For 6 Months COG Approves Surplus Proposal

Reports on surplus property and Manpower were among the items presented at the December meeting of the Executive Committee of the Deep East Texas Council of Governments, held in Woodville at the Woodville Inn.

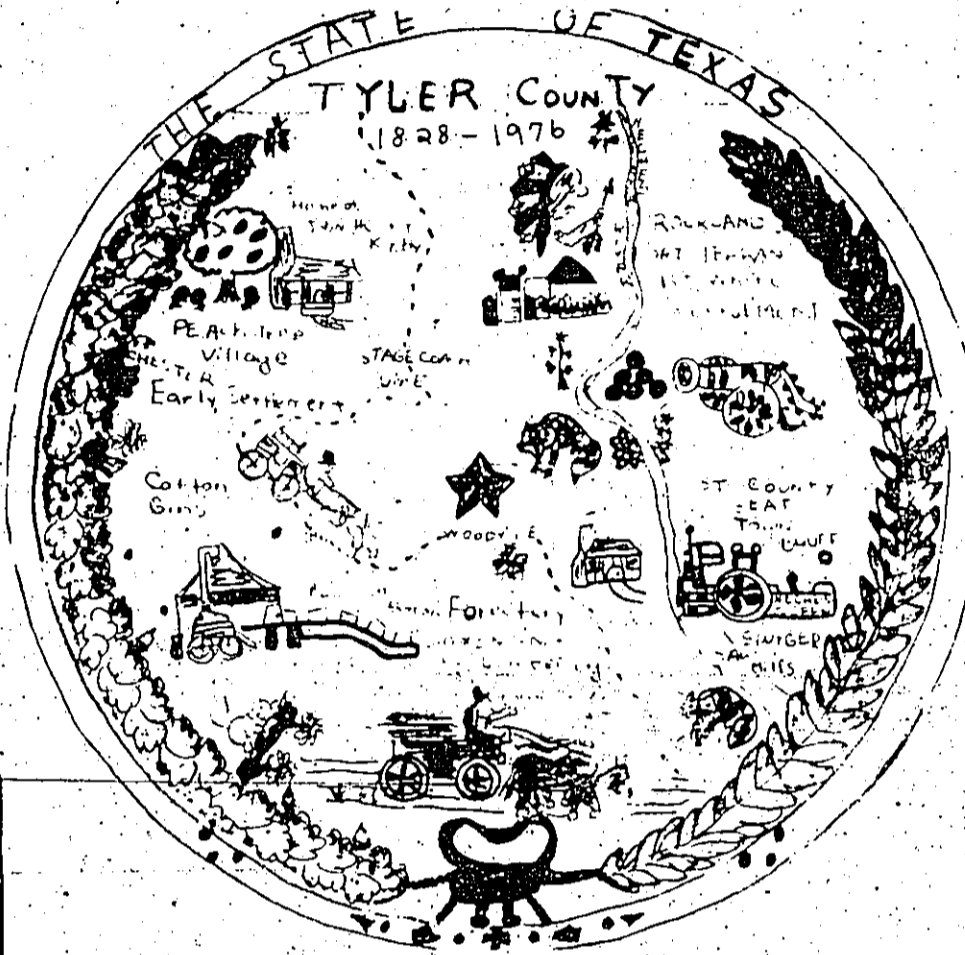
The meeting began at 3 p.m. with Tyler County Judge Tom D. Mann delivering the welcome.

DETCOG's Executive Committee approved a plan for a six-month trial period to obtain surplus federal properties through the Economic Development Administration. Such property could be used for fire protection in rural areas, county road improvements, or for solid waste

collection and disposal. Items like bulldozers, trucks, office furniture, fire trucks and road graders could be obtained on a two-year lease program from EDV.

The trial period would run from Jan. 1, 1976 to June 30, 1976.

Diboll Mayor Clyde Thompson, Chairman of DETCOG's Manpower Advisory Council and member of the Governor's Prime Sponsor Planning Council, gave a report on manpower activities. He stated that some \$2,900,000 in pass-through funds came through the DETCOG area during the past fiscal year, and \$1,200,000 of that amount was used in the Title I Manpower program.

Big Thicket Gets Five Acre Gift

SARATOGA--The Big Thicket National Preserve received a Christmas present Sunday, a five-acre gift of land in the Jack Gore Baygall Unit of the Big Thicket National Preserve were donated to the Big Thicket Association by Houston Thompson, veteran WIA-board member, chairman of the Museum Committee, and Slisbee attorney.

When the land is eventually sold to the National Park Service, the money must be used for Museum development.

The announcement of the gift was made by Howard Peacock, President of the Big Thicket Association, who expressed great pleasure and pride in the gift in behalf of the board.

"This gift is indicative of the kind of interest and involvement we have on our bo-

ard," Peacock observed, recalling that recently Thompson and six other board members had contributed funds for the purchase of another acre to add to the Association's property in Saratoga, which adds frontage on FR 770.

In presenting the gift to the board, Thompson speculated that there may be other landowners who have property designated for the Preserve who would like to make similar contributions to the Museum.

"Funding our Museum is always going to be a problem," Thompson said, "unless we can establish a sizeable endowment. We have a fine opportunity to serve our area and the nation, but it will take hard work and money to fulfill that opportunity."

Thompson also sought permission from the board to accept other gifts in behalf of the Museum, which are pending.

A Museum Fund drive is now underway in Hardin County and the area to raise immediate funds for Museum operation. Funds will be used to keep the Museum open longer hours and to employ a qualified Museum director, Thompson said. Siviculture Course Offered In Woodville

NACOGDOCHES--A special graduate-level course, "Siviculture of southern bottomland hardwoods," will be offered in Woodville during the spring semester by the school of forestry at Stephen F. Austin State University.

Dr. Laurance C. Walker, dean of the SFA school of forestry, said the course will be taught on Thursday nights after the SFA spring semester gets underway Jan. 16.

The class will meet at the Woodville Inn, from 7-10 p.m. It will be taught by Dr. Gerald Lowry, associate professor of silviculture at SFA.

Dr. Walker said the course will consist of detailed analysis of silvicultural and harvest methods and regeneration procedures for major and minor hardwood forest types in the south.

"The over-all goal of the Human Services Delivery System (HSDS) program is to make available to our citizens the social services necessary to reduce or eliminate poverty and to improve the quality of life in Deep East Texas. A two-faceted course of action will be directed toward fulfillment of the above goal," said Mary Bodley, HSDS coordinator for the Deep East Texas Council of Governments recently.

"First, personnel of existing social service provider agencies must be encouraged to communicate with one another and to coordinate their programs. To foster this communication, an organization of persons involved in the delivery of social services has been formed. At present, this Inter-Agency Council has 21 active, voting member entities: 16 social service providers, 4 counties, and a school district. Membership is voluntary and always open," she said.

The second facet of the HSDS program, Bodley explains, involves filling gaps in available services. Each year, our Region will receive an allocation of State-appropriated HSDS money. Directed by a vote of the Inter-Agency Co-

uncil the Deep East Texas Council of Governments, as grantee and administrator of these HSDS funds, will subcontract with entities around the Region and provide those entities with small amounts of funds so that they may start new, needed social service programs for the Region.

Before any entity can receive any Human Services Delivery System (HSDS) funding, their project proposals must gain the support and blessing of the local elected officials in the areas in which the programs will operate. The HSDS program and the Inter-Agency Council will not fund any program which local elected officials do not wish to be operated in their jurisdiction, she said.

corded in the official documentation of the agency application, attend this meeting, according to Lyn Holt, Deep East Texas Council of Governments Public Information Officer.

Included on the agenda for the meeting are the following entries: Introduction & Purpose of the Meeting; Responsibilities and Requirements of an HSA; Report of the Steering Committee; Board and Summary of Organizational Development; Presentation of the HSA Work Program; Qualifications of the Applicant Entity; Composition of the HSA Governing Body; and the Recording of Public Comment. It is requested that all individuals wishing to comment on any phase of this meeting, please write down the comments if possible so that all comments can be incorporated not only on tape, but as a written record as well.

According to Holt, for those who cannot attend the public meeting, a copy of the Agenda and materials to be presented at the meeting will be available for copy or review at the Office of the Texas Secretary of State, each county courthouse, in the Deep East Texas Council of Governments Region, and at the Main Office of the Deep East Texas Council of Governments. Written comments should be mailed, not later than 3 January 1976, to: HSA Steering Committee, Jasper, Texas 75951.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

Four months ago, representatives from thirty-two small cities in Texas and in other states came to me asking for support. They had just formed the American Association of Small Cities, an organization limited to cities and municipalities with populations under 50,000 people. Its goal: to resolve those special problems faced by cities this size across the nation.



By the time the Association met in Belmond, Texas, barely a week ago for its first general meeting, its membership had grown to more than 250 cities and municipalities across twenty states.

Obviously, this cause has some very strong driving power, and with good reason. The representatives that came to see me focused on a central issue that has long concerned me. That issue is this: Although these small communities face the same critical problems that big cities do, they do not receive the same amount of federal attention.

Winter Waterbeds Save Infants Lives

Heated waterbeds sound wonderful for winter nights. They may also save little lives. Every year in the United States, thousands of infants die from a respiratory disease syndrome called crib death. The pattern is almost always the same. The baby is put to bed happy and healthy. During the night, there is no sign of disturbance of any kind. In the morning, the baby is dead. The cause is not suffocation. Autopsies show no clear-cut pathology in the lungs or anywhere else; there's no evidence of vomiting or choking. This fatal phenomenon, some experts believe, is brought about by spasms of the vocal chords which shut off the intake of air during sleep. A viral infection in the respiratory tract could cause breathing difficulties and trigger the lethal spasm. Death may result from an inhalation of bacteria through the mouth when nasal passages close. No one knows for sure. But the disease happens more often in winter than any other season. Now doctors at the University of California hope that heated waterbeds can help reduce the death toll among newborn babies. Dr. Louis Gluck, who has developed a method for predicting this condition in unborn infants, says the small water mattress, kept at body temperature, gives the baby the same sense of weightlessness as the mother's womb. He says heating the waterbed can give the infant a constant sense of motion, and the recording on a heart-beat can duplicate the mother's and be passed through the waterbed. Researchers plan to set up the special, blessing centers for babies in the infant intensive care unit at the University's School of Medicine in San Diego. 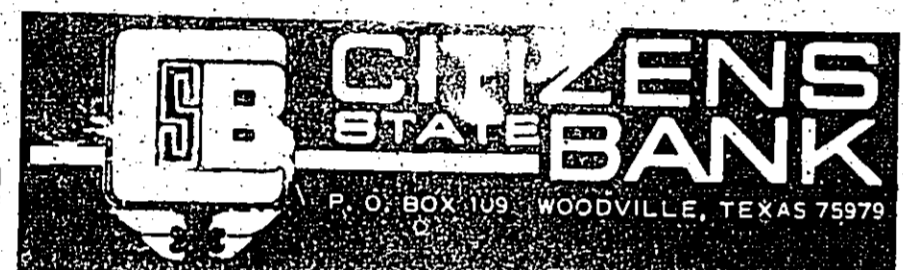

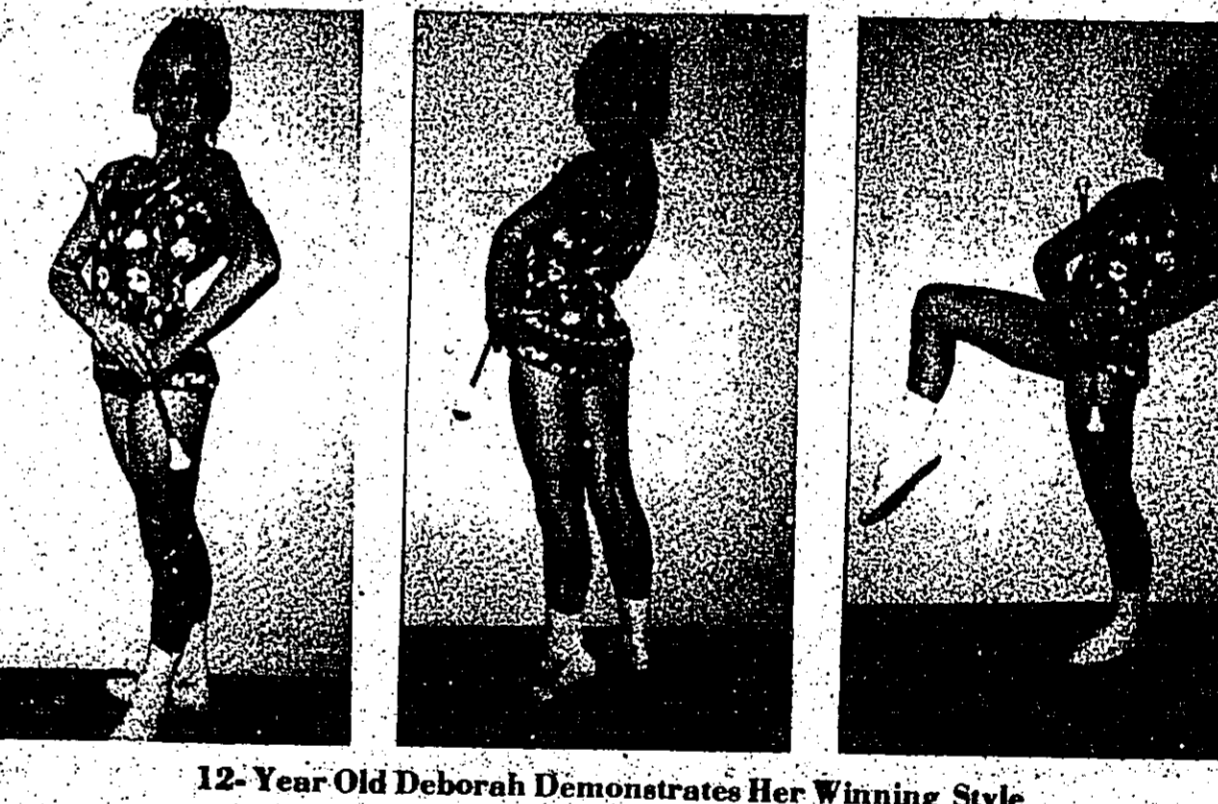

Licenses Down

AUSTIN—Fishing and hunting licenses were down 10.5 percent in numbers during the period Sept. 1 through Nov. 30, 1975, as compared to the same quarter in 1974, and income to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department dropped \$265,233.80.

Some 63 F&W licenses were listed in the comparative report. The total number sold in that three month period in 1975 was 1,006,796, down from 1,123,530 during the same period in 1974. Revenue dropped from \$4,428,874.84 in 1974 to \$3,854,228.45 for the same three months this year.

The widest combination hunting and fishing license which went into effect Sept. 1, 1974, took a dip from 646,815 sold during the period last year to 517,011 sold through the same three months in 1975 — a loss of \$368,302.75 in revenue to the F&W Game and Fish Fund.

F&W licenses remained this week also show fishing licenses (which are valid for residents and non-residents alike) were down 114,229 from the 339,158 in 1974 to 224,929 in the first three quarters of 1975.

Second Dove Season Begins On January 3

AUSTIN—Shortly after 7 a.m. in the southern quarter of Texas, hunters aimed in the dim light a half hour before sunrise on January 3 will be ready for the second part of the mourning dove season.

An old Southern tradition? Hardy, at least not in Texas. The state has not had dove shooting before noon since the 1950 season a quarter-century ago.

For 16 days through Jan. 18, 1976, though, hunters in the South Zone only will be taking part in this experimental departure to measure the amount of interest in full-day dove hunting in mid-winter and the kind of dove hunting it attracts.

Questionnaires will be mailed to a review committee of hunters after the close of the season and those replying to the Wildlife Department officials to complete and return the information as quickly as possible.

The second portion of the South Zone season is open for a half hour before sunrise to sunset daily with a bag limit of 10 and 20 in possession. Mourning doves may be hunted only in those South Zone counties south and east of and including Maverick, Zavala, Croft, Alameda, Wilbarger, Garza, Caldwell, Bastrop, Lee, Burleson, Brazos, Madison, Walker, Trinity, Angelina, San Augustine and Sabine Counties.
