He added "the state can afford outlays only for maintenance and operation of the highways. The commission chairman disclosed that a new study will examine the widening gap between needed construction and available revenues. He said the study will also look at the need to increase tolls, as well as the need to increase the public benefits of proposed projects. He said Mr. Houston is saying it that the state will have to find more money. If new road construction is to continue, the new funds will have to come from new taxes.

## Tyler County Prepares For Bicentennial Celebration

Tyler County has begun its work toward getting a bicentennial program established. County Judge Tom Dickman recently named J.B. Coffman as chairman of Tyler County Historical and Bicentennial Committee.

DETA historical chairman, Mrs. Julia Wade advised that Mr. Coffman be appointed to this office. Following his appointment Coffman wrote letters to various civic clubs and organizations about the county, asking for a representative from each to serve on the county committee to organize a program for Tyler County.

One of the first special bicentennial programs that will be in Tyler County will be a show at the Allan Shivers Library in September. The Allan Shivers Library was one of the first places to request this exhibit, which will be on display in seventeen places during September.

The show, "Texas and the American Revolution," provided by the Institute of Texas Cultures, consists of 3x7 foot panels hung in sets of three. The bicentennial show will consist of eight columns of words and graphics in Hebrew, English, and Spanish. Column One and then move to column Two, then to the others in numerical order, reading the story as a narration as they follow it.

The rental on this exhibition is free with those using only paying the freight charges. The total weight is approximately 200 pounds and is the lightest in weight of any of the large institute shows.

Eventually 22 copies will be made so the show can be displayed simultaneously at that many places. Bookings for the exhibit already extend into mid-1976. It will be in Woodville throughout the month of September.

The Allan Shivers Library is already involved in promoting the Bicentennial theme with their summer vacation reading program. The theme selected this year by the Allan Shivers Library and the Texas Reading Club is "Cross Country With a Hero" and students in this program must read at least one story about one of our nation's heroes, either a folk or historical character. A total of twelve books must be read to complete the summer reading program but only one book has to be about a hero although others may be read.

Certificates will be given to those completing the reading program at the end of the summer. Presently 64 students have signed up for the program but others may sign up by the first week in August and still complete the reading program.

Supplies sent to the hero reading program will be ready for Mrs. Sullivan's class during September with the show from the Institute of Texas Cultures they will have several other special programs, possibly one at night. She also said they plan to honor Mrs. Ella Moseley and her newly published book at that time also.

With the Bicentennial celebration in mind the Reading Club has chosen their theme for next year, "Cherish The Past and Challenge The Future". They are planning a series of programs that will give glimpses of the past and a preview of the future.

The Kirby High School FFA officers met with President Kathy Ray to formulate plans for the school year. They will have a September carnival and in October they will have a cake sale in order to have money for their bicentennial projects. One of the projects they have planned is a puppet show with bicentennial theme for elementary students. They will also sponsor a family play day with old fashioned games and events, plus baby sitting.

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Washington Trip Has Farm Bureau Results For Farm Bureau Efforts

When we went to Washington in April, we did not go as an organized delegation, but we were well received and today we are still feeling the benefits of our friendly visit," said Mr. Benjie Stanfort, secretary of the Tyler County Farm Bureau.

Honoring Hints Making Pickles At Home

Have you ever experienced the frustration of not being able to find a recipe for making pickles at home? One way is to get some hints from the experts. The Tyler County Extension Agent, Mrs. Virginia Worley, has some hints for making pickles at home.

First, she says, choose a good variety of cucumbers. She suggests using a large number of cucumbers, about 10 to 12, for each quart of pickling liquid. The cucumbers should be firm and well developed. They should be washed thoroughly and then cut into slices, spears or other shapes. She suggests using a sharp knife to cut the cucumbers.

Next, she says, choose a good variety of pickling liquid. She suggests using a mixture of vinegar, water, salt, and sugar. The vinegar should be white distilled vinegar. The water should be filtered water. The salt should be pickling salt. The sugar should be granulated sugar.

Finally, she says, choose a good variety of pickling time. She suggests using a pickling time of 2 to 4 weeks. The pickles should be stored in a cool, dark place. They should be used within 3 to 4 weeks.

Another way to get hints is to ask the experts. The Tyler County Extension Agent, Mrs. Virginia Worley, has some hints for making pickles at home.

## Speeding Up Brucellosis Testing Payments

Just what can livestock producers do to speed up indemnity payments on the brucellosis eradication program? This question arises at virtually all brucellosis eradication programs held in Texas as a result of the lag time that follows the slaughtering of animals that react to the brucellosis test, says Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To get the answer, Dr. Armstrong contacted U.S. Department of Agriculture veterinarians with the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) in Austin, who with the Texas Animal Health Commission officials administered the program.

Reasons for paying brucellosis indemnity is to compensate the owner of a reactor for the loss of an animal maintained as part of a herd-breeding herd. Reactors directly slaughtered or to slaughter plants are not eligible for indemnity. Reactors found in herds that are found as a result of slaughter are eligible for:

1. Reactors must be slaughtered within 15 days after disclosure.
2. Reactor animals must be quarantined and branded within 15 days after disclosure.
3. Herd of origin must be quarantined or tested within 30 days after disclosure at livestock markets, veterinary clinics, or other concentration points.
4. Movement of all reactors from a quarantined herd must be permitted either directly to slaughter or to an approved market for consumption directly to slaughter.
5. Premises must be cleaned and disinfected under probable slaughtering conditions, this regulation may be waived.

### Tyler County Has Forestry Incentives Program

What is the Forestry Incentives Program all about?

The Forestry Incentives program (CIFP) was authorized by Congress in 1973 to share the cost of tree planting and timber stand improvements with private landowners. The Federal Cost-share is approximately 75% of the cost, which is set by the Tyler County Assessor.

The smaller private owners, who control the majority of forest lands in Tyler County, do not have the funds to make long-term investments, therefore the Forestry Incentives Program is designed to share this expense with these private owners.

Planting Forest Trees. This practice is intended to increase the production of timber and improve the environment. Site preparation is an authorized part of this practice. Improving a Stand of Forest Trees. This practice is aimed at increasing growth of trees on sites suitable for production of saw timber and veneer logs. Both site work and handwood improvement will qualify.
