Ariz., had introduced legislation in Congress which would have provided money for planning by each state for the use or non-use of land. 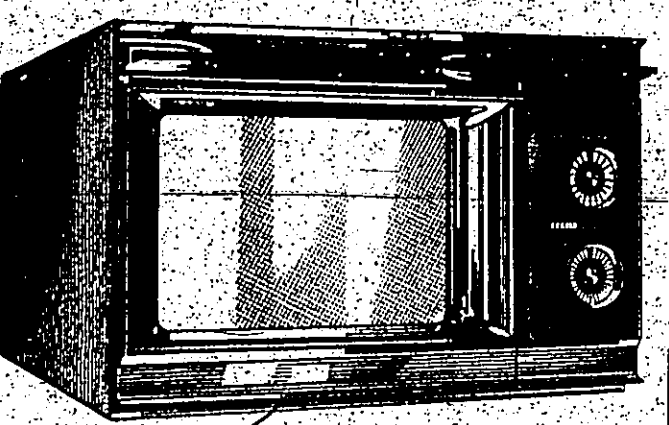
