Senator Adams Speaks To Lions Club On Recent Legislative Acts

State Senator Don Adams of Jasper spoke to the Woodville Lions Club at their noon meeting last Thursday. He was introduced by County Clerk Allen Sturrock. Adams spoke on the recently concluded legislative session.

He said that there were five major accomplishments in the session which ended on June 2, 1975, and they were in the areas of State Finance, Utility Regulation, School Financing, Presidential Primaries and Constitutional Revision.

The Legislature passed a record Appropriations Bill to the tune of approximately six billion dollars a year for the next two years. Adams said that inflation caused the State Government expenses to increase just as it has caused personal expenses to increase.

First Baptist Church Burns Note

Present for the note burning ceremony in the First Baptist Church, Woodville on Sunday morning, July 13 were Gordon A. Anderson, member of the original building committee, Ben Farmer, custodian of the church since it was built, and Mrs. L.M. Feagin whose husband was a member of the original building committee.

This past session was to be the session for education, but Adams said the Legislature fell over the stumbling block of ad valorem taxes. The bill passed by the Legislature will be of financial benefit to the Woodville Independent School District in the areas of maintenance and operation, transportation and teachers' salaries.

The Legislature passed a Presidential Primary Bill which has a co-called "self-destruct clause" for March of 1977. Adams cited the bill as giving each voter a voice in the Presidential nominations whereas before this was decided by a small number of citizens in each county.

There will be a copy of the complete text of the Constitution sent to each household, along with a side-by-side analysis of the old Constitution and the new proposal so that the people of the state can be better informed when they vote in November of 1976.

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This session of the Texas Legislature place on the ballot for November of this year a complete revision of the 1876 Constitution. Senator Adams said that the Legislature adopted the revision in about 30 days, but only after the unsuccessful Constitutional Convention had done a great amount of groundwork.

Computers Help Monitor Forest Insect Problems

In almost every aspect of life these days, computers are being used to solve problems. In the forest, they are used to monitor insect problems.

The southern pine beetle attack in the southern pine belt is a current epidemic, which began some 15 years ago in Hardin County, has spread over a 25-county area. The computer has become an invaluable tool in helping to define the beetle's damaging path. In 1973, estimated timber loss caused by the beetle amounted to more than 3 1/2 million dollars.

Texas Forest Service workers have used the entire insect restoration area about every four weeks from April through October to locate new spots of beetle activity. The spots are checked on the ground to determine the location, number, and extent of the beetle infestation. Finally the land owner is notified and encouraged to stop the beetle's spread by initiating control efforts. As one ground survey record keeping for the beetle's life cycle detected each year. It is a big job.

Beginning in the spring of 1973, the Texas Forest Service initiated its southern pine beetle Operations Information System. All information is entered on computer punch cards. Then various computer programs developed by the Texas Forest Service are used to sort and combine the information into up-to-date listings of spots that need to be checked on the ground or controlled. These lists are produced about every two weeks during the active beetle season.

The data collected on all the southern pine beetle spots serves another purpose. Research entomologists are using the computerized historical records of beetle infestation to determine the effectiveness of current control





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WILSON REPORT Wants to make Congressional Record reflect more accurately debate on House floor

The resolution specifies that a distinguishably different type face be used in the Congressional Record more accurately reflect debate on the House floor.

The House floor. It provides for three things: 1) that the record should be a narrative and verbatim account of remarks; 2) that in sections should have a distinctive type face from that used for verbatim reports.

An important reason for the resolution is the need to give an accurate understanding of congressional intent to federal agencies and agencies charged with implementing legislation. For example, in released an opinion on the Equal Employment Opportunity Act based on a dialogue between Representatives Edith Green and John Pickens, the dialogue recorded in the Congressional Record never took place.

This incident was not meant to deceive, but its result was unfortunate. It is difficult to have law many other times government officials and the American public have been misled by the appearance in the Record of brilliant persuasive arguments that were never actually uttered on the floor. This bill would prevent them from appearing in the Record. It would only make sure that the intent of Congress is not suspect and the public is not deceived.

I am continuing my investigation of problems associated with welfare for elderly couples who need nursing home care. As I reported last month, I have found incidents where "indefinite laws force married couples to seek divorces in order to qualify for nursing home payments. Since I made my findings known, I have received letters and calls from elderly couples who are in that predicament. I have received assurance from the Director of the Texas Department of Public Welfare that he will look into the matter. Meanwhile, I am also seeking assistance from the Social Security Administration and Congressional Committee to see if there are any other avenues of help for these people.


