In November of this year, Texas voters will have the opportunity to vote on a new constitution for our state. If the new constitution will replace the state constitution adopted in 1876 it could cost as much as \$11 billion if all provisions of the new constitution are carried out to the fullest extent, according to Comptroller of Public Accounts Bob Bullock in a report sent to five state senators recently.

The report showed that proposed revisions would directly cost the state government \$100 million a year in actual expenditures and would cost taxpayers another \$53 million a year in new taxes on such intangible property as bank deposits and stocks, the comptroller said.

Bullock listed the following direct cost increases:

- Annual sessions of legislature, \$2.25 million.
- Additional appeals courts and upgraded salaries \$3.52 million.
- Text books and expansion \$20 million.
- A new higher education fund \$14.7 million.
- State employee retirement changes \$3 million.
- State building fund \$6.33 million.

Land Acquisition For Big Thicket Begins In July

Acquisition of land for the Big Thicket National Preserve in East Texas will be handled for the National Park Service by the Army Corps of Engineers.

The amendment was made jointly by Joseph C. Runy, Jr., Southwest Regional Director of the Department of Interior's National Park Service, at Santa Fe, New Mexico, and two Corps of Engineers officials, Brig. General Charles I. McGinnis, Division Engineer, Southwest Division at Dallas and Colonel Joe H. Shepard, District Engineer, Fort Worth District, in Fort Worth.

The Big Thicket National Preserve is a recently authorized park in southeastern Texas containing 12 units and totaling approximately 84,500 acres. It contains a complex mingling of plant and animal life found nowhere else in the United States.

Acquisition work will be under the direction of the District Engineer, Fort Worth, according to a memorandum of agreement, signed by the National Park Service and the Corps of Engineers.

The Corps will open a land acquisition office in association with the National Park Service's project headquarters in Beaumont, Texas in July 1975. Tom Lubbert, the Park Service's project manager at Big Thicket Preserve, has the responsibility for establishing the priorities for acquisition.

Police Constantly Strive To Upgrade, Improve Department

Woodville Chief of Police Garry Mattingly and officer Garry Collins attended a five day Homicide Investigator seminar in Austin on May 5-9. There were 149 persons attending the 21st annual seminar. It is sponsored by the University of Texas and the Department of Public Safety on alternate years it is partially sponsored by the University of Oklahoma at Norman.

Delegates to the seminar represented many states including Wisconsin, Tennessee, Alabama, Colorado, Arizona, Oklahoma, Kansas, New Mexico and Louisiana. The DPS auditorium has a capacity of 149 persons so over 200 applicants were turned away.

"I hope we didn't ever have to use what we learned, but I can't think of anything more valuable to have. If needed then the information we were given at this seminar," said Chief Mattingly.

Outstanding pathologists spoke to the group and showed slides from some of their cases. They showed slides on all types of homicide cases, including those from the mass Houston murders. Some of the pathologists addressing the seminar were Dr. Charles Pacy of Dallas, Dr. Joseph C. Rupp of Corpus Christi, Professor Oliver Schroeder from the University of Ohio and the well known Dr. Joseph Jachlmayr of Harris County.

Each day of the seminar consisted of eight hours of class study. They were each given a certificate for attending this seminar and (his will) give each officer two points toward further certification in the department.

Chief Mattingly recently obtained his intermediate certificate and is presently working on his final or advanced certification. In order to obtain an intermediate certificate one must have college work and work experience for seven years of experience and 40 points in the educational field. Two points are given for each 40 hours spent in educational work.

Chief Mattingly announced they will be holding an Intermediate Traffic School in Woodville on August 4-5. This will be sponsored by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education through the Police Academy at Killebrew College, Officers from Austin will conduct the school.

Purpose Of DETRMHMS Explained At Open House

During Deep East Texas Mental Health, Mental Retardation Services Week a special open house was held Friday, May 23 from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. at the Mental Health, Mental Retardation Center. Along with the public who were invited to attend and learn more about the work done by the Center, members of the board of directors were also present at various times during the open house period to answer questions and discuss the regional program.

Allie Owens worked to provide transportation for persons wishing to visit the open house. Barnes drives the mini bus and Mrs. Owens is the secretary for the transportation of the aging offices. Persons wishing to attend could call the mini bus office or wait at the Tyler County Courthouse for transportation to the Center.

Refreshments were served and in the hallway a table was filled with literature which was available to anyone interested. Pamphlets were on drug abuse, alcoholism and mental health, mental retardation, Mrs. Margie Ealer, on the advisory council, along with B.M. Minter were in charge of the reception for visitors.

DETRMHS serves 250,000 people living in 13 counties in the east Texas areas. Of these, ten percent or 25,000 persons are mentally ill to the extent they will need professional help some time in their lives.

Three percent, or 7,500 of these persons are mentally retarded.

Four percent, nearly 10,000 are alcoholics or have serious problems related to alcohol. Recent school surveys show that the drug abuse problems are still increasing. Nearly 42,500 persons living within the east Texas area need professional help. The Outpatient Clinic in Woodville is designed to help individuals and families affected by mental illness, alcoholism or other problems. It provides a place they can go for help, a place where the problem they suffer will be understood. Through the Outpatient Clinic professional help is available in the form of counseling, therapy and diagnostic services.

Fees for services at the centers are determined on a sliding scale. The less a family makes, the less his services will cost.

The purpose of the DETRMHMS programs are to enable families to stay together in society while learning to overcome their problems. By remaining in the community, the mentally ill or retarded persons can maintain in the mainstream of society with a little help in understanding and teaching their persons to use the abilities they have.

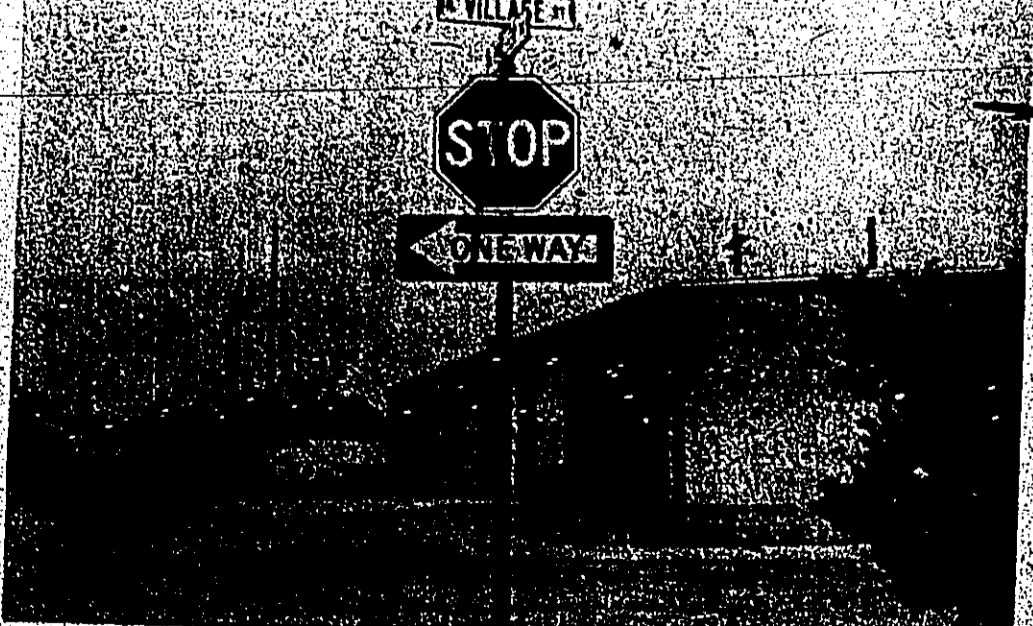

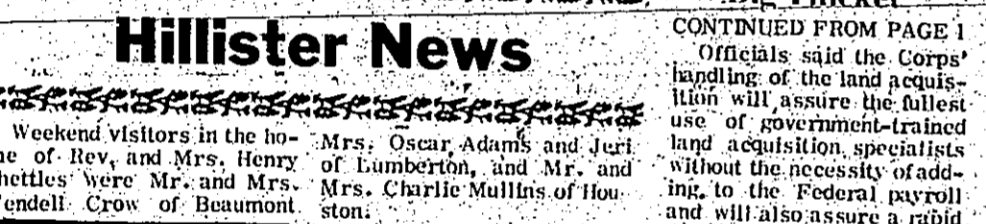

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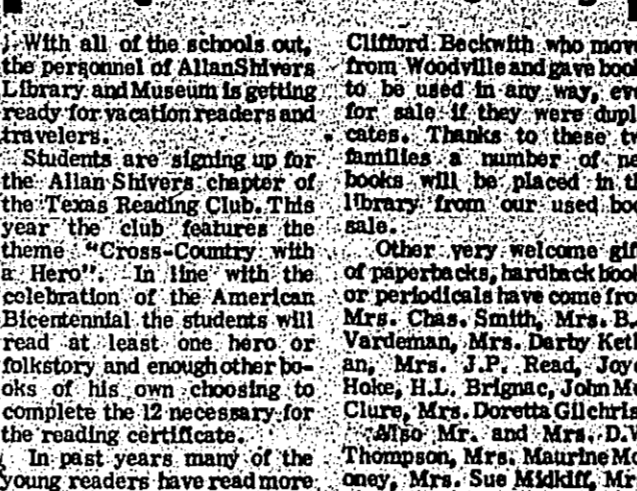
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Faircloth - Falcon Vows Are Said

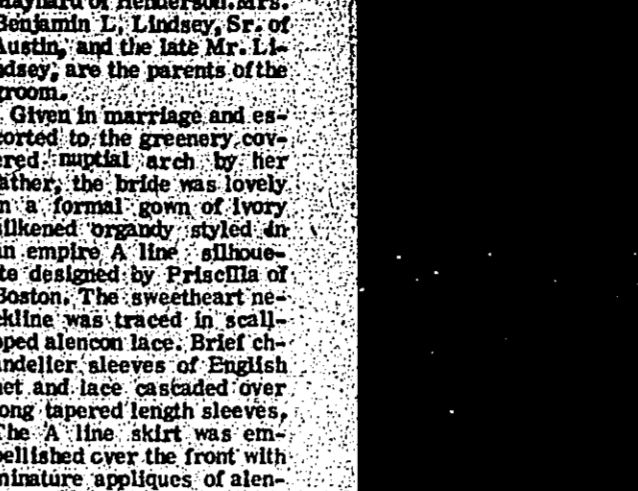

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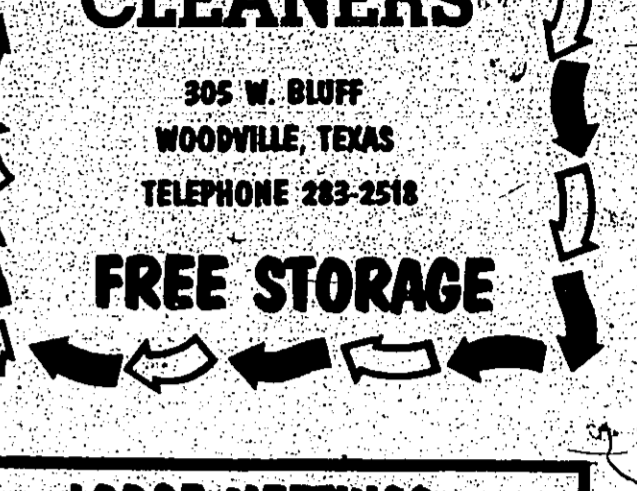
