Commissioners Hear Complaints On Salaries, Roads, Taxes And Cars

The Tyler County Commissioners' Court met in regular session at 10 a.m. Monday, May 12. All members were present.

Commissioner Joe Best moved to accept the court's road and open it to the public. It has been maintained by the public for the past ten years. Citizens in Warren had petitioned for this action to be taken. All commissioners voted in favor of this.

Commissioner H. M. Parks made a motion to continue the Justice of the Peace salary of Mrs. Billie Jean Broom, Pct. 2, at \$50 per month. This was the salary established at the time she was elected to the office and all the commissioners voted to continue this until further action is taken by the court.

Commissioner Kenneth Bell made a motion to approve the treasurer's report for the month of April. All voted in favor of this.

Bond Election

On \$2.9 Million School Rejected

A moderate number of voters came to place their votes in the Tuesday, May 13 election on the \$2.9 million school bond issue. Voting was held at the Kirby High School auditorium.

Voters rejected the bond proposal in this most recent election for new school facilities. In past years several other bonds have also been defeated.

Commissioner Jordan moved to authorize the District Clerk, her deputy, and the County Clerk to attend a meeting in San Antonio June 17-21, with all expenses to be paid. The District Clerk was authorized to hire extra help during the time she will be absent. All voted in favor of this.

A letter was read to the commissioners regarding the keeping of a petty cash fund for the payment of jurors.

A representative of group of lot owners in the Lake Ivan area asked the commissioners to consider county maintenance of the roads in this part of the county. No action was taken by the commissioners at this time.

School finance and teachers' salary debate began this week in the Texas House, while the Senate Education Committee considered its version of how to help equalize educational opportunity. When the House and Senate get through with the bill, it will probably be in the \$600 million range, with teachers assured of a starting pay of \$7,600 up to \$8,000 per year.

City Council Considering Cable TV

Members of the City Council met in regular session on Monday, May 12, at 7 p.m. All members were present at the meeting held in the city hall.

City Council members listened to Ben Campbell, of CATV System Inc. He said his company was interested in putting in a cable television service in Woodville. Councilmen expressed their interest in the installation but delayed action until more information on the company is received.

City Council members listened to two delegates from the "courthouse talk" about the parking problems they encounter and took the matter under advisement.

They accepted bids on the street work to be done at the new nursing home. They agreed to run the customary 100 foot sewer line to the site.

Mount Pisgah Cemetery

Historical Marker Will Honor Wheat At May 17 Ceremony

Mrs. W. H. Seylert, Jr. of Mexia announced that a historical marker honoring John Wheat will be erected in Tyler County on Sunday, May 17 at 2 p.m.

The marker will be placed in Mount Pisgah Cemetery on Seneca road off U.S. 69, about 4 mi SE of Woodville.

The inscription reads:

JOHN WHEAT
August 7, 1813-April
24, 1889

A native of Lawrence County, Ala., migrating to Texas in 1835, Wheat located his headright and boundary lands here, and named many Tyler County creeks while hunting bear and other game. A soldier in Texas War for Independence, he guarded a Mexican officer prisoner after Battle of San Jacinto. He donated land for this cemetery, and served as county commissioner in 1852-54. Married four times, he had several children, and left to descendants many legends of the early days.

The dedicatory address will be delivered by Josiah Wheat and the Rev. Claude Bennett, pastor of the First Christian Church, who will give the invocation. Dedication ceremonies will be conducted by members of the Tyler County Historical Survey Committee.

Veterans Group Insurance Policy Applications Are Due August 2

Less than 120 days remain for veterans discharged since 1970 to take advantage of the new low-cost Veterans Group Insurance (VGLI). Applications and first premium must be received before August 2, 1975.

Veterans Administration Regional Office Director A.A. Hunter issued the reminder April 3, and it applies to all veterans who were discharged between April 3, 1970 and August 1, 1974.

The new program offers up to \$20,000 for a monthly premium of only \$3.40 for veterans under 35, and for those 35 and over, the maximum coverage is \$6.80 per month. It is a non-renewable policy designed as interim protection during readjustment to civilian life, Mr. Hunter explained.

Another important advantage of buying VGLI, Hunter pointed out, is that it reinstates the veteran's right to convert his Servicemen's Group Life Insurance Policy to an individual policy at standard rates regardless of his health or physical condition. Normally, this privilege terminates 120 days after discharge. Those covered by VG-

LI can convert on termination of the five year VGLI policy.
