### Representative Tanner Reviews Legislative Issues For Lions

At the Thursday, July 24 meeting of the Woodville Lions Club, State Representative Perry Tanner was guest speaker. He was introduced by program chairman, Lewis Craven. Representative Tanner spoke on important issues dealt with in the last legislative session.

He spoke about the establishment of a utilities commission. He said, "The bill finally signed was not as strong as the one passed by the House, but it was a start in the right direction. The bill passed through the House and one that I supported would have put more teeth into the regulation, but the present one is a start and one we can improve in the next session."

Tanner said "Texas now has strip mining regulations. We are not so affected in this district yet, but north of us there has been operation for several years mining for lignite coal that has left the earth bare. The legislation calls for operators to reclaim the land to its original condition. One of the first actions taken in this session was to look into retirement benefits of teachers and state employees. It was found that inflation had substantially eroded these benefits and those people who were living on fixed incomes were in need of relief. The legislature submitted to the voters an amendment that gave a retroactive raise. About school financing, he said, "Some people think that

### District Governor To Address Rotary Club On Thursday

Rotarians of Woodville welcomed on Wednesday the governor of this Rotary district, Neal Pickett of Diboll. He addressed the local Rotary Club, one of 36 in his district, and conferred with Grady Holderman, president of the local Rotary club, and other club officers to obtain information on the club's plan for its service activities and to offer suggestions on Rotary administrative matters.

Mr. Pickett is one of 357 Rotary governors in all parts of the world who are serving as the sole representative of Rotary International in districts comprised of member clubs. Each district leader is responsible for supervising the clubs in his area. More than 16,000 Rotary Clubs in 151 countries are supervised by Rotary governors.

A member and past president of the Rotary Club of Diboll, Mr. Pickett is a former Mayor of Houston and a retired executive director of the Deep East Texas Development Council. He was elected to office at the Rotary convention in Montreal, Canada, in June, and will serve until next June 30.

"While in Woodville," according to Mr. Holderman, local Rotary club president, "the governor of our district will talk with us about possible growth of membership and the likelihood of forming additional Rotary clubs in our area. He will also give us a broader understanding of the world-wide Rotary organization that today embraces more than 770,000 members in practically all nationalities and political and religious beliefs."

Though a seasoned Rotarian before his election to the office of Rotary governor, Mr. Pickett attended a 9 day meeting last May in Boca Raton, Florida at which all Rotary governors for 1975-76 received intensive training for their jobs. One of his biggest jobs will be to hold a district conference and the likelihood of forming additional Rotary clubs in this area. The conference will be held April 1, 2, 3, and 4, 1976 at Galveston.

## August 7 Will Be Tyler County Night At 'Beyond The Sundown'

People all about the state and nation are coming to this area to see the attractions offered. One of the most popular things which is currently bringing visitors here is the outdoor performance of "Beyond the Sundown" being performed nightly, except Sunday, at the Sundown Theatre on the Alabama Coushatta Reservation.

It would be unfortunate if the people of this area missed seeing this attraction which is drawing crowds from many areas. It has been featured in several entertainment magazines from this region and pictures from the play were in the magazine section of the July 27 Houston Chronicle.

Therefore August 7, Thursday is being set aside for residents of Tyler County to attend the 1st performance of "Beyond the Sundown." Tickets for that night will be especially priced at only \$1.00 and two side sections will be reserved. These areas are regularly priced at \$4.00 per seat. This will enable people of this county to enjoy at a discount price the play others have already seen and enjoyed.

"Tyler County night" was an original idea presented to the Chamber of Commerce at their regular noon meeting in the Woodville Inn on Monday, July 28.

Tickets will be available at Jarrott's Pharmacy, the Magnolia Groceries, the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, Griffin Pharmacy and the Tyler County Booster.

The amphitheatre, especially designed for the presentation of this play which tells of the Alabama-Coushatta acquisition of the land they presently inhabit, is a living stage. The buildings are permanent and the stage area is landscaped with plants and shrubs which will grow yearly and eventually turn the area into an authentic forest setting.

The Alabama-Coushatta Indians were not a nomadic people, therefore the homes they built were those of a permanent nature, of wood, and their lives revolved about their pursuits of hunting and fishing. The sedentary life style is reflected in the stage setting.

The story, written by Kermit Hunter, dean of the Meadows School of Arts at SMC, tells the story of these Indians during the period of conflict of Texas independence. Hunter is recognized as having more plays produced than any other American playwright. Other of his outdoor dramas include "Trail of Tears", produced in Oklahoma; "Horn in the West", North Carolina; and "Unto These Hills" also in North Carolina.

The outstanding music for this play was composed by Frank Lewin, of the Yale School of Music who has written for television and motion pictures, theatre, opera and concert. Lewin based the musical composition on original tunes to which the Alabama and Coushatta Indians played, danced and worshipped. A combination of 14 different drums are used for the basic coordinating sound. Music is heard through a quadrophonic sound system.

The play begins as the light of day lowers. The setting is simple and serene. To one side stands the ceremonial hut used by the two tribal chiefs. A village of the Indians fills another portion of the stage. The story opens with the Indians going about their daily routines; life for them is care-free and uninhibited. They are presently untouched by the conflict which will soon become a crucial point in their woodland existence. Because of the wisdom and respect from the other Indian tribes living in Texas, both the Texans and the Mexicans are anxious to have the support of the Alabama-Coushatta tri-

### Manpower CETA Programs Will Begin On August 1

Another year of Manpower programs will be starting in the Deep East Texas Region on August 1. These programs are part of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) Program, which is designed to provide training, educational and employment opportunities for disadvantaged, unemployed and/or underemployed persons in the 12-county region. The programs are operated through the Deep East Texas Council of Governments.

The CETA Act itself was written in 1973, and has programs aimed at helping to ease the problem caused by the two types of unemployment most noticeable today. One of the two types of unemployment has made the headlines recently, and is known as cyclical unemployment. This type of unemployment involves the job market when inflation and spiraling costs become such that skilled workers are released or laid off. In other words, the skilled labor is there, but jobs are unavailable. Recent employee cutbacks at factories and lumber mills reflect cyclical unemployment.

The second type of unemployment is known as structural unemployment. These people could be called hard-

Colmesneil ISD announced the hiring of four new teachers for the academic year 1975-76. The Colmesneil school year will begin for students on Friday, August 15. Teachers and administration will have two work days prior to student attendance on August 13 and 14. Colmesneil will observe one holiday during the first six weeks period extending from August 15 - September 26, which will be Labor Day, September 1.

Students will report to classes on Friday, August 15 and teachers will have six weeks training two days preceding the beginning of classes.

Information concerning the Woodville ISD new teachers and opening dates were not available at this publication time.

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### County Benefits From Manpower Program

During the summer there have been 29 boys and girls employed in various capacities about the county. These youths work approximately 40 hours a week and their jobs will end the day before the beginning of school.

They are employed for the county benefit through a Manpower grant by the DETCOG. This federal grant has been enabling some youths to obtain work during the summer for school clothes and other needs for the past five years.

Money that is refused or not spent by the county is returned and passed on to another county or state to use. Therefore it does not cost taxpayers directly, as they will support this program whether they benefit from it or not. The work of these youths has helped the county in several ways.

Part of the employed boys have been working with County Extension Agent, Clinton Currie to construct bleachers at the 4-H FFA rodeo arena. Others have hidden the flat bed trucks on their rounds about the county and policed the solid waste canister sites, making these areas clean and neat and picking up refuse which has been strewn about the side of these containers. Still others have done maintenance work at the Hennigan Little League Ball Park.

Three girls have been working in different offices in the courthouse while employees have been on vacation. For some the summer job has just been a week spent in a replacement capacity but for others the job has been of longer duration.

All those employed are paid \$2.10 per hour and allowed to work a maximum of 40 hours. A maintenance crew, working under the direction of Bruce Conner has been doing work about the city and courthouse. They have painted new parking space lines, trimmed hedges, mowed the courthouse lawn and done other odd jobs.

The program, which usually begins when school is out, was delayed this year when the grant approval did not arrive on time. When the program is for the entire summer, fewer youths are employed and they have shorter work weeks. This year however, due to the delay, more were hired for longer hours in order to use all the grant money without having to return it to the federal government for redistribution.

 core unemployed - they do not possess definite job skills, or perhaps lack the education or experience needed for securing a particular job.

One of the CEPA programs, known as CEPA Title I, focuses on this latter type of unemployment. Title I is geared to give assistance for those who want to enter the job market, but are not job ready. Title I's basic goal is to help these people achieve permanent, unsubsidized employment.

CEPA Title I concentrates on three areas to help clients reach job readiness. These areas are work experience, vocational training and on-the-job training.

Work experience focuses on short-term employment, where a person can get a little bit of experience and earn needed money. Work experience also provides local public entities needed manpower on a short-term basis. During work experience, however, DETCOG manpower coordinators work with each client, trying to determine the client's interests and what training he needs to find and retain long-range employment.

Oftentimes, a lack of training if all that is standing between a client and a prospective job. Here the second part of CEPA Title I - vocational training - becomes important.

Training schools will be set up in the 12-county Deep East Texas region for clients, teaching such skills as welding or auto repair; or clients might be enrolled in existing schools in or out of the region - in such areas as nursing or heavy equipment operation.

Clients selected for vocational training are extensive-

**A Touch Of Grace How's Your LCU?**

Even a minor illness is a luxury most of us cannot afford...the common cold can set you back fifty bucks and any-thing more can result in a lost get for months to come. So naturally I was very interested in an article I read recently that supports to reveal why people get sick. In my very comfortable state of ignorance, I could always blame almost all illness on a virus and feel confident I'd get no argument.

Dr. Thomas H. Holmes, professor of psychiatry at the University of Washington School of Medicine, has been doing quite a bit of research on the subject of illness...especially WHY. Since his field is psychology, it's only reasonable that he would lean to the theory that physical and mental health are uniquely inter-related, anything that disturbs our body can upset our mental stability to some degree.

As a result of all this research, Dr. Holmes determined that change, or rather coping with change, is the key to health. He noted that those who must adapt to a major change or to a great number of minor changes are at a greater risk of becoming ill. It doesn't really matter much whether the change is "good" or "bad," a pleasant experience or a tragedy both make waves.

**GAME BIRD SEASONS SET**

The setting of hunting seasons for a variety of game birds received the attention of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission meeting in Austin.

Primary interest is on the Texas sportsman's dates of the morning dove season for both the North and South Zone of the state.

In the North Zone, morning dove hunting season will be September 1 through October 30. Shooting hours will be from sunset to sunset, daily bag limit is 20 birds and possession limit 20 birds.

The South Zone morning dove season has been split into fall and winter segments. The fall segment runs September 29 through November 2, except in those counties having a white wing dove season where it will be September 29 through October 26.

The winter portion of the South Zone morning dove season will be January 3-18, 1979.

Shooting hours in the South Zone are set at one-half hour before sunrise through sunset, daily bag limit will be 10 birds with the possession limit 20 birds.

Use of special interest areas sportsman is the special interest season set by the Commission last Friday.

The early start duck season will be September 29-28 with shooting hours set at sunrise to sunset. Like last year, the teal bag limit will be four per day with the possession limit eight teal.

In setting the white wing dove season, the Commission was especially generous in allowing for seven half-day hunts.

The increase in the white wing dove season was in response to a sizable increase of the white wing dove population in the Rio Grande Valley.

For the white wing dove season, the Commission has set a daily bag limit of 10 birds and a possession limit of 20 birds. Other game bird seasons set by the Commission include: King and clapper rail, September 1 through November 9, except in the Trans-Pecos where the season ends October 31; daily bag limit is 20 and possession limit is 30; shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

### Joys Of Summer Often Spoiled By Drownings

With the official arrival of summer in Texas comes increased opportunities of fun-time outdoor activities such as swimming and boating - and often tragedy.

Each year in Texas, an alarming number of persons die in swimming and boating accidents. Only automobile accidents claim a larger number of lives in Texas.

Many, if not most, drownings need not happen, according to the Texas Medical Association.

TMA offers the following basic safety rules that will help to avoid a tragic water accident in your family:

- 1) Learn to swim and relax in the water.
- 2) Never swim alone.
- 3) Do not swim when you are tired or when the water is extremely cold.
- 4) Do not overestimate your ability and endurance.
- 5) Swim at protected points or beaches under the supervision of a trained lifeguard.
- 6) If a boat overturns, stay with it and don't try to swim a long distance to shore.
- 7) Never dive into waters of unknown depth.
- 8) Try new activities, such as water skiing or scuba diving, only after learning the skills from qualified instructors.

Since many families will do much of their swimming this summer in private pools, some special safety precautions are indicated:

- 1) Make certain the pool is kept clean and the water chlorinated and purified.
- 2) Walk, don't run, about the pool. Horseplay should be forbidden.
- 3) Fence the pool and keep the gate locked to keep out small children.
- 4) Keep handy rescue equipment, such as long poles and ring buoys.
- 5) Keep bottles and glasses away from the concrete pool deck.

TMA emphasized that good manners and common sense in boating will prevent most accidents. "The rules are well known. Don't overload the boat, have life preservers for each occupant, don't stand up or change seats in a small boat while under way; keep watchful eye out for other boats, swimmers and fishermen. And give all a comfortably wide berth."

### Start Good Budget Habit Early

Even though today's young adults start out with more education in financial matters than previous generations, they can still go overboard when spending money. Mrs. Lillian Chenoweth, family resources management specialist, reminded this week:

"First requirements for trying to avoid debt is a realistic view of actual income available. The lifestyle of young adults should be based on net income, not on how much can be charged. The 'special' results in ending up short of cash with debts piled up, she said.

"The problem the young adult frequently faces is that of being a home. Adding to this problem is the desire to fill the new home with new furniture, new appliances and an endless list of wants - causing an equally long list of bills to pay."

Mrs. Chenoweth pointed out that the lifestyle of young adults in relation to income is a crucial factor in our country.

"Some people feel they should immediately have the standard of living that their parents worked many years to achieve," she noted.
