Thicket Craft Fair Is This Weekend

Stained glass lamp shades, turquoise jewelry, oil paintings and handmade wooden toys are some of the items that will be featured at the first annual Tyler County Big Thicket Craft Fair, Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 25-26 from 9-4 p.m.

Many dealers, shop owners and individuals will be bringing items to sell during the two day fair at the Woodville airport rodeo arena. Buyers, buyers and sellers will enjoy the covered booth area provided.

Attracting many will be a blown glass display while others may delight in the White Elephant goods in another booth. Concession stands and those with a variety of home baked goods will also be at the fair.

One dealer will be bringing a large selection of ceramic pots while a Garden Club group will have a multitude of plants for sale. Imported beads, strung or loose, in many sizes and colors will be sold at another booth along with hand fashioned hickory wood ornaments designed and decorated by the artist.

Several craft shops will have items from the stores. Handmade and designed leaded glass articles, especially the "Tiffany" glass lamp shades will also be for sale. Those interested in jewelry will find genuine turquoise and coral jewelry in a

variety of styles and prices. Turquoise jewelry from New Mexico and Arizona fashioned by Navajo, Hopi, and Zuni Indians will be displayed. Polished gemstones and cut rocks in an astounding variety of colors and sizes will be at the Fair in another booth.

Wooden trains, trucks and cars, all fashioned by hand will be sold by a Woodville artisan. These are made in several different woods and offer an ingenious, unbreakable toy.

For children there will be a multitude of games to entertain them - sand painting, a fortune teller, skill displays of still walking, make-up selections and fence painting. They may also have their silhouettes drawn or play guessing games. Other supervised games are being planned by the Children's entertainment committee, Mrs. Nancy Phillips, chairman.

On Sunday only, the 1923 Moon automobile, built for and owned by the baseball hero Babe Ruth, will be at the fair.

Tourist Minitrain Derails With 50 Students Aboard

At Indian Reservation

A minitrain carrying some 50 students from a DeRidder, La., sophomore class, derailed at approximately 11 a.m. at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation, Wednesday, Oct. 15, as the air brakes on the train apparently malfunctioned on a gradual incline as the train picked up speed heading toward a curve.

According to hospital reports only two students were kept overnight for observation. One student, who had been pinned under one of the cars, sustained abdominal injuries while the other sustained multiple facial lacerations.

According to hospital officials 50 students were sent home by 6 p.m. Wednesday evening.

According to reservation officials a representative of the Chance Mgr. Co. of Kansas City, Mo., was sent immediately and arrived within 24 hours to inspect the brake system malfunction.

According to Roland Poncho, Publicity Relations Director for the reservation, officials had expressed concern about the braking system sometime earlier and had requested that it be changed for a newer system which was then installed.

Poncho said that most of the injuries occurred to students who were riding in the first two cars. Neither the driver, Hobby Williams Sr., or his assistant Lowell Sylestine were injured as a result of the train wreck.

The train has successfully completed some 37,000 injury-free trips on the line and a half track. "Even though that's a good record, we're

not excited about it" Poncho said.

Poncho wouldn't predict when the train would be back in operation, saying "Whatever time it takes to satisfy the safety experts to make absolutely sure this doesn't happen again," he said.

"All other activities and rides at the reservation remain open," Poncho emphasized.

The Woodville Red Cross had volunteered to assist according to Mrs. Vick Warfield, local Red Cross volunteer.

"We called to see if we could be of any assistance as soon as we learned of the incident," she said.

The reservation has two qualified nurses on call and they accompanied the injured students to the Tyler County Hospital where all the students were examined, with only the two remaining overnight, one being transferred on to Ft. Polk the next day for further observation. Reservations ambulances were used to transport the severely injured private conveyance was

Bureau Convention Held

The Tyler County Farm Bureau held its 4th Annual Convention Saturday, Oct. 16, at the Lions Den in Woodville, with Bud Byram, president, conducting the meeting.

"Special guests and speakers for the evening" were Phyllis Spurlock, who was valedictorian for the Texas Farm Bureau's Citizenship Seminar this past summer, and Missy Grillo, who also attended. Phyllis spoke on the "Optimism of Youth to our great country." Missy gave highlights of the week the girls spent there.

The Tyler County 4-H Gold Star boy and girl were introduced, they are Joe Jordan Jr. of Spuriger, who has had projects in Pasture, Poultry, and horse, and Denise Stanford, who has had projects in Home, Environment, Clothing and Foods and Nutrition. Denise represented Tyler County this year at the State 4-H Roundup in June.

Henry Burton, District director of District 9, told the group of the new problem in the Brucellosis Program. He read excerpts from a letter to the Texas Animal Health Commission, which stated: "That since Texas is not following the Guidelines of the Federal Program, funds will be stopped as of January 1, 1976."

The Federal program is funding Texas several million dollars for this and when it is stopped Texas will really have a problem and the animals might possibly be stopped from moving out of Texas and we ship a great many cattle. Burton urged all of Tyler County's voting delegates to attend the State Convention Nov. 30, thru Dec. 3 in San Antonio, where the State policy on this will be made. Tyler County will have 4 votes at the convention.

Byram gave a summary of the progress of the Farm Bureau this year which included a review of the new Bureau newsletter which was sent to all Farm Bureau members in the county. Two quarterly meetings held thus far have dealt with two major subjects: policy development and the Queens' Contest. Miss Kathy Barnes is the current Bureau Queen.

Alvin Duriam told of the two policies that were to be covered from Tyler County's view. Mainly, he said, the land use planning bills that have been promoted in the State and National Houses. The ever present "Fire Ant problem" that is hurting this area and spreading to other states, and the only essential thing is to eradicate this. It was taken off the market because of its destruction of other plants and animal life.

Membership Chairman, Ruth Stanford, told of 148 new members, the Bureau enrolled this year, and the 189 renewals of the 199 membership of last year, to give Tyler County 331 members as of Oct. 17, 1976.

Larry Treat Insurance Agent reported the Bureau Agency had sold three-quarter of a million dollars of life insurance since Jan. 1, 1975 and had written 300 policies of Auto and Fire insurance. He asked if there was anyone interested in having a program on Estate planning, and

he would get someone from the State Insurance Co. to come in and help those who were interested.

Bennie Stanford, Nominating Committee chairman, placed the names of Paul Pickard of Warren, Loy Corner of Chester, and Marvin Ivy of Hillister, up for election to the Board of Directors to fill the places vacated by outgoing members, Toby Spurlock, Ben Worthy, Jerry Grimes and J.C. Clark Jr. These men were elected by the Convention, which leaves one place to be filled by the Board. Members left on the Board are: Bud

Byram, Lloyd Fortenberry and J.C. Powell.

Ellis Davis, chairman of the Heritage Dept. of the Tyler County Bicentennial program told of the needs of her group for monies to be used to repair the tax rolls of Tyler County from 1846 to 1910, which have been micro filmed by the state and then to be destroyed, she said she has saved the originals which have to be put on pages and then bound so they can be kept for our use here in Tyler County.

Assistance to armed forces personnel includes counseling with personal and family problems; help with emergency and convalescent leave; reporting on family conditions and communications; recreation for hospital patients; and emergency financial assistance.

Mrs. Warfield said that locally, assistance to servicemen, veterans and their families included personal counseling of family problems, emergency leave due to illness in the serviceman's family, as well as communications between service men overseas and their loved ones in Woodville.

Sergeant Cecil Taylor of the Texas Highway Patrol announced today that during the month of September 1975, in Tyler County, there was 1 Rural Fatal Accident in which 2 persons were killed. In addition, The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 rural motor vehicle accidents in which 14 persons were injured.

Through September of this year, there have been 13 rural accidents in Tyler County, killing 9 persons and injuring 79 people.

During the same nine month period, in 1974, there were 127 rural traffic accidents killing 5 and injuring 46 persons.

Make Hunting Preparations Early For Safe Trip Safe

With the approach of fall hunting season, Texas sportsmen should begin making preparations for their trips ahead.

"This not only means marking hunting dates on a calendar and gathering equipment, but getting the gear and 'deak chack' physically ready for the hunting adventures ahead," says a wildlife specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Firearms which have been stored since the last hunting season should be cleaned and checked. In fact, stored guns should be checked every month or so for signs of rust or discoloration, particularly if they are kept where temperature and humidity conditions are variable. Special attention should be given to cleaning the bore and making sure the action works smoothly, emphasizes Dr. J. J. Shuler, who is located at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Uvalde.

He also advocates carefully cleaning the rifle and handgun. "Even if the hunter has been hunting, the gun should be cleaned as often as the last firing. It is a good policy to double check. This will not prevent disappointment over a missed shot but will also get the shooter used to the feel of his weapon again."

Center-fire rifles should be checked by using the bullet weights and powder charges which the hunter expects to use in the field. Sighting distances are determined by the type of game to be hunted and the terrain where the hunt takes place. As a rule of thumb, shot groupings from 50, 100 and 200 yards will give the hunter for most situations, notes Shuler.

"The good hunter does not fire one or two rounds and decide that he and his rifle are ready to go. The expense of firing a box or two of ammunition while sighting a rifle is less than the expense of firing a box or two of ammunition while sighting a rifle in the field. The confidence the hunter will gain in his weapon and his shooting ability."

Handgun bullets should also spend some time "burning powder" on the range before taking to the field. "When speaking, handguns should be sighted in for distances up to 60 yards. It takes a dedicated pistol shot to be consistently accurate at greater distances. Remember, gun safety is a critical importance with all firearms but especially so with handguns," cautions Shuler.

For shotgun enthusiasts, Shuler advises a double trap or skeet shooting, "patterning" the shotgun. This is accomplished by firing at large sheets of paper or cardboard at distances of 15, 25 and 35 yards. The dropping of pellets holes on the paper lets the hunter know his weapon performs at those distances with whatever load he is using.

Another good plan with double barrel, slide-action and semi-automatic shotguns is to fire more than one round to get used to getting off a second or even third shot. Shunt points out.

Archers should be getting ready to hunt by carefully checking their equipment, sharpening broadheads and practicing with aluminum field targets. These targets, especially those which are life size, get the archer accustomed to firing at "vital spots" rather than just "at the deer."

"Most hunters carry some type of a cutting tool for their hunt axes or bone saws should be sharpened and sharpened. A dull knife in the field is not only frustrating but also a dangerous than a properly honed one," notes the wildlife specialist.

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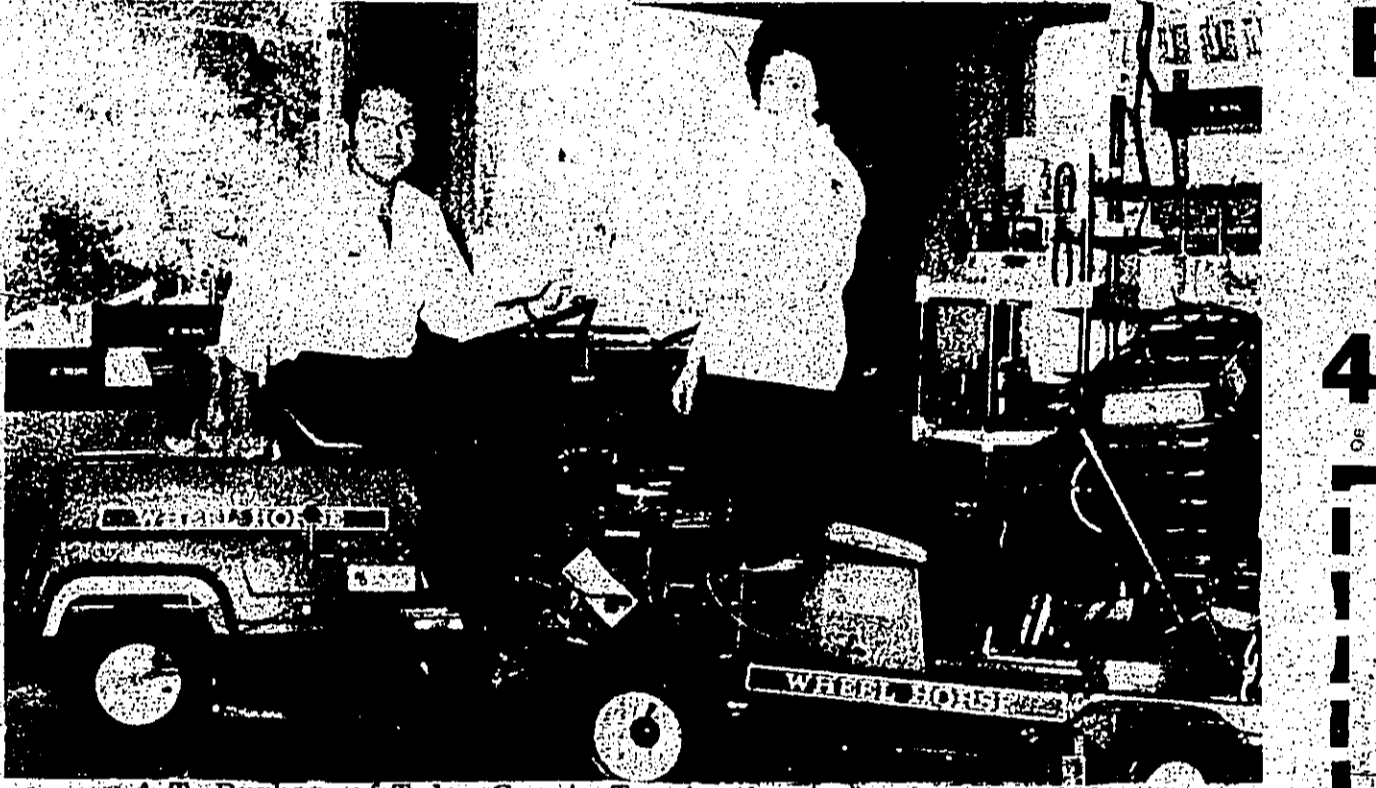
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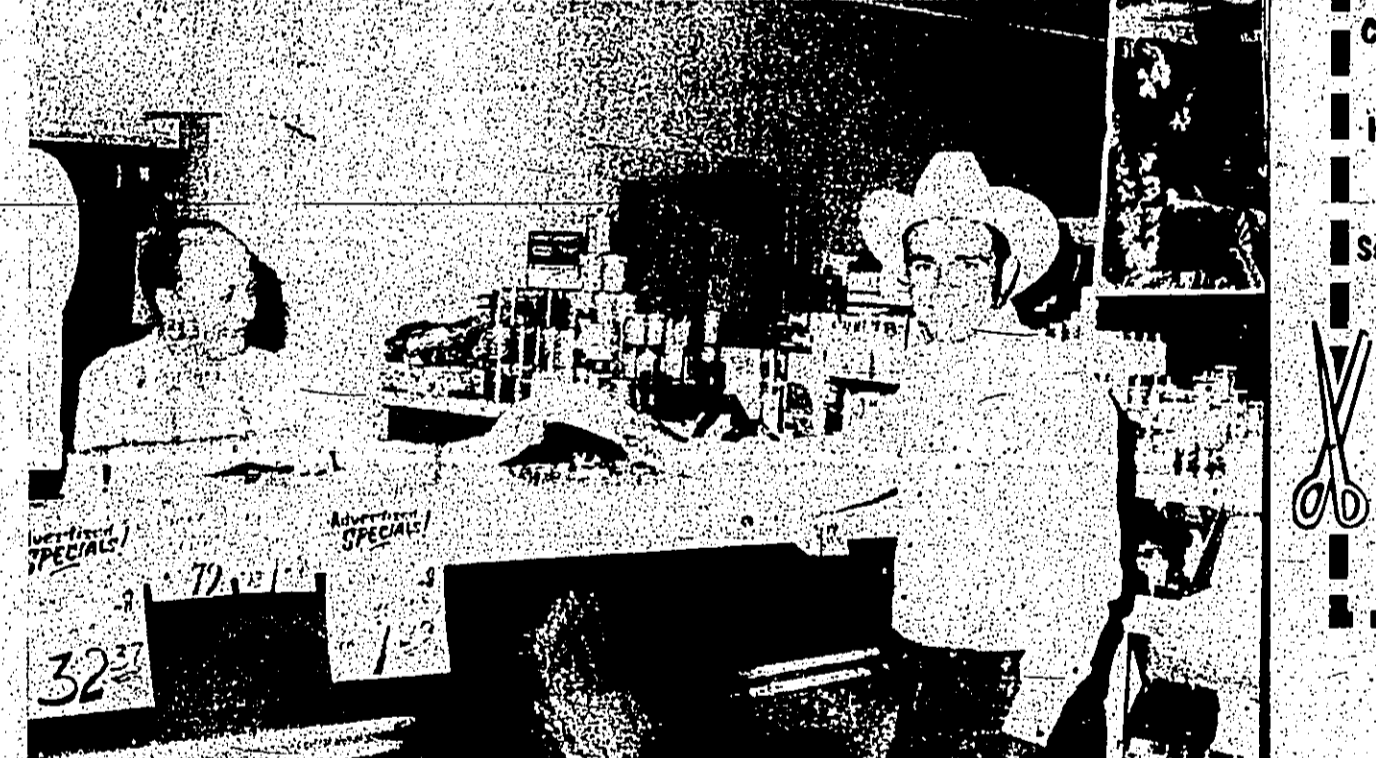
