Grant Money Up For State Bicen Plans

The American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) has made available an additional \$40,000 per state in matching grant money for support of Bicentennial projects and programs around the nation. Totaling \$2.2 million, the money comes from net revenues from the sale of Bicentennial medals and the ARBA's commemorative license-

ing program. This is the first matching grant program for fiscal year 1976. However, it is the third increment of \$40,000 in non-appropriated money that has been provided each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Guam and the Virgin Islands.

In announcing the grants, John W. Warner, Administrator of the ARBA, stressed "the need to include programs and projects focusing on the contributions of women, youth, ethnic, racial and Native American groups. "While many states are showing good progress in these areas," he said, "from a national perspective some imbalances still exist. We are asking the State Commission to use these funds with special emphasis on correcting these imbalances."

The grants were authorized by the American Revolution Bicentennial Policy Board at a recent meeting.

As in the past, all money will be awarded through State Bicentennial Commissions which will also monitor the grants. Projects to be supported may be conducted directly by the state, commissions or by state or local government agencies or non-profit organizations.

Project sponsors must apply to the state Commissions for the grant money, and projects must be officially endorsed or recognized by the Commissions to be eligible. Determination of eligibility is primarily within the discretion of state Commissions.

ARBA will allow in-kind contributions to be used for up to one-half of the matching requirement to promote the widest possible participation in the Bicentennial. In-kind refers to contributed labor, administrative support and the like and can be particularly important to the groups singled out by Mr. Warner who may not have a great deal of financial resources.

Public Law 93-179 established the period of official Bicentennial commemoration between March 1975 and December 31, 1976, and all projects funded must bear a direct relation, but not confined, to this period.

Applications for grants under the newly announced program must be received by the ARBA by December 31, 1975.

To date, over 1,100 Bicentennial projects and programs have received financial assistance through ARBA's non-appropriated fund activity.

Adams Appointed

State Rep. Herman Adams of Silsbee announced today that he has been appointed Senatorial District 3 Coordinator for promotion of the proposed new state constitution. The appointment was made by Citizens for the Texas Constitution, an organization composed of citizens advocating the acceptance of the new state charter that Texans will be voting on Nov. 4.

Rep. Adams said, "I feel that the new constitution is an improvement over the old one. It deletes unnecessary language while basically maintaining our current structure of government in Texas."

Rep. Adams joins a list of distinguished Texans supporting the new constitution including Lt. Gov. William Hobby, Attorney General John Hill, Speaker Bill Clayton, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Joe Greenhill, former Gov. Price Daniel, former Chief Justice Rolih, Calvert, and other state officials and legislators. Among the many organizations supporting the document are the League of Women Voters, the Junior Bar Association, the American Association of University Women and the Texas League of Municipalities. The Texas Bar Association is strongly supporting the Judiciary Article.

Rep. Adams stressed the need for citizens to get out Nov. 4 and vote. "This is one of the most important governmental decisions that Texans have faced in the last one hundred years and I hope that all Texans will prepare themselves for this vote," he said. If any civic group would be interested in acquiring a speaker on this subject or if anyone would like to become involved in the campaign to attain additional information on the proposed document, Rep. Briscoe OK's Grant For Angelina County

Governor Dolph Briscoe today announced his approval of a \$10,013 grant to Angelina County for a prosecutorial assistance project for the 1976 Judicial District.

The money comes from the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office. CJD administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Bill of 1972.

The grant will provide an assistant district attorney and additional equipment for the 1976 Judicial District.

Anticipated results of the project include initiation of a screening process to weed out non-meritorious cases and reduction of backlog of pending cases.

The Angelina County award was among 38, for a total of \$2,682,210, which Governor Briscoe approved today for reducing crimes in Texas.

Petticoat Politics

Last week Petticoat Politics was about seeing a performance of the musical "Petticoat" in the Eisenhower Theatre at the Kennedy Center.

I thought that a follow-up on the Kennedy Center, before coming to our nation's capital city, I had not fully understood what the center was all about. Not only is it beautiful and breathtaking, the Kennedy Center belongs to all Americans. During the daytime it is pleasant just to walk around the grounds which overlook the winding Potomac River. And at night, the finest view of Washington is from its rooftop balcony.

President Eisenhower signed legislation authorizing the national cultural center in September, 1958. And in 1961, the Kennedy Center was officially named the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

The center, opened its doors to the American public.

Funds came from private citizens, foundations, more than 500 large and industrial firms. Their names are for visitors to see inscribed on the marble walls of the entrance hall. The federal contribution was in the form of a grant to match private funds.

Complete with underground parking garages and modern restrooms, it's almost like a city on five different levels. The noted architect, Edward Durrill Stone, designed the center to be monumental and imposing.

The mammoth hallways lead to the Grand Foyer. In the Hall of Nations, hanging from the ceiling are the flags from the 100 or more countries that are recognized by the United States. In the Hall of States, flags from each state and territory hang. But as my husband always points out, the blue of the Texas flag is the wrong shade.

The Grand Foyer, one of the largest rooms in the world, runs the full length of the building and is the lobby for the three theatres. Central is the large bronze bust of John Kennedy.

Seating 1,100, the Eisenhower Theatre was named in honor of both President and Mrs. Eisenhower.

The Opera House opened this week, will be the first premiere of Leonard Bernstein's "Mass." This month "A Raisin in the Sun" returns with "Tremolana," an opera written by Scott Joplin. Opening this week will be Hal Holbrook's "Mark Twain Tonight," followed by the American Ballet Theatre.

Seating 2,750 the Concert Hall will be filled with lovers of Bayou as the Center presents the Hayden Festival of a Lifetime.

The American Film Institute shows older films such as "The Birth of a Nation." Also, held the world premiere for "Give 'Em Hell, Harry!"

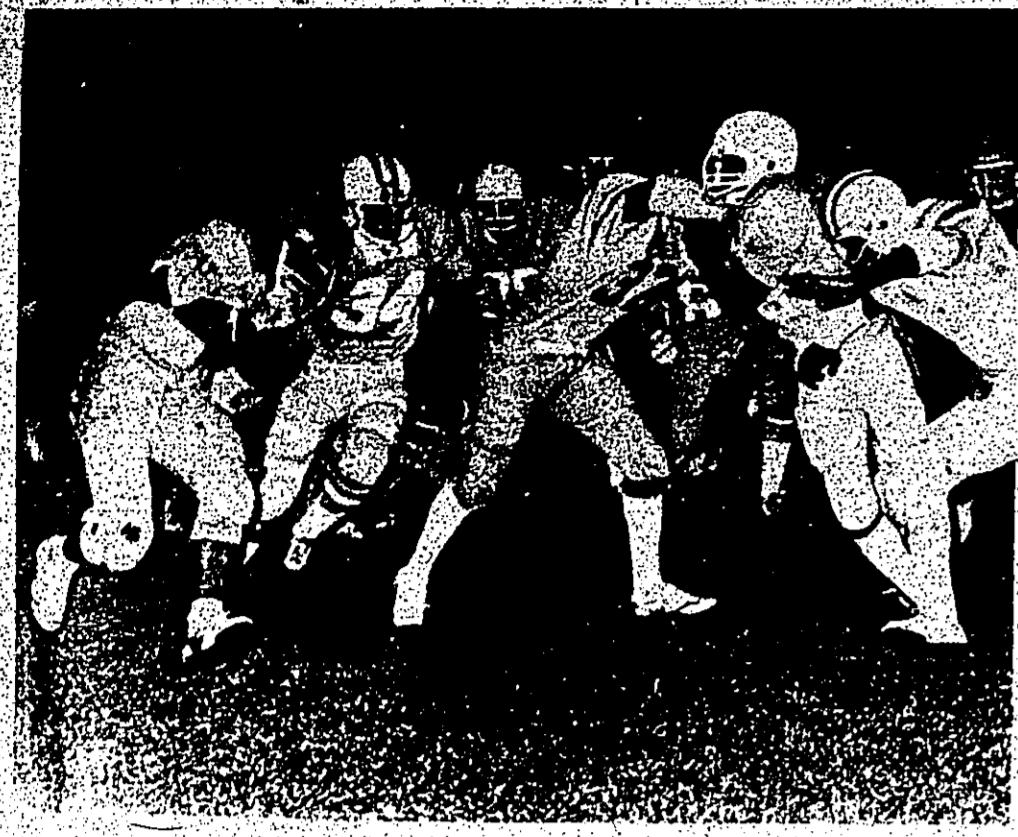
