Keep Halloween Enjoyable This Year

Halloween is just around the corner, and the Texas Safety Association reminds you that it won't be long 'til the little ghosts and goblins celebrate their big night this Friday, Oct. 31. But for many children—and adults—have found the fun to be short-lived because of carelessness or lack of awareness. TSA offers this bit of advice for a happier Halloween.

The Great Pumpkin can prove a greater disaster if you're not careful. If you use nature's product, the pumpkin, always instruct children to carve away from—not toward—their faces as they create Jack-O-Lanterns. As far as

lighting the will-o-the-wisp is concerned, never use a candle in a plastic or cardboard pumpkin. In fact, a flashlight or other battery-operated light is even best for the natural pumpkin—it glows just as well, and is much less a fire hazard.

Don't costume you little trick or treaters in flammable outfits. The use of crepe paper is an invitation to trouble, and probably won't survive a walk around the block even if it doesn't catch fire from a candle-powered Jack-O-Lantern. Choose costumes that do not restrict movement, and eliminate masks that ob-

struct the child's vision. Accompany the small-try when they go a haunting? Even if you must stay near the street or hide behind a tree, they'll be safer from traffic and the possible sadist who would trick instead of treat the youngsters.

Beware of any suspicious treats. Instruct your youngsters to refrain from eating anything until they have arrived home where careful inspection under the lights can expose razor blades, glass, or other booby traps not so easily detected in the dark. Watch for unwrapped or tainted candy, fruit, etc. The sick-

at could be carried away—garbage cans, lawn furniture and ornaments—should be put away, too. Prevention of vandalism is far better than trying to cure it after it happens.

If you're in your auto, slow down and watch for the wee Halloweeners. They may be having to o much fun to watch for you—so don't spoil it for them or yourself.

Texas Safety Association doesn't want Texans to be "scared" of Halloween. The celebration should be fun for everyone—and it can be, if everyone does his part to keep this happy night from turning into a nightmare!

Cancer Crusade Begins Nov. 3

The Tyler County contingent of the American Cancer Society will be ringing residential doorbells next week in all-out effort to come up with \$3,600, designated as this

years goal for the local county organization. According to Local Board President Lawrence Rainey who has five years of service under his belt and who is currently serving his second year as president, "I want them to find a cure for cancer in my lifetime. Cancer frightens me," he added.

"A nickel out of every dollar goes to administration of the Cancer fund. Activities. The rest goes to research, rehabilitation and service."

"A particularly unique way of donating to our cause," said Rainey "is through our Mem-

orial Fund. It's a way of marking the past and providing for the future of cancer research. It's kind of like sending flowers," he said, "with a lot more thought."

"If we can make just one person conscious enough to prevent one case of cancer then we'll consider the drive worthwhile," Rainey stated. The group offers a highly sophisticated educational program through literature which is available through the canvassers.

Crusader Co-chairman for the drive include Mrs. Jim Collins, Mrs. Virginia O'Quinn and Mrs. Vera Bradley. "These women represent the whole of Tyler County," Rainey said. "We also have Captains in every community throughout the county who will be calling on residents of their area."

Rainey himself will be calling on the business community of Woodville for contributions.

Special events, memorial donations and the crusade itself will all count toward the \$3,600 goal. Last year's goal of \$2,200 was exceeded by a whopping \$3,400 in 1974.

The County Board is made up of some 15 persons.

Discharge Permits Sought

International Paper Company's Southern Kraft Division of Nacogdoches and Temple-Eastex, Inc. of Diboll will be asking for permit amendments for the discharge of treated industrial wastewater effluent at a Texas Water Quality Board public hearing to be held October 30th at 10 a.m. in the City of Lufkin City Hall Council Chamber. New permit requests are being made for a water treatment plant and subdivision sewage treatment facility.

Temple-Eastex, Inc. is applying for permission to discharge an average flow per day of 477,000 gallons of wastewater effluent consisting of waste from a wood products manufacturing complex located approximately a quarter of a mile west of U.S. Highway 59 in Diboll. The wastewater will be released into several creeks which flow into Caddo Creek and the Neches River.

The Southern Kraft Division of International Paper Company, operating a plywood lumber mill in the City of Nacogdoches, is asking for a permit change to allow a discharge of an average flow of 22,000 gallons per day of runoff water from log sprinkling. The treated effluent will go into a drainage ditch, and then Bayou LaNana and the Angelina River.

Authorization will be sought to discharge wastes from the Fuller Springs Water Supply District water treatment plant to be located three miles southeast of Loop 287 around Lufkin in Angelina County, and the waste water will be released into Blood Creek and the Neches River. Application to discharge treated domestic sewage effluent from a proposed Thousand Oaks Subdivision treatment plant to be located one mile northwest of Lufkin is being made by R. H. Duncan Builders of Luf-

kin. Discharge will be to Jack Creek and the Neches River. The existing portion of Thousand Oaks Subdivision consists of 53 acres of land divided into 86 lots which is about 80 percent developed, and sewer service has been provided by the City of Lufkin. However, an ordinance has been passed prohibiting the city from providing any

To \$2 Utility Bills Increased

The City of Woodville's utility bills which will be mailed out Thursday Oct. 30, will reflect an increase in garbage and sewer rates also, according to city manager Walt Davis.

Davis said the sewer rate will increase 75 cents from \$1.25 to \$2 for all users in the city.

Garbage rates were raised 50 cents from \$1.50 to \$2, Davis said, with some commercial rates computed on a higher basis according to individual commercial pick-up requirements.

Davis indicated the rate increase was necessary due to the city for gasoline, truck repairs and electricity.

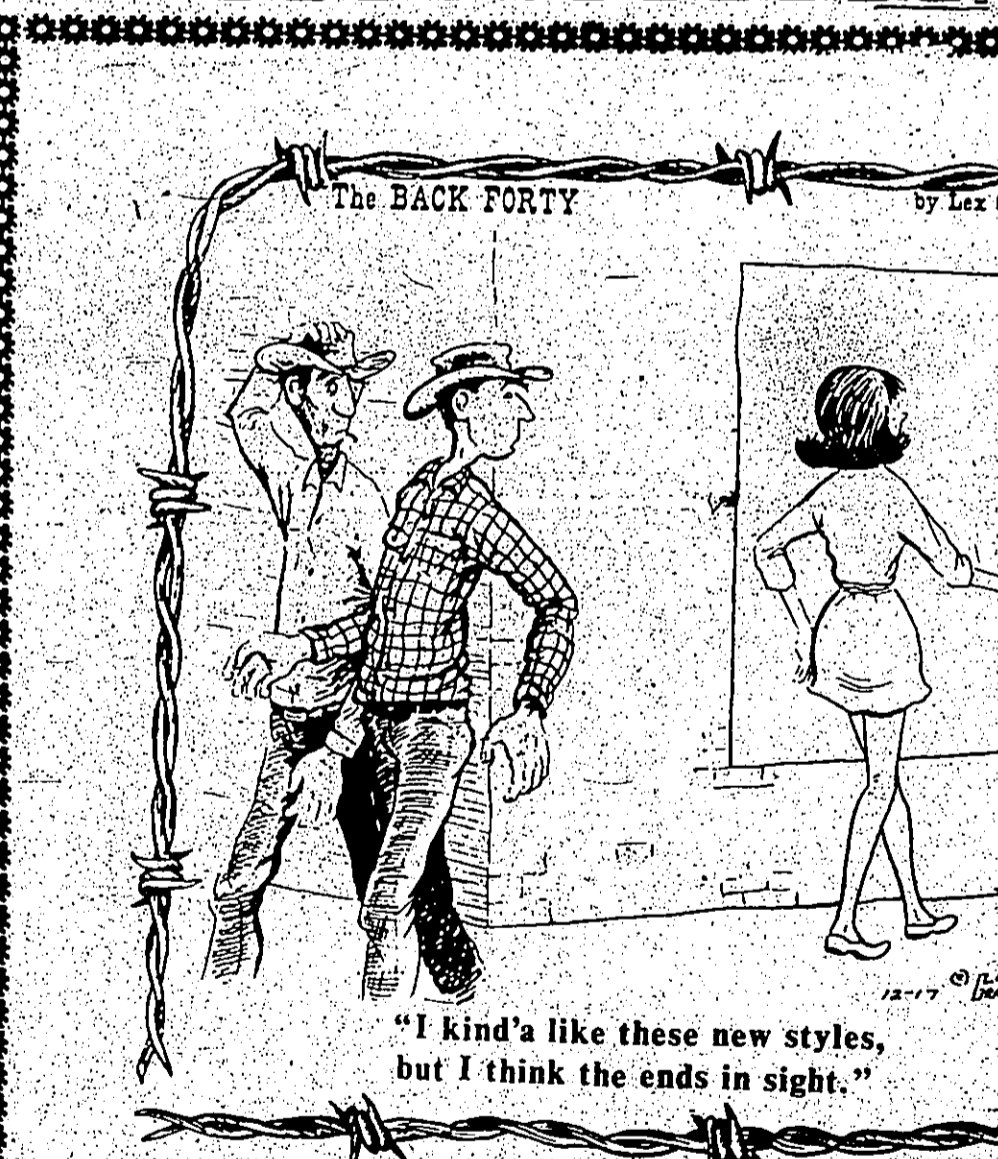


After Dinner Players Return

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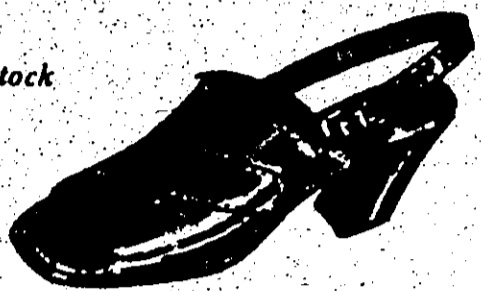
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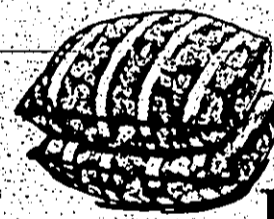
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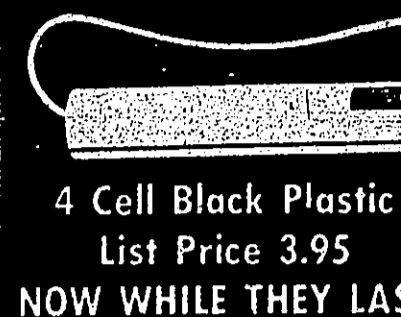
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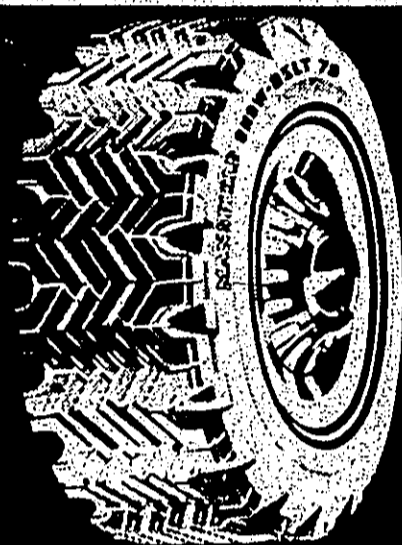


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Bullock Seeks 'Plain English'

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that Texans are entitled to know the possible effects of taxing real property at true market value as required by the finance article of the proposed constitution. "The bankers of the constitution keep telling us that taxing on a basis of true market value is a good thing--and it is--but property owners have a right to know what this means in plain English," Bullock said.

"What would this re-evaluation mean to the average property owner? It means that on a statewide average their houses and lots could increase more than 60 per cent on the tax rolls," he said.

"It would then be up to local taxing authorities, such as our cities, counties and school districts, to reduce their tax rates and/or assessment ratios or property taxes would go skyhigh."

Bullock pointed out that "in the 10 years between 1963 and 1973 local government spending and local property tax bites both more than doubled." He cited Texas Research League statistics showing that local property taxes were increased more than \$1 billion during that period.

"The required re-evaluation could add \$75 billion to the \$125 billion in property values now 'claimed' on the tax rolls. That's a 60 per cent increase any way you cut it, and at today's tax rates that would be approximately \$750 million in new property taxes each year," he said.

"I think most homeowners believe that all real property should be taxed in an equal and uniform manner. However, it's been my experience that they are referring to the other fellow's property because they believe theirs is already valued and over taxed," Bullock said.

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Medical Program Discussed

A program which would provide emergency military air transport services to victims of critical illnesses or accidents in the Deep East Texas Region was the main topic of discussion at the monthly Executive Committee meeting of the Deep East Texas Council of Governments, held Oct. 23 in Livingston.

DETCOG Executive Committee members met at Livingston City Hall at 3 p.m. with DETCOG 2nd Vice President Carl Fairchild of Chester presiding. Livingston Mayor Joe Pedigo gave the welcome.

The emergency air transport program is known as M.A.S.T., or Military Assistance to Safety and Traffic, and such a program is planned to get underway in January, 1976 and will involve much of the Deep East Texas Region, the metropolitan area of Beaumont-Port Arthur-Orange and a large section of Louisiana. M.A.S.T. provides such air transport via helicopter, and the service would be provided through the 36th Medical Detachment based at Ft. Polk, Louisiana. Captain Richard Beauchemin of the medical detachment attended the meeting and made a presentation on the M.A.S.T. program.

Captain Beauchemin stated that the helicopter service would be used only in cases of emergency, such as a critical accident where limited or no ambulance service was available, or in cases where time was a critical factor. In these cases, military helicopters would fly civilian patients to receiving hospital within the area where treatment would be available. Receiving hospitals are those hospitals equipped to handle such emergency cases. The service will be provided at a cost to the civilian patients. M.A.S.T. was begun in 1973 through a pilot program begun at Ft. Sam Houston in San Antonio. There are now 3 M.A.S.T. programs operating throughout the nation, and the Ft. Polk M.A.S.T. area will be the 23rd such area designated. The helicopters used in M.A.S.T. will operate within a 100 nautical mile radius of Ft. Polk, and will be on 24-hour stand-by, 7 days a week, 52 weeks a year.

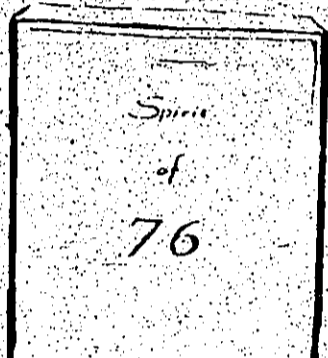
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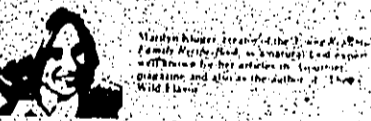
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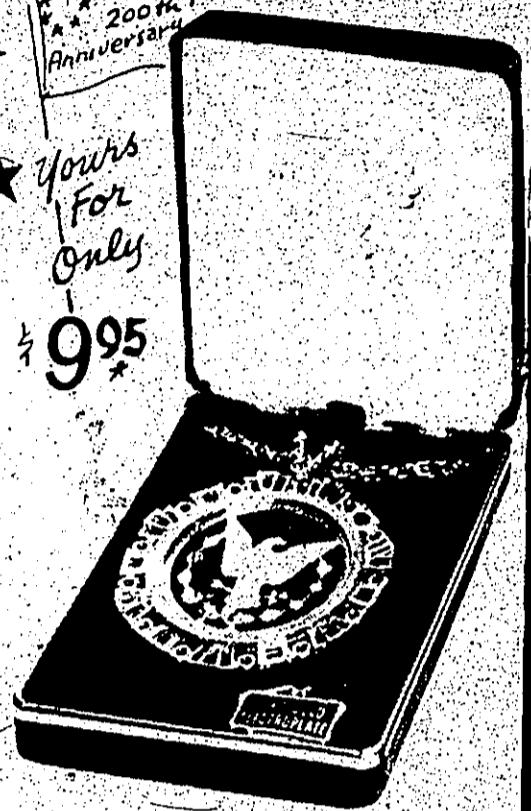
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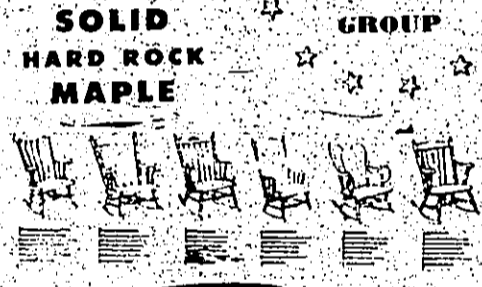


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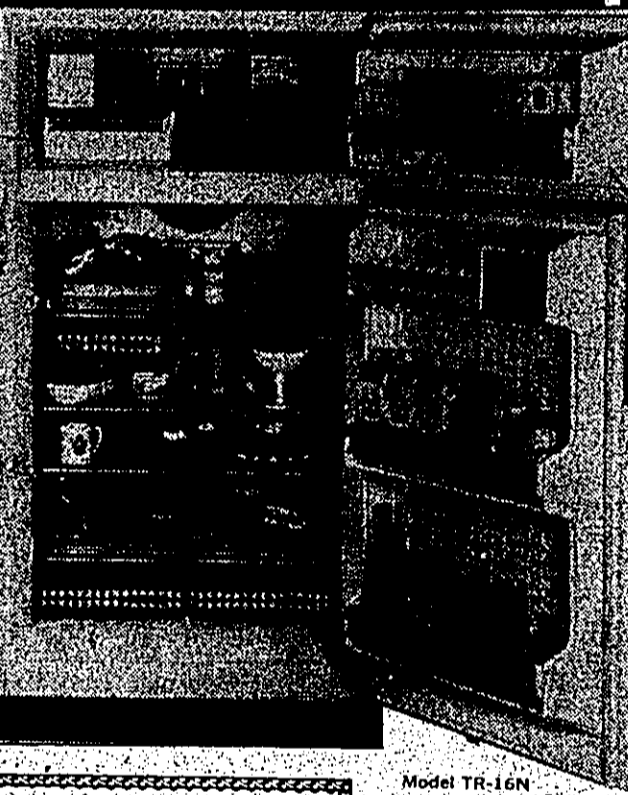
