State Comptroller Bob Bullock says that a record state tax bill ranging from \$320 million to more than \$2 billion appears unavoidable for 1977 if lawmakers continue the current spending trend. House speaker, Bill Clayton urged his appropriations advisors to cut spending recommendations below Legislative Budget Board recommendations.

"It's not a question of if or when. It's a question of how much we pay the fiddler," Bullock said.

The state comptroller believes "The fat is in the fire" and there's no pulling it out. "And because our constitution requires it, \$9.3 billion of the \$13.2 billion expected to pass through the state treasury will go for education, highways, welfare, children's assistance and federal programs."

Bullock believes there is an outside chance of avoiding a major tax bill in 1977 if the current legislature sets aside a \$400 million reserve fund and the 1977 Legislature adopts a hold-the-line budget.

A letter to our state Senator and Representative might help to keep the budget down and head off a tax increase.

Nancy Nichols Crowned 1975 Dogwood Queen



Nancy Nichols, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. W.S. Nichols of Woodville, was the 32nd girl to bear the title of Tyler County Dogwood Queen. She was selected as 1975 Dogwood Queen at the March 18 Final Kings Men interview. She was chosen on the basis of her poise, beauty and personality. During the year of her reign she will represent Tyler County in many activities.

A spectacular stage setting formed the backdrop for the coronation of the 32nd Dogwood queen, Nancy Nichols. She represented Woodville in the Festival and was selected from three other princesses for the honor of serving as the 1975 Dogwood Queen.

Texas Secretary of State, Mark E. White Jr., placed the crown upon her and she made a triumphal circle about the stage with the traditional Dogwood train, the royal scepter and the specially created Dogwood ring.

"It's Dogwood Time in Tyler County" was heard in resonant tones across the amphitheatre stage and the celebration of the 32nd Dogwood Festival began Saturday night, April 5. Nearly all the seats of the theatre were occupied. The festival opened with a solitary stage light on Mrs. Melvin Houston who sang "Trees" while spotlights roved across the trees in the amphitheatre area, highlighting clusters of paper flowers which normally grace them during an East Texas spring, yellow jasmine, red bougainvillea and purple wisteria.

Fred Sullivan gave the welcome and introduced Mr. East Texas of 1974 Congressman Charles Wilson who presented Mr. East Texas of 1975 Ralph Ramos.

This year for the first time the Dogwood Festival Committee decided to honor four persons who had been instrumental in the work and continuation of the annual Festival. Those selected for the initial honor of being given the Josiah E. Wheat Award were, Mrs. James E. Wheat, Sr., widow of the festival founder who has remained a vital worker for the continuation of the pageant. Mr. Sam Sullivan was also honored as having contributed to the festival for many years. Mrs. Sue Bracken, who has for many years headed the flower-making committee was also given special recognition as was Mr. B.J. Coffman who is a member of the permanent directors committee.

The thirty-five formally clad duchesses from surrounding areas and their escorts were then presented to the audience by the master of ceremonies, Josiah Wheat, president of the Dogwood Festival. One of the duchesses, Melissa Tyson, is the daughter of the third Festival Queen, Helen Sheffield; she represented Spring Branch.

The ladies in waiting, Leeza Griffin, Cynthia Mitton and Laura Worthy, were then presented to the audience with their escorts. Next, the five trainbearers were introduced, Darlene Harby, Leslie Gulliver, Sandra Jefferson, Ellen Gay Findley and Allison Smith. Virgil Segrest II, scepter bearer to the queen, David Wilson, ring bearer and James Smith, crown bearer to the queen, were introduced. Next the flower girls were presented to the audience, Monica Minter and Melissa Minter.

Master of ceremonies Wheat introduced Texas Secretary of State Mark White, who had been selected to crown the 1975 Dogwood Festival queen. An announcement of the visiting duchess selected for the honor of being named Grand Duchess was made. She was selected by judges during the three days of court activities on a basis of her personality and poise. The Grand Duchess for 1975 is Stephany Payne of Tyler.

Belinda Currie, Dogwood Queen for 1974, attired in her coronation gown, was presented to the audience for the final time as Dogwood Queen. She swept gracefully across the stage and stood aside to await the announcement of her successor.

Then the Tyler County Princesses, attired in white evening gowns, were presented to the audience along with their chosen escorts. From Chester was Vicki Vinson, escorted by Chick Comer; Brenda Winters represented Colmesnell with her escort, Tim Br-

own. From Warren came princess Debbie Callaway, escorted by Tim Cauthen and the Woodville Princess was Nancy Nichols, escorted by Kelly Broussard.

The announcement of Brenda Winters as the first runner-up, Princess of Tyler County was made and then the name of the queen, selected weeks ago by the Kings Men but kept secret until the pageant night was proclaimed.

As Nancy stepped forward, Secretary of State White gave her the Dogwood ring, the scepter and as she fell on a white satin pillow, the Dogwood crown was placed on her head.

Belinda assisted Nancy and Secretary White with the crown and helped Nancy put on the royal Dogwood train.

After a short triumphal march about the stage wearing the jewel encrusted dogwood train, she and the princesses with their escorts were seated on the royal throne. The enormous throne, fashioned like a dogwood flower, formed the glittering backdrop for the queen and her court.

Organ music for the coronation and the queen's procession was played by Dr. Jim Jinnette. The Robert E. Lee Southernaires, who had provided prelude music for the festival then provided choral music for the enactment of the historical pageant which followed the coronation. They were under the directorship of Miss Eleanor Grant. The choral group had sung for Tyler County Dogwood Festivals in the past.

The theme for the pageant this year was Tyler County during the 1920's and narrator, Monroe Prescott opened this portion of the evening entertainment.

Most Candidates Return To Their Former Position

There was a total of 69 votes cast in the Woodville City Councilman election. Elected to vacant or unexpired terms for two year terms were J. G. Anderson by 67 votes, Webb Ashworth, 63 votes and Dr. James Jinnette, 64 votes.

Terry Watts, running for councilman, one year, unexpired term, was elected by 61 votes. There were three write-in votes cast.

Warren School Board Trustee Incumbents, Harold T. Davis and Herman Elliott were returned to their positions in the Saturday, April 5 election. Davis won his place in Position IV with 396 votes; his opponent, B. I. Hutto received 256 votes. In position V, Elliott got 347 votes to 301 cast for his opponent Marvin B. Fannin. A total of 655 votes were cast during this election.

In the County School Board election, L. P. Hicks was elected for Precinct 4 by a vote of 56; there were three write-in votes cast. For precinct 2, H.O. Seaman was elected by a vote of 82.

Faircloth, of Colmesnell was defeated by the 11th word in the first match, "candied". Christy spelled "capital" to win. The annual spelling contest is sponsored by the Houston Chronicle and Christy will go to Houston, Saturday, April 12, to meet other spelling champions from their areas.

Representing Spurger Schools was Roger Benton, son of Mr. and Mrs. L.T. Benton; he is in the eighth grade. Competitors must be under 16 and have not completed the eighth grade.

Christy is in the sixth grade at Fred Elementary; she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Cravy. She is also entering the UIL Contest in spelling. The Chronicle issued a booklet of words to be used for this contest and Christy only studied it for three nights. Her mother, Mrs. Cravy called the words out to her daughter in order to give her practice for spelling orally at the Spelling Bee.

In this county, the contest is sponsored by J.E. Handley, principal of Colmesnell schools. The contest pronouncer and co-sponsor is Mrs. Edith Findley and District Clerk, Pat Brown was the judge.

The contestants had already competed against other students and were spelling champions from their schools. They were each given a card and pen from the Houston Chronicle.

Christy and her mother will attend the East Texas Spelling Bee on April 12 at the Board Room of the Houston Independent School District. The winner of the East Texas Bee will continue to the National Spelling Bee in Washington D.C. June 2-6.

Preliminary Big Thicket Meeting Held

At an informal preliminary meeting National Park Service personnel talked with businessmen and town and county officials concerning the Big Thicket National Preserve Thursday, April 3 in the Commissioners' Courtroom.

Area manager Tom Lubbert, of Beaumont, said this was the first time they had created a preserve in such a scattered situation. He said eventually the preserve would involve between 2 and 3 thousand acres in a land block. Land purchasing may begin as early as the beginning of next year and continue for six years.

Accompanying Lubbert were Paul Kalkwarf, planner for the NPS and Joel Kussman, biologist from Denver. They are visiting all counties involved in the Big Thicket Preserve to get their ideas for the best approach for the park creation and its administration.

The master plan for the Big Thicket Preserve should be ready by early summer. General meetings will then be held and all interested people will be able to express themselves regarding the present proposals offered by the Park Service.

Until recently the Big Thicket area has been fraught with confusion regarding boundary lines and definition. Territorial settlers this was an area of timbered density filled with an abundance of animals to be shot or trapped. The U.S. Government thinks it is an area with vanishing, unique, restricted or rare plants and animal life, an area felt to preserve the national heritage of the nation.

The first county-wide Farm Bureau meeting will be held Saturday, April 26 at 7:30 p.m. The covered dish meal, followed by the meeting will be held at the Lions Den, Woodville. This is the first of the quarterly meetings planned for the Farm Bureau since the beginning of next year and continue for six years.

One of the highlights of the meeting will be the selection of a Tyler County Farm Bureau queen. The girls between the ages of 16-25 single will represent Tyler County at the district Farm Bureau Queen competition.

In order to qualify a girl must be a member of a Tyler County Farm Bureau family. She will be judged on a basis of appearance, poise, grace and personality. Judges will be from out of town. Applications should be returned to the Farm Bureau office, P. O. Box 611 or call 232-2424.

The Woodville Garden Club will present a flower show, Wednesday, April 16 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of United Methodist Church. The theme will be "I'll Remember April" and the public is invited to the free show. It will include a sale of plants grown by members of the Garden Club.

Any amateur gardener or flower arranger in Tyler County may submit an entry to the show in any division. Entries are to be arranged at home by the exhibitor. Horticulture specimens must have been grown by the exhibitor and in possession for a minimum of 90 days. Large blooms should be exhibited in quart jars and small blooms in one-half pint containers. These wishing to submit an entry should bring them between 8-10 a.m. and remove them by 5 p.m. that same day. Horticulture exhibits should be correctly named. Judges will give the final decision on all entries.

In the artistic division there will be five classes. Class I, "Sunrise Serenade" will be arrangements of fresh cut plant material for breakfast table. Accessories may be used. For competition in Class II, "Beautiful Texas," an artistic arrangement of all fresh cut plant material without accessories will be used. Class III, "Meditation" will consist of an arrangement of fresh cut flowers in glass vases. "Home on the Range" Class V will be an arrangement of all fresh cut plant material.

Class IV, "America the Beautiful," competition will consist of an arrangement of fresh cut flowers in glass vases. "Home on the Range" Class V will be an arrangement of all fresh cut plant material.

City Sales Tax Rebates Will Begin April 15

Austin-Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Friday that monthly rebates of city sales taxes will start April 15.

"Nothing stands in our way now, but the U.S. Postal service," Bullock said. "This first-ever monthly payment will replace the old quarterly payment system with its 90-day lag time which has been in effect since the city sales tax was passed in 1967."

Bullock said that linking the quarterly system, "means we're out buying the city money in the backyard for fruitless for three months at a time."

"Now it will be interesting to see what the cities do with it," Bullock said. "The Franklin said, a dollar invested is a dollar earned or at least seven per cent."

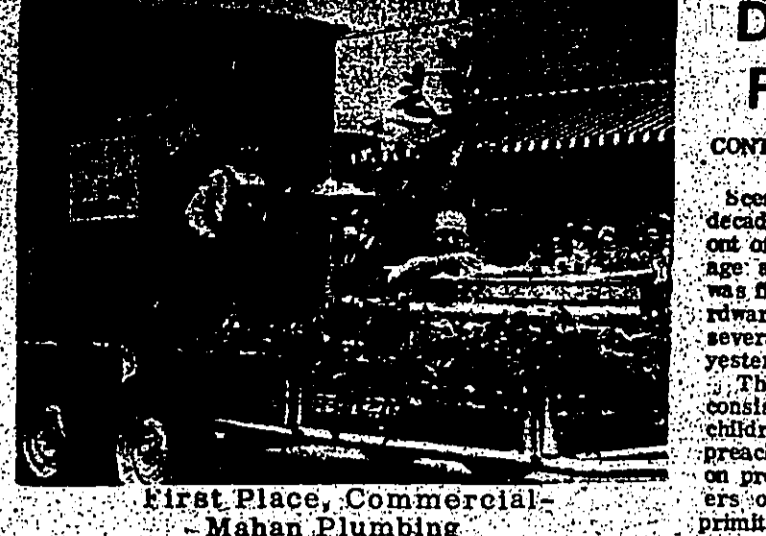

Scenes typical of life in this decade were performed in front of a house typical of this age and a store front which was filled with clothing and hats. A radio was used for several of the glimpses into yesterday.

The first of seven scenes consisted of placard bearing children, a small band and a preacher with a fiery sermon on prohibition. Several makers of moonshine with their primary stills were shown with a prospective customer. Also, a new still would have to be connected before more "corn squeakers" could be made, as this one blew up.

A second scene showed the coming of the automobile and its effect on society and the new morality which accompanied this new mode of transportation and life style. A girl and boy picnic scene was included.

The Tyler County Woman's Study Club was formed during the 1920's. A dramatic scene from one of their installment meetings was shown. Next, in this age of instant glamor, the use of cosmetics and freedom for women, was the reenactment of a beauty pageant. A selection was made from among seven bathing suit clad beauties to wear the title of Miss Thuevenins Creek.

The Kirby High School, built in the 1920's was shown at the time of its dedication with a ode from the poet laureate of Tyler County, Mrs. Frelva Evans.

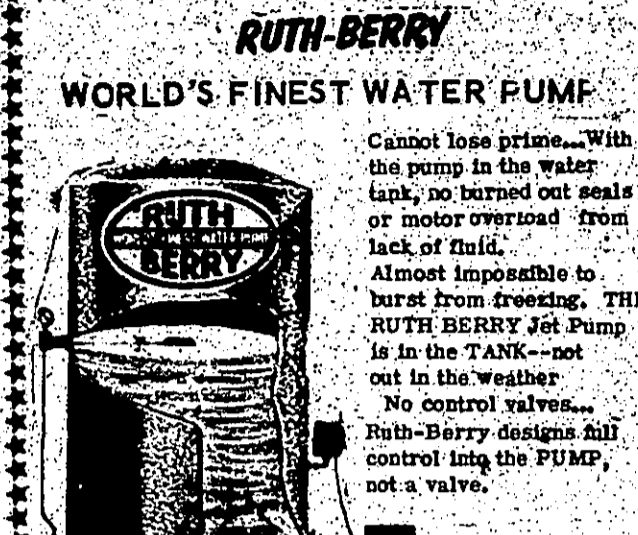
Although the lights of the town were turned off for 20 minutes, the effect on the entertainments of this time was going to the movies. Screen idols such as Rudolph Valentino, Pola Negri, Clara Bow, Douglas Fairbanks, Mary Pickford, Charlie Chaplin and Al Jolson were featured in this vignette.

Land promoters came to this area and brought with them dreams of glamour and work free paradises for only a few dollars down, the first of the installment plan buying arrangements. The last scene of the pageant showed the land promoter, his girlfriend and the Ir accompanying troop of Christian dance girls, bringing these ideas to the citizens of Tyler County.

Depression and other changes followed these days of the "Roaring 20's" the end of a time of innocence and carefreeness that has never been recaptured. But for the festival spectators, they were able to live or relive vicariously those golden days of times gone before.

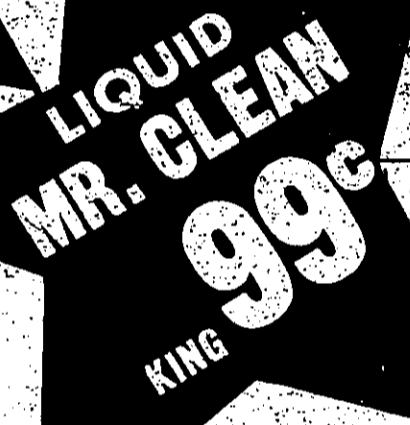

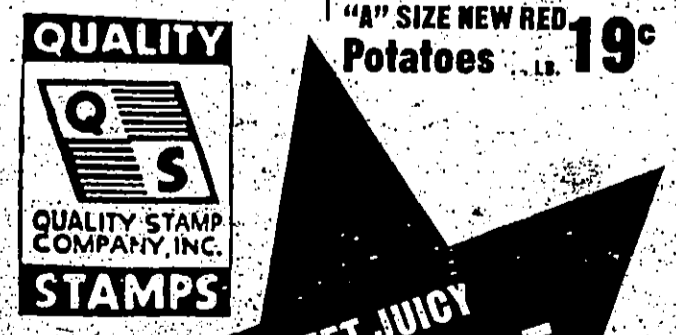
