Western Weekend Sweetheart, 1974



One of the highlights of the Open Rodeo on Western Weekend will be the selection of the 1975 Dogwood Western Weekend Sweetheart. Each trailride officially entered in the parade will be eligible to enter a contest in the Rodeo Sweetheart Contest, an unmarried girl between the ages of 15-18.

The Sweetheart contestants are judged before the rodeo at 4 p.m. on appearance and riding ability. The announcement of the Dogwood Western Weekend Sweetheart and the first and second runner-up is made during the rodeo. Trophies are given to the winner and the first and second runner-up.

Janet Martindale, reigning 1974 Western Weekend Sweetheart, will relinquish her title at the Tyler County Dogwood Festival Rodeo on March 29 when her successor is selected.

Besides being Western Weekend Sweetheart, Miss Martindale has been first runner-up in the Lions' Rodeo in Woodville; second runner-up in Miss Rodeo in Ludlow Tyler County Youth Rodeo Sweetheart; and has won many other trophies in barrel riding.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Martindale of Jasper and is a senior in Jasper High School.

Commissioner's Court Hires Fondren As Assistant Auditor

The Commissioner's Court met in regular session on March 10 at 10 a.m. All members of the court were present at the meeting.

Commissioner Joe Best made a motion to appoint Mrs. Ann Fondren assistant auditor and to increase her salary \$1,000 per year. The salary increase is to come from the auditor's salary and is to be effective March 1. All commissioners were in favor of this motion.

Commissioner H.M. Parks moved to transfer the payroll duties to the treasurer's office from the auditor's office. All commissioners were in favor of this motion.

Commissioner Be Jordan then moved to accept the monthly report of the treasurer's office and this was unanimously approved.

The monthly report from the County Extension Service was approved by all commissioners following a motion for a package made by Commissioner Best.

Commissioner Kenneth Belt moved to pay bills as submitted and approved by the Auditor's office and all voted in favor of this motion.

Commissioner Jordan moved to extend the contract with the Probation Department and to limit it out of Revenue Sharing monies in the amount of \$3,300 for the next three months starting on April 1. All were in favor of this motion.

By a motion made by Commissioner Jordan and approved by all, Raymond Pope was authorized to push dirt and level the east side of the Tyler County airport.

A motion was made by Commissioner Jordan to accept the bid of Citizens State Bank for the County Depository for 1975-76. All were in favor of this motion.

Commissioner Best made a motion to appoint County Treasurer, Austin Fuller as City Clerk. Debrae Director of this county. All were in favor of this appointment.

Commissioner Jordan moved to authorize the Tyler County Sheriff to take bids on an automobile. Bids from each dealer are to be submitted with an allowance made for a trade-in and without a trade. All were in favor of the bid taking.

Wilson Announces Big Thicket Boundaries Will Be Set Soon

(WASHINGTON, D.C.)—Legal boundaries for the Big Thicket National Preserve will be published Monday, March 17, by the Department of the Interior, Congressman Charles Wilson announced last week.

The preserve will contain nearly 84,500 acres, according to Wilson, who sponsored the legislation creating the Big Thicket preserve last year.

The Interior Department does not have a firm estimate on the total cost of acquiring the land, but is expected to begin modest acquisition of property by July of this year, said Wilson.

The East Texas Congressman said copies of the boundary plan will be available from the National Park Service at a normal cost after Monday, and he will obtain them for his constituents who may be affected by creation of preserve.

The old question of whether to divide Texas into five states has been brought up again. Two Texas lawmakers, Representative Fred Agnich of Dallas and State Senator Bob Gammage of Houston are pushing the issue and if Texas voters approved, Texas would be divided into five states. Each new state would have 2 United States Senators, giving our area ten senators in Washington and considerable politicians clout in Congress.

Rep. Agnich said, "I've been concerned about the almost total self interest on the part of northeastern states, who have refused to develop their resources on grounds it might damage their environment, but continue to use our resources."

"I believe it is time we stand up to them. We have this right, and we intend to stand up for Texas."

Agnich and Sen. Bob Gammage, D-Houston, are sponsoring a bill calling a non-binding referendum in 1976 to allow voters to decide if they want to split the state into five parts—North Texas, South Texas, West Texas, East Texas and Central Texas.

Gammage said Texas is the major energy producing state in the nation, and is among the top in agriculture, industry and shipping.

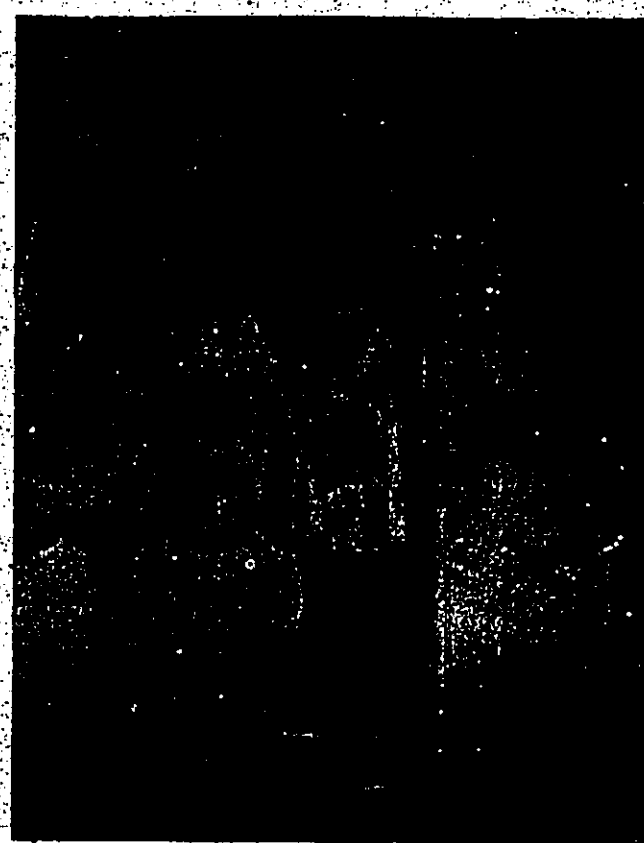


Vicki Vinson

Tim Brown will be the escort for Brenda during Festival events. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Harold Brown of Colmesneil.

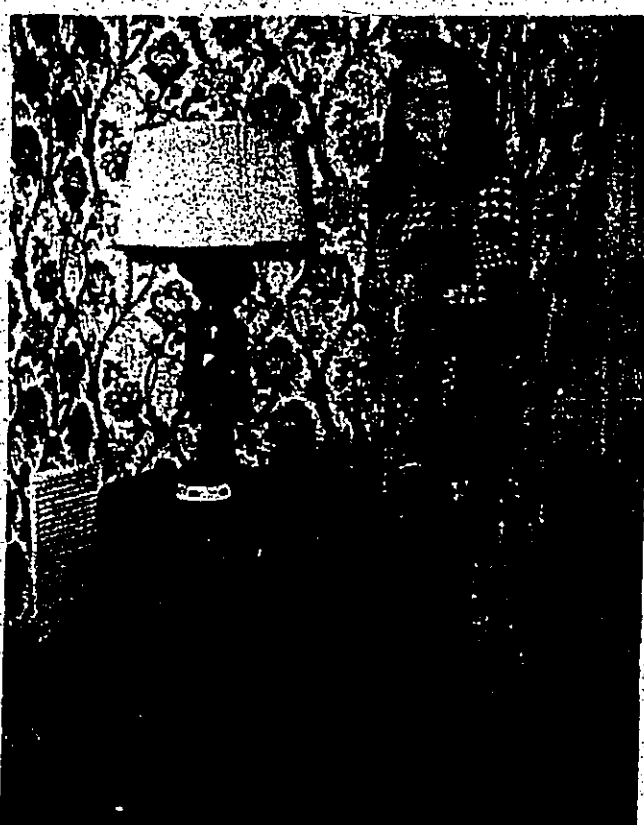


Debbie Callaway

Currie, County Agent he will feed, raise, and care for a calf until next year's show when he will earn \$100 and give in the calf scramble division and the junior breeding division.

To encourage and further educate 4-H and FFA youngsters in the raising, feeding, and breeding of high quality Texas cattle, the calf scramble was started in 1942. Since its beginning, the calf scramble has paid young winners well over \$1 million to buy more than 7,000 calves to feed and develop. Only half of the 388 contestants taking part in this year's scramble will win in the event.

Co-Sponsors Bill
For Public School Prayer, Meditation

It is my pleasure to co-sponsor House Bill #438 which allows public school teachers to conduct a period of prayer or meditation sometime during each school day.

Fertilizers Control Aquatic Vegetation

Aquatic vegetation in ponds is a serious problem in our county. When a pond becomes choked with this vegetation, several things happen. The pond has a tendency to become stagnant due to some of the vegetation dying and rotting in the water, is unhealthy for livestock use. Decaying vegetation uses oxygen in the water which may result in a fish kill. Vegetation furnishes hiding places for forage fish, such as sunfish and minnows. Bass depend upon these for food. If bass cannot find these forage fish, your bass stop growing and the forage fish will overpopulate your pond.

Decaying vegetation also gives off an obnoxious odor. This can surely work over your smaller if you live close to one of these stagnant ponds.

Low soil fertility is the cause for most ponds being choked with aquatic vegetation. Runoff water entering ponds from soils of low fertility carries few nutrients which are important to plankton growth and reproduction. Plankton are microscopic animals and plants. Dense populations will filter out sunlight to aquatic vegetation. Without sunlight, most obnoxious aquatic vegetation will die.

Use of fish to control aquatic vegetation is gaining popularity (biological). Tilapia will feed on most types of vegetation. This is a tropical fish and will usually die when water temperature falls below 50°F. Tilapia will not survive most of our winters. Enough brook stock can be carried through the winter in an aquarium to restock in the spring.

Mechanical elimination or control can be accomplished by deepening the pond. Very little water less than 3 to 5 feet deep should be in a pond. There is no way to filter out sunlight to plants in shallow water. This is probably the only solution to control vegetation in ponds with large amounts of shallow water.

Chemical control can be accomplished with the use of herbicides or inorganic fertilizers. At present, copper sulfate is the only chemical approved for use in water by the Environmental Protection Agency for the control of aquatic vegetation.

meditation with the participation of all consenting pupils therein assembled." The bill further states "The silent prayer or meditation authorized is not to be conducted as a religious service or exercise, but shall be considered as an opportunity for silent prayer or meditation on a religious theme by those who are disposed or a moment of silent reflection on the anticipated activities of the day."

The preliminary ruling by the Attorney General's Office set forth that though they had not researched the bill in depth, it did not appear to present any constitutional problem. The purpose of this bill is to give the school teachers and administrators firm ground to stand on when planning for this activity for the student.

My intention in co-sponsoring this bill is to establish by law, each person's free right to worship as he chooses, to exercise this privilege in accordance with his own decision. I feel this bill underwrites existing laws in a most forceful manner. Therefore, I do not consider it so much a religious bill as one setting forth the principle of freedom of choice.

This is a good beginning as we in the House of Representatives start our deliberations on a long series of legislation directly concerning our public schools and universities. We legislators and the school related professional people are in partnership as we seek to solve the most satisfactory solutions to educational problems. These solutions cannot be narrowly focused but must be broadly shared.

Homemaking Hints

Difference in Water-bath and Pressure Processing in Home Canning

Have you wondered about the difference in water-bath and pressure-cooker processing of foods in home canning? The water-bath method is used for processing high acid fruits and vegetables and is done using a pan with a lid and rack. The rack is used to hold the jars off the bottom of the cooker. It is large enough to cover the jars with one to two inches of water, so that the jars are surrounded by boiling water. The lid is used to help retain the heat. The acid in some fruits and vegetables helps prevent the growth of some bacteria which is the reason the water-bath process can be used.

However, low acid fruits and vegetables must be canned using the pressure cooker. The spores of some bacteria are highly resistant to heat, which makes it necessary for them to be destroyed by high heat. This is accomplished with the pressure cooker. Warren ISD To Give \$300 Bonus To Employees

The Warren School Board of Trustees approved a \$300 bonus for all fulltime school district employees and parttime employees who receive a portion of the \$300 based on the number of hours worked per day. This was approved at a special board meeting, March 12, and employees will receive checks on April 1.

The bonuses will come from the \$26,164.11 received by the Warren ISD from the emergency school funding act signed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe in mid-February. All of the \$26,164.11 appropriation will be expended by payment of bonuses.

The Board voted to open bids for air-conditioning the Jr. High Auditorium and black-topping the parking lot at Jr. High, March 25. The Textbook Committee's Report was adopted. Board agreed to purchase choir risers to be used for High School Choir programs.

Ernest Findley, Tax Assessor/Collector, received an extension on his contract for the 1976-77 school year. The salary was set for the School Trustee Election Judges at \$2.50 per hour and \$2.25 for clerks.

Date for the regular board meeting was changed from March 18 to March 25.

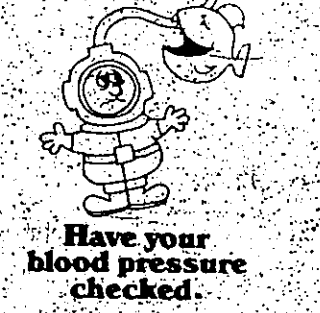

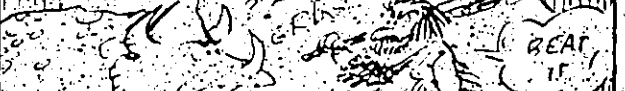
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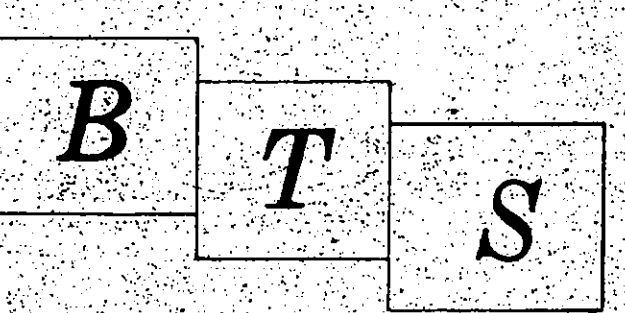

Texas retained the right to divide into five states when it joined the union in 1845. We doubt if Texas voters will approve the division but in case they do we want to be the capitol of the east Texas State.

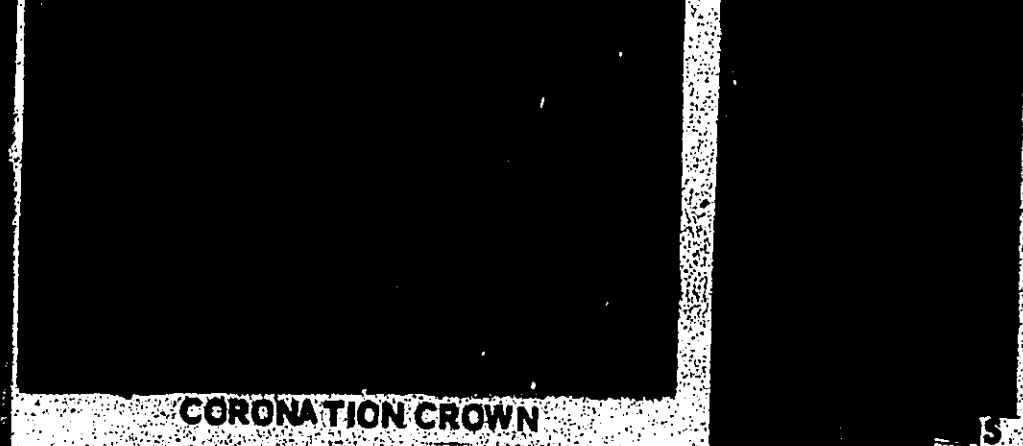

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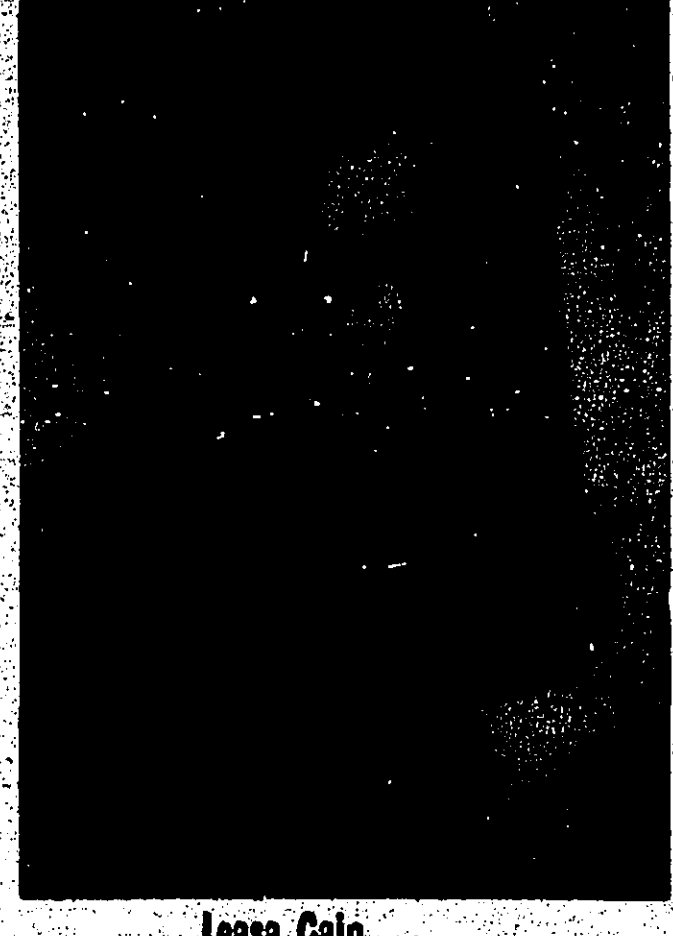
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Neches River Festival Duchesses

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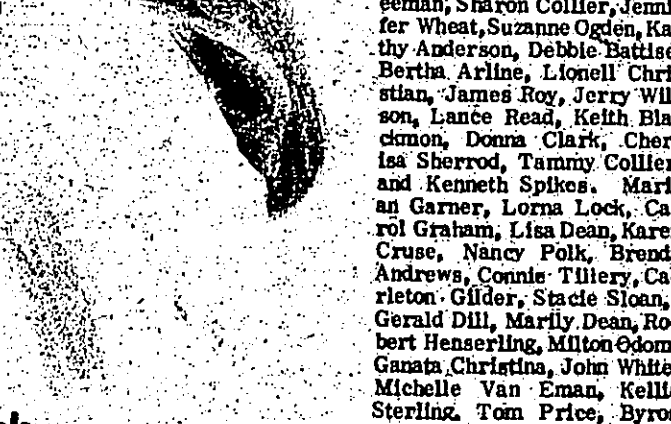
Woodville Band Wins 140 Medals At Solo and Ensemble Contest

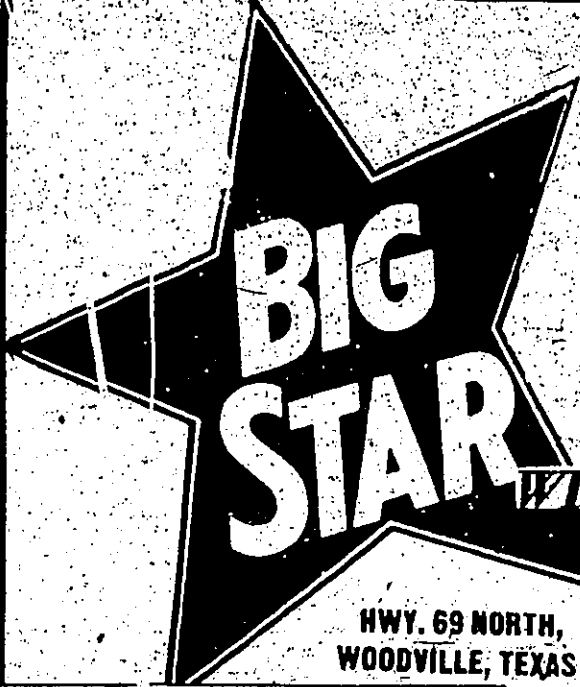
