'Mr. East Texas' Is S.F.A.'s Steen

The directors of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival announced Tuesday that Dr. Stephen F. Austin Steen, president of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival group, will be the 1976 "Mr. East Texas" designee of the Dogwood Festival group. Steen accepted the designation as he received a delegation of Dogwood Directors at his Nacogdoches office on Tuesday.

Formal presentation ceremonies will take place at the Thirty-third Annual Dogwood Festival Pageant and Coronation Saturday night April 3 at 8 p.m. The award will officially be presented by Darrel Mack, Executive Editor of the Beaumont Enterprise and Journal.

Steen will be the tenth recipient of the honor.

Steen thanked the group and said to "look forward" to being present at the Dogwood Ceremonies.

Dr. Steen, who is 70, is a noted author of many books on Texas history and government and American history and government. He has held this position since November, 1958 a period in which Stephen F. Austin has experienced its greatest growth.

Dr. Steen has written 15 books on Texas history and government and American history and government. Many of these publications are used as textbooks in the junior and senior high schools of Texas. In addition, he has published about 75 articles in national journals, and has presented scholarly papers at meetings of such societies as the Texas State Historical Association, the Southwestern Social Science Association, the Texas Academy of Science, the Southern Historical Association, and the Mid-

Briscoe Delivers Budget Message

(Editors Note: The following are remarks by Governor Dolph Briscoe at the Governor's Budget Conference in Austin, Texas at LBJ Auditorium on March 10, 1976.)

I want to thank each of you for being here today. I want to thank the Lt. Governor, the Speaker, and members of the Legislature who are present. I need your help.

I have invited you here today so that we might discuss the fiscal status of our State; the funding needs and priorities of Texas State government for the 1978-79 biennium. It is essential that we do so early before the budgeting process begins.

It is my firm conviction that the necessity of fiscal responsibility in all levels of government is second only to world peace in its importance to the survival of our American way of life.

To put it plainly, government spending still levels has gotten out of hand. The federal budget has quadrupled in just ten years—jumping from less than \$100 billion in 1965 to almost \$400 billion in 1975. Next year, the federal government will spend twice as much as it did from their State government during our first 150 years as a nation.

In Texas, State government appropriations for the current biennium of approximately \$12 billion 800 million, compared with a spending for the 1966-67 biennium of approximately \$3 billion 700 million, represent an increase of \$9 billion 100 million—or 250 percent.

During this period, appropriations for public school education have increased three-fold; welfare has increased four-fold; and higher education five-fold.

Some of this growth was needed. Some of it has been counterproductive. State supported institutions of higher learning, for example, are now graduating 15,000 certified teachers per year, at an estimated average cost of \$6,000 per graduate. But here in Texas we need only 5,400 teachers each year. Thus we are producing about 9,600 more teachers than are needed per year at an estimated cost of \$27 million.

The more we spend—at any level—the more people we have to hire to spend it. That's a law of bureaucracy: it goes up proportionately. As a result, State employment in Texas has risen from 45,000 in 1957 to 135,000 in 1974—a jump of 192 percent. And today, one out of every six Texas workers now works for the government at some level.

The Labor Department projects that in the near future out of every four new jobs created in government, in my opinion, we cannot allow this situation to be reversed. It is sapping our resources and turning our country into a huge bureaucracy. And even worse, it will lead us to bankruptcy.

We have seen what uncontrolled spending has done to New York City. It is a trap for going higher and higher. Businesses and industries were forced to leave and locate elsewhere. And finally, New York City could not borrow enough money to meet its budget and debt service requirements. Only massive intervention by the federal government—neither of which could afford it, considering their own deficits—saved New York City temporarily from total bankruptcy. And now the State of New York is faced with a large deficit that could throw it into bankruptcy. This must not happen in Texas.

This is not going to happen in Texas as long as I am Governor.

This is the reason for this budget conference. I have asked for your help. This is not a simple matter. It is a complex problem. The people of Texas are entitled to a high quality of service and much of our growth since 1966 has given them these needed services.

Three new medical schools, one dental school, and four new nursing schools were established to improve health care for all of our citizens. Nine facilities for the mentally retarded and mentally ill were established so that we might properly care for and treat those who are less fortunate than ourselves. State support of twenty-six new CMSR community centers during this period has also aided in this endeavor.

Our public junior college system now numbers fifty-three institutions.

During this period, as well, nine new institutions of higher education were established in various geographical areas of our State.

The state supported higher education system in Texas is now the second largest in the nation—and there is obviously no need to establish new universities.

New social services, medical and food stamp programs have been implemented to assist our needy citizens.

Further, Texas is one of the few states in the Nation that has attempted to solve the problem of equitable financing our system of public schools. Examples could be cited in other areas of government to illustrate the growth in spending and services during this period. Texas reflects what was happening in other states across the Nation as well as in the federal government.

I have earned my Bachelor and Master Degrees in Theology from the Houston Baptist Bible College of Houston. I am now serving as Pastor of the Baldwin Chapel Baptist Church and Missionary of the General Board District Association, Dr. O.B. Brent of Houston, Moderator.

I am a part-time dispatcher for the Tyler County Sheriff's Department, Tyler County Courthouse in Woodville.

I am interested in the advancement of Youth and would like to serve in this School District as a member of the Board of Education. I am presenting all of the people of this District. Your vote and support will be greatly appreciated.

If Grant Goes Through New Jail Money Added

Advocates for a new jail facility in Tyler County got a boost Thursday as the Deep East Texas Council of Governments Criminal Justice Advisory Council approved another \$9,000 in funding considerations for Phase I planning for a new jail in Woodville. That move by the council is the second of three steps in the new jail construction process. The funding, which was OK'd by the Council Thursday still must be applied for by COG officials in the form of a grant before it can be spent.

On Tuesday the Commissioners Court met to consider several architectural firms in bids for construction and planning of the new jail facility. \$10,000 had been budgeted and approved last year for this preliminary architectural work.

Local Architectural Firm A/E Project Management Services, headed by Don R. Cole Architect and Prindle Patrick and Partners of Dallas were awarded the contract to provide the Phase I Planning study.

According to Ron Willis, COG Criminal Justice planner, the firm has some eight to 10 weeks to prepare the preliminary planning for the jail. After which, he said, a project cost for the facility will be made in terms of whatever suits the county's needs.

Tyler County was represented on Thursday by County Sheriff Lewis Craven, Woodville City Police Chief, Gary Mattingly and Criminal Investigator B.J. Vardeman. Both the Chief and the Sheriff spoke vigorously about Tyler County's need for a new jail facility.

The effective date of the new food cost allowance was set at March 1. The increase amounts to \$2.

The Commissioners in Tuesday action granted the firm of A/E Project Management Services, headed by Don R. Cole Architect and Prindle Patrick and Partners of Dallas, the authorization to begin planning work and to

Commission Signals 'Go' On Jail Planning

The Tyler County Commissioners met on two consecutive days this week on Monday to conduct regular business and on Tuesday to give a "go-ahead" for step one planning for a new jail for Tyler County.

Jail considerations were also on the minds of the Commissioners on Monday as they approved the meal cost allowance for prisoners who are retained in the Tyler County facility.

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The total amount under the "corrections" heading was \$71,500.

Total included all three categories amounted to over \$200,000.

Tyler County is among many East Texas County's which have a deteriorating jail situation. According to Sheriff Craven, "The situation must be corrected."

Appearing at recent Commissioners Court meetings the Tyler County Ministerial Alliance has gone on record asking improvement of the situation in Woodville.

The commissioners were asked by the Ministers "do what you can to improve the conditions."

The group pointed out the fact that the jail falls to meet state and federal regulations in its present condition.

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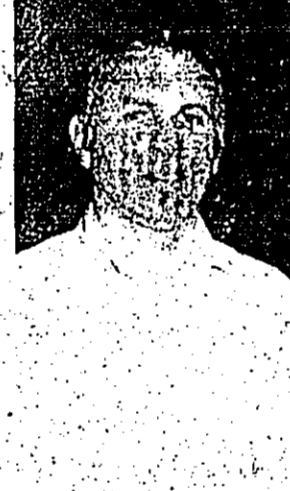
Miss Tyler County Travels To Ft. Worth

 She was accompanied by her manager Mrs. Magdie Fryer and Mrs. Dorothy Birtwell, both of Woodville.



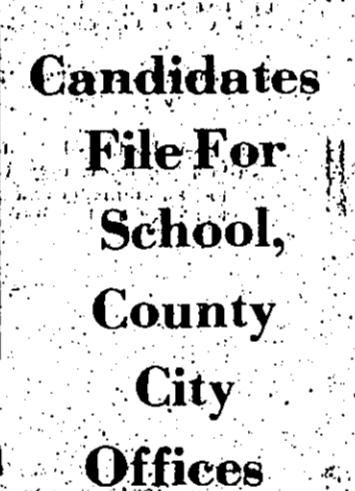

The period of unprecedented growth in our history. We must now face the harsh reality of what we have always known. Neither man nor government can afford to live beyond its means.

We can no longer afford to trade our economic freedoms to the government in exchange for false promises of a better future.

We can no longer naively assume that government has the power, the wisdom and the financial resources to solve every problem that besets our civilization.

The fiscal problems currently confronting our State government require a re-examination of our basic philosophy.

In Nebraska - A special legislative session to avoid projected deficit.

In Ohio - Layoffs of 3,000 state employees to balance the budget.

In Georgia - Reduction of the previously approved spending level by \$150 million to solve immediate budget problems.

In Connecticut - Either new taxes or state employee layoffs ranging from 1,000 to 6,000 workers to offset a potential state deficit of \$80 million.

In Massachusetts - A deficit of \$400 million was met by the state's reduction of state agency spending; and, a freeze on hiring - in order to meet a deficit.

In Colorado - A projected deficit of \$25 million from the State's \$840 million general fund budget.

ending on the federal level has left us a legacy of high taxes, excessive budgets, and huge deficits. Despite the fact that the federal level of spending nationally, we still have an unacceptably high rate of unemployment.

Unemployment is more than just a statistic. It is a waste of human resources, as well as a personal tragedy to those involved. It means either no government services and full employment, than have excessive government spending and eight to ten percent of our people out of work because we have supported an institution to consider a similar type of management study to increase the productivity and the efficiency of your operation.

This is a policy I am proposing. I am proud that Texas has consistently had a low rate of unemployment, compared with other states. Today, our unemployment rate of 5.8 percent - while still too high - is one of the lowest in the nation. We need to reduce the rate of government spending, by consolidating various functions and eliminating some entirely, the Governor's office is operating even more effectively and efficiently.

I want to thank each of you for your dedicated service - and that of each of those fine Texas men who make up our agency, institution or organization and for your dedicated service to the citizens of this great State. It is because of your service that it is possible for Texas to have the best State government in the nation. We need to return to the viewpoint that people look to government to do only those things they cannot do for themselves as individuals, or through private groups.

My fiscal policies represent this viewpoint and in my opinion reflect the thinking of all overwhopping majority of the people of this State.

I reaffirm my commitment again today that Texas State government will continue to operate within our financial means as we have done for the past two regular sessions of the Legislature.

As Chief Executive Officer of this State, I am determined to use all my authority and influence to ensure that this objective is achieved.

During the next Session, I will work with the Legislature, the Speaker and the members of the Legislature so that we will adopt a balanced budget that represents a responsible fiscal plan for the State.

I will veto any piece of legislation that will require new or additional state taxes.

Each of you is the key to implementing this objective - fiscal responsibility in Texas State government.

If I through your agencies and institutions - managed through the Board and Commission concept - that is, a semi-independent state service - provided. I believe this system is sound, and has served Texas well. Citizen members have always given their valuable support to the State government. It is responsible to the needs of its citizens. In my opinion, the professional qualifications of you ladies and gentlemen have been the only by your honesty, integrity and dedication to better Texas government.

To implement my policy, I am requesting that you participate in a totally different process by which appropriation requests are prepared and approved. Budgets are administered.

Such a process involves the following elements:

1. Reassess, completely, the financial needs of each agency and institution for the upcoming 1977 fiscal year. Ensure that every dollar of expenditure is essential, and make every effort to maintain such services at current fiscal year costs. It is not necessary to spend every dollar that may be available under the current appropriations bill.
2. Determine to finance services planned for the next biennium within levels of expenditure that are being presently appropriated to your agency.
3. Justify, fully, and increase requested and be absolutely certain such requests represent the highest priority programs of your agency.
4. Search for new methods and procedures to improve employee productivity to assist you in achieving these goals without taxpayer increases. State government must achieve a five percent reduction in its workforce through normal attrition.

I am directing my staff to review thoroughly each request for appropriations to ensure its adherence to the policy of fiscal restraint that

Hunting Fishing Proposals For Southeast Texas

Another major departure, the opening of cypress swamps to hunting is being proposed for a portion of Liberty County for Jan. 25-30, 1977, with a limit of two coots per day and four in possession.

Swamp efforts in the area were started by the P&WD in 1964, and there is now a surplus of coot pheasants not needed for breeding in some parts of Liberty County.

A proposed change in fishery regulations involves the closing of Keith Lake in Jefferson County and a portion of San Tim State Park to shrimp trawling for the taking of fish and shrimp. The proposal would close all areas south of the Port Arthur ship channel and 20-foot minimum depth would be allowed for bait purposes. Officials said the proposal was necessary to prevent a channel or blue catfish less than nine inches in length in the Southeast, North and Potomac Kingdom regulatory districts.

Drowning Statistics Given

Ruddy Coughlin, P&WD Officer 822-8096, said that the drowning statistics, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department water safety officials said that in 1975, 238 persons drowned in Texas waters.

Of the total fatalities, 546 were male, 388 were female and 104 were children. Accidents while swimming accounted for 218 deaths. Some 153 persons drowned in the State of Texas, and 433 accidents occurred in 1975.

Some what encouraging is that the 1975 drowning statistics are below the 1974 drowning statistics. In 1974, 725 persons drowned in Texas waters.
