There are many bills awaiting action in our state legislature. Some of the bills are good, some just plain stupid.

In the stupid category is HB 1152, now being considered by the House Calendar Committee. If passed, the bill would raise the presumptive limit of intoxication in DWI cases from a blood alcohol level of .10 to .15. Based on last year's results, 21 per cent of the drunken drivers tested by police in one large Texas city would have been found if the proposed law had been in effect.

Statistics revealed by that city's police department showed that about 37 per cent of the city's fatal accidents involved drunken drivers last year. Thirty per cent of the drunken drivers involved in fatal accidents in that city last year had blood alcohol levels between .10 and .15 per cent.

Outstanding Senior Citizen Woman of 1975 is Mrs. Lela Sheffield. Her name was submitted by the Beech Creek Home Demonstration Club along with a biographical sketch and reasons why they thought she was worthy of this honor.

The Outstanding Senior Citizen Man of the year is the Rev. Jesse Adams.



County Judge Tom Dick Mann awarded certificates to the Outstanding Man and Woman Senior Citizen of this county at the Retiree's Club luncheon on Tuesday, May 20 at the Lions Den. Recipients of this honor for 1975 were the Rev. Jesse Adams and Mrs. Lela Sheffield.

The following letter was submitted by the Beech Creek Home Demonstration Club telling why they think their nominee should be given the title of "Outstanding Senior Citizen of 1975":

Mrs. W. A. Sheffield was born December 20, 1895 into the family of Rev. and Mrs. J.G. Ratcliff in Beech Creek Community, Lela Ratcliff grew up in a large and loving family. She attended school in her home community, then taught school for 15 years in Tyler and Chambers Counties. On August 26, 1917, Lela was married to W.A. (Bill) Sheffield of Spurger and with him established a Christian home in Beech Creek. They have one daughter, Billie Herschel Lockey Lee and son William Allen, reside in Nederland, Texas. Lela became a Christian when she was 12 years old and for 35 years she taught a class of boys and girls in Sunday School at Beech Creek Baptist Church, serving as Church Treasurer for 10 of these years. Since 1965, she has served First Baptist Church Spurger, as Church Clerk and works in Bible School, Womens Missionary Union and other organizations of the church.

She has been a member of the Auxiliary.

All of this is very commendable, but we think that Lela excels in still another virtue: Being a good friend and neighbor. When sickness or death strikes in her community or among her large group of friends or kindred, Lela is one of the first to come to the aid of those in distress. Her relationship to her own and her husband's large families has continued warm and loving throughout her lifetime. Her sweet smile cheers many a heavy heart.

Information on the Rev. Jesse Adams was compiled from several letters written nominating him as the "Outstanding Senior Citizen" of the year.

Jesse Adams, the son of a Southern Pacific Railroad man was born in Cason, Texas and raised in Northern Texas. He labored in the educational system of our state as a school teacher, principal, and superintendent.

In 1942, the day Pearl Harbor was bombed, Reverend Adams turned his abilities to a career in ministering. Currently, Reverend Adams and his wife, Grace, reside in Woodville. He is preaching now at the Cade Memorial Methodist Church near Chester.

Since moving to Woodville Reverend Adams has been active in the Tyler County ministerial alliance and numerous other organizations. He is presently program chairman of the local AARP Chapter as well as a past president of the group.

Reverend Adams is currently serving as chairman of the Tyler County Committee on Aging. It has been through his leadership and guidance that this committee has been able to develop and promote the popular minibus program for the elderly and disabled in Tyler County communities. This service is now serving over 200 residents of the county.

Jesse Adams is truly deserving of the title of Senior Citizen of the Year for Tyler County for 1975 as his life is one of service to those of his community and especially to the elderly of our County.

Bishop Warren L. Boudreaux, of the Diocese of Beaumont, announces the transfer of The Rev. Joseph Bertrand, pastor of Our Lady of the Pines parish, to Fort Arthur. He will be pastor of St. Mary's parish there.

The Rev. Bennie Pattilo, currently associate pastor of the Immaculate Conception parish in Groves will be the new pastor of Our Lady of the Pines.

Father Bertrand was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Fletcher in Little Rock, Arkansas for the Diocese of Fort Worth. He came to St. Mary's parish in Fort Arthur in November, 1967. He served as an associate in St. Catherine's parish in Fort Arthur before coming to Our Lady of the Pines in June, 1975.

Father Pattilo, who will be taking this parish was ordained to the priesthood in St. Anthony's Cathedral by Bishop Vincent M. Harris on May 25, 1967. His first appointment was assistant in St. Plus parish in Beaumont. He served in St. Mary's, Orange, St. James, Fort Arthur, St. Mary's, Fort Arthur and in Immaculate Conception

parish in Groves before being appointed pastor of Our Lady of the Pines. He was full-time counselor at Kelly High School, full-time teacher counselor at Byrnes High School and now serves as an advocate in the Diocesan Tribunal.

These changes will take place on June 15.

The Rev. Roger L. Shuemate, pastor of the First United Methodist church in Woodville has accepted an appointment to North End United Methodist Church in Beaumont. He has been pastor of the Woodville Church for four years.

Coming to serve the Woodville congregation will be the Rev. Wayland Elmore from the First United Methodist Church in Groves.

Rev. Shuemate has been in the field of ministry for 18 years. He received his BA degree from Sam Houston State College and then studied at the Perkins School of Theology at SMU. Before coming to Woodville, Rev. Shuemate was minister at St. Louis.

Rev. and Mrs. Roger Shuemate have six children, four

presently in the Woodville school system. Mrs. Shuemate works with the State Department of Public Welfare.

## Commissioner's Court Agrees To New Car For Sheriff's Dept.

The Commissioner's Court met in special session on Wednesday, May 14 at 10 a.m. in the county courtroom. All members were present for the meeting.

Commissioner Joe Best moved to authorize Sheriff Lewis Craven to take bids on a new car with a trade-in of a 1974 Pontiac for the department and to repair one 1973 Pontiac. The money for the new car would come from Revenue Sharing. All voted in favor of this motion.

A motion was made by Commissioner Jordan to take bids on a service contract on office machines and typewriters. All voted in favor of this motion.

Commissioner Belt moved the County Judge write a letter to the State Archivist, John Kinney, requesting the Early Origin Tax Records concerning Tyler County be returned to this county. Ella Davis is to be deputized and authorized to receive these records and return them to the county and her expenses will be paid by the County. All voted in favor of this motion.

The meeting was adjourned until the next regular meeting on June 9 at 10 a.m.

## New Owners Ask Suggestions For KVLL Programming

Announcement of the sale of Trinity Valley Broadcasting Company, owner and operator of Radio Station KVLL in Woodville, was made today by Chuck Stamps, who will remain as general manager.

New owners are Jack Jackson, Kenneth Bond and Billy C. Dove, all of Livingston.

Jack Jackson (no relation to former owner R.E. Jackson) is new president of the company. He is the owner, along with Bond, of Jackson's Hardware in Livingston. Dove is the former publisher of the Folk County Enterprise in Livingston and is presently in the real estate business.

The new owners plan no change in the operation of KVLL at the present time but do ask for suggestions from the listening audience on their preferences in the music format and other programs.

Spurger To Revote On Bond Program

All eligible voters in the Spurger School District will have the opportunity to decide for the second time if they want a new heating/air conditioning system for the school building.

A bond issue that passed 76 for and 16 against last December was declared invalid by the State Attorney General's Office. The School District did not state that property owners and non property owners votes would be counted separately, and the notice of election was one day late in the newspaper. These two legal mistakes caused the School District to start once again with the bond program.

The \$75,000 bond program will be for 15 years and will be sold at an interest rate of 7 1/2 per cent.

If the bond is approved by local tax payers, every effort will be made to complete the program this summer while school is out. The planned program calls for individual units for each classroom, with a larger group of units for the Auditorium and Cafeteria.

The present heating system is a diesel boiler manufactured prior to 1939; and attic fans for cooling. The new system would be all electric, with both heat and cooling in the same unit. Individual room control would keep the auditorium and certain classrooms off the electric meter when not in actual use. Extensive new electrical wiring and insulation will also be a part of the bond program.

The float entered by the Tyler County Dogwood Festival in the recent Jasper-Lena Club Rodeo Parade, won first prize among floats prepared by civic organizations. It featured the beautiful 1975 Queen Nancy Nichols of Woodville standing in an arbor decorated with pink and white dogwood blossoms and greenery.

This is the third year the Tyler County Dogwood Festival has participated in the Jasper parade and the second year their entry has been a prize-winner.


## Chatman-Donal Set Wedding For August 9





**AMERICANS AVERAGE 890 TELEPHONE CALLS PER PERSON YEARLY**

American talk more than any other people in the world—on the telephone, that is.

During 1973, people in the U.S. made 183 billion telephone calls, four times more than the 44 billion calls reported by Japan, the second most talkative nation, Gary Richter, local manager for Southwestern Bell, said. Americans averaged about 2.4 calls a day or about 890 calls per person yearly.

These facts are reported in the latest edition of the World Telephone Yearbook, a booklet published annually by AT&T Long Lines, the Bell System unit that provides national and interstate calling service.

"Statistics in the booklet have been compiled from 1,400 principal cities in 173 countries, and reflect developments to January 1, 1974, only because it takes a full year to collect and analyze all the world wide data," Richter said.

In 1973, the number of U.S. phones climbed to 183.3 million," he added. "That's a 5.1 percent increase in California and gives the U.S. the further distinction of having more phones in service than any other country. For every 10 people in the U.S. there are 6.5 telephones compared to a worldwide average of less than one phone for every 10 people."

Citing local telephone growth, Richter noted that Woodville alone has more phones than American Samoa. In Texas there are 391,850 more phones than in Sweden.

In fact, phones outnumbered people in four U.S. cities, Washington, D.C. leads the list with 1.2 phones for every person, followed by Southfield, Michigan (1.06), Champaign, Illinois (1.05) and Palo Alto, California (1.04).






**Boykin, Tillery Win First Place Trophies**



1. All lakes and parks are reserved for property owners.
2. No boats allowed on any lakes without approval and registration by Association. Decals issued at Association office.
3. No boats with outside vented exhausts will be permitted; all boats with automotive engines must have a proper muffler system. No Rooster Tails.
