## Chamber Directors Plan Projects For '76 Year

The Chamber of Commerce Directors met in their first monthly session Monday night under the direction of the Chamber's new President Carl Nichols.

Nichols, who's slogan for the coming year is "Unite Tyler County" heard reports from various committee persons present for the meeting.

The group, in routine business, agreed to research the feasibility of placing a "Chamber of Commerce" listing in each city directory around the county.

Nichols pointed out the idea of a Chamber charter review to update the existing charter of the organization.

Civic Improvement Committee member Doug Tolbert stated that his Cleanup Committee would try to involve itself in cleaning up city streets and encourage general cleanup of the city streets along with moving considerations of unsightly lots which he said needs to be taken care of.

Tolbert indicated his committee interest in also creating entry "welcome" signs in the city. He also asked the Chamber directors for their opinion of asking the commissioners court for blacktopping of the airport and ballpark roads because of the dust problem when cars use the road.

Tolbert was asked by Nichols to undertake each of the projects and bring them to completion if possible.

Nichols mentioned an interest in seeking county-wide building and electrical upgrading through possible use of quality and workmanship standards codes.

Harry Stafford, chairman of the Industrial Committee, spoke of the need for development of a "united business district" and proposed that the downtown merchants group consider alternative methods through which to improve the appearance of the business district of Woodville.

Stafford said "Woodville is considered by some as the best environment for investment than any city around". Stafford asked the group if they would consider a combined effort by the downtown merchants community while in trying to improve the general downtown appearance. Stafford indicated that a consultant in the architectural and design field was possibly obtainable and could be called upon by the group for ideas on such improvement. Stafford was asked by Nichols

to pursue the idea and report back to the group. Stafford is scheduled to meet with the Chamber of Commerce Retail Merchants Committee. "To explain the idea to them".

The consensus of the directors felt that "The repeat

business would be terrific" as a result of upgrading the appearance of Woodville downtown area.

Retail Merchants Chairman Fred Sullivan reported to the directors of a recent retail merchants committee

meeting where it was tentatively decided to have three promotions during the year. According to Sullivan the group is also considering signs to be placed at the county line urging Tyler Countians to trade at home "first".

## DETTA Hears Ideas On Rural Housing

J. Lynn Futch, director of the State Farmer's Home Administration told the Deep East Texas Development Association Friday that his office "Looks at the housing program statewide as a total package of rural development."

Futch predicted loans amounting to some \$300,000,000 in 1976 and indicated that he was "satisfied" with the local delivery system such as the one in Deep East Texas by the local supervisor.

Futch said, however, that increased case loads makes it difficult to process "the great number we get each year."

Futch indicated that money would be loaned statewide in 1976 with farming interests borrowing some \$195 million while home loans will amount to \$88 million and Water and sewer needs will total \$25 million and business and industrial borrowing will amount to \$16 million.

Futch said the housing program is based on two broad types; single or individual family dwellings, and (2) multi-family or apartment dwellings.

Futch indicated that dollars existed to buy a new home or an existing home or for remodeling or adding additional bedrooms for children.

"The clients must show the need for expansion and they must illustrate that they've tried for credit elsewhere."

Pat Fussell, president of the Development Association, and who is interested in real estate development, has keyed part of his administration this year toward rural housing development in the Association's eight county area.

Fussell has said "Rural housing should be of interest to everyone."

Futch was appointed as State Director by Secretary of Agriculture, Clifford Hardin in 1969. His duties consist of guiding the agency toward its goal of helping build the farm family system, expand business and industry and control or abate pollution; install water and waste disposal systems and other community facilities that help upgrade rural living; provide or improve modest homes in suitable rural environments for low or moderate income families.

Members of the Association were hosted to lunch at Heritage Garden following the business session at 10 a.m. Three important resolutions were submitted for the membership's approval.

Moore said the Department want's the public to know that "The schools are essentially getting a free ride on Texas' highways."

In other action the DETDA approved a resolution praising

AUSTIN—To winter in Texas, boat owners must have a certificate of title from the Texas Water Safety Department. 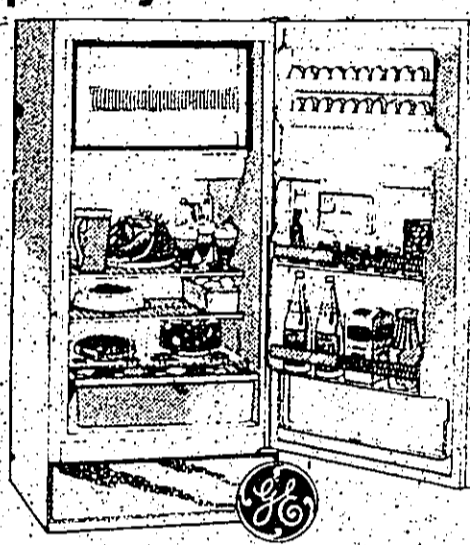

### OWER ALKS by U.S. Senator for Texas JOHN TOWER

WASHINGTON—Statistics, according to Webster, are the "systematic compilation of instances for the inference of general truths."

But statistics in the mouths of politicians can become dangerous weapons. Keep that in mind as you choose your side in the annual Battle of the Budget.

President Ford has submitted to Congress a proposed budget which he thinks is just right. Some think the budget is too low. Others think it is too high. Each will muster armies of statistics to prove his case. Facts and figures will fly like rockets and bombs.

The average citizen can be numbed by the endless flow of numbers if he isn't careful. Different numbers that give different impressions can be applied to the same situation with equal accuracy. It is vital to know what the numbers mean.

For instance, the budget the President has recommended calls for spending \$94.1 billion dollars in fiscal year 1977. That's a truly mind-boggling sum. Those who, like myself, want to persuade you that the government is spending too much will point out to you that if you were to spend a million dollars a day it would take you more than 1,000 years to spend \$394 billion. Or we'd let you that the federal government is planning to spend \$1.833 for every man, woman and child in the country. Or we'd tell you that the federal budget has more than doubled in the last 10 years, and increased tenfold in the last 30 years.

On the other hand, those who want to persuade you that the government should be spending more than it is, will point out to you that the budget is only a percentage of the gross national product, the total value of goods and services produced in the country each year, has increased only slightly in the last 10 years, from 20.5 per cent to 21.5 per cent.

The thing to keep in mind is that no set of statistics can "prove" that one side is right and another is wrong. The contest over the budget is that it is YOUR money we are talking about. The federal government has no resources of its own. All that it has is what it takes from you. In one form or another. Recognition of that fact could have a profound effect upon which side you will join in the Battle of the Budget.

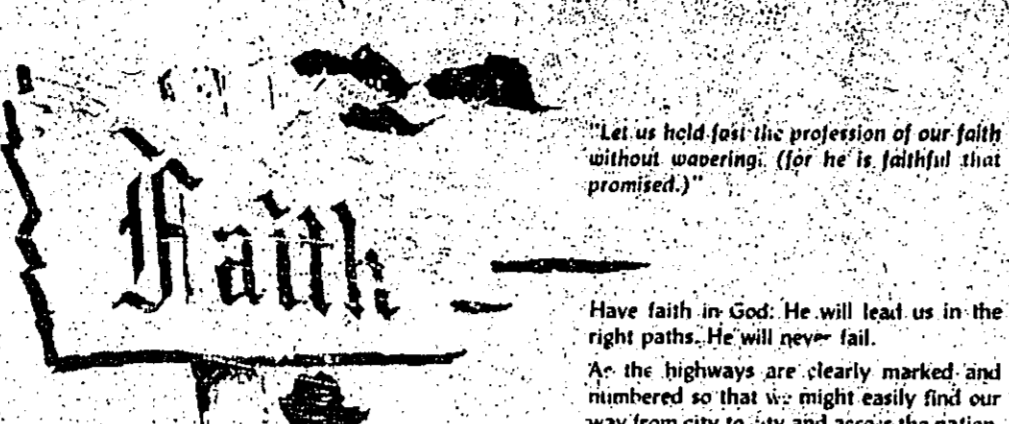

### Atomic Energy Visit Set

COLLEGE STATION—People benefiting uses of atomic energy will be demonstrated on the campus of Colmesneil and Warren High Schools. Orlan L. Hines will explain the structure of atoms, radiation, fusion and fission. Sources and principles will be discussed.
