The United States has plenty of oil, according to an article published in "Petroleum Today" recently. The article says there is an estimated 300 billion barrels of oil in the ground in this country. This amount to two-thirds of the oil that already has been discovered, but not recoverable for economic or technical reasons. If we could get it out of the ground, there would be enough oil, without foreign imports, to last the country another 48 years at the current rate of consumption.

In Wyoming, for example, only one-third of the three original 30 million barrels of oil in place has been produced in the 75 years since the world was discovered. In California production is down to a comparative trickle with only ten percent of the original 300 billion barrels produced.

Engineers are now experimenting with different methods to get the oil out of the ground, but at present, all of the techniques tested have proved too costly. However, with American know-how and ingenuity we may have a chance to become independent of the oil producing countries for our petroleum needs.

Farm Bureau Prexy Asks Moratorium

The president of the Texas Farm Bureau has urged President Ford to call off his moratorium on grain sales to Russia.

Carroll Chaloupka of Dalhart said the ban on grain sales is a serious blow to agriculture. Extension of the

moratorium until mid-October was announced by the President following a meeting with George Meany, head of the AFL-CIO.

"Farmers resent being used as pawns in a political chess game," the grain and livestock farmer said. "When agricultural markets are involved, we feel you should consult farmers, not the AFL-CIO. Labor union leaders do not feed this nation -- farmers and ranchers do."

Rockland Reunion

September 21st is the date set for the Rockland Community Homecoming. It will be held in the Rockland Baptist Church.

This Baptist church was first established in the late 1800's and Rev. Sam Mann preached the first sermon in this church.

At one time, Rockland was a busy town supported mainly by the Cameron Mill Company. It had doctors, two hotels, a commissary, meat market, a combination dry goods and grocery store and saloon.

The town was named Rockland by Mr. Colsenell who operated the first train over the railroad when it was laid from Beaumont to the Neches River. He called it Rockland because of the huge rocks in the area.

The first business was the saloon, owned and operated by Mac Dunkin.

Dianey and Carroll built a saw mill in Rockland and when it went broke, Mr. Hal Aldridge took it over and built a hotel in the town. The huge hotel he built remains today. In 1893, Cameron and Company Lumber Co. bought the mill and the town enjoyed a real expansion. His building programs included office buildings which remain, another hotel and dwelling places for his workers. Between 1900 and

150 "sawmill" houses were built to shelter his many employees.

The Cameron Company closed their mill and the town became another ghost town of our East Texas lumber history.

The residents there ask that anyone who traces his history back to Rockland, or who has friends there, to attend and

bring a basket lunch. The day's program includes the church services that morning, dinner on the grounds, and then singing and fellowship in the afternoon.

Make your plans now to attend. The day promises to be worth the effort and a trip into the past.

County To Reflect 23.98% Tax Rate Increase

Tyler County Commissioners have approved what amounts to a 23.98 percent tax increase over last year's tax structure. The new county tax is based on 28 percent of market value up from 20 percent in 1974, according to Earl King, county auditor.

King pointed out at the same time that the county tax rate for 1974 was \$1.49 and that the tax rate for 1975 has been reduced to \$1.40 per hundred dollar valuation. This action

by the Commissioners amounts to a net tax dollar increase for the county of 23.98 percent, he said. The tax determining body for the county is made up of the entire Commissioners Court which acts as the formal equalization board in setting tax values and ratios.

The commissioners cited recent inflationary trends as justification for the increase King said.

Decisions to implement the new tax were reached at a regular meeting of the county commissioners which was held on Monday, Sept. 8.

According to the county auditor's office, a \$10,000 home valued on the county tax roll based on a 20 percent assessed ratio would result in a \$2,000 assessed valuation. This multiplied times \$1.49, the 1974 county tax rate, would result in net county taxes of \$29.80 on the \$10,000 property.

In 1975, the same \$10,000 property valued on the county tax roll multiplied by the 28 percent assessed valuation. This, when multiplied by the reduced rate of \$1.40, results in a \$39.20 1975 county tax.

In computing the 1975 tax impact to the residents of Tyler County who own a \$10,000 home, the \$39.20 tax figure less the \$29.80 tax statistic for 1974 amounts to a \$9.40 tax increase, or an overall 23.98 percent upward adjustment in county tax considerations over last year. (cont. on page 2)

No Fatal Accidents Reported In August

Sergeant C.L. Taylor of the Texas Highway Patrol announced today that during the month of August 1975, in Tyler County, there was 0 Rural Fatal Accidents in which 0 persons were killed. In addition, The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 15 rural motor vehicle accidents in which 5 persons were injured.

During the same eight month period in 1974, there were 109 rural traffic accidents killing 5 and injuring 40 persons. During the month of August in the 16 counties, comprising District 2B, The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 490 Rural Accidents, killing 10 persons and injuring 202 people.

Home Buyers Get Tax Relief

Consumers expecting a tax credit for buying a new house should check with the Internal Revenue Service first. To be sure they take full advantage of the new law, they should consult with a tax expert.

The Tax Reduction Act of 1975 does include a section on the purchase price of a new home. The purchase price can't exceed an adjusted base of \$40,000 for a maximum credit of \$2,000.

"This law's deduction or adjustment to gross income is simply a credit against federal tax liability," she explained.

"But not every new home or new home buyer qualifies," she cautioned.

Miss Belgeberg is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas AGM University System.

Specific criteria for buyers of new homes include:

- The new dwelling must be a principal residence, not a second or vacation home. It may be a single family house or a unit in a condominium or co-op, or a mobile home.
- Construction must have begun before March 26, 1975.
- The taxpayer must occupy the house for one year between March 12, 1975 and January 1, 1977.
- Certification from the seller must be attached to the buyer's IRS tax return stating the purchase price was established.

The taxpayer-purchaser must be the original owner. Purchasing the home from a relative may result in ineligibility for tax credit.

"Maximum credit allowed under this bill is \$2,000. Married people filing separate returns can receive up to \$1,000 each."

"Also, if a buyer has unrecognized capital gains, the money he made over the original cost of a previously owned house, not including any improvements he made—this reduces his tax credit," she explained.

She reminded consumers to keep up to date on possible modifications of the bill by checking with the Internal Revenue Service.

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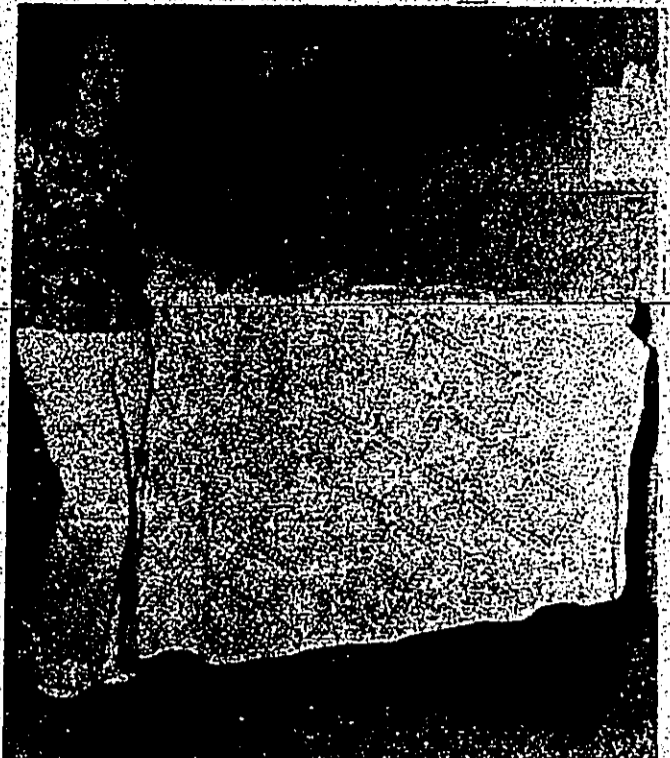
