergency Medical Services plan. They also passed a resolution to purchase more radio equipment for the police department through DETCOG funds. Councilmen voted to buy more radio equipment for the fire department.

The next Council meeting will be held on Monday, April 14 at 7 p.m. The public is invited to attend these meetings.

Civic Pride Important To Town Beautification

"Basically we are considered as having a clean town but with a little extra effort, we could make it really beautiful!" Thus spoke Tommy McClure, heading the town beautification committee, this year for the first time.

He is trying to purchase 20 new 3 x 5 American flags and 20 new Texas flags to put on the parking meters about the courthouse square. Something new is being added this year: all they will have special dogwood flags to mix with the others. These new flags are green with a white dogwood pattern in the center. The Kirby High School home-making classes of Mrs. Bill Jones are making the flags and art students of Mrs. Dorothy Raybon are painting them.

"All we can do is encourage people to have civic pride in their town and urge them to try to make it as attractive as possible for the visitors to the Dogwood Festival," said Tommy. "I would like to see the whole community participate in this activity because it can't be done by just one person. This is one area where size really doesn't make any difference. Small children can pick up litter just as well as adults."

He concluded by saying that he would like to see some of the Scout Troops undertake small clean-up campaigns as part of their contribution toward civic participation. Another possible area of help, mentioned McClure, was through the schools. He is hoping students will want to engage themselves in this work. Tommy mentioned having seen some teachers outside with their small students collecting empty soda can programs. "Everything helps, every contribution, even one yard which is clean is important," he said.

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Homemaking Hints

Canning Home Garden Surplus

Home canned fruits and vegetables make nutritious meals and are a safe way to preserve food.

All parts of the pressure canner should be clean and in good working condition. Check canners with dial pressure gauges at least once a year.

The waterbath method concerns processing food at a temperature of 212 degrees F. by boiling containers of food in water. This method is recommended for processing fruits, tomatoes and other high acid foods, because it does supply enough heat to destroy bacteria, yeasts, molds and enzymes that cause spoilage in acid foods.

There are two ways of packing food for this waterbath method: hot-pack, and cold-pack.

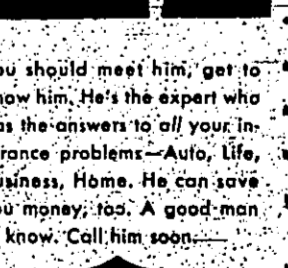
Ramer Is New Postmaster Of Spurger

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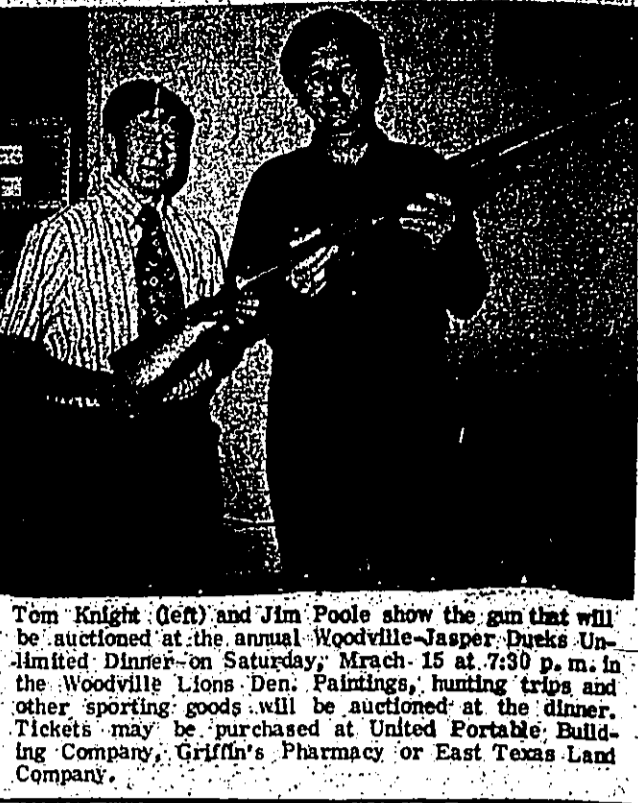

The Alert Consumer

Repair Products or Buy New Ones ?

AUSTIN—Some consumers are economizing by deciding to have older major appliances repaired, rather than replacing them with new models when trouble develops.

But, having made a decision to save the cost of a new appliance such as a television, ammeter of persons have been dismayed to learn that their repair bill was far higher than they expected.

It's not only the repair bill that consumers complain about, however. Frequent sources of customer dissatisfaction are lengthy waiting periods for repair service, unauthorized repairs, unnecessary replacement of parts and subsequent charges, and unsatisfactory work.

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division received numerous complaints about television repair services from unhappy consumers. Our records show, though, that some complaints are valid and others are not. Some problems are due to the fact that the consumer is unaware of how to make simple adjustments to obtain the best picture. Other problems are caused by faulty antennas or improper cable hook-ups, rather than poor repair service.

Still, some complaints about television repair services are justified. In a recent study conducted by the Federal Trade Commission, new television sets with no problems other than one burned-out tube were sent for repairs in several cities.

Cost for repairs on the sets varied by as much as 400 percent between the lowest and highest charges in one city. And "parts fraud," the unnecessary replacing of parts or charging for parts not actually replaced was reported in each city studied.

But, the study also indicated that one especially alert repairman charged nothing for replacing the faulty tube. He had noted a date code on the tube indicating that it was still under manufacturer's warranty and realized that he would be reimbursed for replacing it.

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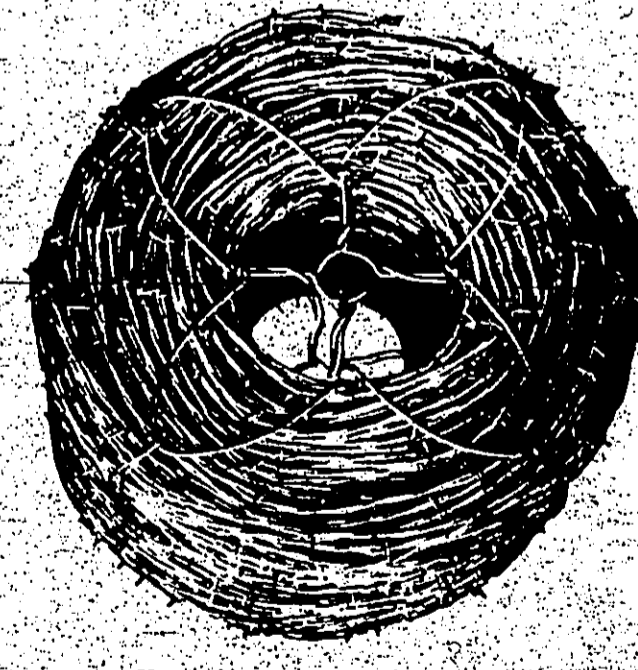

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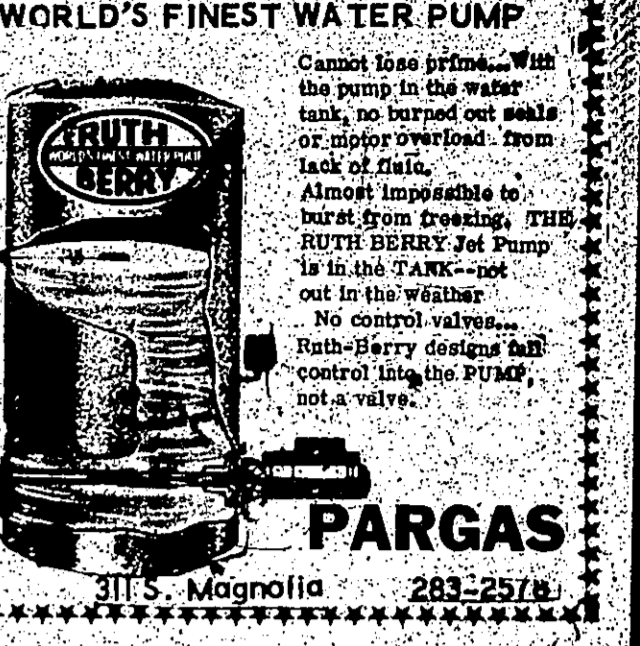

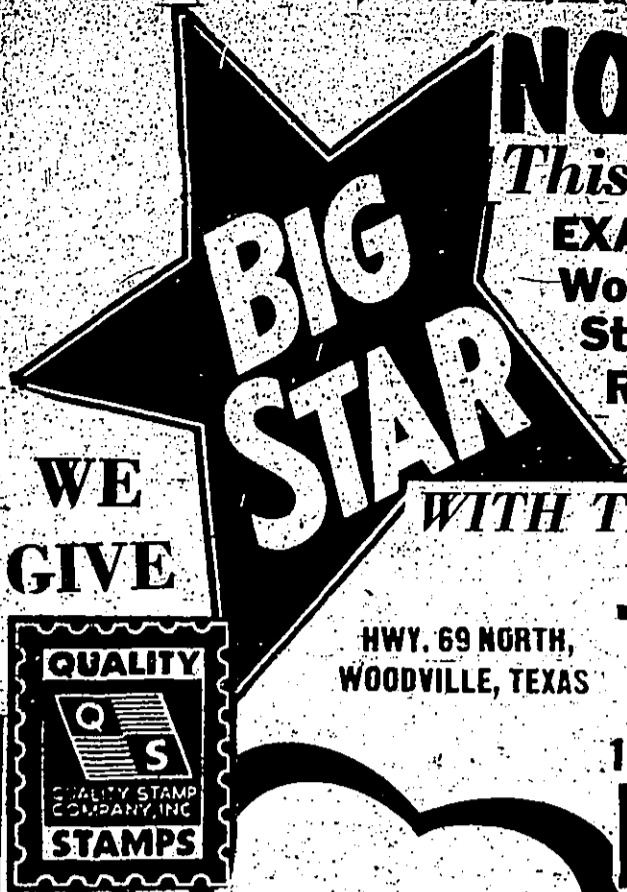
