Hryhorchuk To Get Warren Welcome

The patrons of the Warren Independent School District will get a formal introduction



Adolph Hryhorchuk to their new School Superintendent Adolph Hryhorchuk, (pronounced "Hor-chuck") who takes office July 1, 1976 upon the retirement of W.L. S.D. Superintendent Grover Die on this date. The introduction will be made by Die, as a part of Texas Public Schools Week, which the Warren District is taking advantage of in announcing the hiring of the new Administrator.

Hryhorchuk's 2-year contract was approved at the district's regular board meeting which was held Tuesday, Feb. 17.

Hryhorchuk comes to the Warren Independent School District from the Hudson School District where he has spent the last three years.

Formerly he has been associated with the West Orange Cove I.S.D., in Orange County, where he was theatrical coach and director.

Hryhorchuk modestly says of his hiring from a field of 41 applicants who were screened for the job that "I submitted my application just like everyone else."

He says he's been closely associated with the progress of the Warren I.S.D. while it has been under the leadership of Superintendent Die. He considers the present superintendent a man who is "Always a gentleman...and one

with high moral standards... a requirement" he said "in publication education."

Hryhorchuk says he feels that "the teaching profession has failed in recent years to teach moral standards."

"If we just would teach five minutes a day of good citizenship," Hryhorchuk, who is proud of his Czechoslovakian heritage says his philosophy is "to provide a clean safe place where children can learn and develop at their own rate of speed. Discipline is a prerequisite in maintaining a good educational environment," he added.

Fires Plague County

raging attic fire which believed to have started from a faulty electrical wiring completely demolished the James Allen Riley residence on Seneca Road at about 2:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon.

That fire, along with several others since mid-February, brings the total estimated damage to approximately \$150,000.

Another major fire which occurred early on the morning of Wednesday, Feb. 18 completely knocked out the Allison Pole Mill Tire producing section causing a heavy loss of machinery and equipment.

Veteran Woodville Volunteers in response to that incident fought side-by-side with the Warren Volunteer Fire Department, which had never seen action at an industrial fire since forming just recently.

The Tire Mill fire was the second such fire with the first occurring seven years ago at the same place.

The two major fires along with several vehicle fires have cost the Woodville Volunteers over 150 man hours of volunteer time since mid-February, said Woodville Volunteer Fire Department Marshall Alva Cook.

According to Cook by Tuesday, "The department had responded to nine calls in the last six days, 21 so far this year as compared to a total of 60 last year."

The department responded to the Warren industrial fire only two hours after they had finished fighting a vacuum house fire some eight miles north of Woodville on Hwy. 237.

Firemen believe they helped save a better house and a chipper machine along with three trailers used to haul chips and a welding truck.

Residents in the immediate area report that an employee of the company held the "fog horn" down for a total of 30 minutes letting the folks a Warren know about the fire. The Riley residence fire saw the Volunteer return again about 6 p.m. after the first call to extinguish some stubborn attic embers which had ignited. That call was made approximately three hours after the initial call. Firemen used some 4,000 gallons.

Fire Marshall Cook stated that "Spot fires were breaking out in the woods all around the house."

Cook also stated that an explosion which occurred inside the residence blew a window out knocking Fireman Sid Allison to the ground and barely missing Fire Chief O.L. Marsh.

According to Marsh the men still aren't sure what caused the explosion only that "It

sent a huge mushroom of smoke straight up."

According to a member of the Riley family, "Most everything was lost."

Besides the two major fires reported since mid-February, Woodville Volunteers have responded to three grass fires, two automotive related inci-

idents, one vacant house fire, a trash fire at Keller Industries, and a response to a truck gasoline leak at a local truck stop requiring the volunteers to hose down the truck and immediate area.

"We've put a lot of time in the last two weeks" Cook said.

'Rural Housing' Is Topic

"Rural Housing" will be the topic of J. Lynn Futch's, State Director of Farmers Home Administration, talk to the Deep East Texas Development Association, Friday, Feb. 27.

Futch was appointed as State Director by Secretary of Agriculture, Clifford Hardin in 1969. His duties consist of guiding the agency toward its goal of helping build the family farm system; expand business and industry and control or abate pollution; install water and waste disposal systems and other community facilities that help upgrade rural living; provide or improve modest homes in suitable rural environments for low or moderate income families.

"We are proud to have Mr. Futch as our speaker and urge all realtors, builders, county

agents and other interested people to attend," said Pat Fussell, DETDA President. "An important topic such as rural housing should be of interest to everyone," added Fussell.

Members of the Association will be hosted to lunch at Heritage Garden following the business session at 10 a.m. Three important resolutions will be submitted for the membership's approval. Dr. Benoit, M.D., from Stephen F. Austin State University, will report on a Vocational Training symposium to be held in early spring and include school superintendents, board members, principals and educators.

According to Fire Marshall Alva Cook and Volunteer Walt Davis the school is needed to give the seven fire departments around the county better coordination when a fire does occur.

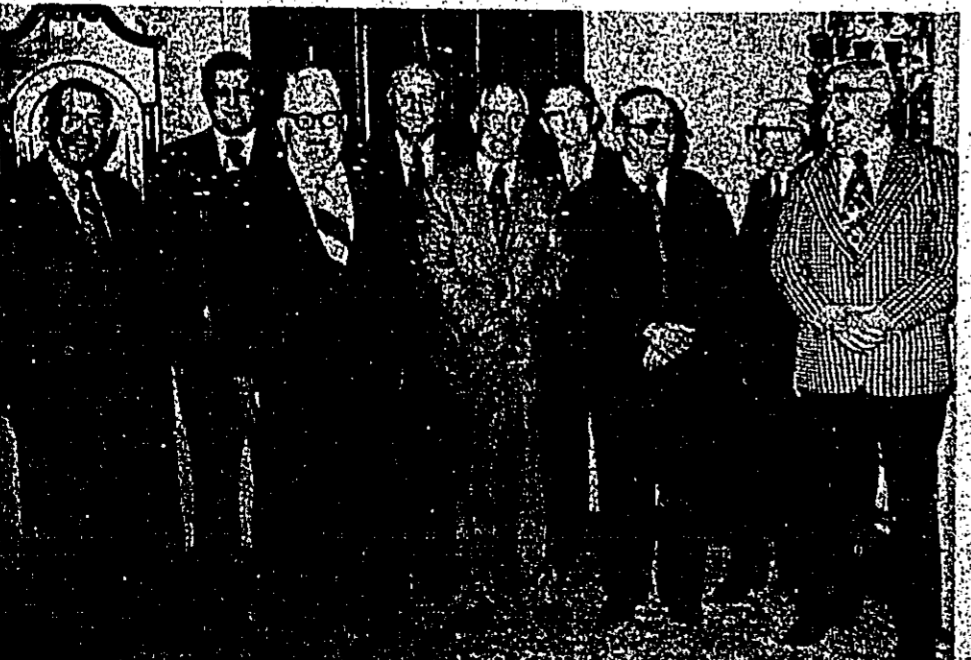
Davis says he feels the group could meet possibly once every two months and review training techniques and exchange helpful information which would benefit each department.

"It will give each department a chance to see exactly what the other departments have," Davis said.

Davis and Cook agreed that when there are 150 volunteers throughout Tyler County, that it takes a coordinated effort to control their activities for the mutual benefit of everyone.

Dogwood Princesses To Be Chosen On Thursday

As the Tyler County Dogwood Festival draws closer participating judges will be making their choices this Thursday, in the second of two preliminary judging activities leading up to the selection of a Dogwood Festival Queen.

The field of 13 girls, which was narrowed from a field of approximately 40 Tyler County beauties will lead to the judges picking five contestants, one to represent each of the schools in Tyler County.

On Thursday, March 18, the final judging will take place for the selection of the Dogwood Queen. The actual winner won't be named until the night of the Dogwood Festival Pageant on April 3.

The judging will take place at 7:00 p.m. at the Woodville Inn. For this final judging, each of the five (5) contestants shall be dressed in evening dresses that have met the approval of the Coronation Committee. Each of the five (5) finalist will participate in the Dogwood Festival, one as Queen, one as Princess

other three (3) as Princesses from their respective towns. The final selection of the Queen on March 18 will remain a secret until the night of the Dogwood Festival, April 3.

Contestants will be judged on the basis of poise, beauty and personality. In each judging phase, judges will vote by secret written ballot. In the final judging on March 18, five of the judges will be appointed to count the ballots and one of these five judges shall be from each of the high school communities of Tyler County.

The finalist and runner-up from each high school will be invited to participate in all the activities of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival. For these events where an escort is required, the girls may select a boy from any high school for her escort. The escorts of all participating girls must be high school students.

All girls entering the contest for 1976 Tyler County Dogwood Festival Queen will be invited to the Kingsmen Ball held on April 2, 1976.

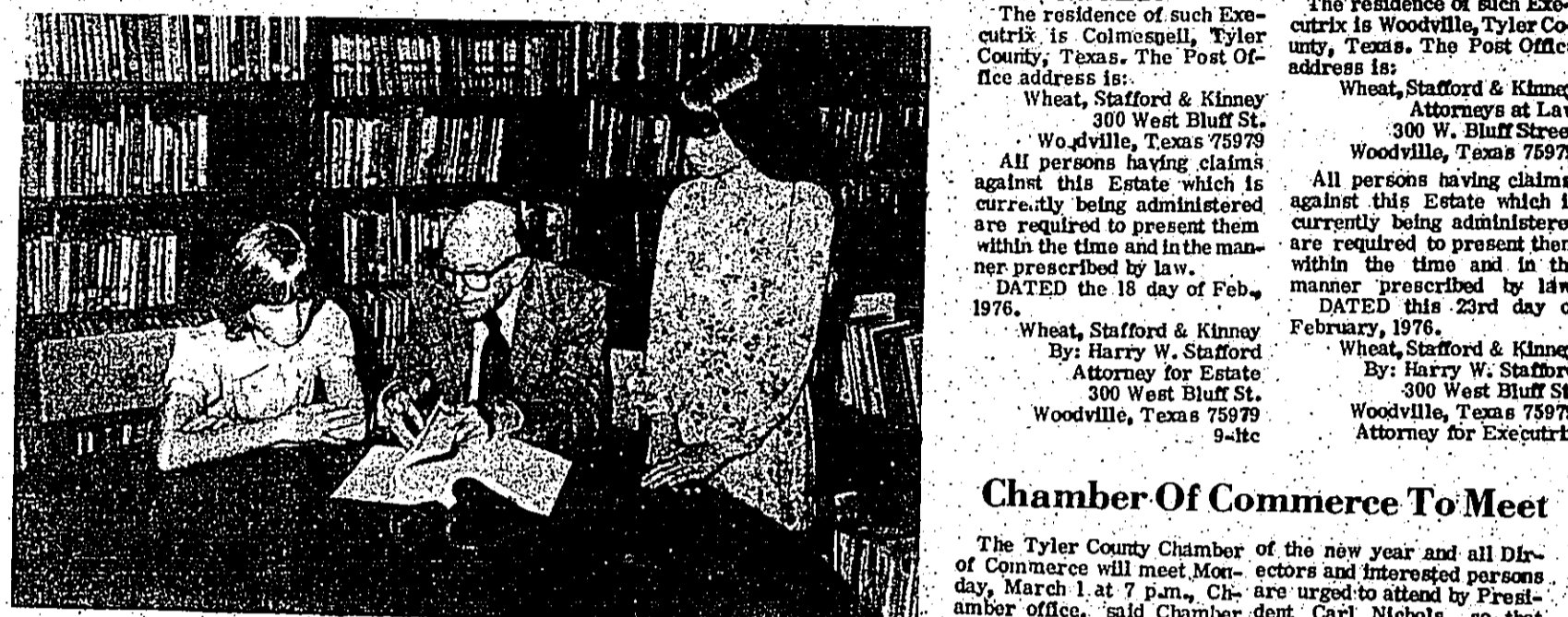

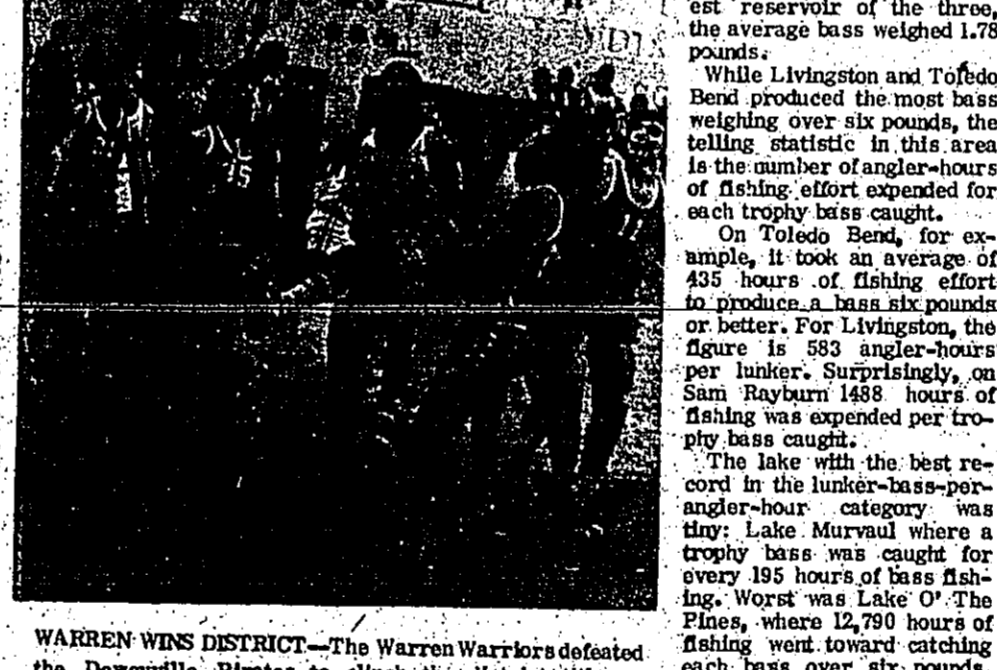

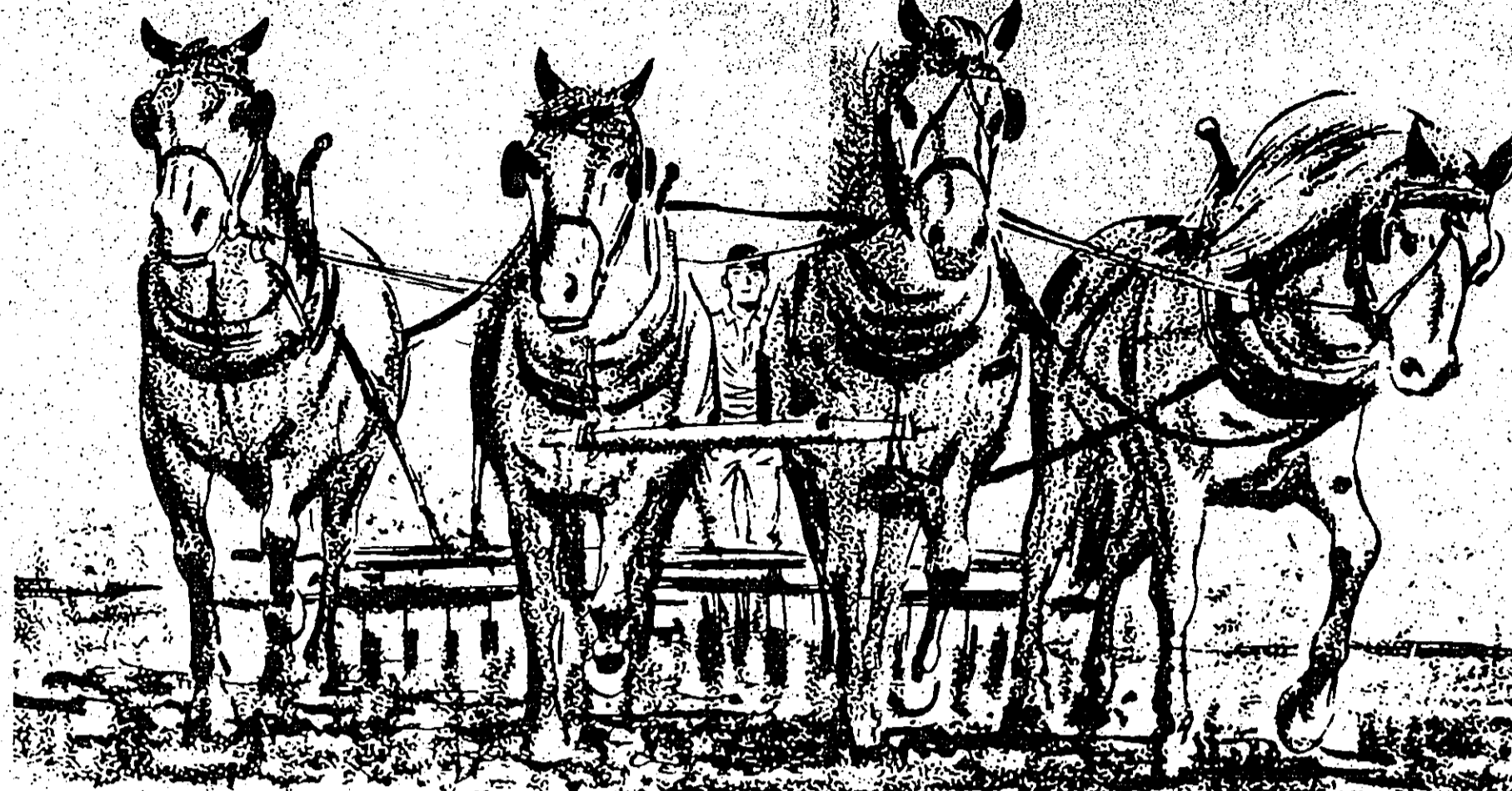

Farm Bureau Week March 1-6

March 1-6, 1976, has been proclaimed "Farm Bureau Week" in Tyler County by County Judge Tom Dickmann. Tyler County Farm Bureau will have a special membership enrollment drive during this period as a part of a statewide effort to exceed last year's total of 180,770 members. Tyler County ended its 1975 year with 346 members. All 29 county TFCOs will be seeking to show a gain in membership for the fourth year in a row.

Bud Byram of Colmesneil is president of the local county Farm Bureau. Membership Chairman is Bennie Stanford of Woodville. Membership enrolling who will be working on the drive include: Lawrence Rainey, Paul Castro, Ed. Hawk Jr. and Jim Sterling Jr.

The county president said farmers and ranchers need an organization more than ever before.

"Farmers and ranchers need a stronger organization to help solve problems in marketing, agricultural public relations, taxation, farm exports, as well as other matters affecting our net income," Bud Byram said.

Part of the proclamation issued by Judge Tom Dickmann reads:

"Agriculture is becoming more important to the economy of Tyler County, our State and Nation. Many of our citizens are dependent directly or indirectly upon agriculture for their livelihood. All consumers benefit from the productivity efficiency of modern agriculture.

"Farmers and ranchers have learned to promote their industry through organization. Four out of five agricultural producers in this Nation who belong to a general farm organization are members of Farm Bureau."

1975 was a notable year for the Tyler County Farm Bureau. Lloyd Fortenberry, Legislative Chairman and Ruth Stanford, Membership Chairman attended the Legislative Conference and the Membership Conference in Austin, Tyler County made its quota of members in their membership drive and Ruth Stanford attended the President's Conference in Washington, D.C. in April. May was the month of the first Queen Contest and Miss Kathy Barnes of Chester was selected queen.

In July the bureau sponsored three girls to the Citizenship Conference in Waco where one of our girls, Miss Phyllis Sparlock was chosen valedictorian of the Conference. Later that month the Bureau sponsored Don Jarker of the Colmesneil Place High to the President's school at A&M University. At the County Convention in October, the bureau reported from all the committees. Also they heard from Larry Trest Insurance Agent of the progress the insurance service was making in the County. The County Bureau was saddened to hear that Mr. Jarker was retiring. Mr. Jarker was the Agency Manager of Polk, Tyler and San Jacinto counties was retiring Jan. 1, 1976. David Horn was chosen to replace him in that position and is working very hard to promote better services to the Farm Bureau Members. All in all it was a good year. "Many thanks" to Mr. Soemans on his many years of service. We wish him many years of happy retirement.

Last year the Tyler County Farm Bureau also had a voting delegate attend the State Farm Bureau Convention in San Antonio. This is the first time Tyler County was represented at a State Convention.

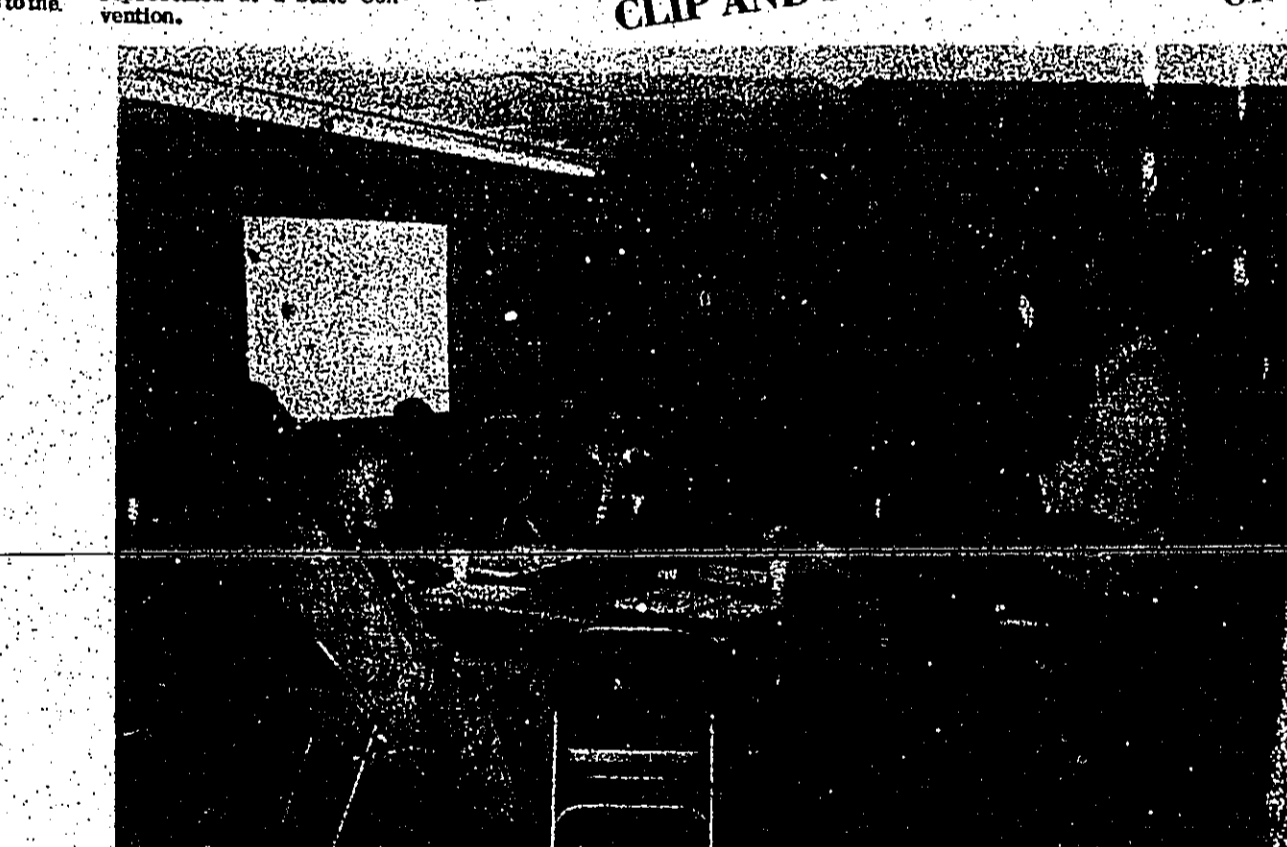
