Craft Fair To Be Held At Lions Den

There will be a Craft Fair Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 6-7 at the Lions Den, Hwy. 190 East. Many vendors will be attending this two-day event with various items just in time for Christmas giving. Booths will open at 10 a.m. Saturday and at 12:30 a.m. Sunday; they will close at 5:30 p.m. each day.

Many dealers from the Oct. Craft Fair will be returning but other dealers with new items will also be present. There will be a large selection of unusual items for sale, ranging from very special Christmas gifts to small stocking stuffers.

One vendor will bring his large selection of stained "Tiffany" glass lamps. He will also have other stained glass items for sale. Several local ladies will be selling home baked goodies, breads, rolls and sweet. There will also be a concession stand at the fair.

One shop will offer various lapidary items, polished gemstones and decorative rocks for display collecting. Jewelry of turquoise and imported beads, sold singly or strung in an original design will be available. Another dealer will be selling a variety of hand crafted jewelry.

There will be a delightful selection of blown glass pieces. Hickory wood created in unique designs will also be sold. To delight a child there will be miniature furniture, wooden toys and one lady will be selling dolls.

To decorate a room, there will be hand painted oil pictures and a variety of metal sculptures. For those wanting a gift sure to provide lasting pleasure, there will be a variety of plants for sale.

Adults will be charged 50¢ admission at the door; registration tickets will be used to determine the winner of an original ceramic tile painting by Clyde Gray.

Children will be admitted free and can register for a free gallon of hard candy.

The craft fair is being sponsored by the Woodville B.P.W. Club. Profits will be used to provide scholarships for students in each of the five schools in Tyler County.

'Outstanding Citizen' Sought By Chamber Of Commerce

The search is now on by the Chamber of Commerce for a man or woman in Tyler County worthy enough to hold the title of "Outstanding Citizen."

That high recognition will be made at the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet which will be held on Friday, Jan. 30.

The Chamber, which serves the whole of Tyler County, will use its board of directors to review nominations as submitted from all sectors of the

county. Specific nominations are being asked from the county's 28 civic clubs. A letter is being written to each by Chamber Executive Secretary Faye Ward.

Anyone may submit a nomination to the board for consideration. All nominations must be submitted with a qualifying resume of the individual to the Chamber offices located on 118 Pavilion St. at the Woodville Inn by no later than Friday, Dec. 19.

Rules for consideration for the award are as follows:

The Outstanding Citizen Award shall be made at the Annual Banquet of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce.

to the man or woman who shall have been selected by the board's special committee, as deserving of this special recognition for the calendar year just past.

The award shall consist of a trophy or plaque with a suitable inscription on which shall be engraved the name of the winner and the year for which he or she gained the award. No persons who have once received the award shall again be eligible.

Any legal resident of Tyler County shall be eligible.

Nominations will be on the basis of who during the past year has given unselfishly of himself (herself), time, and money

(according to means), and thereby has substantially improved the economic and civic climate of Tyler County. He must have acted in his business works so that he is admired and respected.

The Chamber Board of Directors shall meet on call of the Chamber Secretary. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum, and a vote of a majority of those present shall be sufficient to

pass any issue. Each member of the committee except the secretary, shall have a vote.

All voting will be done by secret ballot.

The name of the recipient shall remain a secret until the presentation is made at the Chamber of Commerce Banquet on the last Friday in January.

Wallace Will Speak At Banquet

Mack Wallace, Railroad Commissioner of Texas is slated to be the featured speaker for the Chamber of Commerce Banquet which will be held Friday, Jan. 30.

According to the Chamber Board of directors, President John Kenner who made the announcement at a Chamber directors' meeting last week, plans are still being formulated as to the location and menu for the once-a-year banquet and the details will be announced at a later date.

Wallace, 45, appointed by Governor Dolph Briscoe as Railroad Commissioner to replace Byron Tunnell who resigned to his appointment, Wallace was elected to serve the remainder of the term for which he was appointed. Prior to this appointment and election, he had served as Executive Director of the Governor's Criminal Justice Council since April 1, 1973.

Wallace, former District Attorney of the Third Judicial District of Texas, joined the

Governor's staff in January 1973. Administrative Assistant to the Governor handling legal matters.

Wallace received his J.D. degree from Baylor University in 1953, and after four years in private law practice, he became Henderson County Attorney in 1957. He continued to serve as County Attorney until 1962 when he became District Attorney for the area including Anderson, Henderson and Houston counties. He held this post until January 1973.

Wallace has served on the Grievance, Prosecuting Committee and the Grievance Committee of District 7A, State Bar of Texas. He is presently serving as Judge Advocate of the Texas State Guard and has the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. For his work on the reorganization of the

Kids To Capture County In Bicentennial Emblem

Boys and girls from all the schools in Tyler County are being asked to make a patriotic contribution by helping create a Bi-centennial emblem which would capture the history of Tyler County.

Prizes and county recognition will be awarded to the top entries which are submitted from three grade levels: grammar school, middle school (Junior School) and high school.

Deadline for the entries is Monday, Dec. 15.

Savings bonds worth \$25 each will be awarded to the top three entries from the three school levels. Aside from the monetary value of the prize, Bicentennial Committee persons feel there will be a "larger reward" for the winner when the emblem gains widespread use throughout the county. It's expected that the emblem could be used atop the Tyler County Courthouse for travelers to see as they pass through the county.

"Quite an honor for any kid"

a spokesman said.

According to Austin Fuller, who heads the Bi-centennial Emblem Development Committee, and who has been busy the past 10 days relaying the wish of the Committee to the various school superintendents and principals in seeking their help in the project, says he "asked for the emblem to embrace the history of Tyler County."

"That's all I asked for," Fuller said adding, that, "if we set out any more ideas to the kids then we'd be hurting their creativity in developing a meaningful emblem."

"We've got an unusual chance to allow our children in the county to express themselves for the good of the county," he said.

Fuller has asked the School Principals to pass the word to students to draw their entry on 8 1/2 x 11" paper and put their name, address, phone number and grade on the reverse side of the emblem drawing.

Actual judging of the entries will be done on the night of Thursday, Dec. 18, during the County Bi-centennial groups regular meeting in the Commissioners Courtroom at the Tyler County Courthouse.

Noted Tyler County Artists Loretta Gilchrist, Ruth Houston and Clyde Gray will judge the entries with assistance from representatives of each of the school districts.

Fuller, who was appointed to Chair the Emblem development committee by Bi-centennial Chairman J.B. Coffman, is working also with Mrs. Huey (Doe) Hancock who will help to coordinate the efforts of the County's school kids in creating an emblem which captures the history of the County.

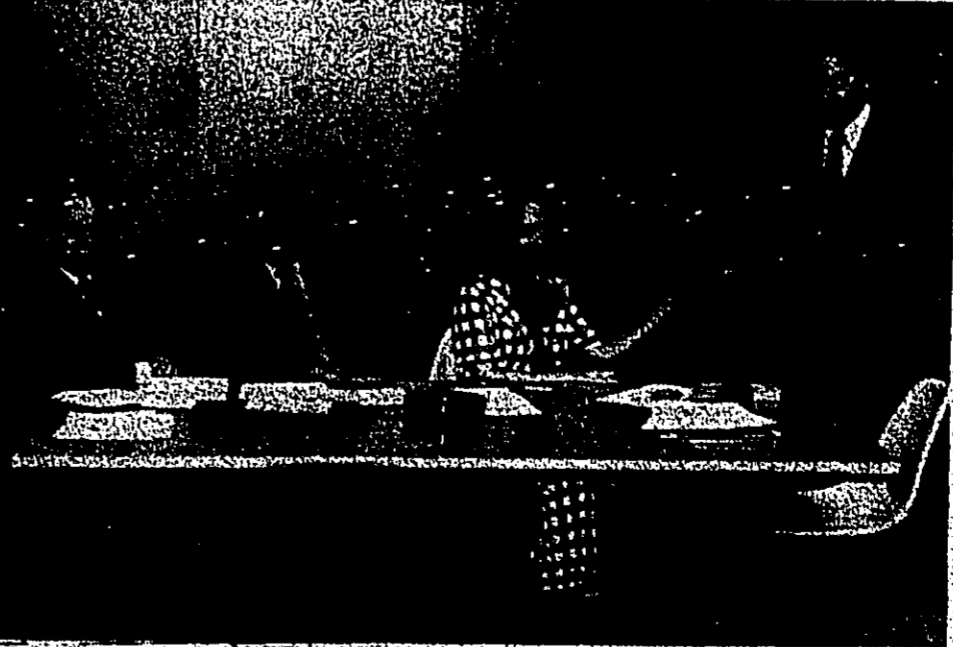
Suggestions as to how the circular emblem would be used range from placing it up under the clock on the front of the County Courthouse to making patriotic buttons and colorful ceramics. The emblem could be placed on county entrance signs and on all county correspondence.

It was suggested that various groups may want to adopt the insignia as a sales item to raise funds for needed charitable projects in the county.

Deer Season Good

AUSTIN-Depending on where you hunted, the first weekend of deer season was either very good or mediocre at best. The Hill Country area fared for the sheer numbers of deer

harvested - yielded few animals during the first two days of hunting. Parks and Wildlife Department regional law enforcement supervisor John Wood in Brownwood said the kill in Burnet and San Saba Counties was light, but with good reports from Kerr and Comal Counties.

TONGUES?

The miracles of Christ produce faith in Him as the Son of God (John 20:30,31). The miracles of the apostles and those on whom they laid their hands (Acts 8:14-17; Acts 19:1-6) were to confirm the spoken word (Heb. 2:1-4). But these miracles were to cease when God's revelation was complete (2 Cor. 13:8-10). The word of God, once confirmed, does not need confirmation in every generation. Yet, some today, as in the past, refuse to be content with God's word. With them emotionalism reigns supreme. Modern Pentecostalism, spreading like a prairie fire, is touching the borders of many religious bodies. It displays a zeal without knowledge, or faith in the facts stated in the first two paragraphs of the article.

But in East Texas, a part of the state not usually associated with good deer hunting, P&WD information officers, wardens and biologists report enthusiastic hunters with large deer. One such white-tail taken from Angelina County had 23-point antlers with an inside spread that measured 24 inches. Biologist Gary Spencer at Silsbee said that recent dry weather gave hunters access to bottomlands along the Angelina and Neches Rivers where they harvested many deer. In Folk and Tyler Counties, wardens counted 120 bucks through their check stations during the weekend. Warden Welby Fountain in Cherokee County estimated some 150 deer were taken in the area on Sunday, the first day of the season for Cherokee County.

Regional supervisor Bill Daniels of Mount Pleasant in North East Texas reported only a fair to low harvest, but with many violations. In North Central Texas and the Pecos basin areas the opening weekend was the best in many years. From Bosque County, one of the best deer hunting spots in the area, warden Ed Henry reported deer to be in excellent condition. Jay Pemberton in Erath County reported seeing more deer in local locker plants than in recent years. Despite unseasonably warm weather and abundance of natural food, hunters in the Permian Basin kept locker plants filled to overflowing. One locker in San Angelo had to turn away hunters Sunday afternoon after registering more than 140 deer in one day. P&WD information officer Tim Lefebvre in San Angelo said the physical condition of the deer taken was excellent with field-dressed weights averaging 92 pounds. Most of the bucks taken in the Permian Basin were eight-pointers. The heaviest buck taken throughout the state so far seems to be a 222-pounder in Brown County near Grosvonor. Deer hunting seemed to be considerably slower in southern Texas. Plenty of cover is left, few deer are moving and the rutting season has yet to start in this part of the state.

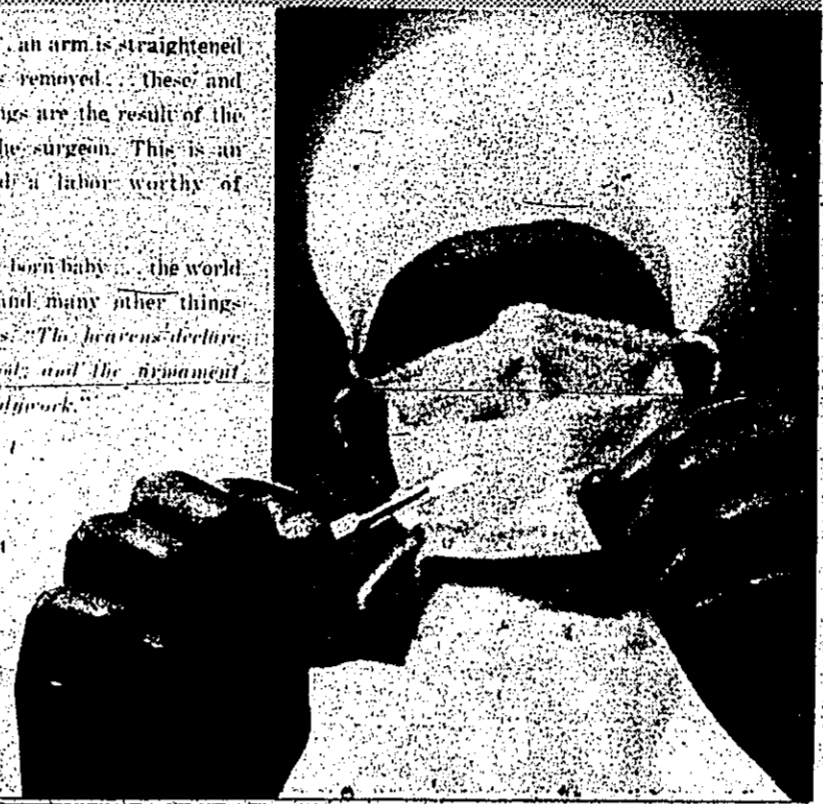

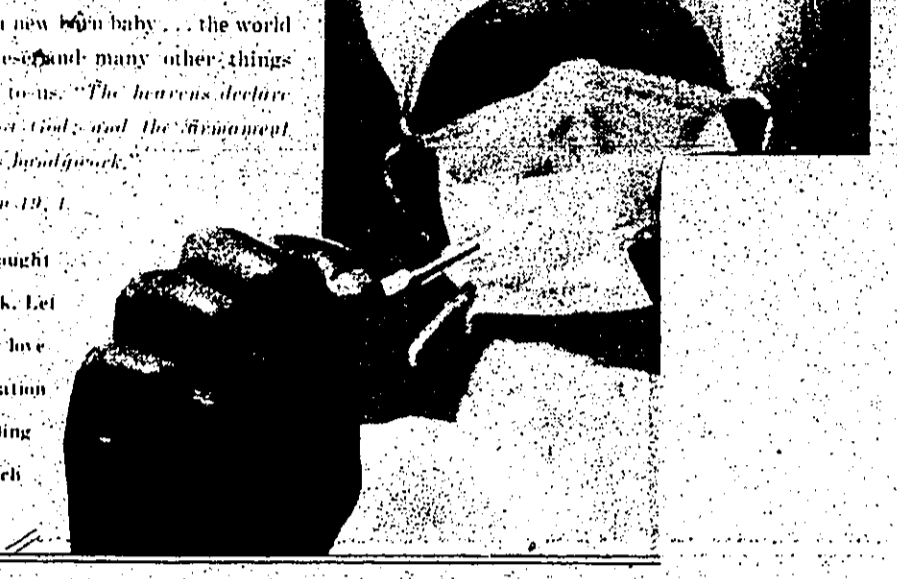

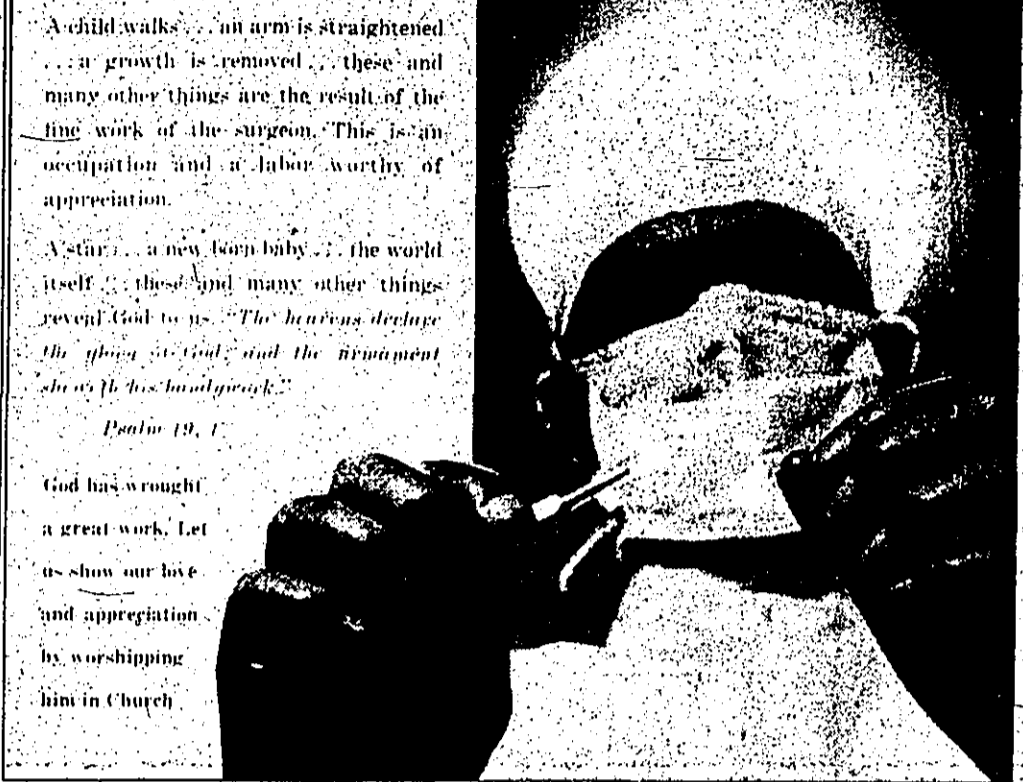

Tax Shortcourse Scheduled Soon

A two-day workshop for tax practitioners is scheduled for December 8 and 9 at the Student Center of Stephen F. Austin State University. The discussion leaders will be a pair of experienced local tax professionals.

The workshop will be held in the Venetian Ballroom at the student center beginning at 9 a.m. each day.

Topics to be covered include what's new, partnership and investment credit on Monday and soil and water conservation and land clearing, net operating losses, capital gains and losses, Section 1223 gains and losses, depreciation, and farm loss recapture on Tuesday.

Included in the tuition will be all tax educational materials and refreshments, said Wayne Taylor, coordinator.

Taylor, area economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, urged those planning to attend to register in advance if at all possible.

"Although fees will be accepted at the door, enrollment will be limited and on a first come, first served basis, of course," he emphasized.

The Lieutenant Governor's Report By Bill Hobby

AUSTIN—Over the next several weeks I am going to share with you remarks delivered by Jim Williams to the Texas Research League annual meeting and to the last regular meeting of the Joint Advisory Committee of Government Operations on the topic "Current Spending Issues: People Service Programs." In his remarks, Williams points out a number of problems facing the State of Texas in providing different types of services needed by our people.

Williams began his remarks with a discussion of the important case of Morales versus Turman. "In August of 1974, a federal court in Texas handed down a decision that could have severe consequences for the State's juvenile delinquency program if it is upheld. The case was styled Morales versus Turman, and the judge made three significant points. He said, first, that the Texas Youth Council, which administers the State juvenile program, has a constitutional mandate to provide services designed to rehabilitate delinquent children, second, that the State institutions run by the Youth Council - Gatesville and Houstonville - are places where rehabilitation is impossible, and they must be closed as soon as possible; and third, he said that it is unconstitutional for the Youth Council to institutionalize every child committed to its charge.

Farm Loans On Increase

COLLEGE STATION—Farmers in the United States are receiving more money than ever from their own banking system, says Johnny Feagan, area economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Feagan points out that the number of loans through the Farm Credit System, which is made up of Federal, State and local banks, has increased by 20 percent over the last year.

"There are 450 agricultural credit institutions in Texas with a total of 150,000 members, notes Feagan. These cooperatives are expected to do more than \$750 million in business this year.

"The present trend," says Feagan, "is a reduced number of cooperatives but an increased volume of business with a growing need for additional financing."

Texas Taxes

Austin—There is frequently confusion among retail merchants about the use of sales tax Exemption Certificates and Resale Certificates.

A Resale Certificate can be used only by a person or business holding a valid sales tax permit and buying an otherwise taxable item from another person or business holding a sales tax permit.

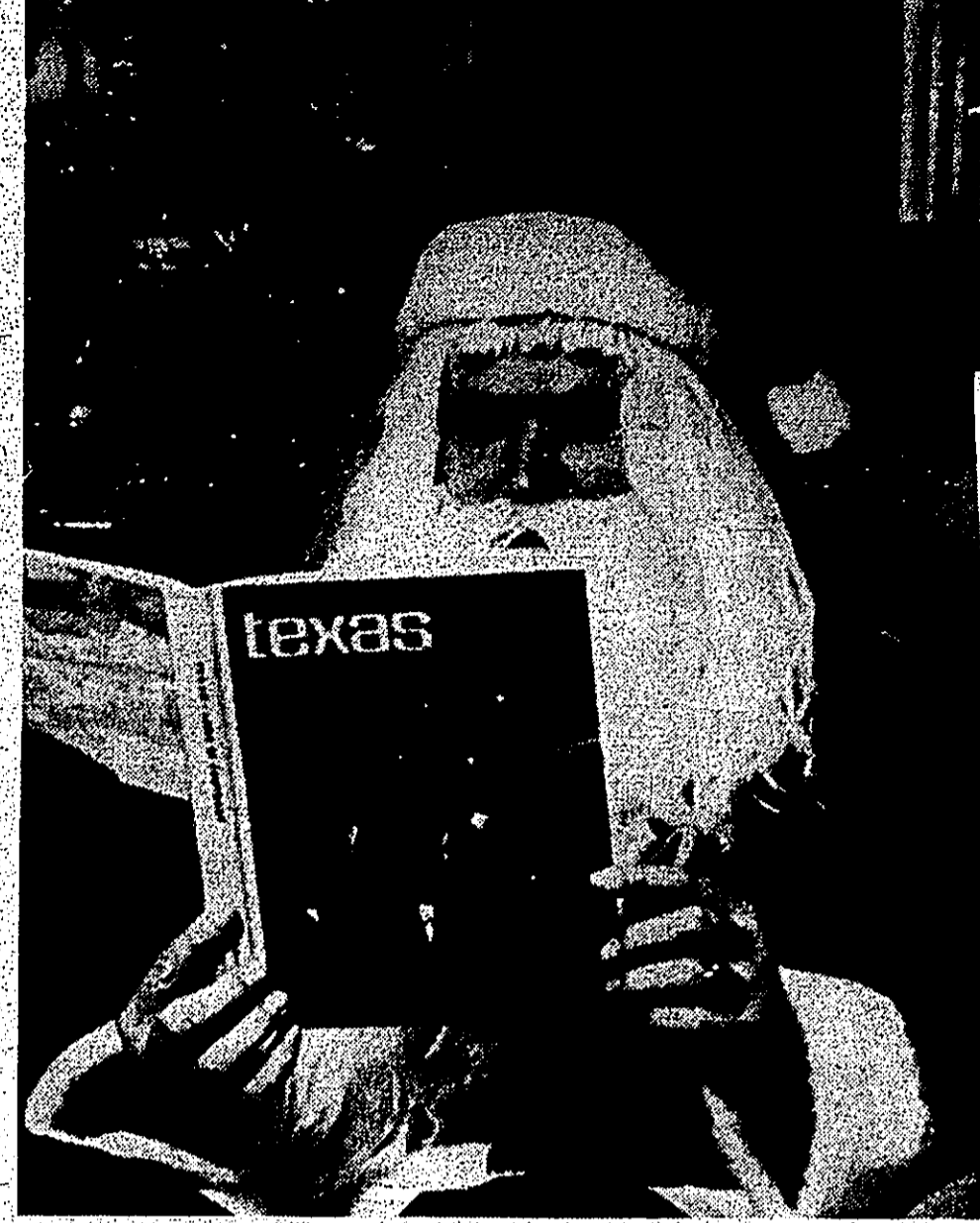
An example of this might be a small auto repair shop which would have a sales tax permit. It would give the distributor a Resale Certificate and not pay sales tax on the parts purchased.

The repair shop would then sell the parts to its customers, charging them the sales tax and remitting it to the state. The distributor, meanwhile, would use the Resale Certificate to prove to the state why that portion of his sales weren't taxed.

Generally a retailer is considered by us to be in compliance with the law if he accepts an Exemption Certificate in good faith. That is, he believes the purchaser is an exempt organization. Obviously, in the case of public agencies such as school districts and local governments, there is no question.

Merchants accepting either Resale Certificates or Exemption Certificates should be very careful to keep these records.

Wilson report

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles Wilson (D-Texas) announced today that he is cosponsoring a bill which would curtail the severe penalties HEW has imposed on those federally-funded day care centers which do not comply with HEW regulations on staff-to-child ratios.

"This would mean," Wilson continued, "that ninety-four percent of the programs nationwide would either be reorganized or risk a total withdrawal of federal funds."

"I had this to be unfair and unrealistic. It would cause serious disruptions to existing centers and would no doubt force many others to close. HEW, in its zeal to enforce regulations which have not been adequately studied or worked out, is once again causing more harm to exist, than good."

The bill would be enforced for eighteen months during which time HEW and the Congress could study the situation more carefully.

"Equitable standards need to be set for different situations so children can receive acceptable care at a reasonable cost. The bill would grant states the opportunity to negotiate their respective situations with HEW until an equitable standardization is formulated."

Game Violations Numerous

AUSTIN—After the draw weekend of deer season, Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens can probably account for as many game violations as numbers of deer taken by hunters.

The Consumer Alert

ALSTON—In previous columns we've discussed problems the average citizen may have when he or she unwittingly writes an occasional check that "bounces" due to insufficient funds. In most such instances, when the problem is discovered, the person makes good the check.

But there are a few individuals who make it a habit of writing bad checks. These are the "artists" who "paper" or "pass" are a special problem for merchants and banks. Although the law provides that individuals too may be victimized, either directly or indirectly, the Texas Penal Code (11) interfering with commerce by issuing a check in a safe manner, forcing merchants to raise prices to cover their losses and the cost of tightened security arrangements. Some estimate that the amount of check fraud losses at \$1 billion annually.

Lawyers in our Attorney General's Consumer Protection, Law Enforcement, and Crime Prevention divisions all say there is a wide variety of ways a merchant can lose money through bad check transactions. But, there are several safeguards that may help merchants full the professional "paper hanger," too, fall under, the District and County Attorneys Association equates merchants that to require valid identification from check writers. Recommended are Texas driver's licenses, Department of Public Safety-issued I.D. cards, student or service I.D. cards, or two or more major credit cards.

Always check to see that any photo or description matches that of the check writer. See, too, that the address and signature match that on the check. If a check has irregularities, messy printing, or a name and address that don't correspond to that of the I.D. card, the check could be counterfeit. Be cautious if a stranger who is writing a check chatters excessively, drops packages, or is in a big hurry. Not all such persons are hot check writers.
