We received a request last week for a list of how Texas lawmakers in Washington voted on their pay raise passed in the House and Senate recently.

Senator John Tower voted for the raise—a year for Congressmen and Senators, while Senator Lloyd Bentsen voted against the bill.

In the House, Texas voted as follows: For the raise—a year plan, Brooks, Casey, De La Garza, Eckhardt, Gonzalez, Jordan, Mahon, Milford, Patman, Ploche, Roberts, White, Wilson, Wright and Young.

Voicing against the plan were Archer, Burleson, Collins, Hightower, Kaven, Kreuger, Poage and Steelman.

Others who will benefit from the pay raise include Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller, federal judges, cabinet members and high ranking government and military employees.

The bill will provide between \$2,375 and \$3,655 increase in the present \$2,500 annual salaries of lawmakers. The bill provides for an annual cost-of-living increase each October as long as inflation continues. The actual percentage of pay increase will be set by the President at the same level he boosts the salaries of low-level federal workers.

Congress got its last pay raise in 1969 and the cost-of-living has climbed 47.5 percent since then.

School Doors Open

Woodville Public Schools opened for the 1975-76 school year for the first regular day of instruction on Friday, August 15. The high school showed an opening day enrollment of 473, while the Wheat School had 487 students, and Woodville Elementary School had 502 present.

On Monday, August 18, the enrollment registered on all three campuses was as follows: Kirby High School moved from 473 to 496, Wheat School increased from 467 to 521, and Woodville Elementary moved from 502 to 546.

Thus, as of August 18, the total enrollment for Woodville Public Schools was 1,563. There are about 40 students who are expected to enroll this week and which will bring the overall enrollment to slightly over 1,600. This is about the same enrollment experienced by the school in 1974.

Bullock Returns Sales Tax Rebates

Comptroller Bob Bullock issued city sales tax rebates Friday worth \$19.5 million and announced a new plan to give cities their proportionate share of any partial collections from delinquents.

In the past, money from delinquents was applied first to the state's claim and only after that was totally paid off did the city get its money.

"It was wrong for the cities to be playing second fiddle," Bullock said. "In more than 800 cities the five per cent sales tax is a four-and-one split, so that's exactly how we are going to rebate it."

Bullock said he doesn't look for the new plan to bring significantly more money to cities but "it will get them their share a lot faster than when they had to bring the rear."

The City of Austin is one example of an immediate beneficiary of the new plan, Bullock said.

An Austin tire company shut down by Bullock last week owed \$37,102 in state taxes and \$9,936 in Austin's city sales taxes. The business was allowed to reopen after paying \$12,000 cash toward the delinquency and agreeing to pay \$2,000 a month on the balance plus keeping future taxes current.

The City of Austin's \$2.4 million share of that initial \$12,000 payment will be included in Austin's rebate next month and its \$400 share of the \$2,000 monthly payment will be paid every month until the full city liability is paid off.

This month's \$19.5 million in rebates to the cities is significantly higher than the \$11.4 million rebated last month. August is the second month of the three month rebate cycle which includes two months of relatively small rebates followed by a large "clear up" in the third month.

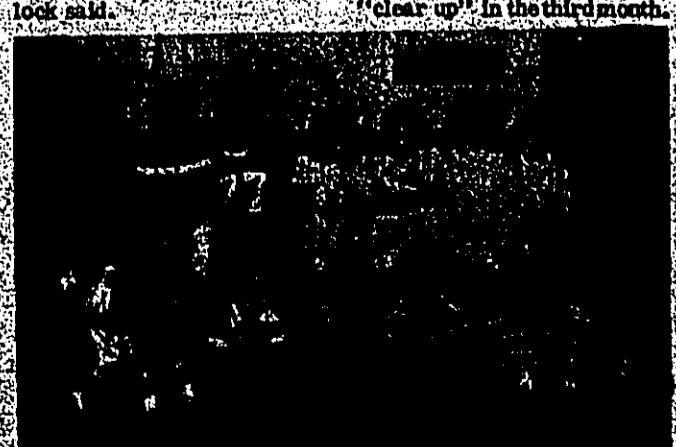

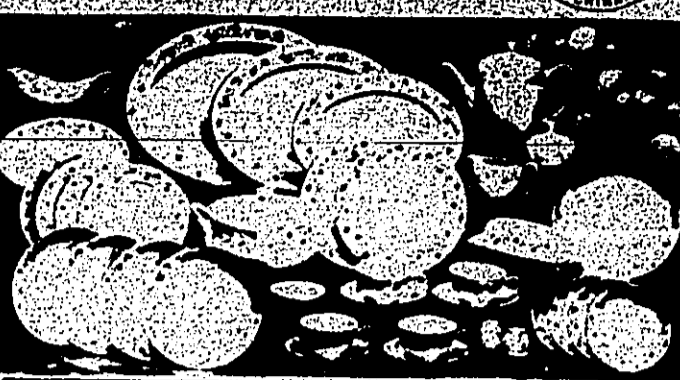
