

At Chamber Banquet Friday Wallace Scoffs At 'Selfish' Congress

Mack Wallace, Railroad Commissioner for the State of Texas, told a collection of Tyler County dignitaries Friday night that if "Texas were to drop out of the Union, that it would still hold the ninth position worldwide in gross national product."

Wallace, who gets upset when the nation's Congress turns it back on the state of Texas, said that "the technology to produce enough fuel" is available, but that residents of Woodville are fined or pay a tax

of \$500 just for owning a car. "This city doesn't have a clean air problem," Wallace said, "but you are forced to pay."

Wallace said that part of the answer was in individual communication with legislators and their requiring elected officials to use "every parliamentary rule in the book" to reconstruct the situation.

"One man's convictions are worth 1,000 words of opinions," Wallace said the price of everything in the future depends on the resources a nation has.

Texas alone has 400 years supply of lignite alone and yet Congress is "trying to meddle with the laws of supply and demand."

Dam B Parks Area To Get \$1.5 Million

The Dam-B area in eastern Tyler County will get some much needed improvement money in about 60 days when implementation of a \$1.5 million dollar parks improvement program gets underway within the confines of the Martin Dies Jr. State Park which also includes a portion of Jasper County.

Cooperating efforts between the U. S. Soil Conservation Service and the Parks and Wildlife Department have resulted in approval of the usage of the funds on a matching basis for parks improvement. Jasper County participation in proportionate allocated will center in two areas on the east side of Dam-B in two parks areas; The Walnut Ridge Unit and the Henhouse Ridge Unit.

The Cherokee Unit is on the Tyler County side of the Dam-B Steinhagen lake water crossing.

The project received fund-

ing "for recreational and erosion control," hence the cooperative effort of both governmental agencies.

A pact was signed in Woodville on Jan. 28 outlining the specifics of the \$1,412,850 program which Tyler County Soil and Water Conservation official Tommy Mackey says will be underway in approximately 60 days.

Specific objectives of the plan are "to provide a higher quality recreation experience for more than 346,000 visitors, and to provide a better experience for 80,000 additional visitors that the improvements reportedly will bring.

Problems that the project reportedly will concentrate on will include: road surfacing, utilities extensions, shoreline erosion control, multi-use campsites, boat launch ramp extensions, restroom facilities, swimming beach improve-

ments, mini-bike trail extension, traffic control, trailer dump stations, and a group picnic facility."

The total park area includes some 705 acres of East Texas' most beautiful country side.

"It is estimated that about 30,000 additional 'visitors days' of use per year will be created by this planned development. In addition the value of a user day will increase so the monetary benefit resulting from recreational use of the facilities is estimated to be \$256,000 computed from the present \$1.25 per day expenditures to a new total of \$1.50.

Signatures on the implementing document to begin the project were Longleaf Soil and Water Conservation Chairman Val Blanchette, Joe Goetz, T.P.W. Engineer and technician and George Reynolds, District Secretary for the district.

the president's message

Dear Tyler County Citizens:

It is an honor to have been selected President of the Chamber of Commerce for the year 1976, the year of the United States Bicentennial. I humbly accept the honor and promise to do my best in the performance of the job. I hope, that, by next year at this time, we will be able to present at least some evidence of progress toward the objective I have in mind.

When asked "What are your objectives during your term as President of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce?" the first thing that came to mind was "Stay solvent - don't go broke!!"

But I have in mind a single objective, which although somewhat abstract, is still a worthy one and you have heard the thought expressed many times but few really know where it came from.

Back in the year 500BC, there was a man known as Aesop. His actual existence is denied by some scholars but, at any rate, he was supposed to have written a collection of short stories - each with a lesson to be learned. One of these stories or "fables", if you prefer, is titled "The Four Oxen and the Lion" in which the thought "United We Stand; Divided We Fall", was expressed.

The next recorded expression of this thought we find in the words of Jesus in Chapter 3 of Mark, New Testament, verse 25 - "And if a house be divided against itself, that house cannot stand." (These same words were quoted from the Bible by Abraham Lincoln during the Lincoln-Douglas debates in the year 1858).

But before Lincoln and in the year 1768, there was a man named John Dickinson who wrote the words for a song entitled "The Liberty Song". In that song are the words "By Uniting We Stand - By Dividing We Fall". That song served to bring the American settlers together in defiance of the British which resulted in the American Revolution and the birth of our Country 200 years ago.

Notice that first mention of the thought "United we Stand - Divided we Fall" was first expressed about two thousand three hundred years ago and has carried through generation after generation to this very day. That would indicate to me that it is a perfectly valid thought.

Therefore, I propose that the objective of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce during the year 1976 be "To Unite Tyler County". Now I'm not saying we are totally divided - but I think there is room for improved

cooperation among citizens, cities, governments and organized groups within Tyler County. If you've ever driven a mule team you know that if one of the lead pair tries to "Gee" and the other tries to "Haw" at the same time the wagon "don't roll". So lets' all us mules get together and pull in the same direction and we'll see progress. The battle cry is "Tyler County Unite".

Gary Pircher, local manager for the company says the majority of the money was used to upgrade rural service and to provide additional lines, trucks and switching equipment for the Woodville central office.

"Last year we spent over \$100,000 in adding 600 lines,

300 numbers and a variety of circuits and switching equipment to our Woodville central office," said Pircher. "Woodville, like the rest of East Texas is growing at a very rapid pace and consequently we've been expanding our local facilities to accommodate the many new residents who are moving into the area."

Pircher also reported that many customers in the Ivanhoe, Hillster and Doucette areas have had their service upgraded from party line sta-

tion to single line status during the past 24 months. "This project is still going on and it will be completed this year," said Pircher. "In addition to upgrading the service of our customers, this project also involved the water-proofing of existing under-

ground cable and burying overhead cable. A construction project of this nature is unusual in that it relieves maintenance problems and improves

local transmission in addition to upgrading service," said Pircher. "Another major construction program which will do much to continue to improve our installation and repair operations in the area is scheduled to begin later this year," said Pircher. "We'll be spending about \$16,000 on the construction of a new work center in Woodville."

A work center is what its name indicates -- a local facility where telephone equipment like telephone poles, sets, cable, wires and trucks are stored. The trucks are loaded with whatever supplies an installer or repairman will need to make his or her daily appointments. "No exact details about the new center are available at this time, but this new work center is something we need and I think the citizens of Woodville will find it to be an attractive addition to the city," said Pircher.

"The amount of money the company spends on new facilities like work centers and additional switching equipment is really not what's important," Pircher said. "What is important though," says Pircher, "is the improved service those facilities provide our customers."

"I think the expansion programs we've undertaken in Woodville will help us to continue to provide local customers with the best possible telephone service at the lowest possible cost."

Bell Forecasts '76 Expenditures

Southwestern Bell says 1976 will mark the fourth year in a row the company will spend more than a half-billion dollars on construction and expansion programs in Texas to meet the ever increasing communications needs of Texans.

Anticipated expenditures for expansion in the Houston area which includes not only Houston, but also such East Texas cities as Nacogoches, Texas City, Wharton, Orange and Rosenberg will exceed over a quarter of a billion dollars for the first time in history.

A little over \$24 million is due to be spent during the year in the Beaumont division, Bell officials say. The division is made up of the Beaumont, Galveston, Huntsville and Fort Arthur districts. The four districts cover 34 counties and 12,000 square miles.

The majority of the 1976 construction budget is for additional telephone switching equipment, buried cable, microwave facilities and additional routes into rural areas as well as the moisture-proofing of existing underground cables, said Gary Pircher, local manager for the company.

Pircher reported that at the end of 1975 there were about 79,000 Southwestern Bell employees in the five-state area in which the company operates, more than 3,000 in the Beaumont Division.

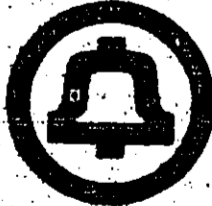

Mack Wallace, 45, was appointed by Governor Dolph Briscoe as Railroad Commissioner to replace Byron Tunnell who resigned, took the oath of office Sept. 18, 1973. Subsequent to his appointment, Wallace was elected to serve the remainder of the term for which he was appointed. Prior to this appointment and election, he had served as Executive Director of the Governor's Criminal Justice Council since about 1972.

Wallace, former District Attorney of the Third Judicial District of Texas, joined the Governor's staff in January 1973 as Administrative Assistant in the Governor's office.

Wallace received his J.D. degree from Baylor University in 1963, and after four years in private law practice, he became Henderson County Attorney in 1967. He continued to serve as County Attorney until 1968 when he became District Attorney for the area including Anderson, Henderson and Houston counties. He

held this post until January 1973.

Wallace has served on the Grievance Prosecuting Committee and the Grievance Committee of District 7A, State Bar of Texas. He is presently serving as Judge Advocate of the Texas State Guard and has the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. For his work on the reorganization of the Texas Military Law, he was awarded the Texas Medal of Merit.

He has long been active in civic affairs as a member of the Henderson County Peace Officers' Association, and a lifetime member of the East Texas Peace Officers' Association, and the Athens Chamber of Commerce. Wallace sponsored a Drug Abuse program for students of Athens High School, and served as a sponsor of the law enforcement segment of the Explorer Scout Program. Wallace and his wife, Carol Ann, have two children, John, age 9, and Leslie, 7. They are members of the Christian Church of Athens.

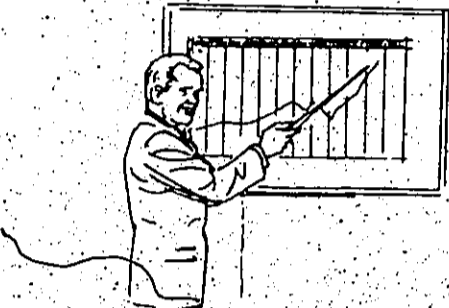

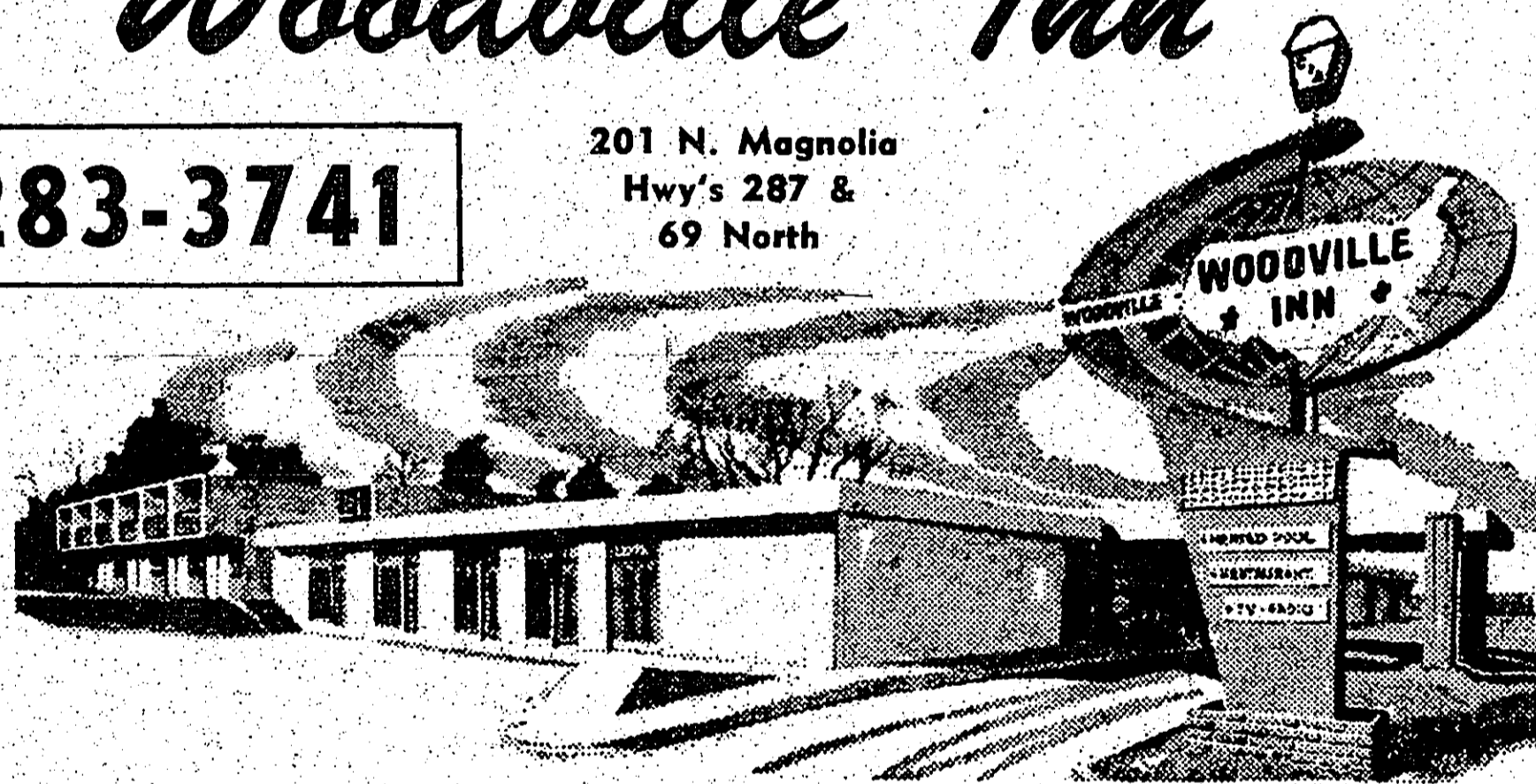

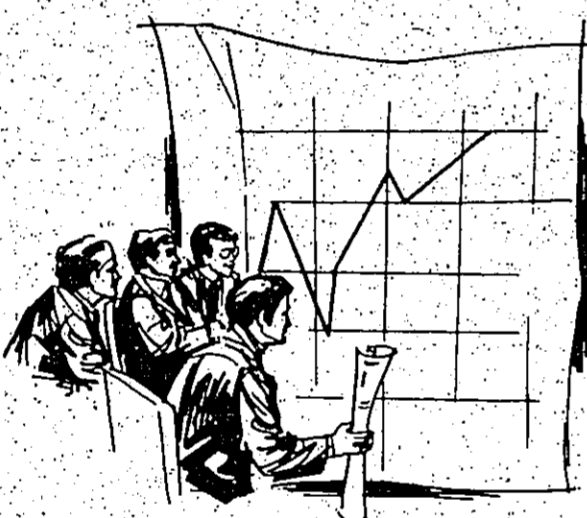

Tyler County Gets Tree Seedlings From Temple

WOODVILLE--In the eighteen years Temple-Eastex Forests' Sillman nursery in Newton County has been producing pine seedlings, more than 230,000,000 trees have been planted on some 460,000 acres of East Texas forestlands.

This planting season, 2,940 acres of understocked forestland in Tyler County will be planted, in a continuing company commitment to keep these foresting sites at peak production.

Assistant Manager, Forest Operations F. Ennis Washburn said, "Replanting harvested areas and those sites that have not responded to natural re-seeding is necessary to insure the future fiber needs of the company's building material and pulp and paper operations."

Washburn said the nursery is now providing seedlings for 25,000 acres of company lands each year.

"We will transplant 13,000,000 trees this season," said Washburn, "with plantings on timber sites in nine Eastex counties."

Outstanding Citizen Award Rule Guidelines Given

The Outstanding Citizen Award shall be made at the Annual Banquet of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, to the individual who shall have been selected as deserving of this special recognition for the calendar year just past.

The award shall consist of a trophy or plaque with suitable inscription on which shall be engraved the name of the winner and the year for which he or she gained the award. No person who has once received the award shall be eligible. Any legal resident of Tyler County shall be eligible.

Selection will be on the basis of who during the past year has given unselfishly of himself, time, and money (according to means), and thereby substantially improved the economic and civic climate of Tyler County. He must have acted in his civic or business works so that he is admired and respected.

The Chamber Secretary will mail letters to civic clubs in Tyler County asking for their nominations and a brief resume of qualifications.

The Chamber Directors shall meet on call to discuss and vote on those nominations, with the President serving as Chairman. A majority of the Directors present shall constitute a quorum and a vote of a majority of those present shall be sufficient to pass on any issue. All voting shall be by secret ballot and the Chairman shall vote in like manner. The name of the recipient shall remain a secret until the presentation is made.
