They, along with one boy and one girl from each of the other 19 counties in Extension District 9, will be honored for receiving the highest County 4-H Club Achievement Award.

Recipients of the Gold Star Award must have demonstrated outstanding leadership development. Additionally, they have successfully completed a project related to agriculture, home management or personal development, according to Belinda Covington and Clinton Currie, Tyler County Extension Agents.

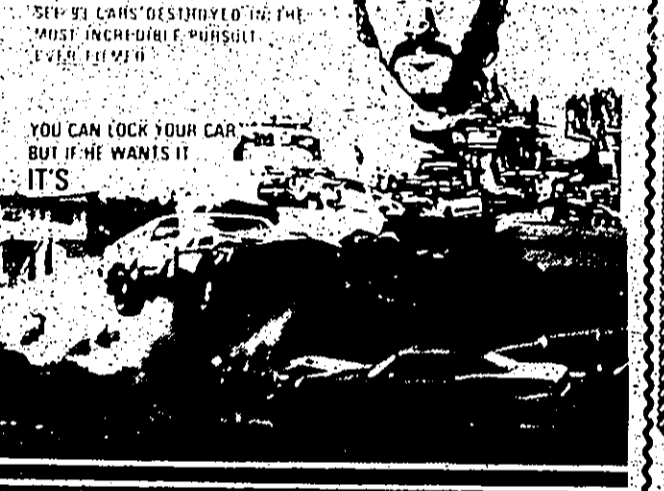

Cemetery Workings

WOODVILLE—The 120-year-old Magnolia Cemetery may receive an official historical designation within about six months, predicts J.B. Coffman, chairman of the Tyler County Historical Commission.

A formal application will be made "within the next few days."

Cost of the official state marker to the County Historical Commission is \$275.

Coffman said the cemetery dates back to 1855 officially, but was known to be used as a burying place prior to that date.

Coffman himself has been responsible for the production of an informative book which documents the location of "nearly every grave in Tyler County." 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Funds Shuffled

AUSTIN—The Texas Historical Commission (THC) has reallocated \$3,000 of federal funds to six historical restoration projects in Texas, announced Mrs. Wesley B. Blanton, commission chairman.

The funds, earmarked for matching grants for the restoration of historic structures listed on the National Register of Historic Places, were originally distributed through the THC to three projects in 1974 which had not been implemented.

The reallocated funds now will go to the Jefferson Junior Historical Society in Marion County for the continued restoration of the Dallas Street (182,800); the Sugarwood Conservation Society in Bexar County for structural restoration of the Steves Farmstead Carriage House in the King William Historic District (20,500); and to James M. Alexander to help fund the development of a manse for the restoration of Fort Phantom Hill in Jones County (\$3,500).

The Commission also awarded \$7,500 to the City of Fort in Garza County for the stabilization of the Algeria Hotel, \$2,000 to the Diocese of El Paso for the development of plans to restore the Socorro Mission in El Paso County and \$3,750 for the completion of an archeological report on the work at Mission Concepcion in Bexar County which was conducted under a previous grant awarded in 1972.

To be eligible for federal preservation grants, sites must be listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Recipients must match federal contributions with non-federal funds or donations of goods or services of equivalent value.

The funds, which are made available under the National Preservation Act of 1966, are channeled to the states through the National Park Service, a division of the Department of the Interior. The Texas Historical Commission administers these funds for the State of Texas.

The projects which returned the 1974 grants for reallocation and met with complications delaying their implementation. Project investigators returned funds so that other projects now in process and temporarily in need of funding could receive this federal aid.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

This past summer, the Senate Transportation Subcommittee did something that has never been done before.

As Chairman, I had grown increasingly concerned in recent years by the lack of a comprehensive review of our overall transportation system.

There was a need to carefully examine the individual parts of our transportation system and how they fit together; then recommend improvements to insure the most efficient, least costly transportation possible.

So, during two full weeks of hearings, we listened to testimony from government leaders, from environmentalists, from industry people, and from private citizens.

Our responsibility is our nation's highway program, but we felt it important that we understand how this program fits into our transportation system as a whole.

My Subcommittee is working on the bill this week, and it will go before the full Senate sometime this month.

The new highway bill now calls for spending \$7-billion next year on our nationwide road system. This is \$600 million less than was spent this year.

Because of the pressing need to hold the line on government spending, we worked to keep the cost as low as possible without causing important highway building and maintenance programs to grind to a halt.

Politicians like to talk about cutting government spending. But when it comes down to doing away with specific programs or postponing specific projects it is too often a different matter.

This is especially true when you start cutting back on highway spending in a state as large as Texas. We depend heavily on good roads to get us where we need to go.

There is a critical need for over \$2 billion in additional funds for grade crossings, widening of narrow bridges, and funds to complete highways or freeways that today stand unfinished.

And, there must be a proper maintenance program to keep our road system in good repair.

Because it is vital that such work continue, we tried to make most of our spending cuts in management costs. We consolidated overlapping programs and, in the process, gave states like Texas a much greater degree of control over setting their own priorities on highway programs.

The upshot is that Texas will get more than \$300 million next year for crucial highway construction and road projects. This isn't as much as we would like to have, but it will enable our state to maintain an active and effective highway program.

That is the goal of the new highway bill, in a time of emphasis on reduced government spending: to cut out some of the fat and frills, but to keep our highway program alive and moving.

This highway bill was conceived after a long and careful review of our nation's overall transportation needs, a longer and more careful study than anything that's been done before. It represents an attempt to consider our highway needs, not by themselves alone, but as part of our overall transportation system, complementing other parts of the system to provide efficient transportation.

At the same time, it is a major step in the move to balance the nation's budget, an example of how we can and should save the dollars of taxpayers wherever and whenever we can.
