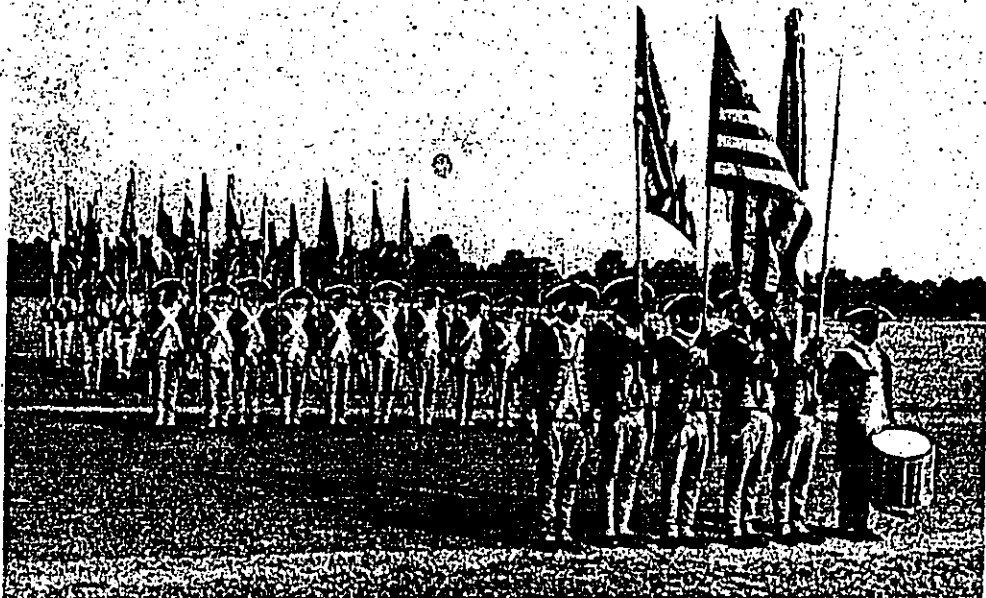

Color Guard To Lead Parade

The Fort Polk Bicentennial Color Guard shown above, will lead the April 3 Tyler County Dogwood Parade which will form and begin at 2 p.m. with Bicentennial ceremonies following on the courthouse square at 4 p.m. The Color Guard Unit is one of four Departments of the Army approved and funded projects which qualified Fort Polk for recognition by the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission as an Official Bicentennial Army Installation. The 17-man unit consists of a marching squad and a color guard including a drummer and five players. The men are members of the Fifty Infantry Division (Mechanized). The color guard's first performance was at Fort Polk, Louisiana, on June 14, 1975, in conjunction with ceremonies observing the 200th Anniversary of the United States Army. Since that time it has performed in more than twenty communities in connection with their bicentennial activities as well as at the Texas State Fair, Cotton Bowl Parade, and New Orleans Mardi Gras. The Fort Polk Bicentennial Color Guard will continue to participate where possible in area community activities associated with the nation's bicentennial observance.

House Speaker Clayton Will Crown Dogwood Queen

Texas House of Representatives Speaker Bill Clayton will be on hand at this year's Tyler County Dogwood Festival to introduce the Tyler County Princesses and name the new Queen and Princess for the Festival during coronation ceremonies at 8 p.m. on April 3.

Clayton, who will be introduced by Festival Director Josiah Wheat, will fly in from West Texas, just for the special evening ceremony, Festival spokesman said.

He will introduce each of the Princesses from Warren, Chester, Colmesneil, Woodville and Spurrier, naming the

Princess "for all of Tyler County" from the five. Following that designation the House Speaker will reveal from the remaining four the "Dogwood Queen for the coming year."

Speaker Clayton has served as a member of the Texas House of Representatives since his first election in 1962. He was elected Speaker of the House by his peers on January 14, 1975.

He has been an acknowledged legislative leader, playing a key role in most major water and conservation legislation during his tenure. He has served on all major committees and has chaired many of them. Because of his hard work and drive, he has probably passed more bills through the House than anyone else in the same time.

Speaker Clayton is a member of the Executive Committee of the National Conference of State Legislatures, Chairman of the Southern Legislative Conference, member of the Executive Committee of the Governing Board of the Council of State Governments, board member of the Texas Water Conservation Association, former executive director and present advisory board member of Water, Inc., and dean of the First Baptist Church of Springlake.

He is past chairman of the Southern Environmental Resources Conference, former

chairman of the Interstate Conference on Water Problems, former chairman of the Intergovernmental Relations Committee of the National Legislative Conference and past president of the Springlake Lions Club.

Speaker Clayton has received many awards and citations, including Fort Worth Press "Outstanding Service Award in Water Conservation," Lamb County Outstanding Service Award, 1974 Citizen of the Year Award from the Earth Chamber of Commerce, was presented the first award of the West Texas Water Institute for Meritorious Contributions in water development, and chosen "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association.

He was born in Olney, Texas, September 11, 1923 and moved with his family to Springlake, Texas, in 1931. He attended Springlake where he attended public school. Speaker Clayton is a graduate of Texas A&M University with a bachelor of science in agricultural economics.

He maintains farming, ranching and banking interests in Lamb County, along with several other business investments.

Speaker Clayton and his wife, Delma, have two children. A daughter, Mrs. Chuck (Brenda) Smith, a son, Tommy and a granddaughter, Lisa.

Kicks Off Dogwood Festival Week

Western Weekend Soon

The co-ordinator of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival Western Weekend activities has every right to feel that his part of the 10-day long event which begins Friday, March 26 is "an extremely 'worthy' project".

Considered one of the best "after" attractions in East Texas, the Western Weekend portion of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival promises "plenty of good action" says Tyler County's own "top kicker" Ben Worthy.

Some 15 trailriding clubs will trek to Woodville for a Western Weekend Parade, Western dance and a wild-west rodeo. The riders will camp for parties and dances along the way, on Friday night, March 26, at various midpoints along Tyler County's beautiful inroads to Woodville and the beginning of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival.

The 15 trailriding clubs will offer up to 100 to 250 individuals each with over 1,500 riders in all as participants in the Annual Dogwood Celebrations which starts off in a Western atmosphere.

Worthy, himself, whose "been messin'" with horses all his life" promises the best stock available including good bulls, good jumpin' horses, fast calves, and tough steers, will wrestle during the rodeo which begins at 4 p.m., March 27, following a two hour parade.

The riders are expected to ride 5-hours straight Saturday morning covering some 17-20 miles and arriving in time for the start of the parade which spills into the rodeo arena at 4 p.m. Parade Chairman Lawrence Rainey indicated that only horse-drawn vehicles will be allowed in the parade.

Rodeo entrants will be accepted on Friday, March 26, only from 8-12 a.m., said Henry Joe Jordan, Rodeo Chairman. Stock is provided by the Dan Harris Cattle Company in Orange.

A Dogwood Western Weekend Sweetheart will be chosen from the trailriding clubs entering the parade. Two runners-up will also be chosen. Jane Worthy, co-ordinator of the Sweetheart Contest will see that the girls are judged 25% on appearance, 25% on personality, and 50% on riding ability. The girls will be judged immediately before the rodeo with the production company providing the judges.

The Dogwood Western Sweetheart will be sponsored by the Dogwood Festival Western Committee to the Jasper Lions Club Rodeo.

A new addition to this year's Western Week activities includes a Teenage Country and Western Dance set for Saturday night, March 27, from 8 till midnight. A 6-piece band from Beaumont, "Deepwater" will provide the music. The

dance is scheduled to be held in the Kirby High Gym. The Adult Western Dance will be held in the Dogwood Inn Ballroom with music by Roger Mayo.

Trailrides making the trek to Woodville this year will be: The Lumberton Trailriders, Allen's Riding Arena, Jasper, Texas Saddle Club, Polk Co-

nty Trailriders; Daytown Trailriders; Lake Texas Saddle Club, Colmesneil; Shawnee Trailriders, Huntington; Tyler County Youth Riders; Tyler County Trailblazers, Beaumont; Rodgers Riding Arena, Jasper; Dogwood Trailriders, Livingston; West Hardin Trailriders; and the Moscow-

Corigan Trailriders.

Woodville School Board Considers Bond Possibility

Board Members Await 'Attractive' Land Proposal



School Board At Tuesday Night Meeting

The Woodville Independent School District Board of Trustees, considered for a fleeting moment on Tuesday night the possibility of calling a new school bond election before graduation this May, because of what they termed "a real good land deal" from board members and Superintendent Tom Linnam said in an open session they were confident in being able to secure the land proposal but needed "to get it nailed down first."

Details of the proposal were apparently discussed in an "closed executive" session following the first open portion of the meeting.

The possibility remains that the board could meet in special session soon for the purpose of calling an election designed to poll the voters

on the new school question before this year's senior class commences late in May.

Jack Stanbury of Moore-Stanbury and Vaughn Architects; of Port Arthur reviewed with the board, in open session, the details of the deal he said were surveyed by both he and Superintendent Linnam prior to the meeting.

Stanbury indicated in reviewing each site that water and sewerage improvements were necessary and amounted to, in some cases, as much as \$100,000 in additional monetary considerations.

In that the board had listed the "possibility of discussion of a school bond election" Stanbury had been asked to present the pro-sita evaluations as to the overall general "feasibility" of each of the lo-

cations. Stanbury volunteered an idea to the board suggesting that they form a "site selection committee" set up, he said, to review the details of each site, consideration then, after adequate study they would present their findings to the board. Board members questioned their individual ability to make pertinent recommendations "just by walking across the land."

Linnam said that he had been asked by Board President E. E. Swearingen to enter the discussion of a possible Bond Election in the meetings agenda and said he felt that "We're trying to give the people a chance to run with the ball."

Swearingen asked the board for their "opinion" stating "this spring or next fall?"

Board Member E.L. Boykin was the first to respond to the board president's question saying "Being prepared is more important than trying to pick a specific month to call the election."

One member said "I don't think we can have it this spring, March is already gone." Jim Gahner in an initial recommendation, suggested that the board "wait until fall."

He later altered that statement toward the general feeling of the board as a whole, in meeting to hear more specifics about concrete site proposals before an actual decision could be made.

School Service League representative Mrs. Curtis Garner, when asked for her opinion, said the Service League was "ready to go right now."

Is there something said about it in the Bible? Embalming is an ancient art, which was skillfully performed by the Egyptians. Modern methods of embalming are of recent origin.

Religious beliefs have their effect on such things. For example we read of people who believed that the presence of the soul in the body was essential to the existence of the spirit after death, but such is not taught in the Bible.

Being embalmed is a matter of personal choice or desire as far as the Bible is concerned, there being no regulation requiring it nor does it violate any part of God's law.

Note some different preparations for burial: (1) Jacob and Joseph were embalmed by the Egyptians (Gen. 50:2). (2) Jesus was buried with a linen cloth wrapped about him (Mt. 27:59) with spices (John 19:39, 40) according to the manner of the Jews. (3) Dorcas was washed (Acts 9:37). (4) Ananias was simply wound up and buried immediately (Acts 5:6).

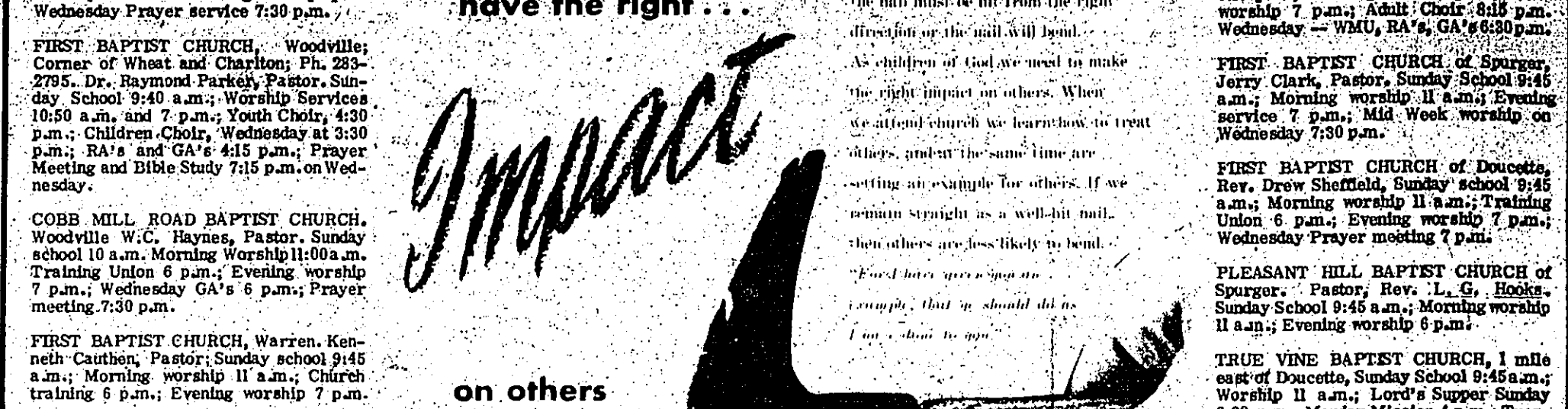

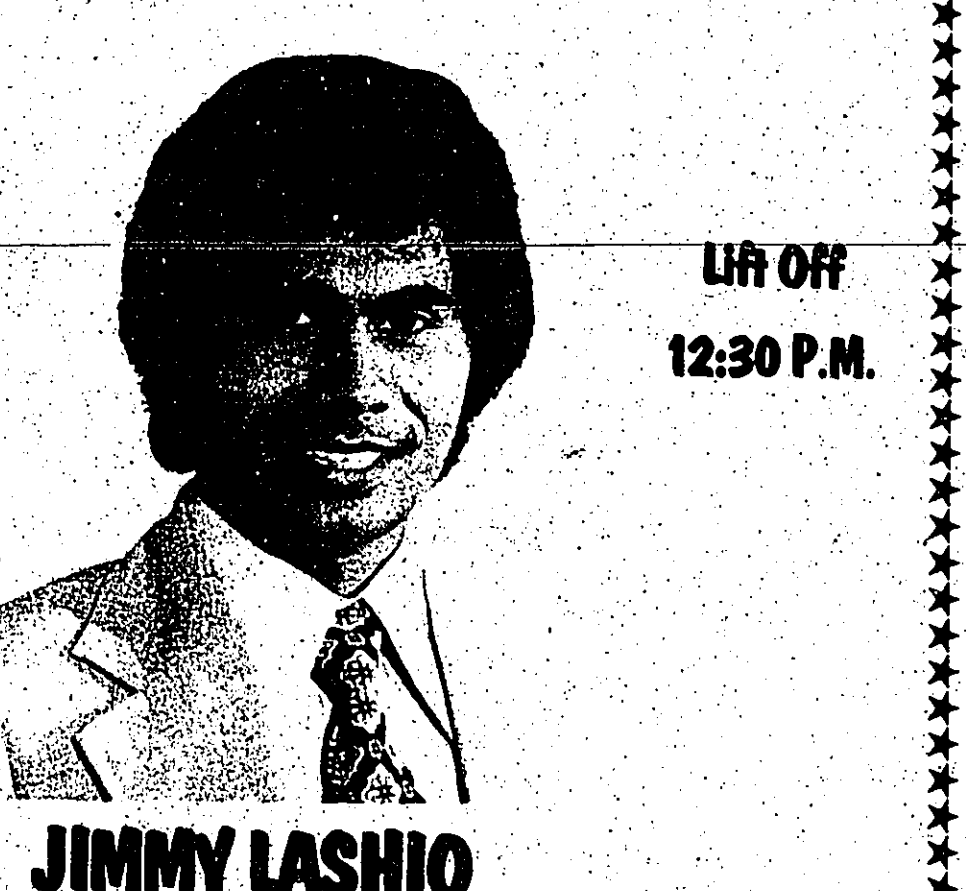
