House Bill No. 226, passed by the Texas house of representatives will abolish the office of County School Superintendent in Texas on December 31, 1978.

The new law reads "After December 31, 1978, no state funds shall be used to support the offices of County School Superintendent, or executive officer, County School Superintendent, or a board of County school trustees or a county school board in counties with no common school districts, rural high school districts, or independent districts with less than 150 average daily attendance, but the offices and board may be supported by an ad valorem tax revenue generated in accordance with the provisions of a voluntary contract as provided in section 17.98 of this chapter."

Section 17.95 of the bill states that "On December 31, 1978, all offices of County School Superintendent, which are not supported by ad valorem tax revenue generated under the provisions of chapter 18 of this code or by voluntary contract with section 17.98 are abolished."

The new law provides for the transfer of certain powers and duties of the County School Superintendent to other county officials, school districts, and regional agencies.

Commissioners Revamp Solid Waste System

County commissioners met and reorganized the solid waste program in Tyler County. It was decided in meetings held by the commissioners on Wednesday and Thursday to have Commissioners H.M. Parks and Kenneth Belt operate the program in Pct. 2 and 3. Commissioners Joe Best and Bo Jordan will be in charge of the solid waste program in Pct. 1 and 4.

They also decided to change the method of operation of the sanitary landfill. The area will be fenced and the entrance will be protected by a gate. There will be a man on duty at the area and the dumping area will be open from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. Mondays through Friday. There will be no dumping allowed on the weekends.

Persons taking advantage of the dumping area during the week day hours will have to check with the man supervising the area before unloading. He will direct them to a dumping site. During the weekend the gates to the sanitary landfill will be locked.

Judge Tom Dick Mann said they plan to prosecute violators to the fullest extent in order to help correct the present solid waste problems. Fines for violations range from \$10 to a maximum of \$200.

Judge Mann said he would like to apologize for the inconvenience the public has recently experienced with the solid waste program. One of the trucks has been broken down and the other one is old and worn out. Judge Mann said he expects the commissioners to call a special meeting and advertise for bids for a new truck. They are also hoping to be able to purchase a standby truck from GI surplus.

The county commissioners has recently purchased 31 more canisters for the county so all areas will have nearer locations to take their combustible garbage.

The present sanitary landfill is located approximately 3 miles from Woodville on Hwy. 190 east, past Thevenins. Creek turn to the right.

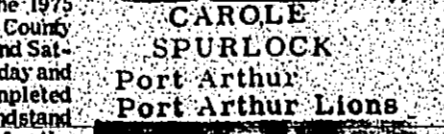

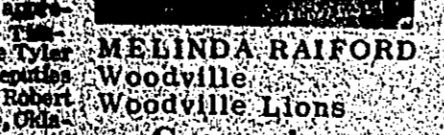

Sheriff's Department Assists In Capture Of Parole Violator

A parole violator, wanted since the first of the year was captured in a wooded area southeast of Woodville Friday afternoon, July 18. Andrew Williams, 42, was apprehended by four mounted horsemen from the Apprehension Squad of the Texas Department of Corrections and two inmates who handled the dogs.

Williams, convicted of murdering his wife, had served time in the TDC was released on parole and violated his parole.

Sheriff Craven contacted the TDC asking for their aid in apprehending Williams. Deputy Jones patrolled the man for several hours in the vicinity of Collins Paint Store prior to the arrival of the TDC units. The Apprehension Squad arrived in Tyler County Friday afternoon, they began to search near Durham Saw Co. The approximate eight mile chase was ended that afternoon near the Spring Hill Church.

Williams is presently being held in the Tyler County Jail awaiting the arrival of TDC personnel to return him to the Department of Corrections in Huntsville.

Pepper Tells Rotarians Of Need To Find New Oil Fields

An expanded search for new oil and gas fields on the U.S. Outer Continental Shelf is urgently needed since three-fourths of the nation's 1985 oil and gas needs will have to come either from imports or U.S. fields not yet discovered, a Mobile Oil Corporation executive said.

G. Paul Pepper addressed the Woodville Rotary Club at their Wednesday July 16 noon meeting at the Woodville Inn. He said the urgency for an early beginning is evident when one considers the lead time involved—from four to more than 10 years—from the time the government initiates an off-shore lease sale to when actual production of oil or gas begins.

Pepper, a plant manager at the Mobile Oil Corporation Beaumont Refinery, said U.S. consumption of oil and gas will continue to rise—even with strong conservation efforts, a one per cent per-year population growth, and "substantially more" coal and nuclear power becoming available.

He said the U.S. is now consuming 28 million barrels of oil equivalents each day, and this will increase to 32 million barrels per day by 1985. At the same time, he said production from proved domestic reserves will drop from 21 million barrels per day to only nine million.

"That means 23 million barrels per day, or three-fourths of what we need, will have to come either from increased imports, or increased domestic production," he explained.

To increase domestic production and reduce the nation's dependency on foreign oil, Pepper said "the vast and little explored offshore areas of the Outer Continental Shelf offer the largest and most significant potential."

"Mobile estimates that oil and gas there could equal almost as half as much as the U.S. has produced in its entire history," he declared.

"Of course, there is simply no way to know how much oil and gas may exist in an area until it is extensively explored and drilled."

Pepper said there are three areas off the East Coast that appear attractive for exploration—the Georges Bank east of Cape Cod, the Baltimore Trough off the Mid-Atlantic Coast, and the Blake Plateau off the southern storm states. But he emphasized "it's unlikely that wells would be drilled within 30 miles of Cape Cod."

The Mobile executive said opinion research indicates that the public is generally in favor of offshore drilling—because "most people recognize either from increased imports, or increased domestic production," he explained.

Rodeo fans will be able to eat their dinner at the Rodeo as the fine concession facilities of the Rodeo Arena will be operating at full strength, serving hamburgers and hot dogs and plenty of cold drinks.

The Ivy Rodeo Company of Fairfield, Texas, the stock contractor and producer, will as always, bring the top backing bulls and horses and strong steers and calves to test even the best of the professional cowboys. The Tyler County event is one of nearly 600 contests sanctioned in 1975 by the Professional Rodeo Co.

Commissioners Vote \$7,067 For DETMHMRS Work To Continue

At its July 16 meeting, the Tyler County Commissioners Court voted unanimously to contribute \$7,067 to the Deep East Texas Regional Mental Health Mental Retardation Service (DETMHMRS) for FY 1976. This local contribution will insure continued growth in services provided to the citizens of Tyler County and the region.

DETMHMRS currently sponsors two programs in Tyler County; the Tyler County Outpatient Clinic, located at 1006 West Bluff and the Tyler County Developmental Center located at 4th Wheat in Woodville. The Outpatient Clinic has served approximately 50 clients and the Developmental Center has served 40 individuals this past year.

Tyler County's contribution for fiscal year 1976 will provide the continued expansion and maintenance of these local programs and the action of the Commissioners Court has again demonstrated a positive outlook for the part of all citizens of Tyler County.

From an allocated \$39,769 for the criminal justice project, \$14,000 for the 1975 feasibility study and architectural rendering will be drawn. Other money was given to fund seven continuing projects and Woodville Tyler County law enforcement/all combination building was given present priority on new projects.

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Planning Ground Approval Given For County Jail

County Judge Tom Dick Mann's Chief Garry Mattingly and B.J. Vardeman attended a DETCOG meeting at Lufkin Tuesday night, July 15. They were able to obtain planning ground approval for the new Tyler County Jail. A grant in the amount of \$10,000 was approved for a study to be made for the need for the new jail and architectural designs for the building made.

nize the need for more oil and gas in the future. In a nationwide survey last year, Gallup Research Corporation found 74 per cent "strongly" or "moderately" in favor of offshore drilling, he said. The research firm of October-Smith Inc. interviewed 2,000 community leaders in eight East and Gulf coast cities last summer, and found 71 per cent agreed with the statement: "On balance, the benefits to the U.S. of offshore drilling outweigh the disadvantages."

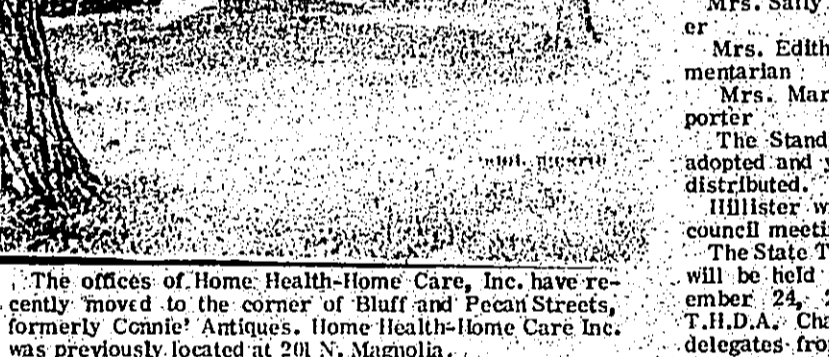

A&M Lab Serves Ranching Industry

Texas ranchers have a unique service available to them through the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University.

The lab serves mainly as a test center for animal diseases, so that specific treatment can be administered.

Dr. William L. Sipple, executive director of the lab, also helps in the commerce of animals by performing various tests required for interstate or international shipment of livestock.

The lab is a central collection point for all diseased animal specimens from throughout the state so that disease outbreaks can be detected when they occur. Recent examples of disease outbreak identifications include anthrax in Central Texas and brucellosis in South Texas.

"Through our study of disease outbreaks, we are able to issue warnings of seasonal diseases through veterinarians and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service," notes Sipple.

"We want all ranchers to feel that our facilities are a part of their ranching operation and to call on us and submit specimens for testing at any time. Of course, specimens must be prepared and specially shipped, so most samples are submitted by local veterinarians," explains the lab director.

The lab itself has a staff of 10 professional people who are available to assist in planning herd health programs, and this can be a major step in avoiding emergency situations.

The lab operates on a fee basis which provides for the cost of its operating costs. Other costs are paid through state and overall animal health conditions, we issue warnings of seasonal diseases through veterinarians and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service," notes Sipple.
