Mrs. Nancy Jo Jehlen has been selected as Conservation Teacher of the Year for 1976 by the Longleaf Soil and Water Conservation District, according to Smoke Signals, the Warren High School student newspaper.

Her work with Conservation has included short instructional units in English classes each year since she has been at Warren High School. She will receive a plaque from the district.

For the past two years her students have won six of the seven awards given in the district's Texas Conservation Awards Program Essay Contest for Boys and Girls. In 1974 Charles Jehlen and Brad Whittington won, and in 1975 Joy Freeman, Debbie Mattingly, Sueann Whittington and Alice Cassel won the awards.

Mrs. Jehlen is being nominated by the SWCD for Texas Conservation Teacher of 1976, according to Tom Mackey, District Conservationist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service.

First Baptist To Celebrate Two Birthdays

On New Year's Eve at 11:45 p.m., First Baptist Church of Woodville will begin a year-long celebration of our nation's 200th birthday and the church's 125th birthday. First Baptist Church was organized on March 15, 1851.

Included in the special service to take place on the front steps of the church will be the reading of a proclamation, singing of patriotic and church hymns, pledges of allegiance to the American and Christian flags, ringing of the church bell at midnight, and a fireworks display.

The community is invited to join with the First Baptist Church in the celebration. Other activities during the year will include patriotic and historical pageants, the flying of the American and Christian flags on Wheat and Charlton streets, and special high attendance days on March 14th and July 4th.

Preapplication Date Extended

WASHINGTON—Rural communities now have until Feb. 15, 1976, to file preapplications for community development discretionary grants under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (P.L. 93-383).

County Democratic Chairman Morris Clemmons, for the Precinct 3 office last week was D.B. (Jack) Tucker, a retired saw shop man who is 55 years of age. Tucker lives on Rural Route 1 in Woodville.

Others who have filed in the meantime include Don Woodruff, 30, of Chester for the office of Sheriff. Listing his occupation as "self-employed," Woodruff has worked as a deputy in the Tyler County Sheriff's office.

Filing officially for Precinct 3 position against incumbent Commissioner Kenneth Bell is Jerry Mahan, 32, of Colmesnell who lists his occupation as a logging contractor.

Incumbent Sheriff Lewis Craven also filed officially on Monday while holding the top law enforcement office in the County for some three years. Craven is 51 and resides in the Ivanhoe Community. The term for sheriff is a four year obligation.

Announcing "intent to run" but not filing officially as of press-time, Maxie Riley, who along with Jack Tucker are seeking the Precinct 1 Commissioner's responsibilities currently being held by Joe Best.

County Clerk Allen Sturrock reminds all candidates and prospective candidates of recent changes in the Texas Election Code concerning reports and actions "Candidates need to be aware of."

Sturrock says candidates need to appoint a campaign treasurer and, "Your campaign treasurer needs to keep a record of all expenses and income received and spent during the report period. This should include your filing fee, newspaper ads, cards, billboards and gasoline spent canvassing the County, etc."

FIRST REPORT DUE..... 30 days before election
SECOND REPORT DUE..... 7 days before election
THIRD REPORT DUE..... 39 days after election

In case of a run-off, the **FOURTH REPORT** is due 7 days before run-off, Sturrock said.

"These reports are to be filed in the County Clerk's office which has the necessary forms available for you at no cost. All monies donated to you are to be recorded and any contributions of \$50.00 or more must show the name and address of the donor. Any contribution of \$50.00 or less must be reported but the name and address of the donor are not necessary, he said.

Filing fees are to be paid to the County Party Chairman, but this must be included in the report you file with us. The filing fee for the County offices and Commissioner's is \$200.00. The filing fee for Justice of the Peace and Constables is \$150.00.

According to Sturrock, "All present office holders are reminded that they are required to file an expense and income report on or before January 15, 1976."

Phone Bill Savings Said

Reduced federal taxes will save Southwestern Bell customers in Texas an estimated \$2.5 million on telephone bills in 1976, according to Gary Pritchard, local manager.

Beginning January 1, the federal excise tax on telephone service falls from seven per cent to six per cent. The reduction marks the fourth straight year the tax has been lowered.

Under a schedule established by federal law, the tax will continue to drop one per cent each year until it expires January 1, 1982. He said that the tax reduction will not affect Southwestern Bell earnings since the company is simply a tax collector agent for the government.

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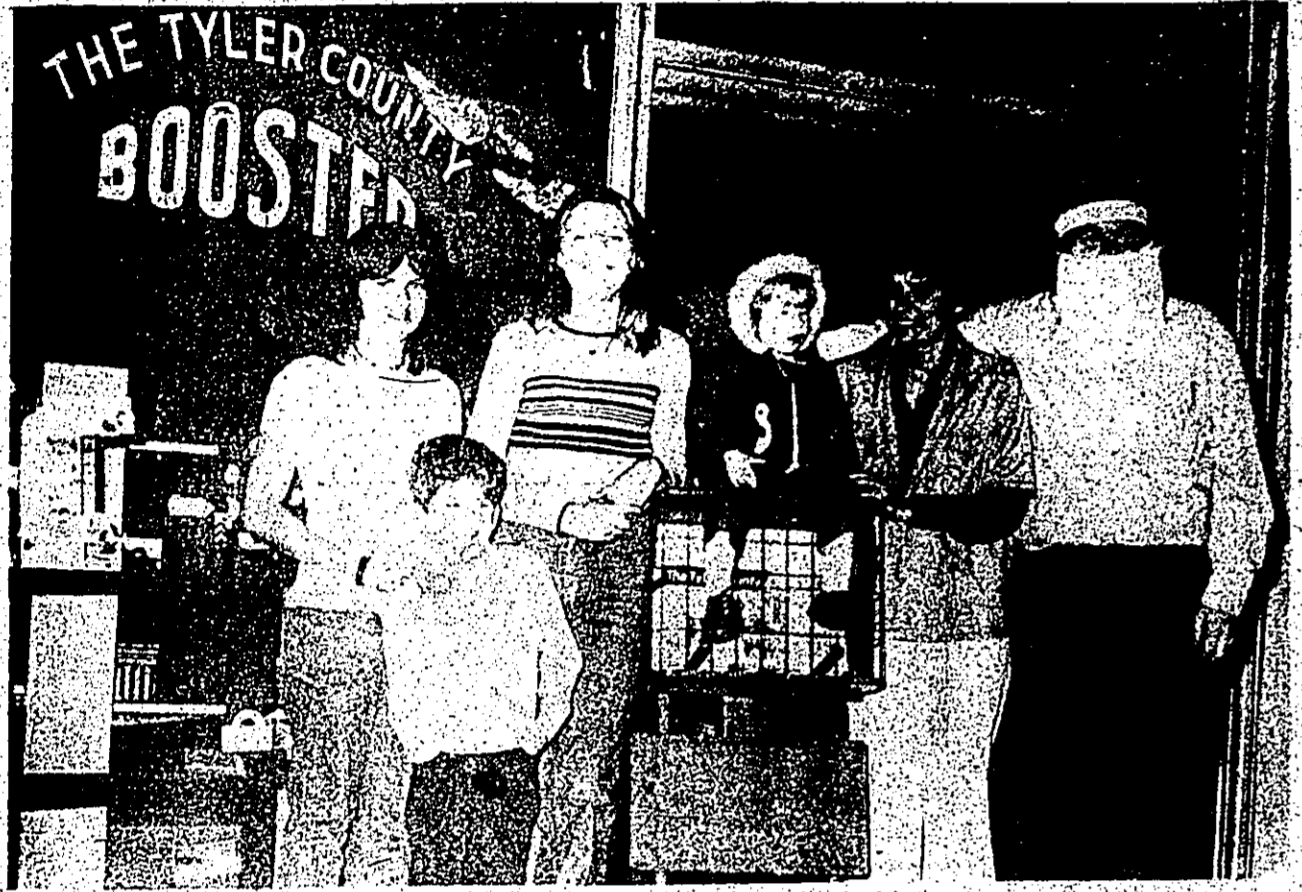

Wilson Report

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Until this year, the Congressional budgeting process was a haphazard, haphazard and inefficient affair. The current Resolution on the Budget which sets binding levels for budget authority, outlays, revenues, the deficit and public debt. No legislation can be considered until it meets these criteria. This will increase the spending or decrease the revenue levels set by the resolution.

This self-imposed Congressional fiscal discipline has been a long time coming, but that makes it less welcome. By limiting the total annual budget authority, which can be kept over federal spending an unnecessary program.

With a planned deficit of \$74 billion for fiscal year 1977, the Congress has to display more concern for the ever-increasing public debt. One of the many lessons of New York's situation has been that a government cannot continue to spend more than it receives indefinitely. What that in mind, I am cosponsoring a bill which would amend the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 to require a budget surplus when over the national unemployment rate falls to 4 1/2%.

A public debt in excess of \$700 billion is a grave and overriding, even in times of near full employment. This unnecessary increase in the public debt often causes harmful inflationary pressures on the economy. This bill would avert such a catastrophe unless the economy fully recovers.

Chosen controls and careful banks have to be placed over the nation's budget, which so directly affects the whole economy. Americans today are more aware of and sophisticated about economic problems and government spending. I have received a great deal of mail from East Texans on this problem, and many of the reforms that have been enacted and proposed are a direct result of this increasing public pressure and awareness.

I am cosponsoring a bill which would require the government to provide more simplified and extensive information on the government's financial situation.

Federal Wage Hike Due January 1

A hike of 20 cents an hour in the federal minimum wage will go into effect Jan. 1, 1977, a U.S. Labor Department official in Dallas today reminded employees and workers.

Philip F. Arrien, who heads the Department's Employment Standards Administration in Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, said the basic minimum wage applicable to most workers will go from \$2.10 an hour to \$2.30.

The increase was scheduled by Congress when it amended the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) in May 1974.

Arrien said the minimum wage of those workers whose jobs were not covered by the FLSA prior to 1968 goes from the present \$2.00 an hour to \$2.20 on Jan. 1. They will catch up in 1977, when their minimum goes to \$2.30.

Covered agricultural workers, those on large farms, go from their present \$1.80 to \$2.00 on Jan. 1, 1977.

READER RESPONSE - MIRACLES

Some of our readers disagreed with what was said about "longue speaking" three weeks ago. Let me assure each one that I appreciated your taking time to write.

It is evident that 1 Cor. 12:8 needs more study. In 1 Cor. 12 Paul names the nine spiritual (miraculous) gifts. 1 Cor. 13 discusses their duration, 1 Cor. 14 their regulation.

Please, take time to read 1 Cor. 13:8-10. "...Prophecies shall fail..." that is, come to an end, cease or be done away. "This indicates that prophesies (inspired speeches) would not continue indefinitely." "...Tongues, they shall cease..." Cease means to leave. "...Knowledge, it shall vanish away..." Vanish, stay is another translation of the same word that was translated "cease."

An important consideration to the duration of miracles is the meaning of "that which is perfect" (1 Cor. 13:10). If it refers to the second coming of Christ, as some believe, then it should read "He who is perfect" not "that which is perfect." "That which is perfect" actually refers to the completion and perfection of the revealed will of God - the written message. When that happened miracles would no longer be needed. Their purpose being to confirm the spoken word (John 2:24 & 3:1).

This is in harmony with NT teaching - the apostles were miracle workers who could lay hands on others (Acts 14:7-10, 19:11-12) bestowing miraculous powers. Those receiving power could not give it to others. They were the apostles died and those on whom they laid their hands died miracle working by name ceased or came to an end.

Denton Announces For RR Commission

AUSTIN (SP)—A veteran state legislator says "it's time the people have a representative on the Texas Railroad Commission."

Rep. Lane Denton, a Democrat from Austin, announced that he will run for the Railroad Commission next year. Denton is a native of Austin and the state legislator he will have a broad base of support. He was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1970 and is now Chairman of the House Social Services Committee. He is a graduate of Baylor University and is married and has one daughter.

"I believe the Texas Railroad Commission can help solve the financial burden of rural and city dwellers alike by taking a more independent, consumer-oriented approach in regulating the rail and gas industry," Denton said. "After all, the Railroad Commission does not have the same interests as the railroads. It belongs to the people of Texas."

Denton is announcing for the seat being vacated by Ben Ramsey, Rep. Denton noted most candidates for the Commission will declare their loyalty to consumers. But, Denton said, the voters should look behind the statements of political candidates.

"I am the only candidate in this race," Denton said, "who has a record of public service which will show that I can be trusted, not to sell out the people to the oil and gas interests but to protect their interests."

Denton said he plans an "active campaign for the people" and has the following points in a recent press conference:

"Before solutions are found to the energy crisis, Denton said, the truth about industry profits and oil and gas reserves must be discovered and presented to the public."

"Denton guaranteed that 'if there is a way to lower the price of energy or the price of transportation, (he) will stand with the consumers and fight to lower any unreasonable price.'"

"Denton wants more 'public scrutiny, public involvement, and public understanding' of the Texas Railroad Commission."

"Denton pledged to protect the natural resources of Texas, particularly, farm and ranch land, from 'unnecessary and irreparable harm.'"

"The Vice legislator also pledged to become 'personally involved' in improving the Railroad Commission's enforcement of safety regulations for railroads and pipelines."

Denton has been very active in the field of education and is a former teacher and school administrator.

Lane Denton is 34 years old, is a former teacher and reform efforts in the Texas Legislature for several years.

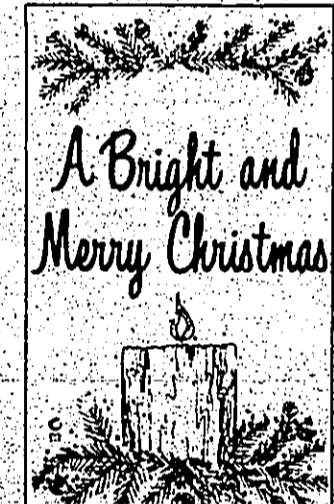
Kids Get Good Gift

Mothers in North Central Texas have given their children the best Christmas gift of all—a safeguard against disease, their immunization shots.

According to Health Department statistics, Texas Region, which comprises 45 counties in the North Central area has had a 240% increase over 1974 in the number of children under one year who have been vaccinated against polio, pertussis, diphtheria, and tetanus. In the under 4 age group, there has been a 12% increase in children vaccinated against measles, rubella and mumps in addition to the diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis and polio vaccinations.

Health Department officials attribute the increase to the Immunization Awareness Campaign that they, along with the March of Dimes, other volunteer agencies, federal agencies, medical organizations have conducted for the past 3 years.

The Awareness Campaign was begun because in the past decade, the concern of parents and physicians over such diseases as polio and measles has declined steadily. As the percentage of immunized children dropped, the diseases began to reappear. A number of cases of polio are still reported each year. Outbreaks of measles have begun to take place. Children are again suffering permanent disability, even death, from these preventable diseases. Health officials warn that local epidemics are possible and urge parents to begin immunization in early infancy, not to wait until school age since it might be too late by then.

Boykin Creek Stocked

Continuing efforts between the U.S. Forest Service and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department moved this week toward the permanent establishment of the only trout stream fishery in the state of Texas, with the recent stocking of rainbow trout on the Anguina National Forest.

The catchable size rainbow trout, stocked last Friday in the lake and drainage creek at the Forest Service Boykin Springs Recreation area, are available for immediate taking by licensed fishermen with a bag limit of five per day and a possession limit of ten.

The trout stocking program is to continue every other week through the end of 1976, with progressively larger fish. According to Bob Bouda, state-trout program leader on the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, trophy size trout, averaging 14 to 16 inches in length, should be available by late Spring.

The remainder of the fish originally stocked at Boykin Creek in North Arkansas, Texas, for subsequent stockings.

Bouda is very optimistic about the chances of survival for the newly stocked trout and indicated the possibility of a spring-fed waters of the lake. An additional 3,000 trout will be placed in the lake in February, and 1,000 will be placed in the stream every 15 days beginning the first week of January.

Biologists of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and researchers of Stephen F. Austin State University School of Forestry will survey the lake and condition of the fishery to determine benefits and costs of the program.

Traditionally and by law, the State controls animal and fish populations and the taking of game, while the U.S. Forest Service manages the habitat on the National Forests.

Forest Supervisor John H. Courtney, at the headquarters of the National Forests in Texas, termed the fishery management effort "an example of cooperation between the State and Federal governments to provide additional benefits to the residents of Texas while making full use of our natural resources."

Boykin Creek, where the trout are stocked, is a spring-fed stream, 200 yards of which flows through the scenic setting of the 60-acre recreation area equipped with 4 family camping units. The recreation area will remain open throughout the year to accommodate visitors.

Although Boykin Springs is a designated U.S. fee area, there is no charge for day use of the recreation facilities, but there is a two dollar charge for overnight use of the camping facilities.

Boykin Springs recreation area is located approximately 40 miles southeast of Lufkin, off State Highway 63, on the Anguina National Forest in East Texas.

Fish Population Sampled

TYLER—Toledo Bend Reservoir on the Texas/Louisiana border attracts fishermen from all over the South, particularly for trophy bass fishing.

In an effort to get an overall picture of the important reservoir's fish population, inland fisheries biologists at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department conducted rotenone sampling at Toledo Bend during September and October.

Under the direction of biologist Paul Seldensticker of Austin, the three covers totaling 7.4 acres were blocked off with nets and the waters sprayed with the fish-toxicant rotenone.

Three painstaking days were spent collecting, weighing and counting the thousands of fish which were killed by rotenone and hauled to the surface.

The technique of sampling the fish populations in covers gives biologists an idea of the lake's entire population in a short time.

Under the results of Seldensticker's work were generally encouraging.

Combined statistics for the three covers show a game fish population of 100,000 pounds of fish per acre of water compared to a rough fish population of some 92 pounds per acre.

According to Seldensticker, this is a healthy ratio of game to rough fish per acre in not an excessive amount.

Significant game fish populations at Toledo Bend sample covers included:

- Largemouth bass, 38 pounds per acre. Of the 265 last sampled, only 40 were of legal size with the remainder less than 10 inches long.
- Warmouth, 22 pounds per acre.
- Redear sunfish, 46 pounds per acre.
- Longear sunfish, 12 pounds per acre.
- Bluegill sunfish, 158 pounds per acre. Seldensticker said that the abundance of bluegills could be a problem in the overall structure of Toledo Bend's game fish population.
- Other statistics show that while some undesirable rough fish were not present in large numbers, they were large in size. Bowfin, for example, totaled only 1.2 fish per acre, but averaged nearly nine pounds per acre.
- Carp were present at less than one fish an acre, yet weighed 15 pounds per acre.
- Indications also point to some large gizzard shad in Toledo Bend. The shad were present at the rate of nearly 40 pounds per acre. Parks and Wildlife Department biologists said striped bass in Toledo Bend are almost at control levels, such large shad. No striper were found in these particular samples.
- Desirable threadfin shad were present in the sampled

Fish For '76

Nearly 30 million fish were stocked in Texas inland waters in 1976, but that total may be exceeded in 1977.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's inland fisheries branch placed some 25.9 million fish in public reservoirs and an additional five million fish in private waters during 1976.

The list of freshwater fish stocked is an impressive one including seven native species — channel, blue and flathead catfish; redear and hybrid sunfish; largemouth bass; and chinle pleural — and ten exotic species — northern pike; Florida bass; striped bass; white crappie; rainbow trout; muskellunge; hybrid white striped bass; hybrid white striped bass; largemouth bass; and redear sunfish.

The above does not include experimental stockings of sailfin, rounder and redfin in selected inland lakes.

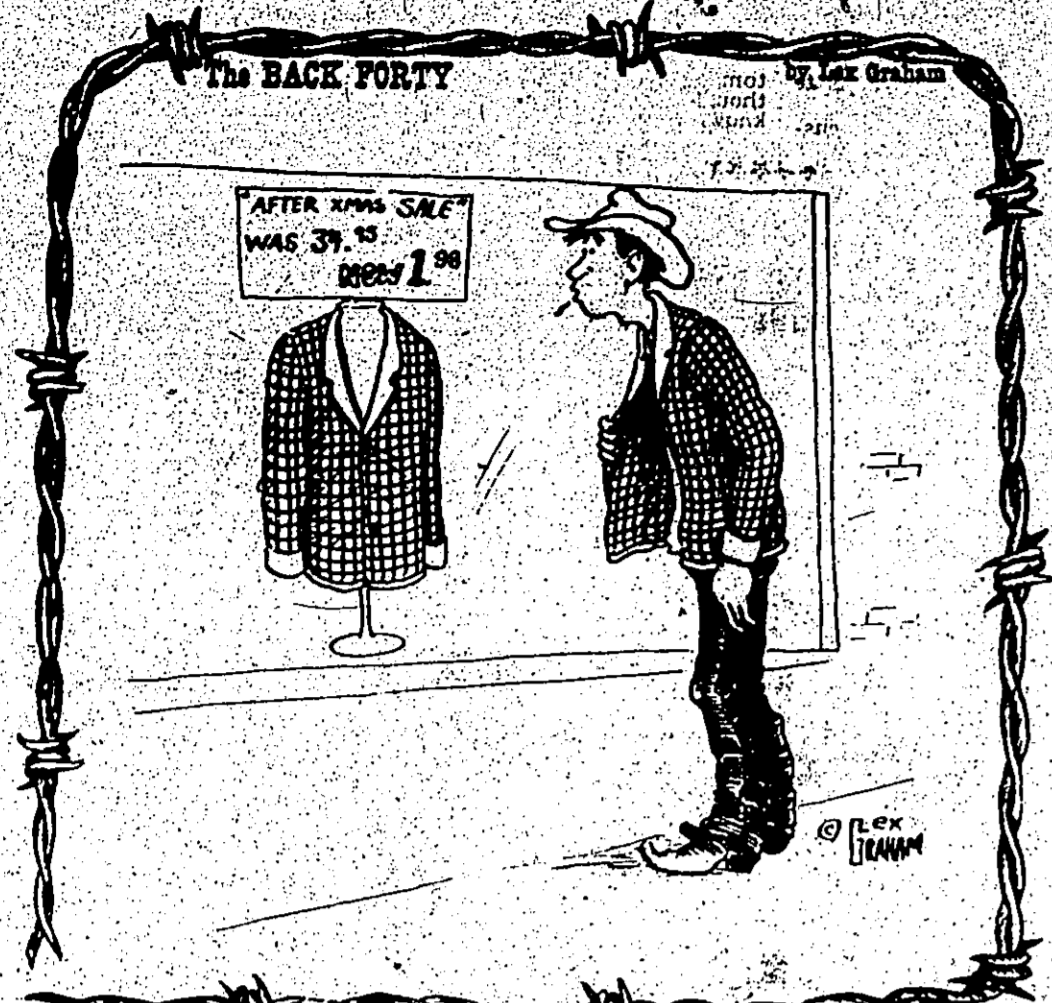

Use Proper Care With Christmas Poinsettias

COLLEGE STATION—The poinsettia is the favorite Christmas plant, with its attractive green leaves and bright red bracts. And with the proper care, it can provide attractive colors for your Christmas decorations throughout the holiday season.

Everett Jamno, landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, outlines several requirements which must be fulfilled to receive full benefits from poinsettias.

The poinsettia will do best when placed in a sunny location and protected from sudden temperature changes due to drafts, heat vents or opening doors. Night temperatures should not drop below 50 degrees F. A sudden drop in temperature can cause complete loss of leaves, he says.

"Proper watering will do much to prolong the life of the poinsettia. The plant's water requirement varies considerably high due to its large leaf surfaces and the low humidity in homes and offices. The soil ball around the plant should not be allowed to become so dry that the leaves wilt. With proper care, it can provide attractive colors for your Christmas decorations throughout the holiday season."

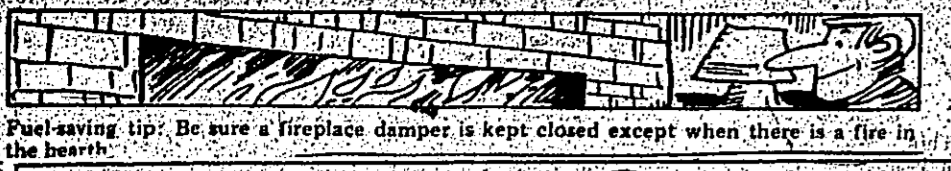

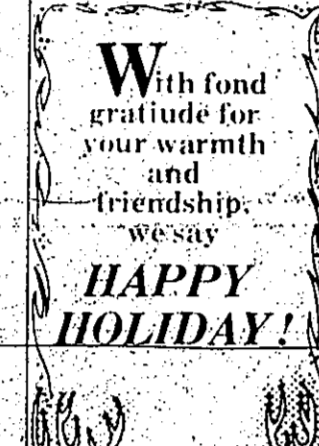

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Holiday Traffic Warning Issued

AUSTIN—Colonel Wilbur E. Speltz, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today warned that traffic accidents during the Christmas and New Year periods may claim almost 100 lives in Texas.

The state's top lawman said 48 of the deaths are likely during the Christmas period, which runs from 6 p.m. Wednesday, December 24, through midnight Sunday, January 2, 1976.

An estimated 45 deaths will occur in the New Year period which runs from 6 p.m. Wednesday, December 31, through midnight Sunday, January 5, 1976.

Speltz said the DPS will be working with local law enforcement agencies to mount a series of enforcement efforts as possible.

"We will be utilizing all the manpower and resources that we have in the department, and will be concentrating on such hazardous violations as drinking while driving and speeding," he noted.

He said public cooperation is also needed. "If a driver is also noted for hazardous driving, he should be prevented during the holiday, and pointed out that DPS will be working with local police and the news media in a public education effort called 'Operation Motorcade'."

"Through this program we attempt to emphasize the problem of hazardous driving and create a driver consciousness that will make our highways and streets safer to use," he said.

During the holiday, the news media will be provided with periodically updated information on holiday accident locations and dangers.

Education Costs Increase In State

AUSTIN—Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that state expenditures during the last quarter of 1975 fiscal year, which began September 1, were \$1.75 billion, or 28 percent from the first quarter of last year.

"More than half the increase in education costs," Bullock said, pointing out that state expenditures for education rose 29 percent.

Revenues for the first quarter of fiscal 1976 were \$1.45 billion, an increase of 15 percent from the comparable quarter a year ago. The largest jump in revenue was in federal funding, up 29 percent over the previous fiscal year, the Comptroller said.

Bullock said tax collections were up 10 percent over the previous year. The 10 percent figure was probably low, he added, because the combination of Thanksgiving and the last weekend of November caused many quarterly tax returns to be late.

The information was contained in Bullock's November financial statement prepared by his Office of Planning and Research. For the first time, the report included information on the crude oil industry.

The news there is that Texas crude oil production tax revenue has doubled since 1972, even though production has declined slightly," Bullock said. "The reason is that during the same period crude oil prices have shot up faster than a spooked stallion."

Ag Folks Can Save Taxes

COLLEGE STATION—Americans will save \$2.1 billion in tax money this year as a result of the Tax Reduction Act of 1975. And some changes are of particular interest to farmers.

Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, advises agricultural producers to give close attention to such tax changes as 1975 draws to a close.

"One change involves an increase in the level of investment credit," points out Hayenga. "A 10 per cent increase in investment credit in the law through 1976. This credit applies to property bought or under construction after last Jan. 21 and before Jan. 1, 1977."

A permanent change associated with investment credit has also been made. Instead of having to wait to claim the credit until the construction is completely done, individuals can claim credit on progressive payments during the construction period, notes Hayenga.

Also, the amount of used property that qualifies for investment credit has been increased from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

A tax break designed to help small farmers and other self-employed workers will make individuals with an annual income between \$4,000

Give Safety As Gift This Christmas

AUSTIN—If you haven't completed your Christmas shopping, the Texas Safety Association suggests a couple of gifts for safety this holiday season.

One requires the giver to exercise his will-power, the second gift to demonstrate his concern for the child of your choice.

The first gift would help insure that holiday travelers traffic crashes annually. Many could be saved if they wore, and still a good financial prospect for their Christmas celebration. That is to "give" yourself one hour for every early before you start to drive.

The reason behind this, the Texas Safety Association explains, is that the body requires about one hour for the alcohol in the average drink to be eliminated from the body.

Because half of all traffic fatalities involve alcohol, the "one hour" rule is the most important gift a parent can give when partying and driving.

The second gift is a present to the child of your choice of an appropriate child restraint system for the car he or she rides in, instead of permitting him to ride unrestrained in a dynamic environment. Nationwide the National Council reports that almost 1500 children under the age of five lose their lives in traffic crashes annually. Many could be saved if they wore, and still a good financial prospect for their Christmas celebration. That is to "give" yourself one hour for every early before you start to drive.

Ordinary seat belts are unsuitable for very young children, because in a crash the drink you take at a holiday party before you start to drive can do heavy damage to a child's fragile body. Child restraint systems designed to more effectively distribute the forces of collision around the body, lessening the chances of injury. Child restraint seats are available at moderate cost from many automobile dealers and jewelry stores. They would make an excellent gift for a youngster, and might be the most important gift a parent can give when partying and driving.

Think Before Returning Gift Merchandise

COLLEGE STATION—After the holidays, the gift-returning consumer should follow some easy guidelines to make the transaction as smooth as possible, a consumer specialist says.

"Not all merchandise can be returned, especially personal products. Some stores will exchange gifts for another selection or give a credit, receipt while other stores may give cash refunds."

"And some stores will not accept merchandise bought at all price for merchandise sold at a reduced price," the consumer information specialist pointed out.

Miss Mizel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service The Texas A&M University System.

"When returning merchandise, have receipts and tags with you. It is easier if you keep receipts and price tags together—and labeled for any gift you buy that may need returning."

If the store has a "Return Desk" or "Return Department," take the merchandise and sales receipt there—if not, go to the department where it was purchased. Only return merchandise to the store where it was bought.

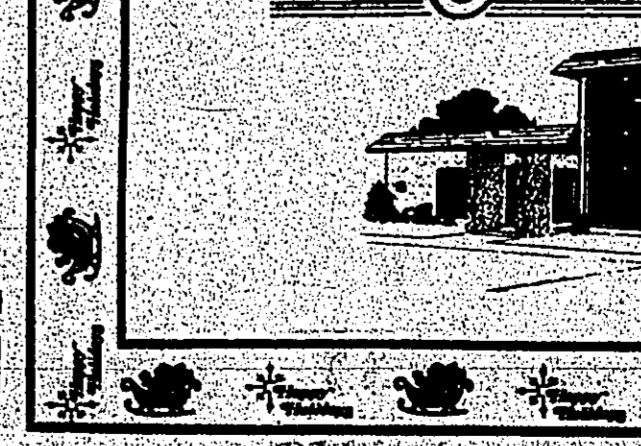

The Madonna and Child in Painting

The Madonna and Child have long been a source of inspiration to artists. The period that produced the greatest works of art of the Madonna and Child was the Renaissance, though there is evidence of painting of the Madonna long before.

The number of Madonna pictures increased after the Council of Ephesus in 431 A.D. when the Virgin Mary and Child became symbols of the accepted Christian faith. The oldest paintings were found in the catacombs of the early Christians, built between the first and fifth centuries, as places of worship. As persecution of the Christians under Roman emperors be-

came more intense, they took to the catacombs as places of prayer and refuge. In the catacombs of Saint Callistus, in Rome, one of the earliest pictures of the Holy Family was found.

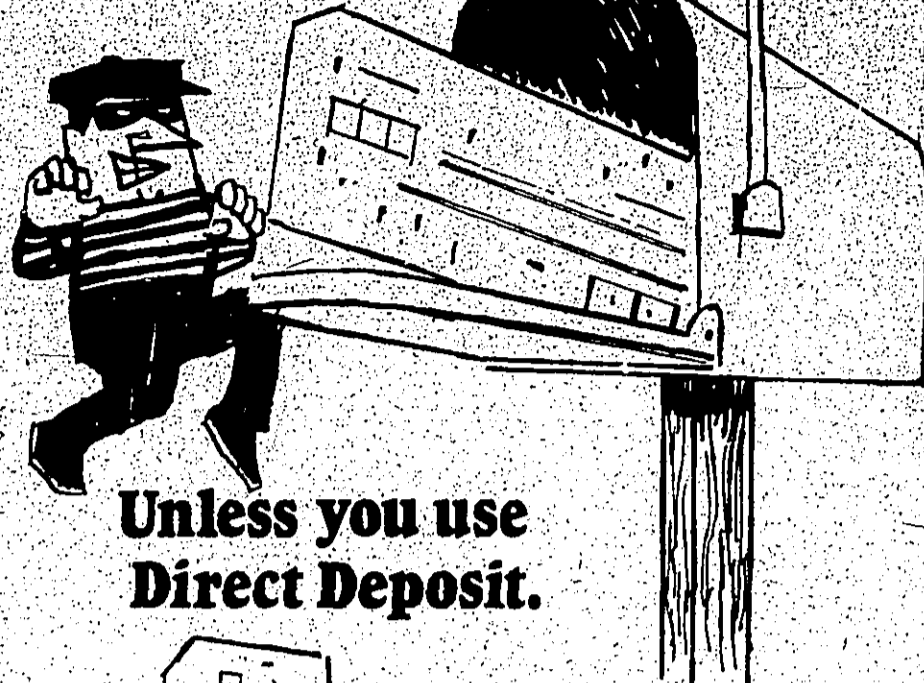
Renaissance means "rebirth" of the art of classic antiquity. Although dates of the period vary from country to country, it is generally agreed that it began in the late 1400's and lasted into the early 1600's. It was a time in which new styles developed in painting, sculpture and architecture. The society in which the artist lived greatly influenced his art.

Some of the greatest pieces of religious art were produced in this period. Paintings of the Madonna were fewer after the 1600's, but the really important paintings were produced before then.

Fra Filippo Lippi represented a sentimental trend in painting of the Renaissance. His "Madonna Adoring the Child" includes a deep forest background in his painting that shows the youthful mother kneeling before the Child. There is a feeling of light and delicacy in his stirring work "Madonna and Child Enthroned".

Some of the greatest paintings of the Madonna were done by Raphael in the late Renaissance. In his short but brilliant life, he

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Special mention goes to Andrea del Sarto, called the "perfect painter" by Florentines of the High Renaissance. He produced masterpieces like "The Holy Family," extremely satisfying and popular works of art.

One of the greatest painters of all time, Titian, a leading painter of the Venetian school, affirmed his joy of life in his "Assumption of the Virgin."

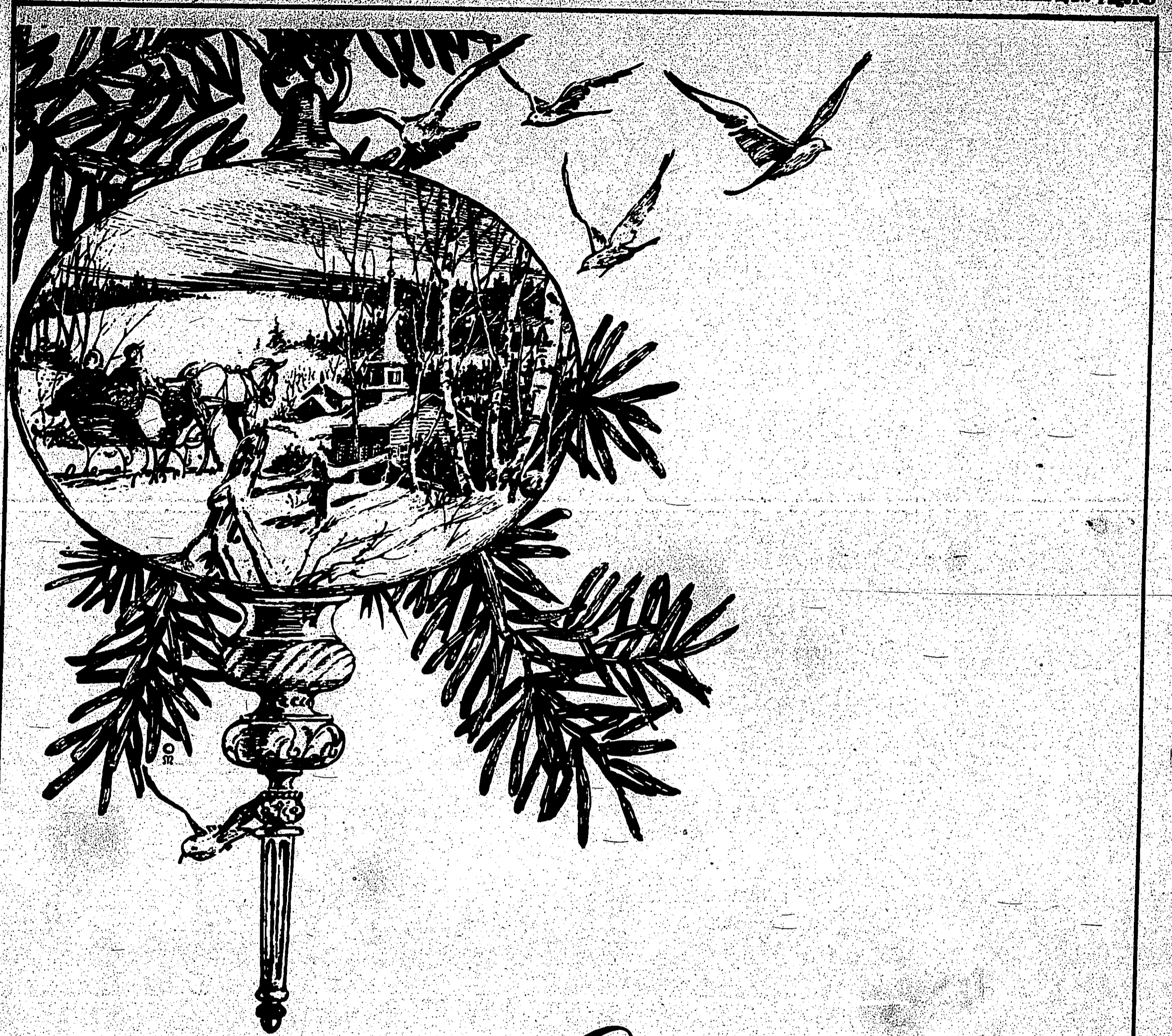

Mulled Fruit Punch

- 1-46 oz. can orange fruit punch
- 1-46 oz. can apricot nectar
- 6 whole allspice
- 8 inches stick cinnamon
- 1/2 lemon sliced thin

Combine all ingredients in large saucepan; bring to boil. Cover and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from heat and let stand for 1/2 hour. Reheat and strain spices out. Garnish with orange slices studded with cloves, after pouring into punch bowl. Makes about 20 servings, punch cup size.

Bubbly Cranberry Punch

- 2 cans jellied cranberry sauce (16 oz. size)
- 1/2 cup lemon juice

- 2 large bottles chilled ginger ale (28 oz. bottles)

Beat cranberry sauce until smooth and stir in lemon and orange juices. Empty several trays of ice cubes into a punch bowl and pour mixture over them. Carefully add ginger ale and mix. Serve in punch cups. About 20-25 cups.



Yummy Frosted Holiday Bread

- 1-13 3/4 oz. pkg. hot roll mix
- 1/4 cup warm water
- 1 egg
- 2 tbsp. granulated sugar
- 2 tbsp. butter melted (margarine if you prefer)
- 1/2 cup mixed candied fruits
- 1 cup white raisins
- 1/4 tsp. ground cardamom
- 1 cup sifted confectioners sugar
- 2 tbsp. light cream
- Candied cherries
- Sliced almonds

Sprinkle yeast from hot roll mix over warm water. In large bowl, stir to dissolve. Add egg, granulated sugar and butter, mix well. Stir in fruit, raisins, cardamom, and flour mix from hot roll mixture. Cover; let rise in warm place about 45 minutes; till mixture about doubles. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 10 strokes. Shape into ball; place in 9-inch pie plate and flatten. Let rise about 30 minutes, till doubled. Bake in 375° oven for about 30-35 minutes, covering with foil if it browns too quickly. Remove from pie plate and cool on rack. Mix together the sifted confectioners sugar and cream; drizzle over bread. Trim with candied cherries and almonds in wreath shape. Perfect for serving after tree trimming.

The Cruellest Tax

WASHINGTON—The most cruel tax you have to pay isn't even called a tax by the politicians who have foisted it upon you.

I can't imagine a more oppressive tax than the hidden tax of inflation, which is ravaging the real income of all Americans.

Inflation is a regressive tax which hurts the poor more than the rich, and the middle class worst of all. It is an insidious tax that demeans the value of work, encourages profligacy and waste, and erodes the productive resources of society.

Inflation, moreover, is a tax which no voter has ever approved, which excheates capriciously, and which is all too impossible to limit.

The tax of inflation has been rising rapidly in recent years. Consumer prices rose by 12 per cent in 1974, on top of an 8 per cent increase in 1973.

Most Americans perceive the symptoms of inflation—ever increasing price levels—not its cause. This is dangerous. To try to cure inflation by removing its symptoms with such measures as wage and price controls is as futile as trying to cure measles by removing the spots.

Inflation is the result of expanding the supply of money in an economy at a faster rate than the production of goods and services is increasing. If there is more money chasing fewer goods, price levels go up.

Excessive federal deficits are the primary cause of inflation. Every dollar that the federal government spends over what it takes in taxes indirectly to an increase in the money supply of about \$2.50.

This is how it works:

(1) When the federal government runs a deficit, it issues 100% Treasury bills—and sells them to investors in order to make up the deficit.

(2) The more the federal government borrows, the more it drives down the price of its own Treasury bills and the price of all other debt instruments such as bonds issued by cities and states and private corporations. This is the same as increasing interest rates.

(3) In order to keep interest rates from going too high, the Federal Reserve buys Treasury bills to slow the decline of security prices. In effect, one agency of the federal government issues new money to pay for the debts of the other agencies.

(4) The money the Federal Reserve uses to buy the Treasury bills supplies reserves to commercial banks, which use the reserves to provide loans to businesses and consumers.

(5) Since banks are able to loan out about \$2.50 for every dollar they hold in reserves, and each loan leads to a dollar-for-dollar increase in the money supply, each dollar the Federal Reserve spends to buy Treasury bills ultimately results in a \$2.50 increase in the money supply.

Deficit spending is the result of lax fiscal policy by the government. It stems from the cowardly reluctance of the politicians to tell the voters the true cost of the programs they are proposing.

There is no easy way to repeal the tax of inflation. Halting inflation would involve giving up those governmental programs being funded by this hidden tax, and this would offend many powerful, special interest groups. But inflation must be halted or it will destroy our economy.

The first step to ending the tax of inflation is to recognize that it is a tax—that there is not, after all, any such thing as a free lunch, or a harmless budget deficit.

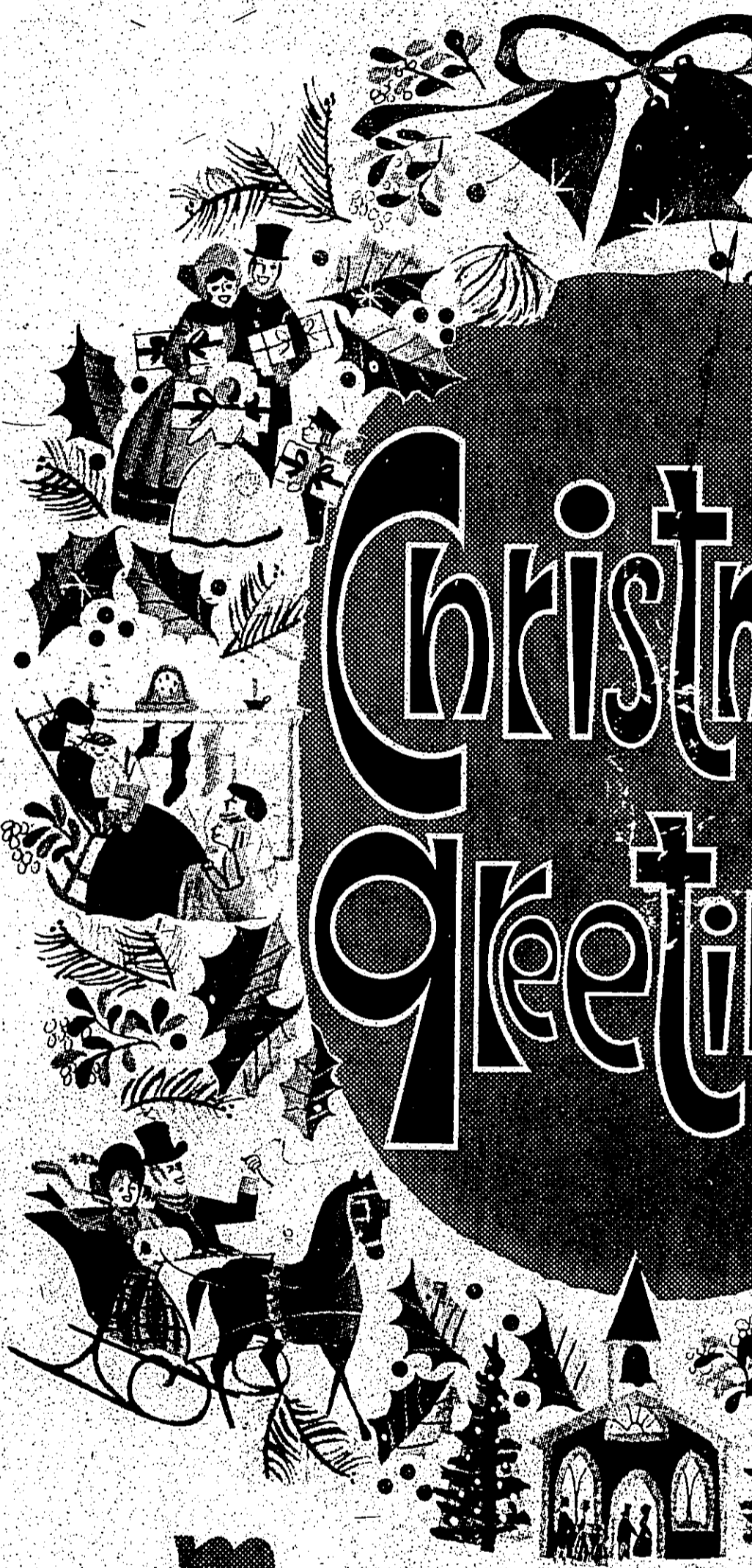

The romantic and beautiful snow scene above, so typical of Christmas and Santa's world, was taken in Loomis, California, about 1919.

Loomis is northeast of the capital city of Sacramento; Sacramento itself embraces the city on which Captain John A. Sutter, in 1839, arrived and started building the Adobe House that became famous as Sutter's Fort. This seemingly undramatic act set the stage for the colorful and turbulent gold rush.

California is a land of stark contrasts. Tropical flowers bloom in mid-winter in the south, and oranges ripen within sight of snow-capped mountains. Only a few hours away from snow-covered ski trails, bathers sun on sandy beaches.

The Sierra Nevada, the coldest part of the state, has experienced freezing temperatures even in the summer. Winters are long and severe and some of the peaks are snow-covered all year. Although snow is nearly unknown in the valleys of the central and southern coast, at Yarnack, in the Sierra Nevada, the yearly snowfall averages about 48 inches.

Early in 1960, the winter Olympic Games were held in Squaw Valley blank among the Sierra Nevada mountains. Athletes from about 30 countries competed.

Christmas in California has many moods like its weather and geography. Spanish and Mexican traditions and customs flavor the holiday as well as those brought to the west, when the frontier was settling.

California's ever-growing population draws together its Christmas in the spirit of peace and brotherhood that mark this holiday all over our great nation!

Would you believe that Christmas cards are sent every year? No wonder the post office lines extra help each year! It does sound like a mammoth job. But what a lovely way to wish "friends" and family well and to renew old friendships. But do you know what exchanging Christmas cards is a comparatively recent custom?

Although there are several claims as to who originated the sending of Christmas cards, there is evidence that this custom began in England in the early 1800's. It is generally acknowledged that Louis Prang, a native German who settled in Boston, introduced them to America in about 1875.

His early cards, produced by a process of color lithography, were models of exquisite craftsmanship. They featured flower designs such as daisies and roses, and were quite unlike Christmas cards of today. By 1881, Prang was turning out about 6 million cards a year, and as time went by he offered more types of Christmas scenes, including the visit of Santa Claus, Madonna and Child, and blazing fires.

In 1880 or 1881 Prang sponsored an open competition for Christmas card designs, offering prizes that came to about \$3,000. More than 600 entries were received and were exhibited in galleries. Noted personalities of that time acted as judges.

The superior quality and workmanship of the Prang cards added to their popularity. However, with an increasing demand for cards, inferior, imitative, cheaper cards came flooding in from Europe, and Prang found it hard to compete. He stopped producing his beautiful cards, but they are still highly valued and sought after by collectors.

Now we have cards available to fit our every mood, and one would be hard pressed to imagine the number of artists and verse writers who make up this creative force of this vast industry. Sending and receiving Christmas cards is one of the delights of the holiday.

There is no doubt that this heartwarming custom will continue and so we say "thanks" to Louis Prang wherever he may be for adding a spirit to Christmas in America.

The Consumer Alert

JUSTIN—The Christmas size 14 cent certain flammability standards. The Texas Department of Health recently issued a regulation to protect children's safety as Christmas gifts. As required by the Act, it is currently working with federal agencies to develop better flammability testing procedures. This type of testing is being done by the state.

In addition to checking all clothing and fabrics for such labels as "non-flammable," "flame-retardant," or "flame-resistant," parents should always examine toys which are given to children as gifts. They should be sure that the toys are safe for the child's age, strength, maturity, and ability. Physical attributes of the child and where the toy will be used. Adults should also check the proper use of a summer Protection Division new toy, and should supervise children who are using toys. Parents should thoroughly understand its operation, since any toy can be dangerous if it is misused.

It's important to check all toys occasionally to see if they have developed sharp points, rough edges, or loose parts that could cause accidents. Most commonly, children will put toys away where they won't be broken or caused derel agencies responsible.

If a child has been given electrical toys, parents should demonstrate the proper, safe way to disconnect the cord. And if warning labels on toys given to older children caution against use by younger ones, parents should be sure to be impressed with the need for safe storage away from others.

If there is a question of misrepresentation of the toys, parents should contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division or your county or district attorney.
