Great Aggie runners like Dick Todd, John Kimbrough, John David Crow and Larry Stegert all take back seats to Bean when it comes to advancing the football on the ground.

The six-foot, 198-pounder recently completed a fantastic four-year career at Aggie land, during which he ran 422 times for 2,646 yards, an average of 5.9 yards each time he ran with the football.

A starter for four seasons, Bean came to A&M from Kirbyville High where he had set all sorts of Texas Schoolboy records as a running back.

But, in Coach Emory Ballard's "Wishbone offense" at A&M, Bean first had to learn to block, a primary requisite for a halfback.

Today, Bean is a complete football player, a runner who moves with a fluid motion that belies his speed and power.

And, he finished as one of the really great clocking backs in Southwest Conference history.

"Bubba is one of the most unselfish football players I've ever coached," Ballard declared. "He's a tremendous blocker, a real team player and he puts everything he has into every play."

Three times in his senior year he was named A&M's Offensive Player of the game in televised contests against Illinois, Texas and Southern California.

He's expected to go high in the upcoming pro-draft this month.

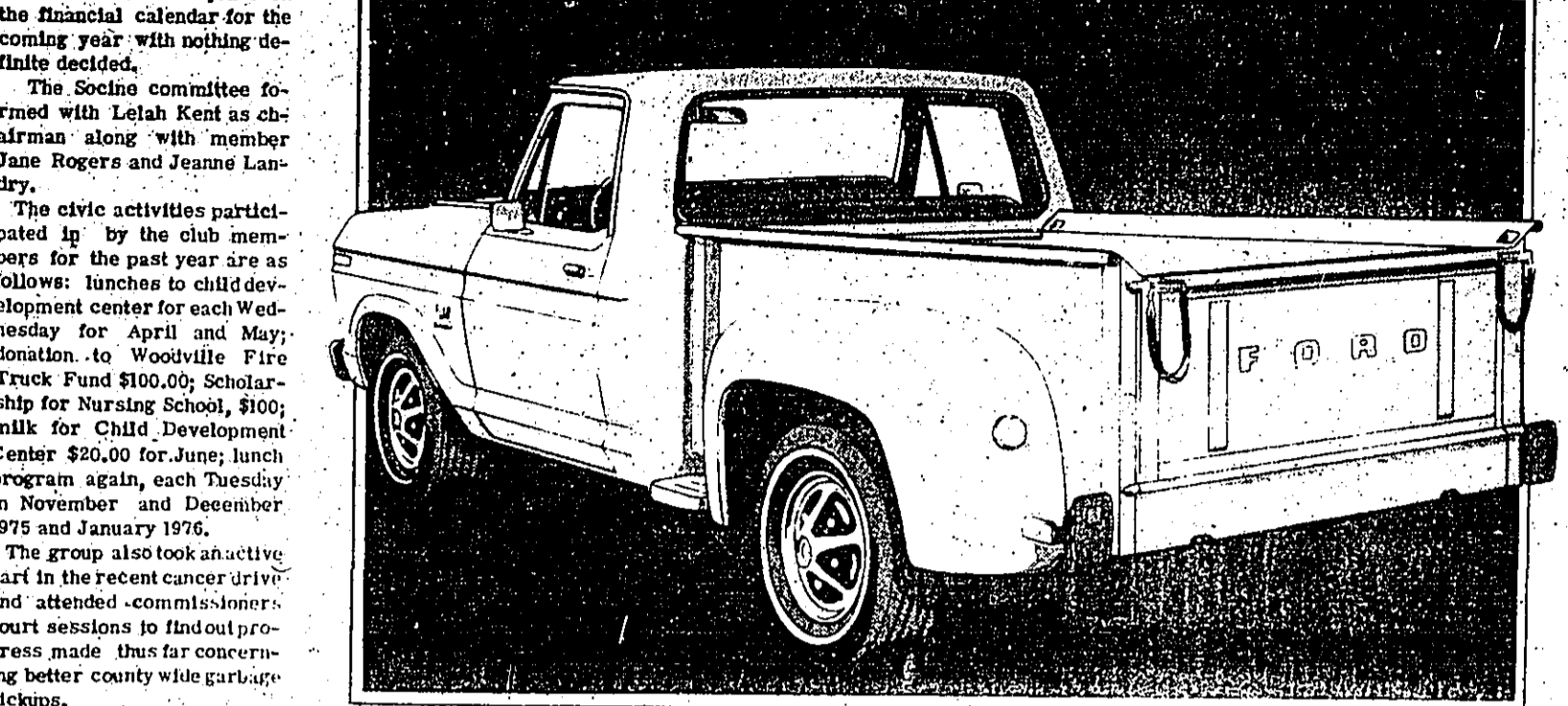
