Statistics indicate the 64th Legislature is heading for a wild and crowded finale, and that more bills will die than survive.

This is inevitable with more than 2,200 House bills and joint resolutions and nearly 1,100 Senate bills and joint resolutions introduced.

The system is overloaded, and the tabulations of unfinished business on legislative committees effectively turn on the warning lights.

Of about 2,400 House and Senate bills referred to House committees, fewer than 500 have emerged.

About 900 bills and important resolutions have been referred to Senate standing committees, and some 500 have come out.

With the exception of constitutional revision, which was effectively and promptly disposed of, most of the session's key business remains unfinished.

Budget bills are still in the Senate Finance and House Appropriations committees.

School finance reform measures are in sub-committees, and seem likely to stay there awhile. Agreement is far from reached on utility regulatory legislation.

Legislators have their hands full in the next six weeks, and the facts are stacked against any easy way out.

The Tyler County Commissioner's Court met in regular session on Monday, April 14, at 10 a.m. All members were present at the meeting.

The meeting began with a motion by Commissioner H. M. Parks to approve the monthly bills submitted and approved by the auditor. He also made a motion to approve the Monthly reports of the Tyler County Extension Service. Both of these motions were unanimously approved.

Commissioner Bo Jordan moved to approve the grant agreement concerning the Tyler County Airport Improvement with the Texas Aeromatics Commission. All voted in favor of this motion.

Commissioner Kenneth Bell made a motion to approve the monthly report of the county treasurer and this was approved by all the commissioners. Commissioner Jordan then made a motion that they accept the \$38,00 bid made by Mamiture Company for an air conditioner for the office of the county treasurer. This bid includes the installation of the 2 ton unit. All approved this motion.

At the motion of Commissioner Parks, all commissioners voted to have a telephone installed in the Drivers License and Social Security office. Commissioner Jordan then made a motion to designate the Citizens St.

School Board Discusses Bond Election Issues

The school bond program set for May 13, 1975, was discussed at the regular meeting of the Woodville School Board of Trustees at their re-organizational meeting April 15.

New board member Bobby Ray Kinion was sworn in and elected to the position of Board Secretary. Dr. R. E. Swearingen was re-elected President, and James W. Gandy was re-elected Vice President.

School architect Jack Stansbury was instructed to prepare a rendering of the proposed new high school in perspective, so voters will have an idea of that portion of the building concept.

The Board further discussed the other aspects of the proposed building projects.

Proceed of the proposed \$2.8 million bond issue will be used to renovate and modernize all buildings that will house grades 9, through grade 12, including cafeteria areas and the present high school auditorium.

To fund the facilities improvement project for May 13, 1975, it is recommended to raise a tax increase of \$5.00 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

Some discussion regarding a site for the new school revealed that until the School Board has actual funds from bond proceeds a site cannot be selected.

Also it was explained that by law the School Board will have to advertise for suitable building site proposals.

Hopefully, all or part of a site might be donated, although board members are not aware of any such offers at this time.

All persons with a valid registration certificate, dated prior to April 12, and residing in the Woodville Independent School District are eligible to vote in the school bond election to be held May 13, 1975, at the high school auditorium during the hours from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Joe H. Cash will be the election judge. Voters may vote absentee at the school administration building from 8:30 - 4:30 each week through May 9.

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
